The chief changes allows 21 nonths to pay off the credit balance due after cash payment. listed, one couple had requested 18 months where the credit amount is more than \$1,000, or 15 months when it is 1800, or Walter Elmore vs. Lois Florence 15 months when it is less

The 21-month payoff limit ap-plies to all items affected by the controls—automobiles, refriger-tors, radios and television sets, washing machines. furniture and other household appliances valued above \$50.



City dwellers may want to grow a few vegetables as part of a landscape plan. If so, pruning the roots and tops of overgrown shrubs will make room for their new plantings. Among those vegetables, Miss Hatfield lists as suitable for planting now in most parts of Texas are roots or seed of asparagus, seed endive car-rots, lettuce, mustard and tur-

The recent state-wide freeze injured a large number of shrubs. Don't prune such frost injured shrubs right away,she warns. on for a while as further protection against other cold snaps, should they occur.

About the care of shrubs, Miss Hatfield has this to say. It is a good idea to examine the flowering quince, gardenias. roses and wax leaf legustrum for signs of scale. That goes for peach and plum trees as well. County agricultural agents have further in-formation on the treatment and protection of shrubs from insects and disease

When shrubs, trees or roses have abnormally yellow leaves, this specialist suggests using a corrective treatment of one cup of iron sulphate (or copperas) and two cups of sulphur. Mix this in well with the soil with-in 15 square feet of the plant, says Miss Hatfield.

Poultry Outlook For '49 As Seen By Specialist

The egg-shaped crystal ball of the Texas A&M College extension specialists in poultry husbandry. and agricultural economics has several pictures for the 1949 poultry prospects.

Prices are expected to be about like those of last year, and they may average higher for the first half and a little lower for the second half of the year. Texas farms will have fewer layers, but the demanudfor eggs is still strong. Total egg production this year may be as high as it was last year, these specialists be-

Feed for layers is more plentiful these days, and prices may drop this year about one-fourth lower than last year. This year's pullet crop is expected to jump sharply, which means Texas will have a large holding of layers by next Jan. 1.

From the poultry angle, the crystal ball shows that recent prices of broilers and turkeys is good. This will likely make for larger production this year. Outlooks on the feed supply show there is plenty, and the costs are more favorable. The demand for broilers and turkeys is dropping off slightly, but prices are expected to remain near the 1948 level in first half. and less favorable the latter part.

Transportation, equipment and other production costs, except feed, may go up some. On the otherhand a higher net income from broilers is expected. A_S for turkeys, a larger number is predicted for 1949, giving an improved outlet for hatching eggs, say the specialists.

Gluten meal and gluten feed obtained from grain sorghums as by-products from the extraction of starch may soon be available in significant quantities for the feeding of livestock.

According to information from Dr. J. C. Miller and Fred Hale, of the department of animal husbandry, and Dr. Carl M. Lyman of the department of biochemistry and nutrition, all of Texas A&M College, some work has been done in the past on the use of corn gluten feed and corn gluten meal as feeds for swine. However, there are no reports on the use of sorghum gluten feed and meal.

In the fall of 1947 and the ummer of 1948, feeding trials were conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station to study the value of sorghum made by-products as pig fattening rations. The first experiment was made up of 40 Duroc pigs, averaging 79 pounds each, and divided into four lots of 10 pigs

The ration in each lot was and a protein supplement which was fed free choice in self feeders. Each group of 10 pigs also had free access to a mineral mixture containing 80 pounds of ground limestone and 20 pounds of salt. The sorghum by-produts were used as part of the protein mixture. The protein mixture in the chack lot consisted of 50 lbs. meat scraps, 30 pounds of soybean oilmeal and 20 pounds of Farms, South Plains and N. Mex dehydrated alfalfa leaf meal

In place of the 30 pounds of soybean meal in the check lot, one lot contained 30 pounds of sorghum gluten meal, and another had 30 pounds of sorghum gluten feed. The third had 40 pounds of gluten meal replacing the 30 pounds of soybean meal and 10 pounds of meat scraps in the protein supplement.

