taken in May of same year. In January, 1941, Mr. Paul Dunkel in charge of the Denton County Experiment Station gave Mr. John Elliott of the Frisco Co munity enough Madrid Clover seed to plant five acres. This is a bi-

In its first year Mr. Elliott not only grazed 20 heads of cattle, but had a hay harvest on this five acres of Madrid clover of 51/2 tons. In its second year Mr. Eiliott grazed it with 20 heads of cattle up to March 10th, and then allowed it to seed. (The second year of this Madrid clover is its seed year). It produced 1784 pounds of seed which Mr. Elliott sold for 40 cents a pound or a return of \$142.00 per acre. From this modest start Mr. Elliott is harvesting seed from 110 acres while the neighborhood farmers are harvesting seed from 984 acres in 1947 with the yield being about 500 pounds Madrid Clover seed per acre. It is estimated that in the Frisco Community that in excess of 2500 acres will be planted in the spring of 1948.

Madrid Clover has been certified as the clover legume of a the clovers, not alone is the value of this crop its seed yield, but it has been proven that any follow-up crop, whether wheat, oats, corn, cotton, or any small grain, it produces from 25 to 40% more yield

Here in the Frisco Community, Madrid Clover has been planted on all types of soil, white rock, poor eroded land, sandy soil, and deep black land. The plant has thrived and has improved the land wherever it has been planted.

There has been an association formed of Denton and Collin County growers, named Certified Madrid Clover Growers, with head-quarters at Frisco, Texas. The association will mail to anyone desiring it a pamphlet about Madrid Clover, and anyone interested in







### Behind the Curtain

Too much misinformation has been circulated about Russia. A lo of this has been put into circulation by Russia. Some of it has come from fellow-travelers and other admirers of the Soviet experiment. There have been honest mistakes of American writers who have been unable to penetrate the mysteries behind the iron curtain. Prominent Americans who have "toured" Russia have too often become dupes of propaganda shows cleverly contrived for visiting eyes.

Gradually, however, facts are coming to light. Documented and unbiased studies are greatly need Facts Talk Loud

Russian Communism theoretieally envisions a classless society. On the basis of pay, the difference between the status of the wage earner and the manager is much proper upkeep of their bodies, a making studies aimed at correct greater there than in America. The many "special privileges and bo nuses" that are distributed to the Soviet managers make this inequality more striking. The average wage of workers was reported in a pre-war year as approximately \$10 to \$12.50 a month.

What about labor? Yes, in Russia labor is active and organized. Joining unions there is a political and economic necessity. Labor leaders are appointed by the ruling group, and their duties are to speed up production, to keep labor disciplined. Wages are not a subject for discussion or negotiation. There is no collective bargaining. Most Russian labor laws, rulings, and pracices would be called "anti-labor"

There are no minorities; there is deviation from the "party line." The final decision of the people, in elections, must conform to the 'party" decision. In the party, relition is equivalent to "superstitions and unscientific processes." Profits are a capitalistic phenomenon, and therefore go to the state alone. The vast profits of the Soviet do not go to the workers whose property they are said to be, but to further the expansion of "the Soviet of the future."
