



# Work Started on Extension of Sewer Mains In East Haskell

Continuing this series of articles, we bring you this week past week we finished the six inch main on North 10th Street and between Avenue H and Avenue K, then proceeded to North 2nd from Avenue H east to the railroad right of way. Some good news or the citizens on the east side of town is in the fact that we have started a strech of sewer main, 2600 feet, beginning on South 1st on Avenue B east, and running to North 7th, Avenue B east. Upon completing these lines the next one to be laid will be in the colored section beginning in the alley on North 7th and between Avenue A and the railroad and run to North 3rd between Avenue A and the rail-

In connection with the projects now under way, people are requested to watch for grade stakes in the areas mentioned, and not to drive over or molest the stakes as they represent a considerable outlay of time in surveying the proposed extensions.

In an accompanying picture is shown the City's new Patrol Motor Grader. This is a new machine-an Adams No. 512, and is powered by a 70 horsepower International diesel motor. This machine cost the city \$9.551 and is the largest motor patrol grader manufactured.

As can be seen in the picture this machine is used to backfill sewer and water main ditches as soon as the pipe has been laid. This is quite a saving to the city for backfill on a contract price is

Roy Oliphant, street superintendent, operates the machine and has been employed by the City some six years Before his connection with the City he was employed for fifteen years by the State Highway Department. When Mr. Oliphant is not busy grading streets and back filling our main line ditches, he rents this machine to the public for leveling lots, etc., at a price of \$8.00 per hour with operator furnished. The rental from such work more than pays for the fuel consumed on all projects together. 