The same ratio was used in the summer of 1948, only in this test the pigs were fed separately rather than in groups.

The results of these tests indicate that the protein supplement for fattening hogs may contain up to 30 per cent of sorghum gluten meal. Also they found that gluten feed is not as good as the gluten meal in hog fattenng rations.

The group of pigs getting the soybean meal as 30 per cent of the protein mixture made 10 per cent greater daily gains than did the pigs fed by sorghum by-pro-

Since grain sorghum by-products are low in lysine, it may be a better practice to replace a part of the grain with these byproducts rather than use them in the protein supplement when feeding the grain and protein supplement free choice in self feeders, these men report.



is done about the obscure scale This is a small insect covered with a circular wavy scale. They are found on the bark, says A. C. Gunter, associate entomologist of Texas A&M College, but you won't see them moving around over the tree. These small scale insects feed

on the juices by injecting a small. needle like beak through bark. Many times large limbs, and once in a while the whole tree, will be killed. But the scale does not bother the leaves or the pecans.

Control of the scale is pretty difficult, says Gunter, because it is so few protected. The best contral can be had by thoroughly spraying the trees during the winter or dormant season with a per cent dormant oil. However, Gunter cautions pecan growers not to use the 3 per cent dormant oil spray if there are leaves on the trees.

The care and management of a pecan grove isn't complete without insect control. When the right variety of pecans is growing on good soil, it is possible to harvest more pecans practically every year when a crop is set if



Jeeps and Pick-Ups Invading Realm Of Cow Pony

These days it is differene from what is used to be on the Texas ranges. Today's cattlemen are doing the same job their grand-dads did, but they are doing it a little differently.

For instance, says A. L. Smith, extension animal husbandman of Texas A&M College, the jeep and the pickup truck are fast replacing the cow ponies in many ranch operations. And. too, the old dipping vat is giving way to the portable power sprayers in insect control.

Other mechanical that is coming into the picture are the mineral dispensing machines, pushing the mineral boxes for supplying phosphorus sup-plements into the background. Calf tables for dehorning, castrating and branding have re-

placed many a "heeler."

The maximum use of grazing crops such as small grains, sudan grass and re-seeded pastures have taken the place of dry-lot finishing of cattle for slaughter

There is a noticeable trend toward more crossbred cattle in Texas, particularly in the southern and eastern part of the state. This crossbreeding is to increase the market weight of cattle. As result of this work, the King Ranch has developed the Santa Gertrudis breed, the only breed developed in the western hemi-

on Texas ranches cattlemen are practicing a more rigid cull-ing of herds and stocking their ranges with less cattle. They realize the pounds of beef rather than the number of cattle is the secret of profitable production.
In the continuous fight against

animal parasites, many new in-secticides are being used today that were unknown just a few years ago. Rotenone, DDT and BHC have replaced standbys of arsenical dips controlling lice, ticks. grubs and horn flies. Chloroform has been replaced by Smear 62 in the control of screw worms. Phenothiazine has proven more effective in controlling stomach worms than the bluestone used

worms than the bluestone used by cattlemen of a generation ago.

Texas 4-H Club work has been responsible for a generous share of these new-fangled ideas in beef cattle production. Club boys seeking information on raising beef calves have learned better and faster methods of feeding and management through the and faster methods of feeding and management through the county agents and animal hus-

bandmen.
In doing so, they have pushed boys' club work in beef calf production ahead in the lines of calf selection, rations, care and management, control of animal parasites and fitting calves for show and marketing, says Smith

Farm Machinery Prices Are Due to Remain High

Farm machinery prices are still climbing. They have gone up continuously for the past 8 years, and right now are at record high.

That's the report from W. L. Ulich, extension agricultural en-gineer of Texas A&M College, He says that in last September, prices were 62 per cent higher than in 1940 and 15 per cent higher than in Sept. of 1947.

As for this year, farm machinery and motor fuel prices are expected to remain high. And, as things look now, he says, farmers will have to continue to buy tractors and equipment on a seller's market through this year, even though there was a record production last year. This production will probably continue


