

Depleted Pastures Being Reclaimed

Paul Russell, who farms in the northwest part of Haskell county has for the past two years been conducting tests on his sandy pastures for the purpose of finding pasture plants to native grasses as a supplement to the grasses in establishing permanent pastures from ground which has become practically void of good pasture grass.

In 1946 Russell eradicated mesquite from a section of pasture and reseeded it with Weeping Lovegrass, which the AAA made payment for. Early in the year it appeared that some of his grass had died and had failed to re-seed itself, but with continued rainfall and excellent growing conditions he now reports that he has a good stand all over his pasture, and is well pleased with the progress. He also applied 100 pounds of superphosphate per acre, and has notified the AAA office that he wants to continue to phosphate a part of his acreage each year.

Legumes Valuable Soil Builders

Anell Waldrip, who farms near O'Brien, reports that cotton this year which followed Austrian Winter Peas was very noticeable in color and stalk, and produced considerably more per acre than other acreage in the same field.

Experiments With Winter Legumes

Roy Wiseman, who farms extensively 5 miles west of Haskell secured 200 pounds of Austrian Winter peas through the AAA, and planted them last fall on approximately 70 acres. He also applied superphosphate to a part of this acreage varying in amounts from 100 to 200 pounds per acre. He has arranged his experiment so that each different block of peas and phosphate can be observed and the greatest value seen from each different type of application.

Wiseman reported to the county AAA office that all his peas were doing very well, and that the phosphated areas were beginning to show some improvement over the areas on which no phosphate was used. Some of the fields are about ready to mature, although he is more interested in the cover crop and soil building aspects than in pasturage.

Wiseman further indicated that his intentions are to conduct further experiments with winter legumes and superphosphate each year in an effort to conserve his soil, and at the same time set the maximum production from acreage put to cash crops.

Cases of Mumps Reported

In the past few weeks there has been a general increase in the number of mumps throughout the state. There have been 1750

cases reported since January 1 compared with only 896 cases in the same period last year, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Though mumps is one of the common childhood diseases, serious complications may develop, so children should be protected as

much as possible from this disease. The usual control procedures such as avoidance of crowds, exclusion from school of all cases or suspected cases and quarantine should be followed. The family physician should always be consulted when a case occurs.

The most easily recognizable symptom of mumps is a painful swelling of the salivary glands. Sometimes there is an involvement of other portions of the body causing disturbances in the digestive, nervous, circulatory, and genitourinary systems. The disease is usually accompanied by a temperature rise which more often than not is mild.

"The patient suffering with this disease should be isolated from other members of the family immediately upon the suspicion that mumps exist, and the family physician should be called promptly," Dr. Cox advises. "In the meantime, complete rest in bed is indicated. The doctor's orders should be followed strictly. Violating his instructions can lead to serious injury, which may permanently affect the individual's health."

Wages and Prices

About 15 months ago Mr. Henry Wallace, then Secretary of Commerce under President Truman, asserted that wages in the automobile industry could go up 30 per cent without prices of cars going up at all. It wasn't true, as all informed people knew at the time. But the statement tended to gain public support.

At least the statement helped gain public toleration for a long strike, which ended with about a 20 per cent raise in wages. But even then the OPA was immediately convinced that increases in prices were made necessary. Little by little the OPA raised the prices on cars until it had granted an average increase of 22 per cent. In short, for a 20 per cent increase in wages for auto workers the public was required, by OPA, to pay 22 per cent more for cars.

Same Play Again

Now the auto workers are asking for another raise of about 25 per cent in wages. Mr. C. E. Wilson, president of General Motors, asserts that such a raise will also put prices of cars up by 25 per cent. Mr. Alfred P. Sloan, chairman of the board of General Motors, also declares that wages cannot be raised without raising prices.

Some labor leaders are maintaining that wages in general can go up about 25 per cent without increasing prices. From last year's experience the public will quite readily understand that if wages go up again, prices must also go up. This leaves just one real issue. Is it to the interest of workers and the rest of the public for prices to keep going up and up?

