H. J. Hambleton Dies Sunday In Haskell Hospital

H. J. (Haynes) Hambleton, plumbing and electrical contractor of this city and former city engineer and water superintendent, died at 4:30 p. m. Sunday in the Haskell County Hospital following a severe heart attack.

Born August 14, 1881 in Stoddard County, Missouri, Mr. Hambleton came to Texas as a young man and made his home in Weatherford before moving to Haskell more than 40 years ago. He married the former Miss Nellie V. Miller of this city. Mr. Hambleton helped build Haskell's first electric plant, The Haskell Light & Ice Company, and was connected with the concern for several years. Later he became superintendent and manager of the municipal water system and supervised the department for a number of years. He helped to organize and was an active member of the Haskell Volunteer Fire Department for more than twenty years. He had been a member of the Methodist Church since young manhood and was a member of the Masonic Lodge.

Immediate survivors include his widow, Mrs. Nellie V. Hambleton of Haskell; three daughters, Mrs. Charles B. Potts of San Antonio, Mrs. Carl Arbuckle, Fort Worth, Mrs. C. E. Wood, Wichita Falls; and a son, H. J. Hambleton Jr. of Haskell. Three brothers, Joe Hambleton, Granbury, Texas; Walter Hambleton, Portales, N. M.; Clyde Hambleton, Midland, Texas; and four sisters, Mrs. Lige Smith of Brazos, Texas; Mrs. Moten Vaughn and Mrs. Alpha Fleming of Weatherford; and Mrs. Doc Anthony of Palo Pinto, Texas. Five grandchildren also survive.

Funeral rites for Mr. Hambleton were conducted at the family home Monday at 5 p. m. by Rev. J. E. Harrell, minister of the First Methodist Church, who was assisted by Rev. C. Jones, Baptist minister of this city. Burial was in Willow Cemetery with Holden Funeral home directing.

Proceeds of Youth Week Aids Texas City Children

The directors of Youth Week, which was held April 20 to 27, have received two letters from the Superintendent of Schools of Texas City, to which they sent the funds derived from activities held during Youth Week.

The Texas City blast occurred while the groups were deciding what to do with the money and it was decided that they send it to the schools there and let them use it to their best advantage. Total amount sent was \$83.87.

"Below are excerpts from the two letters from Levi Fry, Supt. 'I have your good letter and have been deeply touched by it. I think you are wonderful people and in behalf of many of our children who have recently lost fathers, I thank you sincerely. 'One of our greatest tasks now is to keep these children occupied with something that will make them forget some of the things they have seen. To relieve some of the tension under which we have been laboring, the school is sponsoring a nine week summer program by special arrangement with the YMCA at Galveston. We have been permitted to use their swimming pool this summer as a part of our general program. Though Texas City is situated on Galveston Bay, pollution of water by reason of our accident makes swimming in the bay out of the question this summer. Through your generosity, about 800 children of our community may enjoy swimming privileges under competent instructors for a period of about seven weeks. Our District will furnish bus transportation for these children to and from Galveston.

"At the meeting of the School Board last night, it was decided that the greatest number of children would get enjoyment from your contribution by using it as outlined above. We hope that this will meet with your approval and that the delight of these children will be reflected in the life of every member of your group who has so generously made this pleasure possible for us."

Noted Film To Be Shown at Local Church May 14

Vivid full color scenes from astronomy and natural science are featured in "The God of Creation" sound motion picture to be shown at 8 p. m. Saturday at the East Side Baptist Church.

Produced in Moody Institute of Science, West Coast Department of Moody Bible Institute, by Irwin A. Moon, Sc. D., "The God of Creation" is the second in a series of evangelistic films. The first film by Dr. Moon, "They Live Forever," had a large showing in all parts of the country.

In the opening section of "The God of Creation," the audience takes a trip to the stars by means of solar photographs taken through the giant 100-inch telescope of Mt. Wilson Observatory in southern California, and views complex gyrations of our own solar system.

Lapse-time photography is utilized to demonstrate the beauties of natural science. The illusion of flower buds developing into full-bloom blossoms in a few seconds is created through this time-compressing photo technique. The metamorphosis of a caterpillar through the various stages from worm to butterfly, and pollination of flowers are seen on the screen in full color.

