was robbed and died of a beating suffered during the robbery at his home there Sunday night.

Knox, who was retired, lived long enough to give Lamb County Deputy Sheriff Homer McLaury a description of his assailants. Knox told Deputy McLaury before he died that he was struck and robbed by two men,

one tall and one short. They were both Anglos, Knox said, McLaury said Knox related the following to him:

"About 9 p.m. Sunday, two men knocked on the door and told him that their car had broken down and they would like to borrow a flashlight.

Knox let the men in the house and then they started beating him on the head and face. They took his money and apparently left him for dead.

Knox stumbled out of the house and apparently tried to walk to his son's service station which is near his home. He fell as he crossed the railroad tracks between his home and the service station."

Neighbors heard Knox crying for help and called Mc-Laury, who is stationed in Sudan. McLaury called an ambulance upon arrival at the scene and Knox died enroute to a hospital.

A dedication ceremony was tural Housing Association, Inc., an all-new pioneer housing project there for farm laborers.

The Pioneer project in East Dimmitt, first and largest of its type in the US, is expected to serve as a prototype for migrant workers' housing of the future.

The 23-building complex will house 190 workers' families in two-bedroom apartments. It includes nine two-story apartment buildings for migrant laborers, 12 one-story quadruplexes for both migrant and permanent workers, a threechair barber shop, a coin-operated laundry, a large equipped playground, outdoor benches and clothes lines, and paved and curbed streets and parking

In the center of the complex is Manager William J. T. Robertson's separate quarters, the offices of the County Migrant Health Unit and the Texas Employment Commission substation, and a maintenance and storage building.

Constructed of concrete block and steel, the buildings are painted beige brown, with bright colored doors. Inside, the four-room apartments are painted in pastels and have built-in ranges.

Total project cost was \$966, 820, financed mainly with a \$570,000 insured loan and a \$387,380 grant from the Farmers Home Administration.



AUSTIN -- March 15 is the deadline for application for a \$500 scholarship to be offered by Texas Classroom Teachers Association in the fall.





COTTON TALKS

The Legislative Committee of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. met February 29 in Lubbock and reached general agreement on support for an extension of the current cotton program with refinements or modification recommended on eight points.

W. L. Edelmon of Friona, committee chairman, emphasized that this was the committee's first meeting in 1968 and that the position taken was subject to review at subsequent meetings before final recommendations are taken to the full 48-man PCG Board of Directors.

The current cotton program, included in the Agriculture Act of 1965, expires with the 1969 crop year. But the agriculture committees of both houses of Congress have announced that hearings will be held in 1968, probably beginning in late March or early April.

Vietnam News

To Lance Corporal Jonathan D. Kelly of Sanford, Fla., the patrol was almost like his first, although he had participated in a hundred or more.

Kelly is a new squad leader with Company E, Ninth Marine Regiment. Already a five-month combat veteran in Vietnam, he has earned his own squad - a feat of considerable proportions among Marines - and was now commanding it in the field for the first time.

"It's quite a jump from fire team leader, responsible for only three men. he noted. "As squad leader, I have triple the men . . . triple the firepower . . . and triple the responsibility in lives.

"During a patrol, the squad leader is solely responsible for each movement made and each shot fired. It takes constant alertness and you've got to be right the first time - Charlie doesn't often allow you a second chance," he added.

Moving a patrol out at dawn, Kelly aligned his fire teams, set his flankers and positioned his M-79 (grenade launcher) man close by. Through a series of spoken commands and hand signals he tells his squad: "Don't bunch up . . . keep a good interval . . . stagger the column."

He is constantly in motion. often at doubletime, pausing only to check his map and compass. A good squad leader, he says, has to be everywhere at once.

The patrol takes his squad through rice paddies and bushes, along roads and barely discernible jungle paths. His eyes are darting everywhere looking for traps . . . looking for mistakes . . . looking for the enemy. For five long hours and 8,000 meters he is immersed in his work.

As the patrol progresses, a rifleman finds a bamboo trap. Kelly comes forward to investigate. He cautions his men not to touch the innocent looking device until the area around it has been carefully checked for booby traps. Whenever the patrol crosses a cleared area, he disperses his men. He insures both the flanks, the front and rear are covered at all times.

Previous combat knowledge comes into play as he anticipates probable enemy actions that may be taken against his squad at any time during the patrol. His men note his actions, and respond smoothly to his sounds and gestures.

Finally, the patrol ends. There was no enemy action and every man breathes a little easier as he enters friendly lines again. Kelly sees to his men, then goes to a debriefing.

There was no enemy contact, but the patrol has gone smoothly and Kelly is inwardly proud of himself.

"I know I can handle it alright," he says, "but it was something new to me and a lot of my men are new to Vietnam. I guess every squad leader goes through the same thing."
