Prices Moving Upward

It will probably be unpleasant news to Haskell husbands and housewives, anxiously trying to stretch the family budget to cope with the cost of living, that the rise is continuing and may be up as much as ten per cent before the first of the year.

Food, including meat, will probably rise during the summer months. Fuel, including coal and oil, will be higher this fall. Clothing is moving upward, according to the experts, and rents are pressing upward toward the higher limits permitted under existing legislation.

It is apparent to those familiar with economic processes that the extra billions being spent by Congress for foreign relief and national defense, when coupled with the increasing amounts being spent by business on new plants and equipment, will inevitably produce higher prices and accelerate the inflationary movement.

In addition, reports show very clearly that the people are spending their money and, in addition, going the limit on installment buying which is up almost three billion dollars above last year. This means that the consumers are going heavily into debt, with the result that when a deflationary movement begins, the average American will be once more caught in a hopeless financial condition.

Area Farmers Find Proper Management Of Range Profitable

Haskell County farmers have learned that proper management of range land by means of a conservation plan as worked out by district cooperators with assistance from range technicians of the Soil Conservation Service means more money at the end of the year. The fact that good management of the range results in more than double the available tonnage of forage is food for thought for ranchers and farmers in the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District, especially when the management involves no outlay of cash—only stockings of litter and practicing some deferred summer use. Handling the range like this is leaving one dollar on the range this year to make two next year. It is good business to be generous with the range. Not only will more forage be available each year as good conservation practices are put into practice, but a higher calf crop results, lower death loss, heavier cows, less expense in handling, etc.

Farmers and ranchers in the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District who are interested in obtaining the maximum profit from their range land will not stock their pastures with more cattle so as to get all the grass, but stock according to the long-time carrying capacity of that pasture which will provide for a carry over of ungrazed forage each year. A farmer or rancher is losing money who does not practice conservation ranching on his range.

Conservation on the range is but one of the many practices being applied to the land by cooperators of the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District.

The same goes for fresh roasting ears on the table. For best taste and quality, harvest the corn at 11 o'clock for a meal at 12.
As for tomatoes, Rosborough suggests that they be pulled from the vine as soon as they turn pink. Bring them into the house and put them in a cool shady place where they will ripen to a deep red color. You will find that the inside of the tomatoes are juicy and mealy instead of fibrous. This is for fresh tomatoes.
Now, if you want tomatoes for canning, pick them pink and let them ripen in the house, or leave them on the vine until they are fully ripe. A little mental arithmetic will give you an estimate on your tomato crop. A bushel of tomatoes will give you about 25 No. 2 cans. On a larger scale 150 bushels to the acre is a good estimate. This gives about 3,750 No. 2 cans of tomatoes from an acre.
Careful handling of the crop will mean less loss on the yield, says Rosborough, so handle with care and keep your profits up.

**Parents Warned of
Fire Menace to
Children**

Parents can do much to save their children from burning to death, says Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner.
Fire is the greatest cause of accidental death of children in the home, he stated, and parents largely can eliminate dangers and make their homes fire-safe for their children.
Of the 109 Texas fire deaths for the first five months this year, including only the first part of May, 38 of the deaths have been children under 15 years old.
Stating that gasoline has been responsible for the greatest number of child deaths by a large margin, Hall urged that parents ever allow gasoline on their premises. Of the 38 fire deaths, 11 have been caused by gasoline.
Five fire deaths were caused from kerosene, 3 from electricity and 3 from gas stoves. The Commissioner suggested that these things, as well as others, be watched closely so that they will not become hazardous.
Hall recommended that kerosene be kept well out of the reach of children and that they never be allowed to handle it. He said the same holds true for matches, hot liquids and lighted candles, etc. He also urged that kerosene never be used to start a fire and that fires for marshmallow toasting and popcorn roasts be held in fireplaces only and always under adult supervision.
As for gas stoves, Hall said, "the greatest danger for children is getting too close to heaters and catching their clothes on fire—a not so prevalent hazard this time of the year."
With the electrical hazard, the main thing for parents to remember is to keep appliances in good repair.
In two tragic cases children were burned to death when adults carelessly disposed of cigarettes around their beds.
Two more children were burned to death in automobile accidents and one died from burns after falling into a tub of boiling water. Two children met their deaths when hot grease and a wood stove set fire to their respective houses.
The last child died of burns after his clothes ignited while he was playing with matches.
Hall also cautioned parents never to leave their children at home alone, and to be sure that sitters are mature and responsible enough to take care of young children, especially in case of fire. Check to see that they know how to call the fire department, he advised.
Commissioner Hall cautioned parents not to dress children in highly inflammable clothing, such as fluffy net dresses, brushed cotton or rayon suits.