Believed to be the first of their kind are the natural color pictures of photosynthesis, the mysterious food manufacturing process resulting from the action of sunlight on green leaves.

Through photomicrography the audience peers into the microscopic world of a drop of water and observes the complexity of tiny organisms, enlarged more than a million times.

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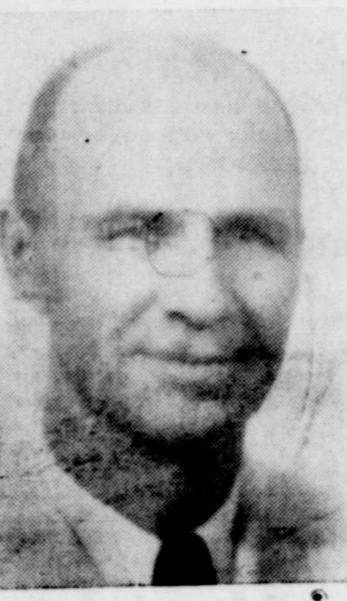

O. E. Patterson, well-known West Texas banker and civic leader of Haskell, Monday was named County Judge of Haskell County by the commissioners' court to succeed R. V. (Virgil) Reynolds, resigned.

Reynolds resigned Monday to accept an appointment as aeronautical inspector with the Civil Aeronautics administration. Appointment of Mr. Patterson followed Monday afternoon and the former banker assumed office Tuesday morning.

Coming to Haskell from Taylor, Texas when this section was first being developed as an agricultural region, Mr. Patterson has been active in Haskell civic affairs during his 41 years of residence here. He first engaged in the real estate business, later was connected with the old Farmers State Bank for nine years, after which he was active vice-president of the Haskell National Bank for 21 years. He resigned from that position Jan. 1, 1947.

The new county judge has served as a school trustee, is past president of the Central West Texas Fair association, has been a director of the chamber of commerce, is a Lion, has been a steward of the Methodist church for 35 years, and teaches a boys and girls Sunday school class here now; belongs to the Masons, is secretary of the Odd Fellow lodge, and is democratic chairman of precinct 1.

Members of the commissioners' court participating in the appointment are Ira Blair, Alf Turnbow, M. B. Cobb and Roy Clark.

An ex-serviceman, Reynolds was elected without opposition and assumed office January 1.

The 36-year old former judge was a flight officer with the Army Air Transport Command in the China-Burma-India theatre from March 1944 to December 1946. He was injured about six months prior to his discharge.

A life long resident of Haskell, he graduated from high school here and attended Baylor university. He was an outstanding football player in high school.

He will take 30 days preliminary training at Oklahoma City and then be assigned to the 5th Region Headquarters, CAA, at Kansas City, Mo. His family will join him when he is permanently assigned.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Reynolds of Haskell.

Vetch and Rye Found Profitable By Area Farmer

"Grazing vetch and rye has made me from \$40.00 to \$50.00 an acre clear this year," says Higam E. Olson, of the Swenson Conservation group in the California Creek Soil Conservation district. Nine acres of vetch and rye on his home place provided two weeks of grazing for 216 lambs and one week of grazing for 430 sheep—an equivalent of year long grazing for one animal unit per acre.

Olson also planted 14 acres of Hubam clover last fall which he grazed with sheep for a short time in April. He plans to harvest the seed this year and plant about 50 percent of his home place in such legumes as Hubam, Austrian winter peas, and vetch and rye.

A. M. G. Swenson, another co-operator in the California Creek soil conservation district, is pleased at the results from the large diversion dam that was built in the North Mountain pasture on the Flat Top ranch. Water which would have gone down the slope

was caught and diverted into the tank—amounting to about 15 feet of stock water.

Now that the wheat harvest is under way the opportunity is at hand for treatment of many acres with stubble mulching. Research studies have shown that a field of wheat land on which the residue had been left after harvest lost less than 1-5 inch of water through runoff and 1-5 of a ton of soil per acre as compared to a loss of 3 inches and 27 tons per acre on fields followed and clean-cultivated through the year. There were 3 1/2 inches more water in the upper 6 foot layer of soil of the stubble mulched field than where straw had been turned under and clean-folowed.

