

It seems that a man who has held office as long as Coke Stevenson might have formulated some definite policies of action, but the most definite assertion we recall the governor has made during his nearly three terms was his FOR COUNTY TREASURER: opposition to the 35-mile speed limit enforced on our highways during wartime.

The Whigs and Tories in colonial days had their "donothing" officials, but at a time when a great state like FOR SHERIFF: Texas is at the crossroads of new development, we need inspirational guidance and someone who has the courage to speak his convictions. Texas' opportunities are too great to take a chance on having them muffed.

The least that might be expected from a Texan who has been in full view of the public for so long is that he would have taken a stand for or against issues that came to the fore. Stevenson has been a flavorless governor who has smoked his pipe right through every issue of importance. He did not take a stand for or against President Roosevelt at a time when some sort of stand was the obligation of every American. His action indicated he supported the Texas Regulars. He would not make his position clear on the mess at the University of Texas. In short, he is entirely without a political personality.

Stevenson evidently operates on the assumption that he will be regarded as a good governor if he does nothing to arouse opposition.
