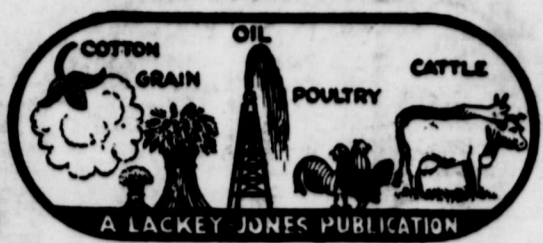

## EX-CONVICT CHARGED WITH SLAYING OF GLENN YARBROUGH IN ARIZONA APRIL 7

An ex-convict from New Mexico, who had been held by Kingman, Ariz., officers for investigation in connection with the slaying of Glenn Yarbrough of Rule on April 7 in Kingman, Monday was formally charged with the killing, press dispatches from the Arizona city stated.

Sheriff Frank L. Porter of Mohave County said he had a complete confession from William Edward Thorn, alias Ivan Leroy Mies, 23, who gave his home as Hereford, Texas. County Attorney Carl D. Hammond was also present when the confession was made, the sheriff said.

Porter said Thorn had been released from the New Mexico prison last year after serving 50 months for a forgery charge.

## Pink Bollworms Eradicated In Six Texas Counties

Pink bollworms have been wiped out in six Texas counties, but they have turned up in two others where they had never been seen before, the Agricultural Department has reported.

Cotton shippers in Brazoria, Chambers, Harris, Jefferson, Liberty and Orange Counties are no longer bound by bollworm regulations, the announcement said, because the cotton pest has not shown up in three years of inspection.

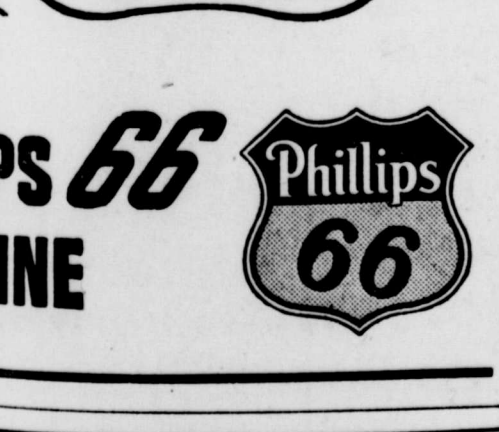

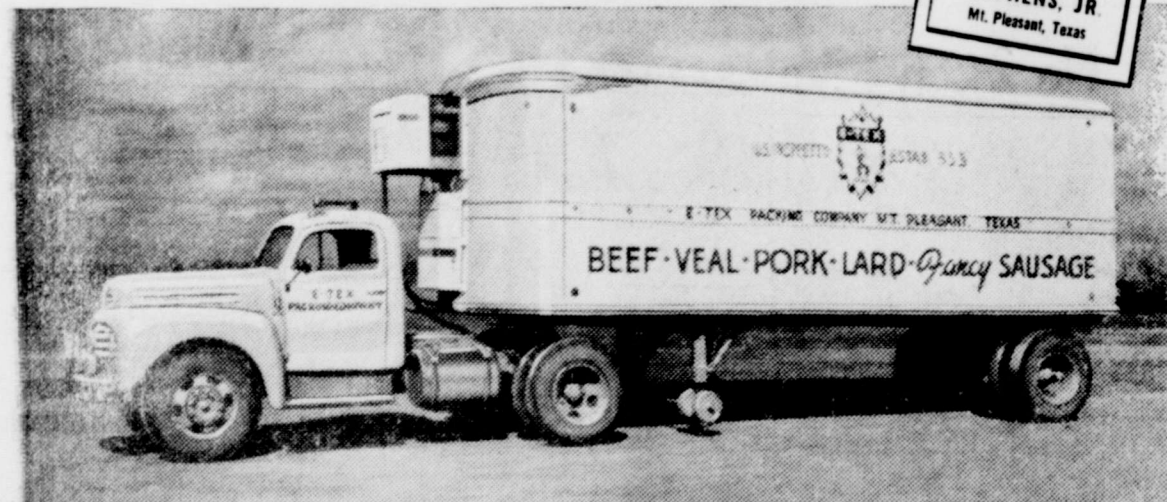

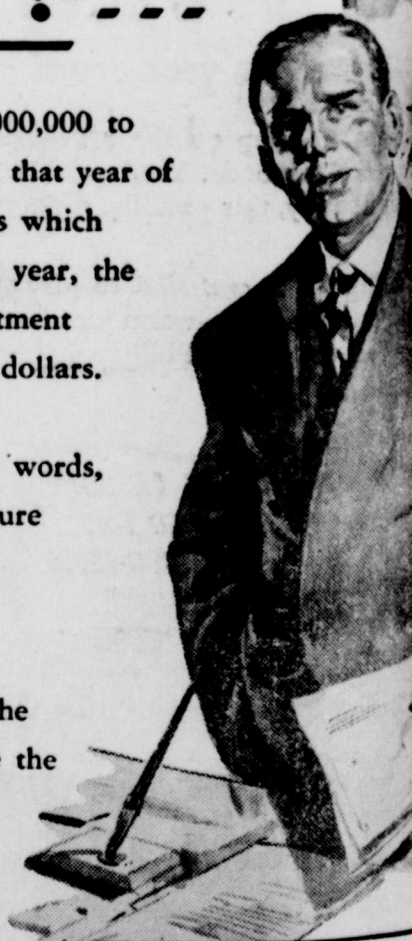

Outline for organizing the state for CROP on a county basis with representation of all church communities in each county as presented by Elmore R. Torn, state director, was approved.

Mr. Daniel C. Russell, state chairman of the Texas CROP committee, reported that the church sponsored world relief program seemed certain of receiving the support and cooperation of all church denominations and farmer organizations of the state.

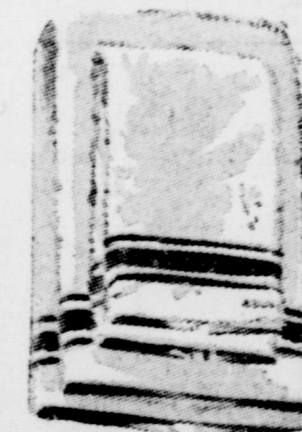

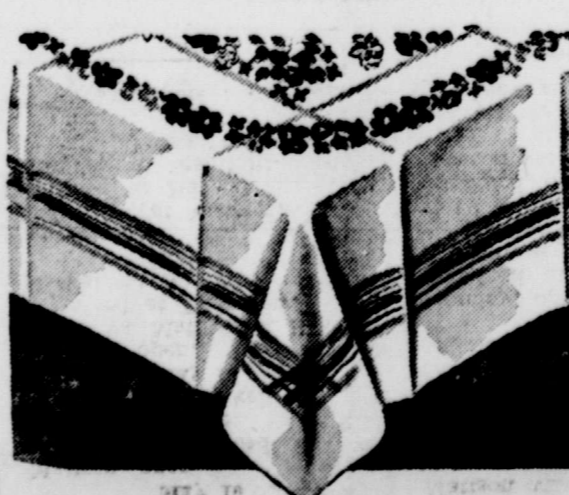