**Housewives Hold
Quality Above Price,
Survey Shows**

A recent USDA survey shows that with housewives who know best, it's quality 12 to 1, says Miss Louise Newman, County Home Demonstration Agent.
The survey, conducted by the Bureau of Agriculture Economics under the Research and Marketing Act, took a cross-section sample of housewives in towns of 2,500 population and over. Texas was one of the 26 states covered in this survey and Texas women from Shamrock, San Antonio, Lubbock and Galveston made up part of the 3,500 women in the nation that were interviewed. These homemakers were asked about their preference in potatoes. Their answers showed that 12 to 1, they considered quality more important than either size or price.
And when it came to size and price, they placed size above price three to one. Southern housewives were just a little more interested in price than those in the North. No matter what the income level, the women thought quality and size were more important than the price. As the income level went up however, interest in quality and size increased, while that in price decreased, says Miss Newman.

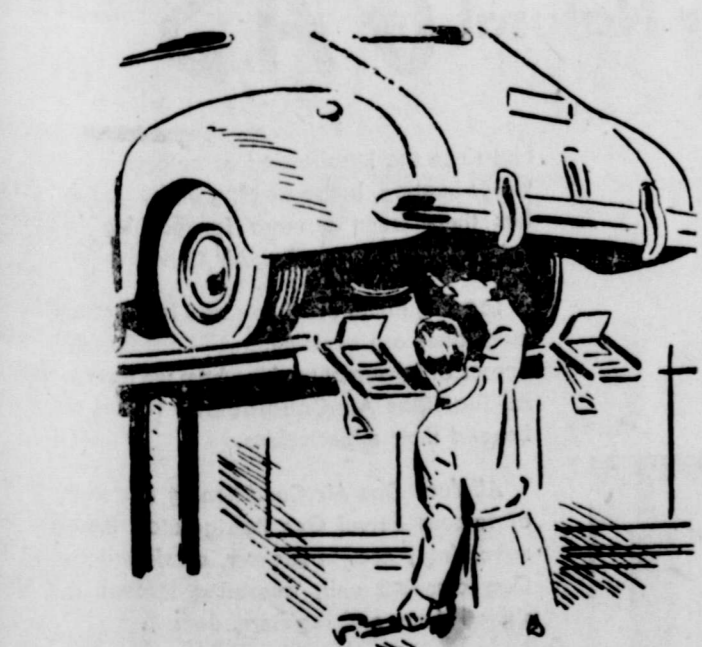

U. S. AAF Base In Germany Honors Abilene Woman

ERDING, Germany, July 2.—Mrs. Jeanette Williams, 27-year-old Texas beauty, and daughter of Mrs. W. R. Sheppard, of 208 Orange St., Abilene, emerged as undisputed winner of the "Miss Erding Air Depot" title, bestowed upon her on the third anniversary of this depot, the supply center of the U. S. Air Force in Europe.

The attractive brunette, well known at the Erding Air Depot for her participation in the depot athletics, was mentioned on nearly every ballot.

Jeanette Williams is the librarian and treasurer of the Women's Club of Moosburg, Germany, where she and her husband, First Lieutenant Leland V. Williams, have lived since Jeanette arrived overseas in November 1946. The Erding queen is also the star member of the women's bowling league of Erding, averaging 135 points per game throughout a recent tournament.

In 1940 she graduated from the Abilene High School where she took an academic course. For two years she worked as secretary-cashier for the Peoples Finance Company, Abilene, and did further work with another finance company in Fort Worth.

On September 7, 1942, she and Lt. Williams, then a corporal with the Air Force, were married in Panama City, Florida.

Lieutenant Williams is pilot of twin-engine and four-engine aircraft of the Air Force, having flown such ships as the Boeing B-24, B-32, the Douglas C-47 and Bechercraft C-45.

Many ex-service men in this area may also be interested in knowing that the War Department has recently authorized enlistment for direct assignment to the European Command of men with specific Military Occupational Specialties, who must enlist in the grade of Sgt. or below, an opportunity which has been non-existent for almost two years.