The board of supervisors of the California Creek Soil Conservation District approved two agreements covering 340 acres at their regular meeting May 28. Mrs. A. A. Frierson and Haskell Stone became co-operators by the action of the board.

Five new applications for assistance were accepted on 1618 acres. The applicants were Mrs. M. S. Pierson, T. L. Ballard, H. R. (Ray) Elliott, Segerstrom Estate, and M. E. Carothers.

Cowboy Reunion To Offer \$5,000 Prizes

Cowboys and cowgirls attending the seventeenth annual Texas Cowboy Reunion at Stamford on July 2, 3 and 4 will be gunning for slightly more than \$5,000 in prizes. The figure represents a 10 percent increase over the 1946 prize list. Five special made saddles will be awarded, along with other attractive prizes.

The American Quarter Horse Association will hold an official show in connection with the Texas Cowboy Reunion rodeo. It will be the seventh consecutive showing. Twelve hundred invitations, entry blanks, rules and prize lists were mailed to breeders in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Colorado who are registered with the American Quarter Horse Association. In anticipation of a record number of entries a new stall barn is being built which will enable the committee to accept approximately thirty more animals than in 1946 when it was necessary to turn down entries due to lack of stall space.

A gala (pre-war style) parade is being planned for the opening

day, July 2nd. Heading the parade will be Hon. Beauford Jester, Governor of Texas, along with other state officials. The Cowboy band from Hardin-Simmons University will be the official band and will not only lead the parade, but will play at each performance of the entire show. A number of high school bands in the area are expected to be present on opening day to compete for the cash prizes. The usual commercial floats, ranch chuck wagons, cowboys and cowgirls, along with many of the quarter horses, will complete the parade picture.

Activities of Girls 4-H Clubs Listed

To acquaint the public with 4-H activities and leadership training the second story of the series written by the 4-H girls is presented.

"My name is Lois Allison. I have been in the Rule 4-H Club for five years. In my third year as a 4-H member, I was president of the club. It was during the third year that I was selected Gold Star Girl for the best 4-H work done in the county. In 1946, I was club reporter and this year I am secretary.

For our September goal we were to make something to exhibit at the county fair. So I exhibited 15 jars of canned foods—five jars of canned green beans, four of canned peaches, four of plums, one of okra, and one of beets.

Another of our goals was to learn the 4-H Club pledge, prayer and motto. The 4-Hs in our emblem represents the 'H's' in our pledge: 'I pledge My Head to clearer thinking, My Heart to greater loyalty, My Hands to larger service and My Health to better living for My Club, My Community and My Country.'

For November we were to check our diet by the Texas Food Standard to try to improve our selection of food. I did that and made out my fall clothing budget.

In December we were to find out new kinds of winter foods. I made three new kinds (to me): egg and potato salad, cobbler from canned peaches and soup.

I made a white sport blouse in January and a blue and white checked dress in April.

We have squash, radishes, English peas, potatoes, onions, tomatoes, beans, beets, lettuce, and okra in our garden and have already used some of the onions and English peas. I help set out about 24 peach and plum trees in the orchard.

We have 109 little chickens; I help to tend to them.

This year I am trying to have a flower bed. We have planted some cannas. With help I've filled the front yard so that we can plant grass for a lawn. I trimmed the hedge.

I am making a pair of Navy blue play shorts and am to get my pattern and dress material next week so that I can make it for the county style show in July.

500 Locker Plants Now Operating In the State

Texans are now using the facilities of almost 500 frozen food locker plants in the state.

As of November, 1946, there were 403 locker plants in the state according to a survey made by Roy W. Snyder, meat specialist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. More recent figures show over 500 plants operating, says Snyder, although a few of that number are meat-curing concerns that cannot be classified as actual food locker plants.

