But this Congress did demonstrate that it was no "rubber stamp" Congress, and it made parliamentary history in this respect. It was a people's Congress. It took definite steps in the direction of a balanced budget, for many legis-

lators put themselves on record in an attempt to preserve the integrity of the nation's finances. No budget legislation was passed, but much was done to prepare groundwork for future budget-balancing legislation.






