Four young area men, thus far, have been taken into custody in connection with the Sunday, March 3 robbery-beating-death of a 71-year-old Sudan man, John Everett Knox.

Lamb County Sheriff Dick Dyer said Tuesday that assault and robbery charges had been filed against Richard Duan Rush, 22, Muleshoe; Cecil Lee

Mooney, 23, Sudan; Odell 'Pee Wee' Howard, 19, Muleshoe and John Hall, 18, Muleshoe.

Released on bond Monday was young Hall, however bond has not been set for the other three pending an autopsy report later this week and further investigation now underway.

The investigation by Lamb County Sheriff Dick Dyer,

Deputy Homer McLaury and Texas Ranger Razz Renfrowled to the early Saturday arrest of Howard and the arrest later that day of Rush and Mooney. Hall was taken into custody Sunday. Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements arrested Howard for Lamb County.

The suspects had been questioned by the Lamb County offi-

cers and Bailey County Sheriff Dee Clements Friday before being placed in Lamb County jail Saturday.

Knox died in an ambulance enroute to Littlefield Hospital the night of the beating and robbery shortly after giving Deputy Homer McLaury a brief description of his assailants.

In relating the story, Deputy McLaury said: "About 9 p.m. Sunday, two men came to the small frame house where Knox lived alone.

"They told him their car had

broken down and they wanted to borrow a flashlight.

"Knox told Deputy McLaury that he let the men in the house and they began beating him on the head and face. He said they took more than \$400 from his billfold then left.

"Knox left the house and stumbled along for a short distance apparently trying to reach a service station operated by his son.

"He reached the railroad tracks about 50 yards from his frame home and fell.

"A neighbor heard Knox cry-

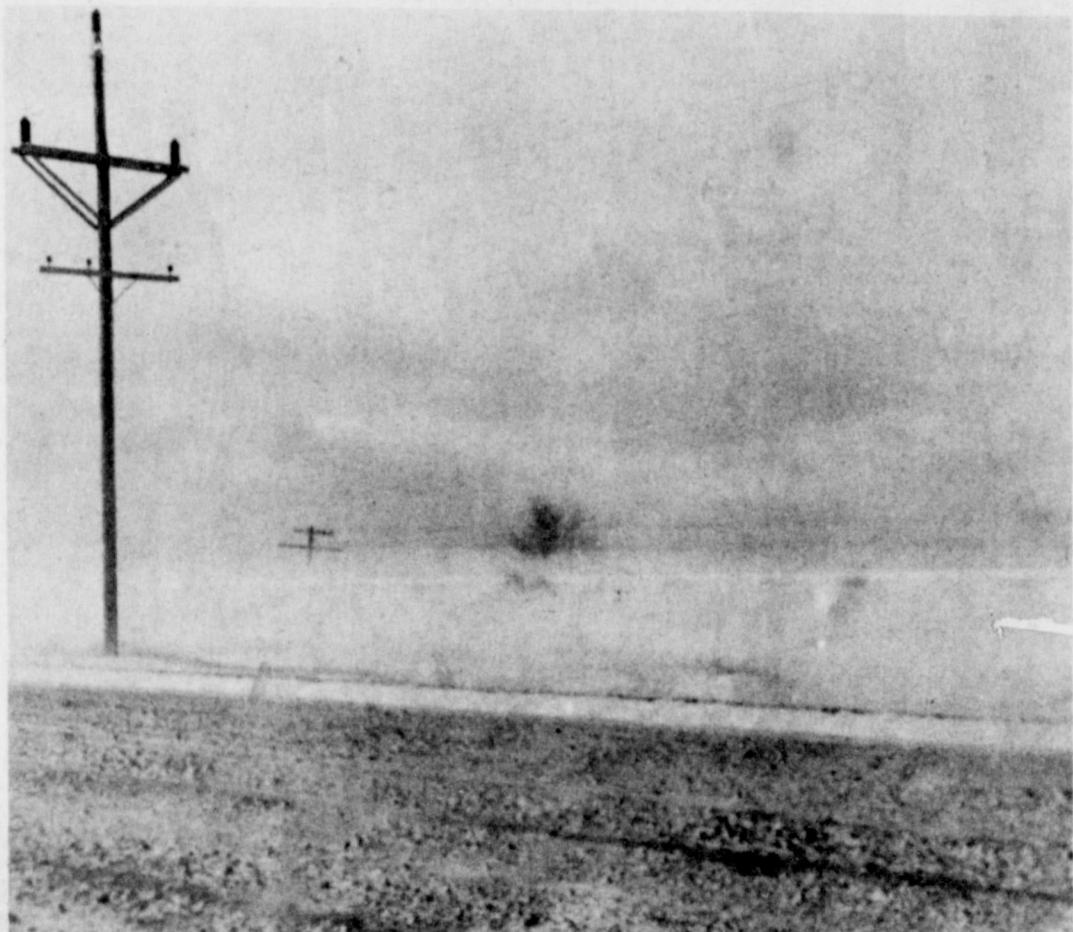
ing for help and summoned Deputy McLaury. Upon reaching the scene, the officer called an ambulance and was enroute to Littlefield with him when he died. The injured man was heard by Mary Trevino, who lives about one-quarter mile from where Knox lay by the railroad."

