Tahoka Wind Energy project gives \$30,000 donation to Sr. Citizens

Lincoln Clean Energy, LLC last week presented a sizable donation to the Lynn County Senior Citizens Pioneer Center to help them reach their goal of \$110,000 to restore the former Tahoka City Hall into a new senior center.

Eric R. Barnett, Director of Development with Lincoln Clean Energy, LLC, presented a \$30,000 check from the Tahoka Wind project for the Pioneer Center's building project, which helped put the center over their targeted goal for funds to begin the renovation project. Jay Dee House, chairman of the Pioneer Center Board of Directors, accepted the check, along with board members Loretta Tekell, Nancy Guilliams, Betty Ehlers, Clyde May, and Center Director Sandra Norwood.

"Thank you very much for the donation, we truly appreciate your generosity," directors told Barnett. "With these funds we have now achieved our goal, and we can begin the renovation process."

The current Pioneer Center is located in an old house at 1600 South 3rd, and the new project will not only give the senior citizens a newer, nicer location with more amenities, but because it is a city-owned property the City of Tahoka will provide the utilities for the new center as well, which will assist the center with monthly expenses. The Pioneer Center not only serves nutritious noon meals Monday through Friday at their location, but also provides meals for many senior citizens in the county through Meals On Wheels.

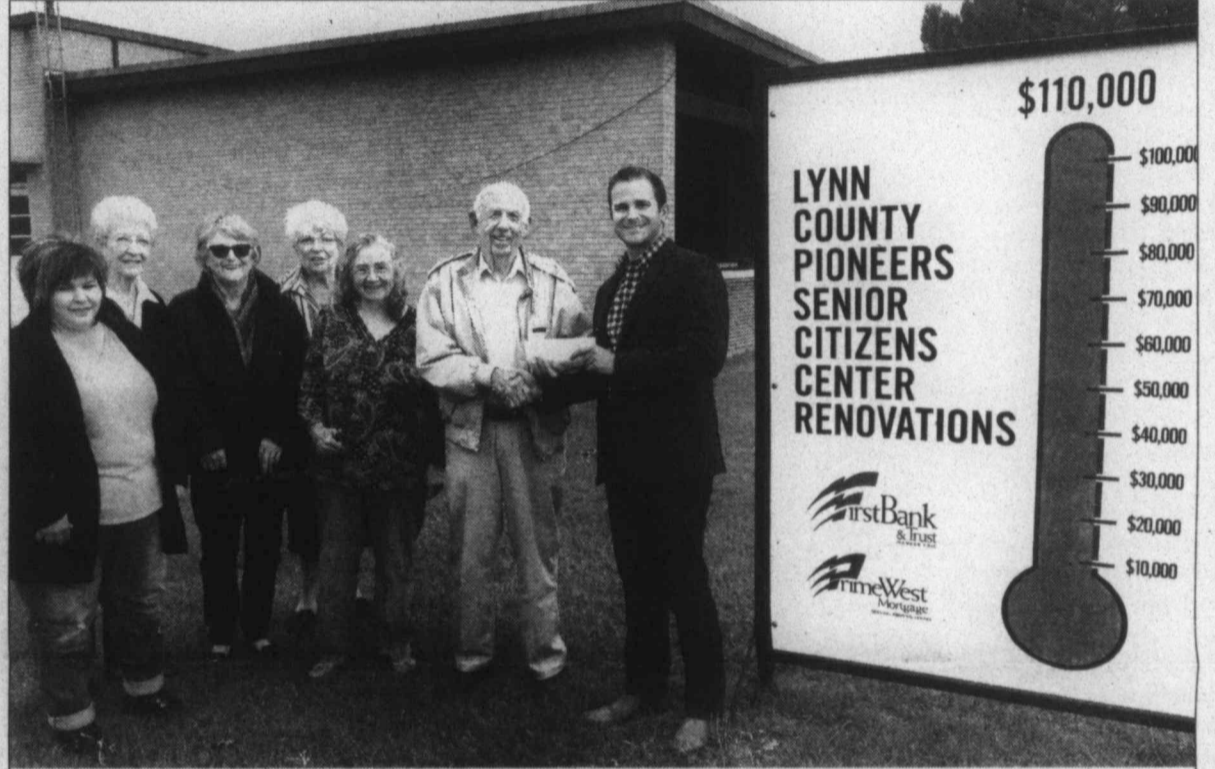
"We are ready to get this project moving, so we appreciate Lincoln Clean Energy for their generosity in helping us be able to reach our funding goal," said House.

