

Flu Vaccine Limited


Influenza vaccine should be given in November in the northern areas or immediately after the first occurrence of the disease, according to the New York state department of health. Duration of the immunity given by the vaccine is short, generally from about four months to a year. The common cold and its complications, however, are not prevented by the use of influenza vaccines, nor is protection afforded against bacterial infections such as streptococcal sore throat.



the interview. MORE WOMEN IN GOVERNMENT

President Truman's failure to appoint more women to high office was tactfully laid before the President by a group of women.

Mrs. La Felle Dickinson, prestdent of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, headed the delegation and told Mr. Truman quite frankly that women generally were disturbed because he hadn't appointed as many women to government jobs as Mr. Roosevelt had. She reminded the President that the state department had built up a roster of 80 well-known American women capable of handling important government work and urged him to bring the list up to date.

Dr. Katherine McHale of the Association of University Women, was equally strong in urging appointment of more women to govern-

Mr. Truman replied that he would like to appoint more women to jobs but it was difficult to get the right person for the right job.

"I watched President Roosevelt work for a long time," Truman continued. "I knew then, but didn't realize fully, just how large a portion of the President's time was taken in finding the right people for the right job. I want you to know that nobody makes my appointments for me. I make them on the basis of my own judgment.'

First, here's a tip about selecting a color. Study the room carefully and try to pick up one of the colors in your furnishings or wallpaper which you've neglected. Then see if this can't be made up into the vindow treatment. If, for example, you want to use

When you are sewing tops and nems on sheer curtain material place a tissue paper underneath the material while sewing on the machine to prevent it from puckering or pulling. Simply rip off the paper when you are finished Unlined draperies need four

inches of material for the heading and five inches for the hem. Be sure to add these measurements to those for the length of the window. You may save time basting window draperies and curtains by

marking off the stitches with a single straight line drawn with chalk. Be sure to use a flat surface for this, however. Make certain machine is adjusted properly for different thick-

nesses of sewing material by testing first on a scrap of the material you are using. Saves time and stitching. To make tailored curtains, pleat sheer material and use a

A group of 32 patients suffering from rheumatoid arthritis were artifically infected and developed jaundice. Of these, 10 were rendered temporarily free of all pain, free movement restored and swelling reduced. Partial relief was experienced by 15 patients and 7 showed no improvement.

U.N.:

How to Disarm?

Sick or war, the U. S. and Russia remained sold on world disarmament, but as the two great powers in conflicting camps, they locked horns on procedure.

The atomic bomb remained the nub of the problem. The U. S. insisted that no adequate system of collective security could be devised until establishment of effective control over A-bombs, long-range rockets and other mass destruction weapons. The Russians, on the other hand, wanted the U. S. to surrender the A-bomb and disarm at the same time.

U. S. military experts reason that should the U. S. give up the atomic bomb without securing effective control and scrap ships, airplanes and tanks simultaneously, Russia would have a distinct advantage in case of future hostilities since she could quickly remobilize her ground the new Club Bagatelle, the owners forces. Thus, stripped of effective communication and power, the U. S. would stand empty-handed at the other end of the world.

No responsible official could stomach that prospect.

Mishaps Take Big Toll

Home, sweet home continued to be the most dangerous place in 1946, National Safety council reported in its roundup of accidents for the year. No less than 34,000 persons were killed in their homes and over



losses, medical expenses, overhead cost of insurance for accidents, production delays, industrial damage and property damage from traffic mishaps and fires, the economic loss was estimated at over 51/2 billion dollars.

Automobile accidents claimed 33.-465 lives; falls, 27,800; burns, 10,-200; drownings, 7,300; railroads, 3,-928; firearms, 31,100, and scheduled domestic air travel, 107. Only 1.2 passenger deaths were recorded for every 100 million passenger miles covered by commercial air lines.

Appliances Find Place in U.S. Homes

Luxuries of years ago are commonplaces in the American home to-What a waste of girl! . . . Bill Orr day, the National Family Opinion organization reported after a nationwide survey for marketing interests.

