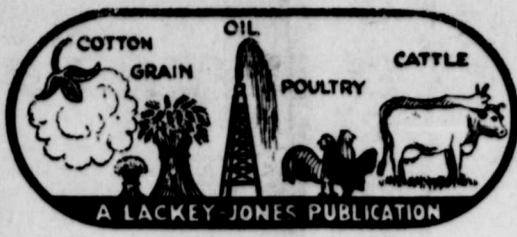

## Wheat Judging School Held Friday

The first of a series of wheat identification schools to be held in this area was held in Haskell Friday of this week in the vocational agricultural building in the Haskell High School with Haskell Stone, local agricultural teacher and F. W. Martin, Haskell county agricultural agent as hosts.

The school, sponsored by the Texas-Oklahoma Wheat Improvement Association plans to hold several such schools over a wide area for the purpose of discussing varieties of wheat adapted to this section, and a general program of wheat improvement. The Haskell school was under the direction of Keats Soder, a director of the wheat improvement association.

Included on the program were F. T. Dines, agricultural department of the Tex-O-Kan Flour Mills of Amarillo who discussed certain varieties of wheat adapted to this section which included Tenmarq, Chiefkan, Early Black Hull and Early Triumph.

Mr. Harry Vaupel, chief chemist of the Universal Mills of Fort Worth, led a discussion of the milling qualities of the varieties discussed. He pointed out that Tenmarq varieties were of the best milling qualities of any grown in this section. Black Hull was discussed as was Chiefkan with the qualities of both being pointed out.

Dr. I. M. Atkins, agronomist of the Denton agricultural experiment station, Denton, Texas, discussed yields of the varieties studied, and pointed out that Comanche, a variety of Tenmarq, had the highest reported yield in this section.

An interesting phase of the program was an open forum in which questions and answers on wheat improvement methods and wheat varieties were discussed.

Attending from Abilene were Bill Coalsen, vocational agriculture teacher; O. P. Jeter and Jerry Morgan of the Texas Mill & Elevator; Leon Canon, Kimble Mill; H. G. Henderson, Henderson Grain Co.; Elmo V. Cook, Taylor county agricultural agent and C. M. Huckabee, assistant Taylor county agent.

From Stamford were Cecil Eagler, feed dealer; and R. H. Austin, grain dealer.

From Haskell were S. M. Royall, grain farmer; C. H. Herren, Joe Cloud, B. L. Richie, and D. H. Persons, instructors in Haskell County Veterans Vocational school; Courtney Hunt and Dunston Head, grain dealers; and Stone and Martin.

Others attending from Haskell county were S. E. May, grain farmer and Louis May, instructor in veteran's vocational agriculture of Rochester.

## Baby Chicks Due To Be Scarce This Year

"You can get baby chicks this year, but it may be hard to get them when you want them," is the warning issued by extension poultry husbandmen of Texas A&M College.

They base their prediction on the December hatchery production report of USDA's Bureau of Agricultural Economics office in Austin. The report shows that commercial hatcheries in Texas produced 1,100,000 chicks during the month, which is just about half of the production of a year ago, and 28 percent below the 10-year average.

Hatcheries are generally starting their main hatching season later than last year, the report says. The egg-feed price ratio is not as favorable for egg production as last year, and most hatcheries are getting eggs according to orders placed with them. The exception is broiler chicks, as the demand for them has been fairly stable.

With such a situation, orders for baby chicks should be placed well ahead of the delivery date desired, the poultry husbandmen say. Otherwise, there may be an unexpected delay in delivery.

## Rites Pending For Mrs. Dodson, Early Resident

Funeral rites are pending for Mrs. Sallie Dodson, pioneer resident of Haskell who died Tuesday at 9:30 p.m. at the family home in North Haskell. Mrs. Dodson had been ill with influenza for two weeks, and suffered a heart attack shortly before her death.

The body will be taken to Fort Worth, where interment will be in Mt. Olivet cemetery beside her husband, who died in 1909.

Deceased and her husband, Capt. Bluford H. Dodson, were married Dec. 2, 1874 in Sulphur Springs, Texas. They came to Haskell in 1887 from Scurry county, and he was an early day merchant here, later serving as postmaster for several years. Mrs. Dodson had been a member of the Episcopal church since young womanhood.

