the meat has been set to cook. Adequate cooking is a final safeguard that should be observed at all times. To destroy any germs that may be present, the meat should be cooked at boil-

ing temperature for at least 20 minutes, regardless of whether it is to be fried or baked later. By observing these safety rules, Texans may enjoy their

One of the first engineering problems was the laying out of forms for concrete support foundation for the steel work, and Mr. Dishongh was successful in working out base line to a point of accuracy which permitted placing of the dismantled steel structure on exactly the same scale embodied in its original construction. This was done by the local builder without access to original blue-prints. Many other construction problems were worked out, and the large new building is rated as an outstanding building achievement by contractors and builders who have inspected the structure.

Dismantling and moving the large steeel hangar from its former location at Stamford Arledge Field was the job of Frank B. Reynolds of this city. Reynolds and his crew moved the steel framework, including the massive 120-foot steel span trusses, to the Haskell building site, and were responsible for swinging the several hundred tons of iron-

work back into position as build-
