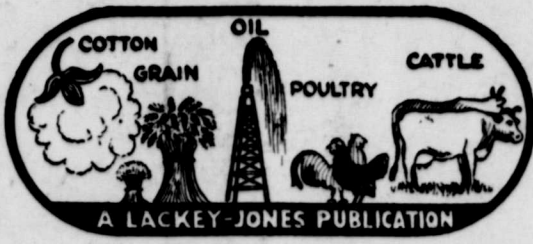

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### Facilities of Haskell Schools Pre for Growing Pupil Load

Over-crowded Haskell public schools continue to tax the district to the extent of the past five years. The population even higher than the 5,000 estimate which was based on electric meter connections. Scholastics have risen accordingly. In 1943 there was a total of 849 scholastics in the district as compared to 1035 in 1947, and 1093 in 1948. The survey shows the increase to be steady throughout this period, and based on the past, the present system will be inadequate to handle the pupil load, even on an emergency basis. Only two temporary class rooms have been added to the system since 1943 despite the increase of 244 on the scholastic rolls. Based

on a State average of 26-30 pupils per room, nine additional rooms would have been necessary to care for this additional load. In addition to the needed class rooms, other facilities needed to keep pace with the growth of the city are proper study halls, library expansion, lunchroom facilities, and laboratories. This needed expansion would take care of only classroom work for studies included at this time, and does not take into account new studies and classes recommended by the State Department.

Another make-shift measure is the housing of our elementary grades in the high school building. This leaves only four regular class rooms available to high school students. This condition cannot exist much longer due to the yearly increase in high school enrollment. At the present, needed laboratory facilities in the high school are being used for a home room.

The lunchroom, with limited facilities, is over-taxed with a load of more than 500 pupils daily. This crowded condition has made it necessary to arrange schedules that necessitates much longer than the customary time allotted for lunch.

State and Federal agencies declare that according to surveys under way at this time, we can expect a continuation of scholastic increases until at least 1956. Haskell's present school plant would be wholly inadequate to care for the increased load.

At the present increase in pupil load, patrons of the district are faced with the high probability that at least part of the pupils will only go to school a half-day, or use other buildings not in the system. Both measures have been found entirely unsatisfactory.

The Haskell school system has an estimated real value of more than \$400,000, with only \$53,000 in outstanding bonded indebtedness. This healthy financial condition places the local schools in a favorable position for a building program.

Practically every school in this area corresponding to Haskell in population have kept pace with the growth of their communities by developing their school systems accordingly. Bond issues upward of \$375,000 have been voted within the past two years in towns

within 50 miles of Haskell for needed school improvements. Realizing the need for permanent housing and expansion in the local system, members of the Board have been in constant study for the past three years to determine methods for this building and expansion program.

The Board has been in conference with architects and bonding company representatives, and have been advised by these companies that the Haskell School District can vote sufficient bonds to take care of these needs without effecting the present tax rate or valuation rendition on property in the district.

### RECIPE OF THE WEEK

**Macaroni and Cheese Loaf**

1/4 cup Fat Milk  
1/2 cup water  
1 cup diced American cheese  
1 1/2 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 cup soft bread crumbs (2 days old)  
2 tablespoons finely cut onion  
3 tablespoons finely cut pimiento (can omit)  
2 tablespoons chopped parsley  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
few grains pepper  
2 slightly beaten eggs  
2 cups cooked macaroni or spaghetti

Turn on oven; set at moderately slow (350° F). Grease a quart loaf pan. Heat slowly to boiling a mixture of milk, water, cheese and butter. When cheese melts, remove from heat. Mix in crumbs, onion, pimiento, parsley salt and pepper. Fold in eggs and macaroni. Put into greased pan. Bake about 1 hour, or until firm. Turn out and slice. Makes 4 servings.

Accidents Worse Than Disease As Child Death Risk

The safest person in the United States has moved.

It used to be that little girl in Connecticut—remember? The National Safety Council's nominee for the mythical safety title is still a little girl, but now she lives in New Jersey.

The Council figures it this way: New Jersey had the lowest accident fatality rate of any state last year. The safest age group in the country was the 5-14 bracket. And for some reason, little girls seem to be safer than little boys.

But the glitter of Little Miss Safety's crown should not blind public awareness that accidents

still outrank by far any of the more generally feared childhood diseases as a cause of death among children 1 to 14 years old, the Council said.

There were 10,731 accidental deaths in that age group in 1947—three times more than were claimed by pneumonia, the next most important cause of death. And accidents caused 42 times as many deaths as polio.

The leading cause of accidental death to children is motor vehicle traffic, the Council said, and for that reason the back-to-school month of September has been designated for special emphasis of child safety as part of the year-round "Operation Safety" campaign.
