FROM THE TRAFFIC ORDINANCE REGULATING TRAFFIC UPON THE PUBLIC STREETS, ALLEYS AND OTHER THOROUGHFARES IN THE CITY OF HASKELL, TEXAS, AND FIXING PENALTY FOR VIOLATIONS, ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF HASKELL, TEXAS.

ARTICLE VI

OPERATION OF VEHICLES
Section 10. Operation of Vehicles on Approach of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Upon the approach of any authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles giving audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle, the operator of every other vehicle shall immediately drive the same to a position as near as possible and parallel to the right hand edge or curb of the street, clear of any intersection, and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles shall have passed, unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

Section 11. Following Fire Apparatus Prohibited. Upon the sounding of gongs or warning devices used upon fire apparatus, operators shall stop their vehicles as near to the right curb as possible and shall remain standing until such fire apparatus has passed or until five minutes after the official fire siren has started sounding. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to follow any fire apparatus in response to a fire alarm closer than three hundred (300) feet from the rear of such apparatus.

ARTICLE V
STANDING, PARKING AND STOPPING

Section 6. Parking Prohibited in Certain Places. (c). It shall be unlawful for any operator to park any vehicle within three hundred (300) feet of any burning building or structure or thing where fire fighting apparatus is being used for the purpose of extinguishing same, except under the direction of the Chief or other officer of the Fire Department, or a police officer of the City.

**742 Million Birds
On Nation's Farms**

There are now over 742,047,000 chickens on farms in the United States, according to a report released by the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

The estimate, based on reports from rural mail carriers, crop and stock reporters and hatcheries, shows chicken population to be about the same as a year ago, but three percent less than 1936-45 average.

Texas is listed as having 42,459,000 chickens, more than any other state except Iowa, with 54,169,000.

**Care In Selecting
Orchard Sites Is
Important**

Letters of inquiry from Texas fruit growers have prompted Extension horticulturists at Texas A. and M. College to offer a few pointers on selecting a site for planting a new orchard this fall, winter or early spring.

Big points to remember, say the horticulturists, is getting the soil in good shape early enough that late summer and fall rains can put the finishing touches on the ground so that it will be ready when planting times comes around.

Drainage and soil type are two things to watch in selecting that orchard location now. Since fruit trees don't like "wet feet" both top and subsoil must have good drainage. Land with a slight slope to the northeast is good, since such slope protects the trees from prevailing winds and still offers thorough drainage.

Growers have found that good orchard soil has these qualities: moderately rich (over-rich soil may cause too fast vegetative growth); high in organic matter; a pH, or acidity rating, of 6.5 to 7; completely free of such trouble makers as nematodes, cotton root rot, oak root rot, crown gall or Bermuda grass. Most fruit trees produce on many different soil types if drainage and ailing is good. However, the horticulturists like to see orchards on 12 to 18-inch deep sandy or sandy loam soil, with well-drained sandy clay underneath.

They tell growers never to plant fruit trees on old orchard sites, which may be diseased and insect infested. Newly cleared land also may have termites left from decay ing wood.

The smart orchardist, when he selects a new site, goes ahead to terrace the land, pulverize the soil, plant an adapted winter legume fertilizer and set stakes where the trees are to go.

**German Hospital
Serves US Army**

One of Hitler's "Youth Through Joy" hospitals which was probably the finest establishment of its kind in the world has been taken over as an American Army research center for the study of infectious hepatitis. It is located at Bayreuth in Bavaria.

The causative organism and method of transmission of hepatitis, or jaundice, which first attracted wide attention during the war, thus far have defied detection. It is a malady characterized by fever, nausea and abdominal disturbances, usually accompanied by the yellow color associated with jaundice.

