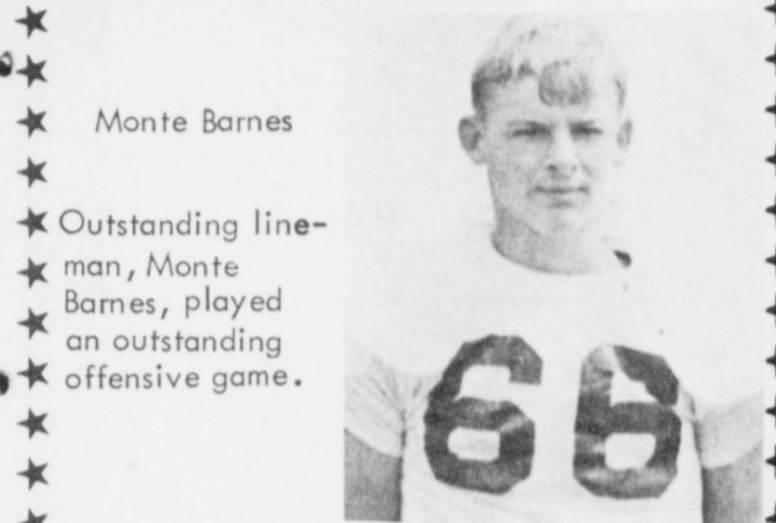

CRISIS IN OUR CITIES:
What Rural America Can Do About It

Since its early days, our nation has periodically faced a crisis in its cities. And, since the early days, the root cause has been the same... people flocking to the cities in search of something better... people leaving areas of little opportunity in search of fulfillment for themselves and their children. In earlier times, the people came from overseas. Nearly all of them came from the land which no longer provided them with a living. Today the people who fill our cities in search of a better life... nearly 600,000 of them a year... come from our own countryside, nearly all of them from the land which no longer offers them a living. The fact is, as Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman and other informed government officials have noted, that 70% of our nation's population is crowded into one percent of our land... many of them crowded into space covered by brick and mortar and macadam, over-laden with smog-filled air... treeless, flowerless, hopeless. They are the victims of a quiet revolution in agriculture which no longer needs the labor of large numbers of human beings to produce the vast quantities of food and fiber we provide for the world. They are today's landless immigrants who formed our city ghettos and slums of generations past. The people of rural America, and America's rural electrics, believe this view of the past and of the present contains the seeds of our future... a brighter, more productive future for the people of the cities and the people in the rural areas. We believe it is time we use one of our nation's greatest assets... our uncrowded countryside... to help solve the problem which concerns us all. Rural America boasts more than space. It has fresh air and sun and sky and water. It has room for kids to run barefoot through grass covered with early morning dew, hills covered with clean snow for sleds and skis, fields for people and dogs to romp in. And it has more. In the towns and villages of rural America there are uncrowded streets and sidewalks. There is electric power and transportation. There are good roads to bring the products of hard-working people to the great market places. What rural America lacks are job opportunities. Of the nearly 14 million new jobs created in our country in the past 15 years, few were created in rural areas. Yet polls say half our population would like to live and work in rural areas. We believe that unless we bend our efforts to the development of rural America, we will fail to solve the problems of our cities. Unless we stem the tide of migration from the country to the city that puts more and more people into less and less space, we will have ignored our greatest asset in meeting one of our gravest problems. We must start now to develop job opportunities, adequate hospitals and medical facilities, better schools and theaters and libraries, better water and sewer systems, and improved public services and facilities for industry in our rural areas. With them, rural America can meet the job hunger of its own people. It can provide the space and living room city people so desperately seek. The nation's rural electrics view with optimism the efforts of our nation's leaders to restore the balance between rural and urban America. We pledge our support and the continuation of our unstinting effort. We invite the participation and cooperation of all people concerned about the future of our country, regardless of where they live. There is, after all, only one nation, and we are all part of it.

PUMPKIN PECAN PIE

- 3 slightly beaten eggs
- 1 cup canned or cooked (mashed) pumpkin
- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup dark Karo
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

- 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup chopped pecans
- 1 unbaked 9" pastry shell

Method

In mixing bowl, combine eggs, pumpkin, sugar, corn syrup, vanilla, cinnamon and salt. Mix well, pour into unbaked pie shell and top with chopped pecans. Bake in moderate oven at 350 degrees about 40 minutes or until knife inserted halfway between center and edge comes out clean. Chill, serve with whipped cream.