"Our fundamental mission is to

produce clean energy for a sustainable future and be a good neighbor to the people in the communities in which we operate," said Barnett. "We are proud to be part of the Lynn County community and are happy that our contribution will help provide the county's senior citizens with needed care and support."

The funds are presented through the Tahoka Wind project,

which was the first phase of the Staked Plains Energy Center project for Lincoln Clean Energy. Tahoka Wind encompasses an area of approximately 60,000 acres with 120 wind turbines producing 300 megawatts of energy, bringing new jobs and increased tax revenue to Lynn County. The majority of the project is located south of US 380 in Lynn County, east of Tahoka and going towards Grassland.

Early Voting starts Monday for Nov. 6 General Election

Early Voting for the Nov. 6 General Election begins Monday, Oct. 22 and continues through Nov. 2. In Lynn County, Early Voting will be conducted at the County Clerk's Office located at 1627 Ave. K, during regular business hours, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday-Friday. Registered voters must provide their voter registration card and

a driver's license or other form of photo ID, when voting.

Local offices, all unopposed, will be included on the ballot for the positions of County Judge (Mike Braddock), County Clerk (Susan Tipton), District Clerk (Sandra Laws), County Treasurer (Amy Schuknecht), Justices of Peace for Precincts 1 (Christie Olivan) and

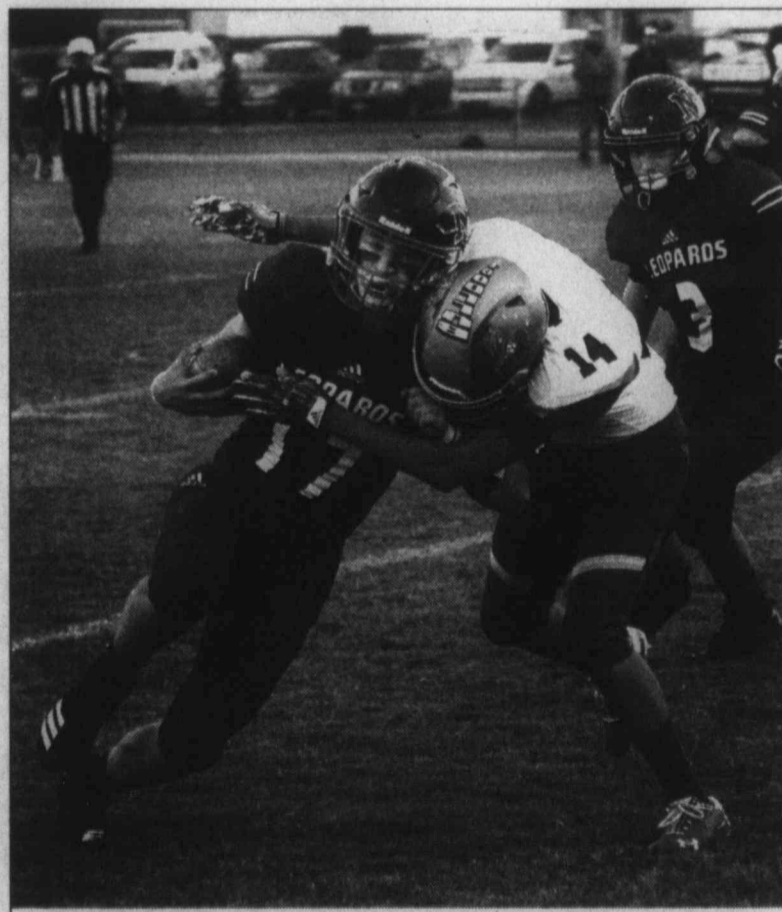
4 (Ed Follis), and Commissioner Precincts 2 (John Hawthorne) and 4 (Larry Durham).