Tit for Tat

Some unions are now declaring that the raises they got last year are already neutralized by increased prices of the things they must buy. This is evidently true. Now if another raise in wages is granted, only to be followed by a still greater boost in prices, workers will be no better off. In fact they, and all the rest of us, will be worse off. Higher prices will finally cause buying to drop off, leading to unemployment and finally to depression.

There is a way for everybody to gain — both workers and the general public. That way is for management and workers to cooperate to increase production so effectively that goods will become plentiful and prices will go down.

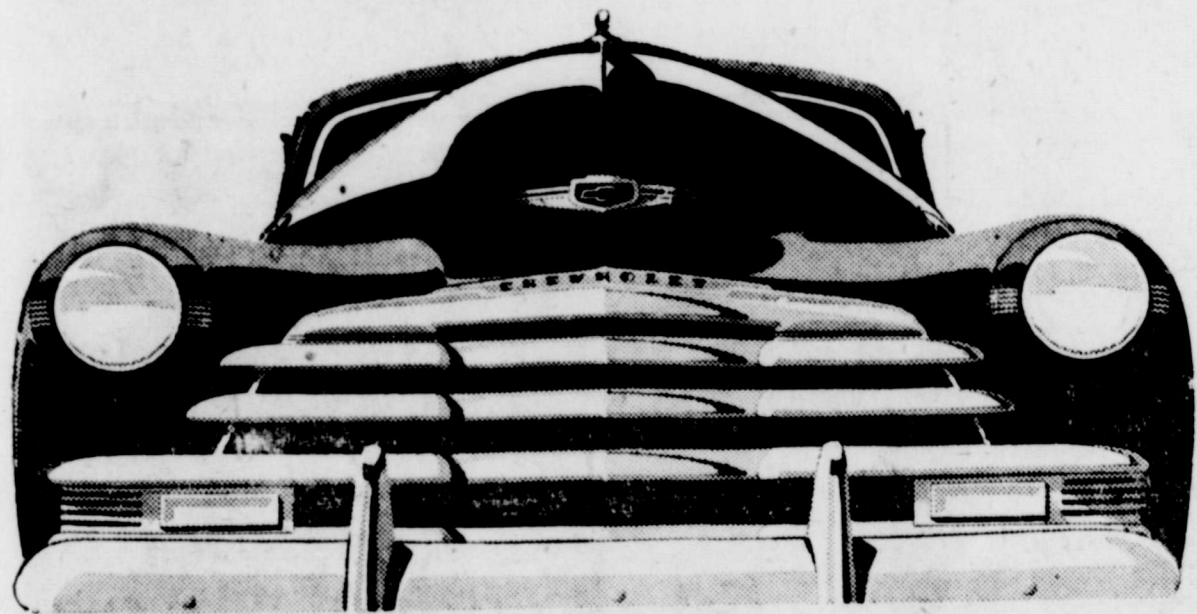

Fairness Begets Fairness
Recently I found in my mail an unusual letter. It was an impressive letter, for it came from a well-known manufacturer on the subject of labor unions and their leaders. Omitting the personalities involved, I should like to offer you the letter in full. It is so sane and offers such rich practical suggestions for settlement of some of our huge industrial problems that I want to pass it on to readers of this column.

"Dear Sir: Your description of the labor situation in Sweden almost depicts the labor situation of the 'XYZ' industry in our country. Mr. X, the founder of the Union, plus the cooperation of the manufacturers, brought it about. And I dare say this labor leader instilled the spirit of cooperation into the manufacturers by fair play and honest tactics.

Men of Calibre
"Since the formation of the Union in 1919, no strikes have occurred. The instruments installed by him for orderly settlements of disputes are no doubt well known to you.

"All of this leads to one conclusion. If the leaders of labor are men of right calibre, strikes are almost impossible because employers are invariably reluctant to have their business disrupted and are willing to meet fairness with fairness; hence, my advice is: Urge labor unions to choose wise and business-like leaders; men of high ideals, thoroughly honest.

"All of this may sound silly, but to prove my point: There existed a 'XYZ' union before Mr. X's entry which had no influence and accomplished nothing, and if allowed to continue would have perhaps brought disaster to the industry like in so many others.