"We have had an enormous increase of locker plants here in Texas," Snyder says. One or more

plants is in operation in 210 of the state's 254 counties. The only sections of the state in which the plants have not spread rapidly are in extreme West Texas—the Big Bend country—and East Texas. The answer to the West Texas condition, says the meat specialist, is large ranches and scattered population. He believes that East Texas counties are just "a bit slow in starting," but that the plants will spread over that portion of the state in time.

Some families look upon a locker plant as a luxury rather than a good investment, says Snyder, but a food locker can be another contribution toward the family's balanced home food supply.

POUND OF DDT MEANS 2,000 POUNDS BEEF
College Station, June 5—An ounce of prevention was once worth a pound of cure, but DDT now claims a new figure. A pound of DDT is said to be worth 2000 pounds of beef to Texas stockmen during fly season this year. Entomologist Charles A. King, Jr., of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service, the man behind this statement, says "figure it up for yourself."
One pound of wettable DDT powder, mixed in 25 gallons of water, will spray about 25 head of cattle and stockmen say that beef animals will respond to spraying during the fly season by gaining an average of 80 pounds. When 25 head gain 80 pounds Entomologist King concludes, that nets 2000 pounds of beef from one pound of DDT.

40 Years Ago

On last Tuesday the first business house ever erected on the north side of the square in Haskell was moved away to make room for a modern 2 story brick building to be erected by the Odd Fellows Lodge. As this is almost the last landmark of the primitive town, was moved away, the writer and F. C. Wilfong got into a reminiscent mood and talked of the incidence of 1884 and 1885, when this little box house, 18 by 24 feet was the most pretentious business house in town. It was erected in the spring of 1884 by

William Harvey, a rather dignified old fashion farmer, who came west to make his fortune. When the house was completed, D. M. Winn was put in charge of the stock of dry goods, high heel boots and Stetson hats, the only kind worn by the cowboys in those days. In 1885, the county was organized and a shed room 8 feet wide was added to the building and rented to the county for a courthouse.

The first case ever tried in the county was for an assault and battery and was tried in this shed-room. Oscar Martin prosecuted and it was his first case in court. The defendant was his own lawyer, F. C. Wilfong and J. E. Wilfong were on the jury.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Can I go to school under the G. I. Bill while I am taking on-the-job training under the Act?

A. Yes, you can go to school under the Servicemen's Readjustment Act (G. I. Bill) while you are taking on-the-job training if the school course is determined to be related to the on-the-job course. The government will pay your tuition.

Q. Will the government pay for tools and other equipment while I am taking on-the-job training

under the G. I. Bill?

A. Yes, if the tools and other equipment are necessary for successful pursuit and completion of the course of training and is required by all trainees.

Q. I have been told that my pension will be reduced in 60 days. What can I do to prevent this reduction?

A. You may submit additional evidence to show that the reduction is not warranted.

Q. Must I show that I have had experience in business to get a guaranty of loan for business purposes?

A. The law provides "that ability and experience of the veteran and the conditions under which he proposes to pursue such business or occupation are such that there is a reasonable likelihood he will be successful."

RESOLUTION
 Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for the payment of pensions and the payment of the equipment of other permanent state institutions...

One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for the widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia; provided that the Legislature may reduce the tax rate hereinabove levied.

"Also, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the constitution of Texas, a state ad valorem tax on property of Five (5c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping buildings, or other permanent improvements at the designated institutions of higher learning; and the governing board of each of such institutions of higher learning is fully authorized to pledge all or any part of said funds allotted to such institution as hereinafter provided, to secure bonds or notes issued for the purpose of acquiring, constructing and initially equipping such buildings or other permanent improvements at said respective institutions. Such bond or notes shall be issued in such amounts as may be determined by the governing boards of said respective institutions, shall bear interest not to exceed three (3%) per cent per annum and shall mature serially (10) years from the first (1st) day of January of each year in which such funds are allocated or re-allocated to said respective institutions; provided, the power to issue bonds or notes hereunder is expressly limited to a period of thirty (30) years from the date of the adoption of this amendment; and provided further, that the Five (5c) Cent tax hereby levied shall expire finally upon payment of all bonds hereby authorized; provided further, that the state tax on property as heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 9 of Article VIII, as amended, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100) Dollars valuation. All bonds shall be examined and approved by the Attorney General of the State of Texas, and when so approved shall be incontestable; and all approved bonds shall be registered in the office of the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas. Said bonds shall be sold only through competitive bids and shall never be sold for less than their par value and accrued interest.

