2,000 Barrels Daily Is Estimated Yield of, No. 1 M. A. Smith

Heralded as one of the largest potential oil producers in Central West Texas. the Thos. C. Humphreys No. 1 M. A. Smith was brought in Friday morning with production from Upper Canyon lime from 2766 to 2769 feet being estimated as 2.000 barrels daily. The discovery. drilled by the Dallas operator as a west extension of the Lawson Pool six miles east of Haskell, has created widespread interest in the Haskell County field, with a number of companies and operators indicating intention of drilling in various sectons of the county.

A second producer, Humphreys No. 2 M .A. Smith, 660 feet west of the gusher, was brought in Sunday night as the Dallas operator traced the western trend of the Canyon pay. No. 2 Smith, 330 feet sout of the southwest corner of the Smith tract, topped pay at 2845 feet and was drilled 2847 feet. On Railroad Commission test made on No. 2 Smith the well flowed 82 1-2 barrels of oil in three hours through 3-4 inch hoke on 2-inch tubing

The No. 1 Smith, located 330 feet out of the southeast, corner of the M. A. Smith 100 acre tract in the J. M. Cass Survey, "blew in" after spudder had been moved in and drilled three feet into lime with cable tools. Bailer being run at the time was blown from the hole, and geyser of oil from the open 7-inch casing sprayed 75 feet into the air until the well could be brought under control. Tubing was run for R. R. Commission test, which will be run as soon as adequate storage can be placed. Expected to be drilled in during the week-end is the Humphreys

Haskell to Go Forward

Consider these facts concerning the proposed Water and Sewer Revenue **Bond** Issue:

Citizens of Haskell will have the opportunity to further the progressive development and growth of this city Friday, if they vote for the issuance of \$88,000 Water and Sewer Revenue Bonds, \$72,000 of which will be expended to extending and enlarging facilities of the City Water and Sewer System.

The planned extension will make sewer and water service available to an estimated two hundred and fifty new patrons, many of whom are urgently requesting the extensions, pointing out that all property owners are entitled to every convenience necessary to better homes so long as it can be financed under a sound financial plan.

In voting the proposed bonds, property owners will be creating a lien only against the revenues of the water and sewer system and they must be paid from this source. No tax money can ever be used to retire the bonds.

The proposed extensions of the water mains will insure better fire protection and bring about a permanent reduction in fire insurance premiums that could not be granted with the present inadequate system of water mains. The Fire Insurance Commission at Austin has estimated the reduction in fire insurance premiums at about six and one-half per cent, which would result in a net saving of more than fifteen hundred dollars per year to the citizens of Haskell.

At present there is outstanding \$16,000 four per cent bonds against the city's water revenues. Holder of these bonds is not willing to accept the cash for them at the present time, but has agreed to accept bonds from the proposed new issue in exchange. Therefore it will be necessary for \$16,000 of the new issue to bear four per cent interest. The additional \$72,000 for water and sewer extensions will mature over a period of fifteen years. Bonds maturing within ten years will bear two per cent interest, bonds maturing ten to fifteen years will bear two and one-half per cent interest.

Average increase in the city's obligations by reason of voting the proposed bonds will be less than \$6,000 per year for a period of fifteen years.

If there is an additinal two hundred new water and sewer customers added by reason of the extensions, these at the minimum fee of \$2.75 per month would add \$6,000 per year to the present revenue, making the proposed extension self-sustaining.
