Despite a seeming lack of interest on the part of voters, baloting in the first Democratic Primary Saturday, July 24, is expected to attract between 3,800 and 4,000 voters to the polls in expressing their choice for the county and district offices and the large number of State posts to be filled by nominees of the primary.

Although little interest has been manifest in advance of the primary, approximately seventyfive absentee ballots have been returned to County Clerk Horace O'Neal by voters who will be away from their voting boxes when the primary is held. Additional applications for absente ballots are being received daily by O'Neal. Absentee voting will be permitted until three days before the primary, and at the present rate a sizeable number of ballots will be cast by vacationing voters, he believes.

In the first primary in 1946, a total of 3,836 ballots was polled, and voting this year is expected to be in the neighborhood of that figure, with Tax Assessor-Colector Coburn reporting a total of 3,884 poll tax receipts and exemption certificates

He need only fill out a application form, in which he certifies that his health s as good as when the policy apsed, and pay premiums for wo months.