**G. I. Benefits
Pass 8 Billions
In Four Years**

The Veterans Administration said this week it has handed out 14,300,000 "benefits," totaling \$8,223,000,000 during the first four years of the GI bill.

There is no way of telling exactly how many World War II veterans shared in those payments, the agency said.

But more than 7,980,000 veterans received readjustment allowances which included \$2,584,000,000 for unemployment and \$493,000,000 in self-employment allowances.

More than 5,000,000 received education and training benefits totaling about \$5,000,000,000.

And 1,353,000 bought homes, farms and businesses with the aid of government guaranteed and insured loans. Interest on these loans cost the government \$140,-

000,000 and defaults cost another \$6,000,000.

Of the nation's 14,800,000 World War II veterans, many have taken advantage of more than one type of assistance. Other thousands have applied for no benefits whatever.

At the end of May, 503,276 veterans were receiving readjustment allowances and 2,333,766 were in training under the GI bill. The bill, properly known as the Servicemen's Readjustment Act, became effective June 22, 1944.

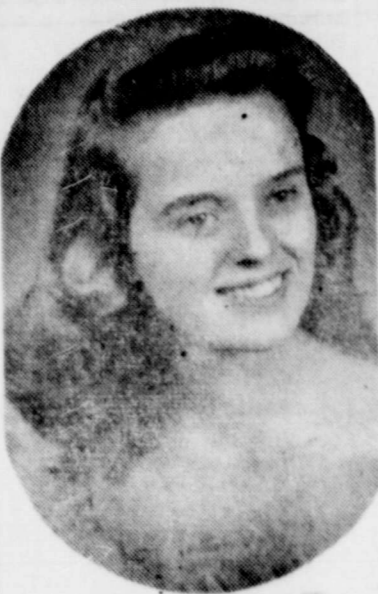

Veterans' News

The Veterans Administration reminds veterans that July 31 is the last day for reinstatement of lapsed National Service Life Insurance on a "comparative health" basis.

Before August 1, an eligible veteran may reinstate any amount of term insurance—from \$1,000 to \$10,000 in multiples of \$500—regardless of the length of time it has been lapsed, and usually without a physical examination. He need only fill out a simple application form, in which he certifies that his health is as good as when the policy lapsed, and pay premiums for two months.

The privilege of reinstating on this basis will be available after July 31 only to veterans whose policies have been lapsed for less than three months. Where the period of lapse is three months or longer, the veteran will be required to take a physical examination and qualify as an insurable risk, V.A. said.

Veterans carrying National Service Life Insurance term policies will be able to renew them for an additional five years upon expiration of the present term period, under Public Law 838 passed by the last Congress.

Term insurance taken out before January 1, 1946, carries a term period of eight years from date of issue. Policies issued after that date are for a five year term.

The first NSLI policies were issued to men in service in Oct., 1940. Therefore, the first term periods would have begun to expire in October of this year. Those who renew their term insurance will pay a higher premium than their old rate because of increased age. Veterans may convert their term insurance to permanent types of insurance whenever they desire.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q—I am going to be trained under Public Law 16 and would like to know if I can borrow money from Veterans Administration in case of need when I enter training?
A—Yes. Loans from a revolving fund, provided by Congress, not exceeding \$100 in any case, may be made to trainees commencing or undertaking vocational rehabilitation.

Q—Is it true that if I secure a guaranteed loan VA will pay part of the loan without cost to me?
A—Veterans Administration would pay to the lender, for credit to your account an amount equal to four per cent of the guaranteed portion of the loan. For example, if the guaranteed portion of your loan should be \$2,000, the lender would receive \$80 from VA to credit to your debt and you would not have to repay this amount.

Q—Can I, a veteran of World War II, get a guaranteed loan to go into any type of business I want?
A—Yes, you are permitted to get a guaranteed loan for any type of legitimate business on which the lender is willing to lend you money, provided your ability and experience as well as the conditions under which you propose to operate your business are such that there is a reasonable likelihood you will be successful. Also, the total cost must not exceed the reasonable value of the business.

Q—I am in training under the G-I Bill and am writing a thesis for my Ph.D. Will the Government pay the cost of publishing this thesis?
A—No.

