





now. We must all tighten our belt get our feet on the ground, and go to work just as hard as we can work. A greatly increased measure of productivity per man-hour is the best answer to the present situation that can be thought up

Down With Prices

With increased productivity, with an honest hour's labor given for every hour's pay, we could see a considerable lowering of prices. In deed, with genuine whole-hearted cooperation from labor and industry, it would be quite possible to increase output as much as 40% generally. This should be enough to bring about a general 25% reduction in prices. This could be done with our present labor force and without increased working hours.

This would in fact bring prices down until it would be equivalent to an increase in wages. This is the one sound answer to the present threat of a depression. Such answer would also give us hope of regaining our foreign markets, which have had little attention paid to them since the war

Wisdom of a Sage

The importance of this thing prompted Bernard M. Baruch to state recently that the whole post war world would "get going only i men work" and to come out for a 51/2 day, 44 hour week. The seriousness of the problem we face is such that we may be able to save civilization if we accept the challenge, Mr Baruch said, adding that this would mean greater effort than that ex erted during the war.

In proposing a 44 hour work week with no strikes or layoffs to January 1, 1949," as a means of in creasing production, Mr. Baruch recognized our present tendencies to put limitations on our work. He emphasized that a way must be found for production to flow smoothly. This achieved, then a "sense of security would return to worker and employer, and the reaction upon the economy of the world would be deep and lasting."

Heads Together

The sage Mr. Baruch has more. "Until we have unity, until we straighten out and solve our problems of production, and have internal stability, there is no basis on which the world can renew itself physically or spiritually," he continued. If labor and industry would put their heads together, come to e realistic solution of their problems, shake hands across the table and go to work in earnest to whip this threat of immediate depression through maximum and whole-nearted production, then no one would have anything to fear.

ARTICLE VI

OPERATION OF VEHICLES Section 10. Operation of Veicles on Approach of Authorized Emergency Vehicles. Upon the approach of any authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles giving audible signal by bell, siren or exhaust whistle, the operator of every other vehicle shall immediately drive the same to a position as near as possible and paralel! to the right hand edge or curb of the street, clear of any intersection, and shall stop and remain in such position until the authorized emergency vehicle or vehicles shall have passed, unless otherwise directed by a police officer.

Section 11. Following Fire Apparatus Prohibited. Upon the sounding of gongs or warning devices used upon fire apparatus, operators shall stop their vehicles as near to the right curb as possible and shall remain standing until such fire apparatus has passed or until five minutes after the official fire siren has started sounding. It shall be unlawful for the operator of any vehicle to follow any fire apparatus in response to a fire alarm closer than three hundred (300 feet from the rear of such appa-ARTICLE V STANDING, PARKING AND STOPPING Section 6. Parking Prohibited In Certain Places. (c). It shall be unlawful for any operator to park any vehicle within three hundred (300) feet of any burning building or structure or thing where fire fighting apparatus is being used for the purpose of extinguishing same, except under the direction of the Chief or other officer of the Fire Department or a police offcer of the City.






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

hould be there at the time for which the hearing is designated. Q. To what benefits is a man with a yellow or blue discharge entitled?


A. A yellow discharge from the Army is dishonorable and the veteran is not entitled to any VA benefits. A yellow discharge from Navy service may be dishonorable or other than dishonorable. If dishonorable, the veteran is not eligible for benefits. If other than ishonorable, the veteran is entitled to file a claim and Veterans Administration will determine whether the claimant is entitled to benefits. The same procedure

applies to blue discharges from the Army. Q. May a veteran receive compensation from Veterans Admin. stration and State benefits for old age?