The position of 106th District Judge is also on the ballot, with candidate Reed Filley running unopposed.

The ballot will also include two federal positions, with candidates for U.S. Senator and

U.S. Representative District 19, as well as state offices including Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, State Representative District 83, and other offices.

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1's election for a Director, Pct. 1, is on the ballot as well.

Council approves ordinances regulating residential parking, mobile food vendors

Tahoka City Council met last Monday night for routine business, approving adoption of two ordinances that will regulate mobile food vendors in Tahoka, and that regulates parking in yards of residences here.

The council had received citizen input in the past regarding the proposed ordinance that would restrict parking of vehicles in unpaved or non-driveway areas in the front yards of local residences, and made several amendments to the original proposal, including exempting existing lots that have farm equipment parked on them.

Parking on unimproved surfaces will be prohibited by the Yard Parking Ordinance, but there are certain exceptions listed in the ordinance, such as behind a concealing fence, wall or other screening. An improved parking surface is defined as a surface paved, covered or improved with asphalt, gravel, rock, caliche, brick, concrete or

some other impervious all-weather surface. No vehicle may be parked within the front yard or side yard of any lot in a residential district, except for loading/unloading purposes for a period not exceeding 7 days during a 30-day period. A recreational vehicle of a non-Tahoka resident visiting a local resident will be allowed to park on the lot of the person being visited for a maximum of 7 days during a 30-day period, according to the ordinance.

The City of Tahoka may impose a fine not to exceed \$500 for each violation of this ordinance. Interested citizens may obtain a full copy of the Yard Parking Regulations from Tahoka City Hall.

The Mobile Food Vendor ordinance lists several regulations, regarding initial permitting inspection and certified food managers, vending permit fees, permitted locations, and other requirements. Mobile food unit vendors shall be permitted to conduct business in

CVF professional wrestling to put on show here Oct. 21

On Sunday, October 21 the CVF Professional Wrestling ministry will put on a free show at 5 p.m. at the Tahoka Elementary gym. All are invited to attend.

The Christian Wrestling Federation (CVF) is Professional Wrestling with a Christian message, according to Mike Watt of Tahoka, who wrestles as "Shiloh".

"I've been doing this pro-wrestling thing for 17 years. I've wrestled in school gyms, county fairs, even in the shadow of roller coasters in theme parks. I've wrestled in Egypt, Africa, Mexico, and Puerto Rico, and many states here in the good old USA. We even set up our wrestling ring at this year's Harvest Festival," said Watt.

"We are a Professional Wrestling ministry," he explains. "We put on exciting pro-wrestling shows with tons of action. We have high flyer Luchadors that will leap off the top rope as well as 250+ lb bruisers who will slam opponents across the ring. Most people are drawn into the story and action within the first match.

"In addition to the 3-5 matches in a typical CVF show, we will offer CVF Kids Experience. For \$5 kids of any age can get in the ring, and learn some of the basics of pro-wrestling before the action starts. This is a unique opportunity for fans to live out the dream of stepping into a wrestling ring.

"That leads to why we do what we do. We put out a family friendly pro-wrestling show. Families can come and get loud and have a great time. All the while, parents do not have to worry about language or wardrobe malfunctions. In addition, we emphasize 'do

the city, not closer than within 200 feet of an established brick and mortar restaurant or food service location, and may operate only during the hours of 7 a.m.-10 p.m. Vendors shall not be permitted to conduct business in any area within the city that has been zoned for residential and/or schools, or within 100 feet of the boundary line of any residential zoned district.

The Mobile Food Vendor ordinance will not apply to any child neighborhood beverage stand, mobile ice cream vendors, or mobile snow cone vendors, or to mobile food vendors participating in the annual Lynn County Harvest Festival. A complete copy of the ordinance is available at city hall.

The City Council also approved advertising for bids on the city's farm land of 367.13 cultivable acres southeast of the city, and approved placing stop signs at the east-west intersections of Ave. H and Harper Street that will require east-west traffic to stop.