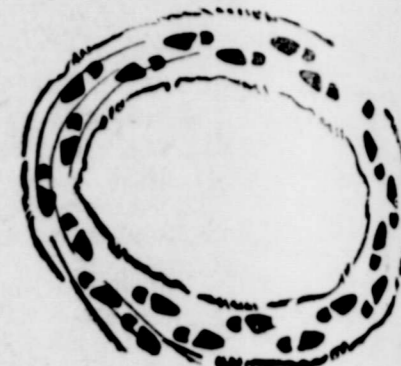

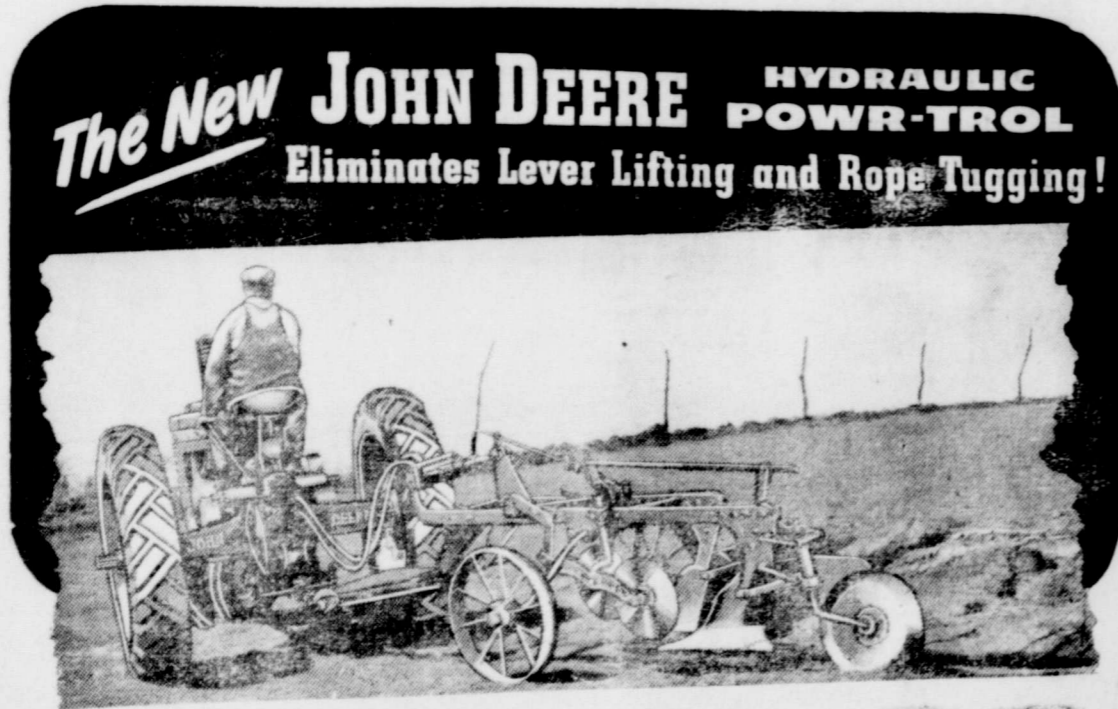

New Liason Plane Used By Army

The XL-15, a new liason plane being procured by the Army Air Forces for use by the Army Ground Forces has completed its initial flight tests at Wichita Division of Boeing Aircraft Company. It has an unconventional appearance with its gondola-type fuselage and inverted tail surfaces. With its 125 horsepower Lycoming engine, the all-metal, high-wing monoplane is designed to take off and clear a 50-foot obstacle in 600 feet, climb 628 feet per minute, to cruise at 100 miles per hour and to land at 35 miles per hour. It is designed for use in aerial observation, photographic or communications assignments. Plane is designed for operation in the Artil or in the Tropics and it can be quickly disassembled and loaded on a 2 1/2 ton army truck. Or with the propeller removed, the plane can be towed in glider fashion at speeds up to 165 miles per hour.

Proper Grazing Practices Help Pasture Lands

If proper season of grazing is used in pasture management much can be done to improve the grass cover and to have grass for live stock during the dry hot summer months. It has been noticed that where concentrated grazing was used in the winter and early spring months to control weeds and annual grasses and to utilize certain perennial grasses which can best be utilized at that time, to defer during the growing season of summer grasses to improve their stand on the ground, a much better turf resulted. Tobosa grass is best utilized during early spring and cattle should not be made to utilize it after it makes a seed head because it is not as palatable at that season, and other good

