

But by that time, history had caught up with it. The trail to Montana had been closed by settlement, and homesteaders moving westward were clamoring for the XIT lands. So John V. Farwell put the mup for sale, thus instigating the last of the great land runs in the country. When all the chips were counted, the Farwell heirs still peld some 70,000 acres, which they still hold, and the Old West was no more.

Using FHA Farm Plan, Oscar T. Corzine Family Clears Debt On Modern Farm and Home Within Span of Seven Years

In 1941 Mr. and Mrs. Oscar T. Corzine of Rt. 1, Rule, made application to the FHA office in Haskell, then known as the FSA, for a loan with which to buy a

At the time Mr. Corzine was 40 years old and had been farming as a tenant for 19 years. He had four children, 2 girls and 2 boys, the oldest boy being 17 years old. At that time the Corzine assets consisted of 1 cow, 12 hogs, 200 hens, a tractor, and a car. His net worth was figured \$2000. It was decided to let Mr. Corzine's application lay over a year to see if he would increase his net worth. This he did to the extent of \$4000 in 1942, and by 1943 when Mr. Corzine found a farm that suited him, his net worth had increased to \$5233. By this time the Corzines had 300 hens, a sow and 8 pigs, 6 cows and 4 calves, a new John Deere tractor and \$730 worth of feed with which to feed the cows and hogs. They also had \$500 in cash plus \$381 they had put into War Bonds. By this time the oldest boy was serving his country as a mem-

ber of the U. S. Navy. The Corzines had selected 160 acre tract of land west Rule on the Brazos river just the edge of Stonewall and Haskell counties. The farm was appraised, and on April 4, 1944 a loan of \$10,300 was made to buy and improve the farm. The land cost the Corzines \$8050, leaving \$2220 to repair the dwelling, smoke house and brooder house and to build a new barn and poultry house. Work on the improvements was begun immediately and the old place began to take on new life. With Mrs. Corzine acting as bookkeeper and accountant, the Corzines began work on a five year plan which was to put the farm into operation the way they wanted it and pay off the loan within 40 years. Under the chang-ing system the Corzines were working out, the farm produced \$4312.74 besides things used by the family the first year, 1944. The family spent the 1944 income in this manner: \$1978.68 went for family living and operating the farm; \$115.10 went to replace and repair capital goods; \$638.96 was put into the bank to increase their \$500, last years operating capital; \$180 was held back to buy additional capital goods: \$1400 was paid on their loan making 3 payments the first year in stead of one. 



Protection Against Whooping Cough Advised for Baby Now is the time to have your

baby protected from whooping cough, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. The Texas State Department of Health recommends that vaccination against this disease be administered at three months of age with a booster dose of vaccine when the baby is two years old. There is many a child whose life could have been saved if he had been immunized in infancy, said Dr. Cox.

"Whooping cough", said Dr. Cox, first masquerades as an ordinary cold with running nose and eyes, followed by a slight cough. These symptoms develop about 1 to 14 days after exposure. Then in about another week the cough develops into a series of continuous attacks, in an effort to expell the

troublesome mucous. An attempt to breathe during the choking spell produces the characteristic whooping sound. In mild cases it may be absent. The whooping stage lasts 4 to 6 weeks and may then take another two or three weeks to decline gradually. "Here are some facts about

whooping cough: 1. The disease starts like a common cold, 1 to 14 days after exposure. In about another week the cough develops and whooping usually begins.

2. It is one of the communicable diseases children often catch at school. After a child has reached the age of five, fatalities occur less frequently. Children may carry his disease home to babies.

3. Most important of all is to that infants are vaccinated against whooping cough, for most deaths occur among children less than one year of age.

4. Call your family physician at once if you suspect your child has whooping cough and follow hi directions in detail."