She is survived by three sons and five daughters: Mrs. G. G. Mincher, Mrs. G. W. Fulton, Mrs. H. E. McQuaid, Fort Worth; Mrs. J. M. Cobb, Haskell; Mrs. F. S. Britton, Dallas; Frank M. and Leon Dodson of Haskell; and R. S. Dodson of Fort Worth. Fifteen grandchildren also survive.

Funeral arrangements are in charge of Holden's Funeral home.

## Former Haskell Doctor Killed In San Antonio

Dr. G. Cole Herndon, San Antonio physician, who formerly practiced in Haskell, was killed instantly at 9 p.m. Friday when his automobile and a truck collided in San Antonio.

The accident occurred while Dr. Herndon was making an emergency call.

Dr. Herndon served his apprenticeship at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene, and practiced medicine in that city and in Haskell before entering the Army Medical Corps. He served in Alaska before the war and was later sent to the other parts of the Pacific theater. Since receiving his discharge, he has been practicing in San Antonio.

Survivors are the widow; two children, his father and step-mother.

## Area Students Eligible For Scholarships

Any boy graduating from Haskell, O'Brien or Weirnet high school this year with a good scholastic record and need of financial assistance will have a good chance to win his own college education in a competition being conducted by Texas A&M college. Notice of the 1948 competition, with entry blanks for Haskell, O'Brien and Weirnet boys who want to compete, were mailed to the principals of those schools today by R. G. Perryman, secretary of the Texas A&M college scholarships committee.

Filling the need of giving every outstanding Texas boy a chance to earn his own college education, in spite of possible financial handicaps, the Texas A&M Opportunity Awards program is now in its third year. It offers boys graduating from Texas high schools each year a chance to compete for four-year college scholarships paying from \$200 to \$300 per year, plus an assurance of student jobs sufficient to earn other necessary expenses.

Sixteen Texas boys who would not have been able to enter any college were given their chance in 1947, thirty more in 1947. Their records in college have been excellent. This year's announced folder lists twenty-eight separate scholarships, with the probability of more being made available before the close of the contest.

Scholarship, character, evidence of leadership and need of assistance are the points on which final winners are selected by a college committee. Application blanks, now in the hands of local school principals, must be filled out by the boys and returned to the college committee by March 15.

Future Farmers of America and 4-H Club Boys of Haskell county will exhibit approximately 100 animals in the annual Fat Stock Show to be held in this city, Tuesday, February 24, on the Central West Texas Fair grounds. The show will be the largest held in the county since the annual event was inaugurated a number of years ago by the agricultural and live stock committee of the Haskell chamber of commerce and this year's show is expected to attract a large number of live-stock buyers from the surrounding territory.

According to Haskell Stone, FFA director, and County Agent F. W. Martin, 4-H Club boys supervisor, 54 club calves and 42 hogs have been entered in this year's show.

Highlight of the show will be a nuction sale of the top twenty calves. F. M. Robertson, Abilene oil operator and former Haskell county Attorney will be the auctioneer. In previous shows, the club calves have brought fancy prices from local and out of town buyers, and this year's offering of animals is expected to bring record figures, sponsors said.

Tommy Stuart, farmer and rancher of Roby has been named official judge of the show. Assisting him on a sifting committee will be Thos. L. Ballard of Haskell, and J. B. Pumphrey Jr., of Old Glory.

Classes for the show have been set up as follows:  
Fat Hogs—Class No. 1, hogs weighing 150 to 200 pounds, Class No. 2, hogs weighing 200 pounds and up, Class No. 3, grand champion fat hog.  
Fat Calf Classes—Class No. 4, light dry lot calves, Class No. 5, heavy dry lot calves. (A dry lot calf is an animal that has not nursed a cow after November 1, 1947). Class No. 6, light milk fed calves, Class No. 7, heavy milk fed calves, Class No. 8, grand champion calf.  
Grand Champion and Reserve Champion calves will be selected from the first and second placings in the calf contest.

Scouts and leaders will attend church services in uniform. Those of Jewish faith will hold their observances in synagogues and temples on Friday evening.