More than 93 per cent of American homes have electric irons; 90 per cent have radios, while 15.9 per cent have combination radio-phonographs. Almost 36 per cent of the homes have electric mixers and 11.5 per cent have electric roasters.

Among the heavier electrical appliances, vacuum cleaners are most popular, with 61.8 per cent of the homes possessing them. Washing machines are close behind, being found in 59.7 per cent of the homes. Fully automatic washers are owned by 5.4 per cent of the families. Electric sewing machines are distributed through 39.1 per cent of the homes.

ANTARCTICA:

New Discoveries

The vast frigid Antarctic lying at the bottom of the world began to take clearer shape as a result of the Byrd expedition. No less than 125,000 square miles of hitherto uncharted wasteland were mapped by naval explorers in the first five weeks of polar operations.

Fliers photographed and charted 4 great bays, eight major mountain ranges, more than 20 islands, 3 important peninsulas and 2,000 miles of coastland. Most important single discovery was a vast bay cutting deeply into the continent from Franklin Roosevelt sea. It measured 180 miles in length and 120 miles in width.

Now on his fourth antarctic expedition, Byrd remained sold on the white-capped continent. He asserted that it contains a treasurehouse of raw materials which could supplement U. S. resources depleted during the war.

UNEASY OVER FLIGHTS

WASHINGTON .- The splurge of recent air crashes is causing considerable worry to the secret service agents responsible for the life of the President

The secret service is afraid the day may come when the President's special plane, "The Sacred Cow," also may encounter bad weather or mechanical trouble. They also know something about the President's propensity for taking off, rain or shine, and it keeps them awake at nights thinking about it. When he wants to go some place, he simply goes.

Result is that a quiet campaign is under way inside the secret service to persuade the President to abandon air travel generally. They want him to take the train-as President Roosevelt did on almost all occasions. FDR enjoyed train travel. It rest-

ed him and gave him a chance to get caught up with his correspondence. Truman, however, loves the speed of an airplane. He can get to Kansas City in four hours whereas it would take him two nights and a day by train. The secret service has never re-

Despite the recent series of air crashes, fact remains that commercial air lines hung up twice as good a safety record in 1946 as in 1945. Although the total number of aircraft fatalities increased, it is important to recall that the airlines flew twice as many passenger miles in '46. This cut the fatality rate in half.

Another factor most people overlook is that the Civil Aeronautics authority, which regulates commercial flying, is operating in the face of a pinch-penny congressional appropriation. Despite the small appropriation, CAA worked out a bad-weather instrument-landing system which has now been adopted by every country, including the Russians.







6 to 8 ounces elbow macaroni

3 tablespoons butter 2 tablespoons mustard 11/2 cups milk 1 cup ground ham 1/2 teaspoon salt

1/4 teaspoon pepper 1/2 cup chopped celery 2 apples

Cook macaroni in boiling, salted water for 10 minutes. Drain and rinse. Melt butter, blend in flour, mustard and milk. Cook slowly until thickened, stirring constantly. Combine all ingredients except apples and sugar and pour into a greased baking dish. Dice apples and spread over top of casserole. Sprinkle with sugar and bake in a moderate (350 degree) oven for 30

Simple little tricks add a lot of eye appeal to certain simple dishes, such as this one. In this case, the cooked noodles are mixed with minced pimiento and green pepper and placed in a casserole. Then, press a "nest" into the center of the noodles and fill this with a mixture of creamed tuna fish. 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
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

Additional Social Security Benefits Now Available

Haskell County people will bo interested to learn that wives of a number of retired workers will penefit from one of the 1946 amendments to the Social Security Act, according to an announcement made today by Ralph T. office of the Social Security Administration. Step-children and adopted children of certain retir-

ed workers will also benefit. Under the Social Security laws, benefits have previously been denied the wife of a retired worker unless the marriage occurred prior to the date the husband became 60 years of age. Effective January 1, 1947, this age limit has been removed and the wife can be eligible if the couple has been married for 36 months or more and if the wife is 65 years of age or older. Wives of retired workers who would qualify under this amendment should get in touch with the nearest Social Security Administration Field Office at

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