"Funds raised from said Five (5c) Cents tax levy for the ten (10) year period beginning January 1, 1948, are hereby allocated to the following institutions of higher learning, and in the following proportions, to wit:

"Not later than June 1st of the beginning year of each succeeding ten (10) year period, the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, based on the average long session full-time student enrollment for the preceding five (5) year period of time, shall re-allocate to the above designated institutions of higher learning then in existence, all funds to be derived from said Five (5c) Cent ad valorem tax for said ten (10) year period; and all such designated institutions of higher learning which participate in the allocation or re-allocation of such funds shall not thereafter receive any other state funds for the acquiring or constructing of buildings or other permanent improvements for which said Five (5c) Cents ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of other state funds. This amendment shall be self-enacting. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the purpose of this amendment; and the State Treasurer shall pay warrants so issued out of the special fund hereby created for said purpose."

"Section 18. For the purpose of constructing, equipping or acquiring buildings or other permanent improvements, the Board of Directors of the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Five Million (\$5,000,000.00) Dollars, and the Board of Regents of The University of Texas is hereby authorized to issue negotiable bonds or notes not to exceed a total amount of Ten Million (\$10,000,000.00) Dollars. Any bonds or notes issued hereunder shall be payable solely out of the income from the Permanent University Fund. Bonds or notes so issued shall mature serially or otherwise not more than twenty (20) years from their respective dates, and in no event later than twenty-five (25) years after the date of the adoption of this amendment. This amendment shall be self-enacting.

income from the Permanent University Fund, as such interests are now apportioned by Chapter 42 of the Acts of the Regular Session of the 42nd Legislature of the State of Texas, for the purpose of securing the payment of the principal and interest of such bonds or notes. The Permanent University Fund may be invested in such bonds or notes.

"All bonds or notes issued pursuant hereto shall be approved by the Attorney General of Texas and when so approved shall be incontestable."
 Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at a special election to be held throughout the state on the fourth Saturday in August, A. D. 1947, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:
 "For the amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, adding Sections 17 and 18 and providing for the levying of a state ad valorem tax on property in lieu of the present state ad valorem tax of Seven (7c) Cents for Confederate pensions in order to create special funds necessary for the payment of Confederate pensions and for the financing of the construction and equipment of buildings and other permanent improvements at state institutions of higher learning, in the amounts of Two (2c) Cents and Five (5c) Cents respectively; providing for a Five Cent reduction of the maximum allowable state tax on property, making such tax not to exceed Thirty (30c) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation; providing a method of payment for the construction and equipment of improvements and buildings at the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Texas and The University of Texas."
 Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue

the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.
 Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of the state, not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

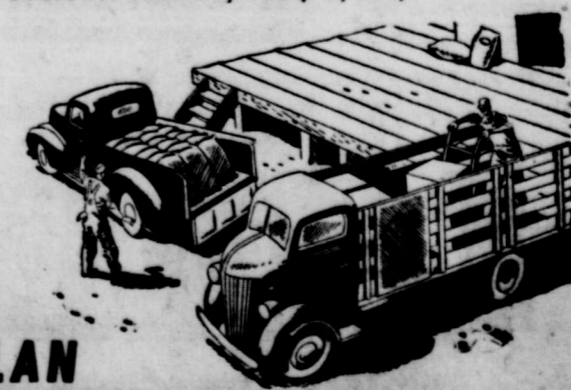

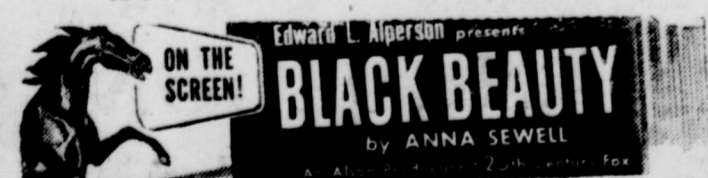