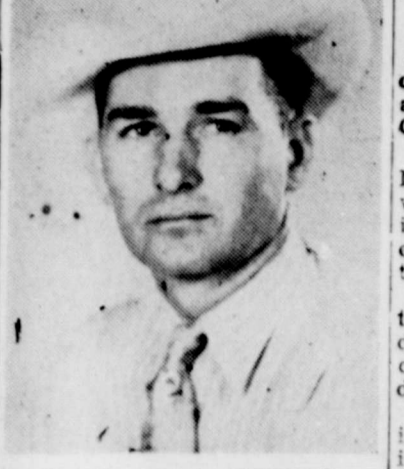

Diphtheria Cases Cause 77 Deaths In State

According to the morbidity report for this week ending July 3, more than 463 cases of diphtheria occurred throughout the state so far this year.

The morbidity report is released weekly by the Texas State Department of Health. It shows the prevalence of communicable disease by counties.

"In the light of our present knowledge regarding the control of diphtheria, it is unfortunate that the disease is allowed to flourish," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer.

For the week June 26 to July 3, Nueces County reported four cases; Hopkins, Tarrant and Val Verde Counties reported one each. For the year 1947, seventy-seven deaths from diphtheria were recorded.

"A life-time immunity may be established in 90 per cent of the children receiving the diphtheria toxoid," the health officer said. "If all parents of children over six months of age would have their children inoculated, the incidence rate of the disease would be rapidly reduced." The administration of toxoid causes little or no discomfort in the child, Dr. Cox added, and positive immunity can be determined by a Schick test conducted four to six months after the final dose of the toxoid has been given the child.

Huge Outlays Are Planned in County For Repairs

An estimated \$215,000 will be spent in repairing and modernizing non-farm homes in Haskell County during 1948, according to a report just released by the Tile Council of America.

That sum will be expended largely on painting, carpentry work, roofing repairs and plumbing, the report disclosed. "Greater availability of building materials will make possible a record amount of home improvement throughout the nation this year," declared Malcolm Schweiker, chairman of the Council's residential construction committee.

About 30 of every 100 homes in Texas well be painted, either inside or out, during 1948 and 17 will have roofs repaired or replaced, according to the report. Seven will have plumbing overhauled, bathrooms tiled or showers installed and six will have carpentry work done, the report revealed.

"To meet demands for materials for both new homes and home repairs, production has been stepped up in practically every type of material," said Mr. Schweiker. The output of ceramic tile for bathrooms and kitchens, for instance, is now at the highest rate in history, government reports show.

Throughout the nation between

\$2,600,000,000 and \$3,300,000,000 will be spent this year on home repair, according to the Tile Council report. This is believed the largest amount ever expended for such work.

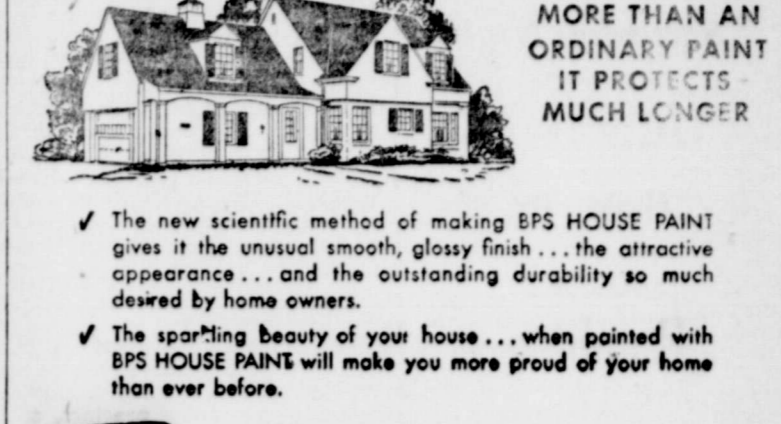

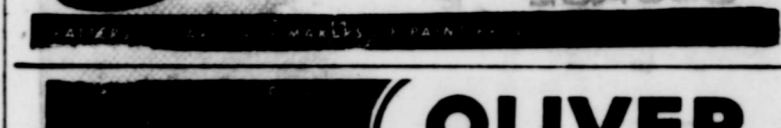

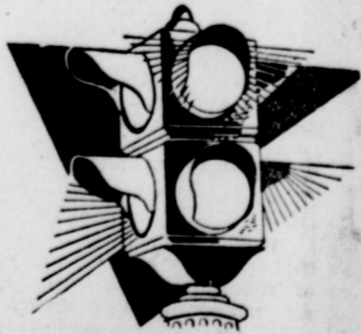