"If labor were headed by men who are qualified for leadership, labor troubles would eventually be of minor importance."

Depleted Pastures Being Reclaimed

Paul Russell, who farms in the northwest part of Haskell county has for the past two years been conducting tests on his sandy pastures for the purpose of finding pasturegrasses to native grasses as a supplement to the grasses in establishing permanent pastures from ground which has become practically void of good pasturegrasses.

In 1946 Russell eradicated mesquite from a section of pasture and reseeded it with Weeping Lovegrass, which the AAA made payment for. Early in the year it appeared that some of his grass had died and had failed to re-seed itself, but with continued rainfall and excellent growing conditions he now reports that he has a good stand all over his pasture, and is well pleased with the progress. He also applied 100 pounds of superphosphate per acre, and has notified the AAA office that he wants to continue to phosphate a part of his acreage each year.

Many grass seeds are available to farmers throughout the area, and the AAA will make assistance payments for many of them. Farmers are requested to contact the AAA office for further details.

Pruning shade trees, fruit trees, late blooming shrubs and evergreens is a recommended practice for this area of the state, Louise Newman, Haskell County home demonstration agent, advises. The only plants which should not be cut back at this time are those which bloom early such as spirea, flowering quince, redbush, and pyracantha. These should be pruned immediately after they bloom.

Moderate pruning will give the gardener more and larger flowers and improve the shape of the plant by getting rid of awkward limbs. Pruning cross branches that rub each other and form places for disease to enter or the removal of dead limbs is good insurance against plant disease. By keeping plants trimmed enough to fit into the landscape picture is another important reason for pruning.

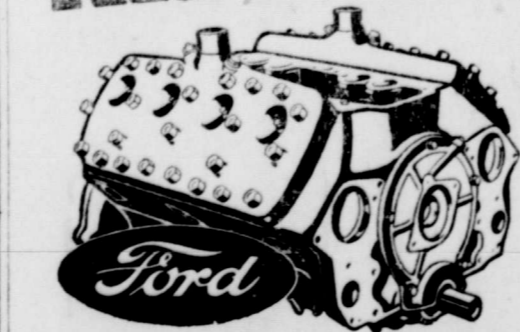

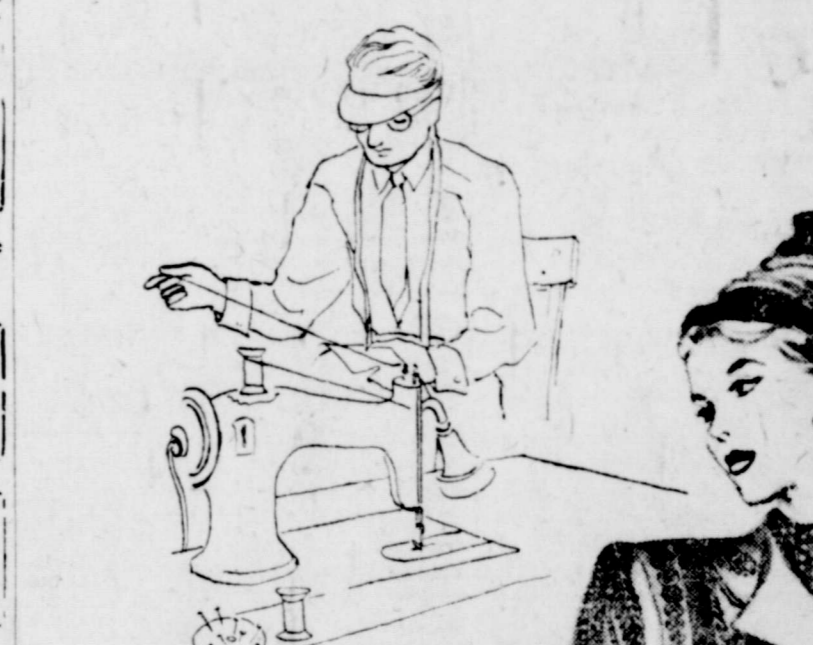