Abandonment of a portion of Ave. D between S. 5th and S. 6th Streets was approved, and monthly bills were approved.



Tahoka Mayor John Baker led the meeting, with City Administrator Jerry Webster and council members Ronny Jolly, Shiloh Braddock, and Ryan Curry present. Councilmen Johnny Rosas and Ray Box were absent.

Bulldogs find the win column in district opener against Leopards

Two Lynn County teams faced off on the football field last Friday night, with Tahoka traveling to New Home for the district opener in 4-2A play. Tahoka got the 71-6 win over the Leopards, who are in their first season of 11-man football after moving up from six-man competition.

The Tahoka Bulldogs got back on track after a tough three game stretch and picked up a big district win to move to 3-3 overall, but more importantly 1-0 in district 4-2A play. The Dogs had a sluggish first quarter coming off the bye week, but really found their stride scoring 34 points in the second quarter. The Bulldogs were paced by a huge night from Malik Hamilton as he racked up over 268 yards of total offense to help get the Bulldogs back in the win column.

Hamilton scored the first TD on a 1-yard run in the first quarter to go up 6-0 over New Home, and then scored on a 70-yard run early in the second quarter. Soul Moore added a

TD on a 14-yard run, Hamilton scored again on a 6-yard run, and Braden Stone ran for a 12-yard TD and then completed a pass to Hamilton for 43-yards for another TD, all before the half, to lead 34-0.

In the third quarter, Hamilton opened with a 59-yard run for a TD, and John Stone ran for a 76-yard TD, followed by another TD by Braden Stone on a 23-yard run. In the fourth quarter, Javier Zuniga made a 25-yard field goal to add another 3 points. With 3:20 remaining, the Leopards made their only TD on a kickoff by Chris Gutierrez to the 21-yard line, which Blake Buckelew returned for 79 yards and a touchdown. At 1:30 left in the game, Tahoka's Major Due ran for a 65-yard TD.

"I was very impressed with how our offense responded after the first quarter. Coming back after a bye week and getting back into live game action is sometimes tough and we experienced that in the first quarter," said Coach Stephen Overstreet.

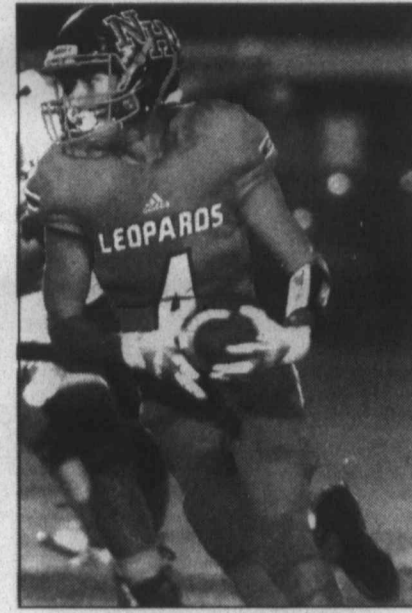
"We found the endzone early, but then hit a little patch and had to punt the ball away. After that it seems like we hit that reset button and didn't look back. We had many guys pitch in and help guide us Friday night and most of that comes from the five guys upfront. Our offensive line created huge holes that our backs were able to find. Malik obviously had a huge night but Soul Moore, Major Due, and Alexander Herevia all had big nights on the ground.

"If our offensive line is able to control the line of scrimmage we feel like we have talented enough backs to make big things happen. We try and play a physical brand of football and this isn't possible without the help of those big guys. We have a very talented group up front that complement our very loaded backfield. We hope that as we continue through the gauntlet of district play and hopefully into the playoffs that we keep getting better and more physical," said Overstreet.

"Defensively I was happy

with how we got after the quarterback, but more importantly how we covered on the back end. We have given up some big plays the last few weeks and we were able to cut down on those and get off the field on fourth down. We also looked better special-teams wise. We used the open week to make a few changes on that end and sure some things up scheme and personnel wise but I was pleased with all our special teams this last week," Overstreet added.