The dead man's son, R. B. Knox, who operates a Texaco service station some 400 yards from his father's home said the \$400 to \$500 in his father's billfold was "all the money he had in the world."

"I know he had a \$100 bill, a \$50 and some \$20 bills. He had been at the station with me from 10 a.m. to around 5 p.m. that afternoon."

Investigating officers said the elder Knox had attended a dance at Midway Saturday night and several there had seen that he had the cash.

Sheriff Dick Dyer told the Journal that other developments could very well be in the making and further comment could not be made until the autopsy report was completed and returned.

Snow Storm Rakes Area: Schools Closed Monday

Heavy clouds rolled across the plains Sunday morning, a prelude to a snow storm which closed schools Monday, blocked highways in some areas and hampered travel generally.

Rain fell during the day, followed by ground fog rolling in around 11 p.m. ahead of high winds and snow which caused drifting up to four feet in the immediate area.

Snowplows and highway crews operated around the clock from the time the leading edge of the storm began to halt traffic to the north and west.

The Panhandle area of Texas was paralyzed by drifting snow over a thick coating of ice by early evening and the storm moved south-southeast. New Mexico caught their part of the snow and ice as the system moved across the northern portion of that state.

Moisture measured approximately 1.50 inch here. Snow fell until morning Monday and skies remained overcast during the day. Tuesday dawned clear and sunny.

A tornado moved across open country Sunday afternoon, on the ground for some eight miles west of Plains to northeast of the city, uprooting a power

transmission pole, Plains Chief of Police Bobby Kinsey and Yoakum Deputy Sheriff Bill Jones followed the tornado in patrol cars until it lifted. The cloud which produced the funnel cut a six-mile wide path as it crossed the area, leaving two inches of hail on the ground.

Farwell, likely the hardest hit in the immediate area, reported snow drifts up to six feet with schools remaining closed Tuesday waiting for the sun to burn off the ice glaze from the highways and melt the drifts blocking rural roads.

While motorists were stranded in cars in the Panhandle in Texas, the moisture was of great benefit to wheat farmers.

Wheat farmers, especially, felt like the rainfall and snow

was money in the bank and much of the wheat in the northern part of the state had begun to show signs of much-needed moisture.

Some of the land, however, was still damp to boggy from moisture which fell last Thursday.

Thousands of acres of wheat in this region are being grazed due to the low market price of the cereal crop. Though some acreage across the South Plains was still being grazed, most of the feeder cattle here have been removed from the irrigated land.

"The wheat is showing good growth, some county agents report, however, others said, "cold weather had limited growth."

That the General Telephone Company of the Southwest is hereby authorized to discontinue, as a new service offering, residence four-party service and business two-party service. The offering of and rate for residence four-party and business two-party service will apply to existing services only.

The Council accepted a \$1,000 grant to purchase books, microfilm and visual aids and to use for book repairing. The grant was received from the Texas State Library division.

An assistant for librarian was also discussed and consideration was given for hiring this assistant on part-time basis.

Norman Bays, city attorney, gave a report on procedures to condemn unsanitary motels or rental property in Muleshoe, however, no action was taken.

The Council began work and continues to work on the 1968-69 budget and a budget report is expected to be available in the near future.

Library Supplies Expanded

Muleshoe Area Public Library will be able to take advantage of a new service be-

ing offered by the Texas State Library.

The new services starts March 15 and the local library will begin participation in the Texas State Library Network. The new service is explained this way: "Because no one library can own all the material that its patrons will need, this service will allow each public library to submit requests for material and for information to other public libraries."

Public libraries serving communities of 25,000 or less will be able to telephone a designated, larger public library when the service is needed. If the larger library is unable to supply the material, or the needs of its own patrons, it will telephone the Major Resource Center Library serving the area. Should the Major Resource Center Library not have the material,

or need the material for its own patrons, the request will be referred by teletype to the Texas State Library.

The collection of the State Library will be searched; when necessary the request will then be submitted in turn to each of the other nine Major Resource Center Libraries. If the material is not located in any of these libraries the Reference Division of the Texas State Library will make every attempt to get the material elsewhere.

Cost of this service will be paid for by funds made available under Title 111 of the federal Library Services and