We have witnessed the fact that people all across the state are proud of him, also. Week before last, State Representative Bill Clayton was one of the principal speakers at the state-wide Annual County Judges and Commissioners Association Meeting in Fort Worth. We have found out that he is held in high esteem by county officials throughout the State for his work as Chairman of the Counties Committee during the last session of the Legislature. His committee dealt with all problems pertaining to county and local governments. Then, only last week, he was a principal speaker at the state-wide annual meeting of the Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Local Leaders Attend Annual State Convention

Mr. and Mrs. E. N. McCall, W. L. Welch and Henry Stoneham of the Soil Conservation Service represented the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District at the 27th Annual State-Wide Meeting of Texas Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisors held in Fort Worth, October 17-19 at the Hotel Texas.

The theme for this year's meeting was "Leadership -- Key to Districts' Future." The entire meeting stressed the importance of local leadership in conserving, developing, and utilizing the soil and water resources of Texas.

People on the program included U. S. Senator John Tower, Congressman Jim Wright, State Representative Bill Clayton, Gilbert Kretschmar, president of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts, Warren Fairchild, executive director of the Nebraska State Soil and Water Conservation Commission, Johnny Watkins of KWTX-TV Waco-Bryan, and H. B. Martin, Field Representative, Soil Conservation Service, Fort Worth.

The speech he made before this group was highly praised by members of the organization, and he had hundreds of requests for copies of it. He spoke from notes, but when he returned to Springlake he worked out in printed form, basically, the speech he presented to the Soil and Water Conservation Annual Convention. We attended this meeting, and thought so much of his speech we are printing it in the "Cross Section," our official publication of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District.

While attending the banquet of the Soil and Water Conservation District Convention last Wednesday night, he received an award from that Association for providing distinguished service to the State of Texas. It is a known fact that State Representative Bill Clayton has carried all the legislation pertaining to Soil and Water Conservation Districts during his last four years in the House of Representatives. Water problems in our area and West Texas as a whole, take up much of his time. Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Ben Barnes, has said that Bill Clayton is probably the most knowledgeable member of the House of Representatives on water and water related problems in the State of Texas. Speaker Barnes also indicated that within the next few days, he will appoint Representative Bill Clayton to an Interim Water Study Committee to continue the study of water problems across our State.

Representative Clayton made a trip to California a few weeks ago with several water people including representatives from the High Plains Underground Water District to study their laws pertaining to Master Water Districts. We believe that Bill Clayton will be one of the key people instrumental in helping our area of the State to import water for irrigation in the future. Being a farmer and businessman from this area, he knows and realizes our problems, and we are proud of the fact that he is serving us, his district, and the State of Texas... and doing such a fine job.

Early Harvested Cotton Rated In High Quality

Early harvested cotton on the South Plains has been of high quality, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Most of the cotton harvested this season has been long staple varieties and grades have been predominantly Middling and staple has averaged nearly 1-1/8". Micronaire also has been excellent with over 90 percent having a micronaire reading of 3.5 and better.

Middling cotton made up 55 percent of all cotton classed at the Lubbock Classing Office during the week ending Friday. Strict Low Middling made up 19 percent, Middling Light Spotted 11 percent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted eight percent.

Staple length reflected the fine quality of the early harvested bales. Eighty percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock last week stapled 1-1/16" and longer.

Convention Set To Formulate Year's Policy

AUSTIN---Three prominent guest speakers will address Texas Farm Bureau's 34th annual convention here next month at the Terrace Motor Hotel Convention Center.

Ben Barnes, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Herbert E. Harris III, legislative counsel for the American Farm Bureau Federation, and U. S. Congressman W. R. (Bob) Poage of Waco will speak Tuesday morning, November 14. Some 2,000 persons, including more than 800 voting delegates, are expected here Nov. 12-15 when the state's largest general farm organization meets to formulate its policies for the coming year.

Texas Farm Bureau President C. H. DeVaney, Waco, will give the president's annual message Monday morning, November 13. Also addressing the group at the same session will be M. F. (Mike) Frost, McAllen, TFB secretary treasurer and District 13 board member, who will give the financial report; and Craig L. Thomas, Waco, executive assistant to the TFB president, who will present the administrative report. Speaker for the Tuesday evening banquet has not been announced.

Prices offered for these early bales indicate a strong demand for South Plains cotton. Prices, as reported to the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA, ranged from \$1 per bale over the loan for high grade, short staple cotton up to \$65 per bale over the loan for 1-3/32" and longer cotton.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$50 to \$57 per ton.