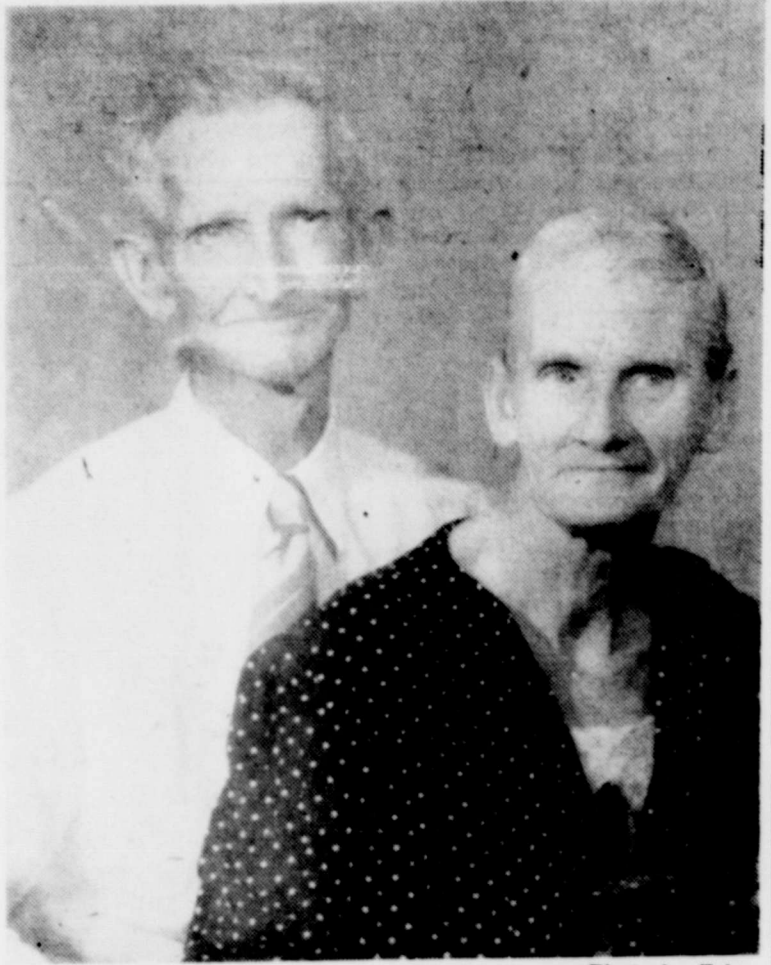

Supporting Our Schools

In a few weeks, the children of Haskell County will be going back to school to engage in the vital process of acquiring an education.

The people of the United States are unusually generous in their support of public education. Their faith in the value of their school system is tremendous. Large public funds are freely poured out every year to support the American system of free public schools.

Children represent plastic material, are subject to many difficulties which adults often misunderstand and the development of an educated human being from a trusting and ignorant child, is a task which challenges the best talents of any adult.

It might not be amiss to observe that, despite the tremendous sums spent for public education, every generation finds itself confronted with the task of enlarging the scope of public schooling. It seems, upon the surface, that the process of the years would develop an educated race, but if one analyzes the birth statistics, especially the fact that the less fortunate segment of the population provides most of the children, it is easy to understand why the process of education can never end.

About Buying Power

Without going into an argument as to the effectiveness of price controls during the war, we call attention to figures quoted by Ray Tucker, Washington columnist:

In 1940, he says, dollar sales of consumer goods amounted to \$46,400,000,000. In 1946, sales amounted to \$96,700,000,000. This was a gain, in dollars, of 108 per cent, but represented a purchasing power of only \$62,600,000,000 in terms of 1935-39 prices.

As the columnist remarks, "Buyers spent ninety per cent more money and got only thirty-six per cent more goods."

Predicts Good Business

"Good business" in the latter part of this year is predicted by Gordon K. Creighton, assistant-general manager of the National Retail Drygoods Association. He believes that economic laws are now working with the merchant and for the consumer and that people will not have to take goods that they do not want.

The gentleman is talking, of course, about apparel in the main. He predicts that, during the coming Fall season, everybody will be able to get the materials they want, in the qualities they want, in the colors most becoming to them and in their own sizes.

This will be something of a change from conditions that have endured for the past few years. It is pleasant to contemplate the prospective stocks of merchandise, so ample for consumer needs and all that we have to be sure about is that the consumer will continue to have the money to purchase what he wants.

Native Grasses Show Sturdy Qualities

Old time ranchmen of Archer County are saying that native West Texas range grasses do almost "unbelievable things" in grazing when given a chance.

The ranchmen are giving their grasses that chance by clearing mesquite growth off the range, and giving forage grasses room to grow, reports C. W. Wilhoit, Archer County agricultural agent.

Wilhoit says that Wayne B. Ray, stockman in the county, has a certain tract of land that would carry 40 head of cattle 10 to 40 years ago if the cattle were given extra feed three months out of the year. Seven years ago the mesquite was grubbed off the pasture, and for the past three years 100 to 120 stocker cattle have been sold off the same land.

Ray tells the county agent that this increase has come about without the extra feed bill and that his cows have been in even better flesh than when they were getting extra feed on the mesquite pasture.

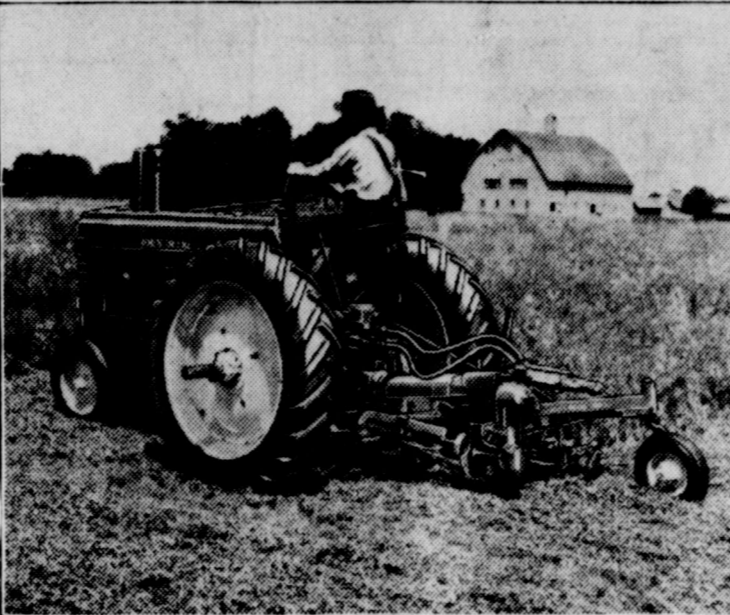
