Each boxer twice won national championships. Corna captured Texas titles five times, more than any other fighter. Attra was four-times state champion.

Slender, clever, sharp-punching Corna was Texas' first national champion. Representing Beaumont, he won the title as a

welterweight in 1941. Then in 1942, both Corna and Attra collected national crowns. Corna had trimmed down to a lightweight. Attra wore Temple colors and was a light heavyweight. Austin did not have a

tournament that year. Attra punched his way to his second national title in 1945, while in the Army and fighting

Statement of Wages Earned Required With Tax Return

The office of the Collector of Internal Revenue cautioned taxpayers today that income tax returns filed on either of the individual income tax forms could not be accepted unless statements of warges earned, Form W-2, from employers are attach-

The Form W-2, issued by all employers to their employees, can not be used as a return this

Instead, all persons filing individual returns must use either Form 1040-A or Form 1040. Form 1040-A should be used by all persons having income wages or salaries not in excess of \$5,000. It can be used as joint return of husband and wife. All Forms W-2 received from employers, for both the husband and wife, must be attached. The Collector's ofice will figure the taxes or refund due on these returns.

Forms 1040-A may be secured from employers, post offices, banks, and field offices of the

Collector of Internal Revenue. Persons having income in excess of \$5,000 must use Form 1040. If any income was from wages or salaries, the Forms W-2 must be attached.







Veteran students who acquire dependents or additional dependents while in training under the GI Bill should notify VA as soon as possible, so that VA can determine whether they are eligible for increased subsistence payments.

Notice of change in dependency status should be sent to the VA regional office in which the veteran's records are kept. The notice should be accompanied by legal evidence of dependents, such as a certified copy of public record of birth, baptism or mar-

Subsistence payments will be increased as of the date legal evidence is received by VA, and will not be made retroactive to the date the veteran actually acquired the dependent.

Monthly subsistence allowances for veterans studying full time in school are \$75 for those without dependents, \$105 for those with one dependent, and \$120 for those with more than one dependent.

Subsistence allowances paid by VA to veterans in educational or on the job training are not considered as income for income-

tax purposes, VA reports
Any income that the veterans nay earn on part-time jobs while ttending educational institutions full time, or earn while on the job training, is subject to taxation under existing tax laws.

Any veteran whose eligibility for GI Bill education runs ou after he completes at least half of a school semester which is normal in cost may complete the remainder of the semester at government expense, VA says.

Questions and Answers -Q.-VA has decided that vocational training under Public Law 16 to be "medically not feasible" for me. Will such training be provided at a later date if feasibility for training should then be established?

A .- Yes, if all other requirements of the law can be met. In such a case, vocational training may be provided as soon as medical feasibility is established. In the meantime, your application for vocational rehabilitation is referred to a rehabilitation board in the regional office. This board follows up your application and at regular intervals arranges for any service which might helpful in accomplishing hospital and who intends to visit ocational rehabilitation.

Q.-While in training under the GI Bill, I was dropped from ubsistence rolls because my monthly progress reports failed to reach VA in time. What should do to be restored to the rolls? A .- You should check with

your employer and urge that he send in reports. You will be restored to the rolls as soon as your progress report is received. The progress report must be received by VA within 60 days of the first delinquency or you will lose the subsistence for the deliquent period.

Q.Is it possible for a veteran to complete his last two grades elementary school under the A.-Yes.

Q .- Will VA pay the traveling osts for my son who is in a VA

home over a holiday? A.-No. All travel while leave from a VA hospital is at the expense of the veteran.