"We don't have any rest for the weary, especially in this district. We hit the road again this week and take on a very good Crosbyton team. Crosbyton is a team we have played every year I have been in Tahoka. Each year this game is a slug fest as our kids and coaches all know each other very well. Coach Huseman is a really good friend of mine and a guy I have a lot of respect for. We will be able to use the things we learned from the Littlefield game this Friday night as Coach Huseman spent many years playing for

and working for his dad who installed the system they still run today. Playing Littlefield was a planned game in order to prepare us for this Friday night. we prepared for all year. Starting out 1-0 sets you up very nicely but you can't sit back and relax. We still have four more games against great teams to hopefully achieve a goal. We hope to see everyone out in Crosbyton Friday night and thanks to all of our Bulldog FAMILY for everything so far. Hopefully our best days this year are still to come," said the coach.

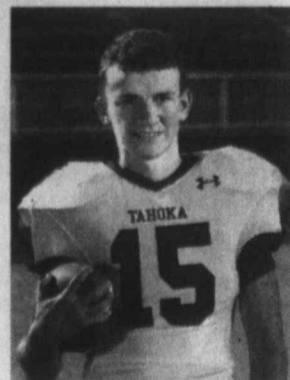

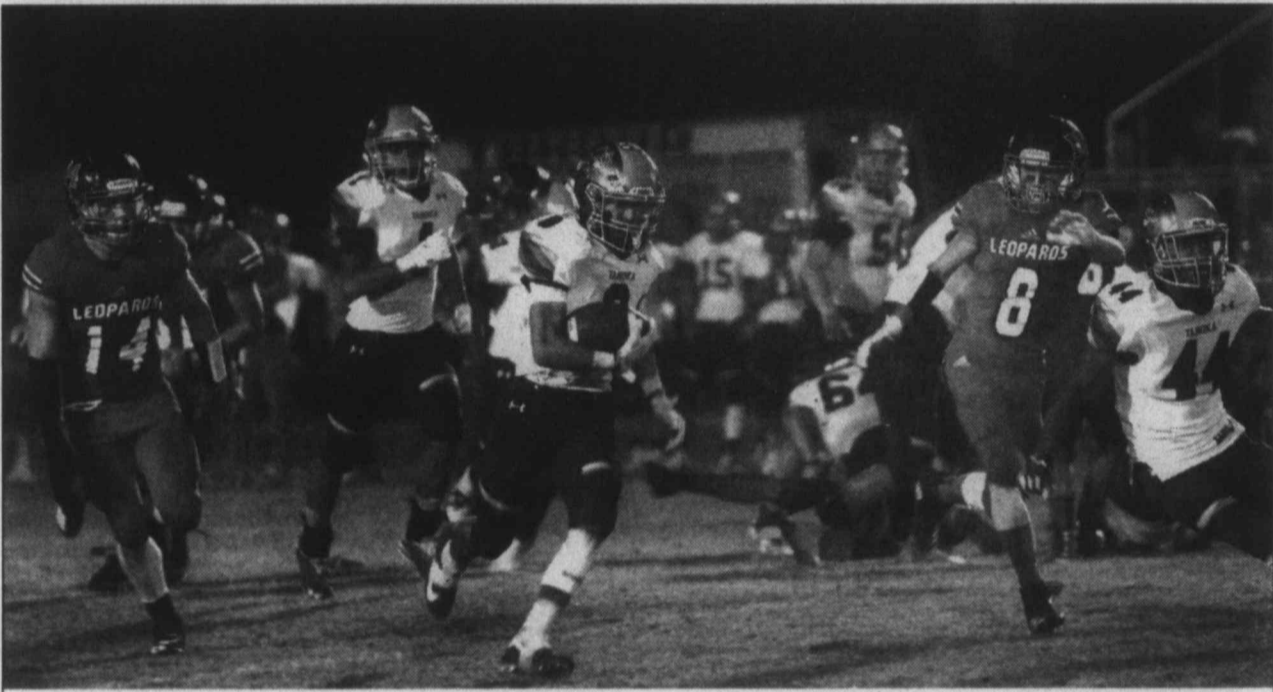
