### Farmers Advised to Secure Legume Seed Early

Highlighting the season's soft- Now is the time for Haskell to be played at Fair Park Field about getting legume seed to city of hairy vetch seed because feated Weinert aggregtaion, who of the extreme drought of last have held undisputed possession fall, and it may be necessary to obtain the seed from out of state. The price of the seed will rise as Haskell, well entrenched in demand for the seed picks up, so it would be wise to get the seed and have it on hand for that team from the north, and the contest is expected to attract a with the moisture in the soil such With the moisture in the soil such as we have at present, and if additional moisture is received at seeding time, this fall should be an excellent season for winter

> Winter legumes will prevent wind erosion on sandy or mixed Canada land subject to blowing such as occurred last spring. Hairy vetch or peas should be planted in the cotton rows at least by October, and should not interfere with the cotton yield if planted correctly. The cotton should respond to these soil conservation crops especially if super phospate is applied at seeding time. A rotation of legumes, maize, and cotton should pay big dividends for cotton farmers. Cooperators of the Wichita-Brazos Soil Conservation District report increased yields and stable soil with no wind erosion after placing winter legumes in their rotations. Technicians of the Soil Conservation Service assisting the district will help cooperators in applying these con-servation practices to their land. The acreage planted to winter legumes this fall is expected to be larger than ever before.

### Heart Disease Still No. 1 Killer in State

In Haskell County and throughout the state, heart disease continued in the top spot as the number one killer of Texans, according to figures released by the Texas State Department of Health.

Mortality rate figures show an increase of 255 deaths from the April, 1946 figure of 1,099, as compared to the April, 1948, total of 1,354. This represents an increase of more than 18.5% for the comparative period.
"So-called functional

disease is usually traceable to nervousness, infections from other parts of the body such as teeth and tonsils, a disturbed function of the thyroid gland, and to influenza," Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, said. "And the excessive use of tobacco, coffee, tea, or other heavy stimu-lant is often a contributing

correctable condition, the health officer said, insofar as the sources of infection in the sources of the source o of infection may be located and eliminated, as in the case of bad teeth or tonsils. Incurable organic heart ailments exist only too frequent.

Strict adherence to competent medical advice will eliminate much worry about either functional or organic heart conditions, Dr. Cox said. He added that such adherence would unquestionab reduce deaths from heart disea
