This is a regular service for local residents to give them an opportunity to file claims for social security benefits, obtain original or duplicate social security cards, or discuss any questions they might have in connection with the Federal Old-age and Survivors insurance plan.

This Federal insurance, which covers employees in commerce and industry, provides for the payment of monthly retirement and survivors' benefits to qualified workers and their families. Retirement benefits are payable to the worker and certain members of his family when he reaches the age of 65 and is no longer working under Social Security. Survivors' benefits are payable to eligible members of the insured workers' family in case he died at any age. No benefits can be paid unless a claim is filed with the social security office.

### VA Announces Health Waiver on GI Insurance

World War II veterans with service - connected disabilities were reminded by Veterans Administration today of an important deadline in connection with their entitlement to Natioal Service Life Insurance.

Prior to Januaary 1, 1950, such disabilities actually incurred in Service between October 8, 1940, and September 2, 1945, if less than total in degree, are disregarded in determining eligibility under the health requirements for National Service Life Insurance pur-

This means that veterans who might not otherwise qualify for life insurance for health reasons may reinstate lapsed National

Service Life Insurance or buy new or additional insurance up to the \$10,000 maximum if they apply before the end of the year.

A physical examination is required, however, for all insurance applied for under this special provision. Such examinations are made by Veterans Administration without cost to the veteran.

### Cotton Markets Move In Narrow Range Past Week

Cotton prices moved within arrow margin last week in very active trading at southwest spot markets, according to the U. S. Agriculture's Department of Production and Marketing Ad-

ministration. Sales at Dallas, Houston and Galveston totaled 154,534 bales, only 12 per cent less than the previous week's record sales. Grand total for the nation's 10 spot markets, including Texas centers, reached 488,200 bales, slightly more than the previous week and a third larger than the corresponding week last year.

Demand continued fair to very good for Texas and Oklahoma cotton from both domestic and export interests. However, prices offered were somewhat lower and this restricted the volume of

Domestic mill inquiries showed a tendency toward lower qualities from previous inquiries in Snyder Monday to attend the and were mainly for bright low celebration and program honoring middling to middling in a wide staple range. 
