

Vital To Future Progress of Community Haskell voters will decide perhaps one of the most important issues in the recent history of Hisskell when they vote on the proposed bond issue Friday, Dec. 16, that will determine the issu-ance of \$150.000 in bonds for civic improvements.

Order for the bond election was passed at a recent meeting of the City Council following a study cf several months on immediate needs of the city. Growth of the city has made necessary certain expenditures that must be made at once to keep abreast of the city's continued growth, officials city's continued progress, offi-

cials pointed out. Voters will decide three phases of the program in the Dec. 16th election: The issuance of \$85,009 in bonds for street improvement private June 11, 1942, and took that will include paving and badly needed drainage; the issuance of \$40,000 in bonds for improvements and extensions to the water system; and authorizing \$25,000 in bonds for improvements and extensions to the sewer system.

City officials, have declared that the issuance of the proposed bonds would not affect, nor increase present taxes based on present taxable values and an anticipated continued growth of the city. Each series of bonds will bear interest at a rate not to exceed four per cent, and will mature serially over a period of not more than 30 years.

City officials further declared that the rapid post-war growth of the community has placed an unprecedened demand on all facilities of the city government, and that if the community keeps pace, and continues to grow, these improvements and extensions must be made at once

Many people think of social security as something to expect only when they get old, according to Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security of-

One of the most important features about this government inurance plan is the protection it Where there breadwinner dies. are dependent children under 18, old-age and survivors insurance provides for monthly payments to"the children and to the widow who is caring for them. The widow may be entitled to monthly benefits for life when she reaches 65. If there is no child or widow, the worker's parents may qualify for monthly payments at 65 if they were dependent on him for their support. In some cases there is no one immediately qualified for any of the types of monthly payments and in such a cose a lump-sum death payment

may be made. There are two important considerations in the payment of

these benefits; first, the breadwinner must have worked under social security long enough to be insured; and second, a claim for the payments must be filed with the social security office.

Tests Made To

Research workers at state and tederal experiment stations in many parts of the nation are busy trying to develop new varieties of fruits that will out produce and yield more desirable fruit than the varieties now com-

monly grown.. They have come up with several outstanding new affords the family in case the peach varieties and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Stations at Stephenville and Lindale have tested more than 300 varieties.

In the tests made at Stephenville, a new variety called Dixigem looks very good. John Hutchison, associate extension horticulturist of Texas A & M College, says it is a yellow freestone fruit of fine texture and good quality. The skin has a rich red blush with a yellow base. It ripens four to five weeks before the fencing, electrifying the farm workshop, and adding an electric motor to the gasoline run washing. Next in order of rip-Elberta. ening is a new peach known as the Dixired. This peach really does have the skin you love to touch. It is not as large as the Dixigem, but it is most attractive in appearance. The trees tend to club overbear and it is a good idea to thin the fruit early in the spring so that the fruit left can attain full size.

some of the new ones. For the southern part of the state, a new variety known as Southland has done well under the climatic conditions common to that section. This peach is a yellow freestone and needs only 200 hours of cold weather during the dormant period to produce a good crop of fruit. Hutchison suggests that home orchardists in he southern part of the state try few trees of his new creation.



Last year at this time, cotton prices at these markets were \$12.75 to \$14 per bale higher.

Although the cotton picking in south, central and east Texas is about finished, ginning is going full blast in western parts of Texas and Oklahoma. The backlog of seed cotton at the gins and in the field increased daily last week.

Domestic demand for cotton as very slow last week, except for the better grades and staples for prompt delivery. Export inquiries were fairly numerous both for nearby and for shipments running through the early pring. Japanese demand strengthened for the lower grades and a moderate volume of sales were eported.

So far this season, Texas farm-ers have placed 273,328 bales of cotton under USDA's loan pro-gram and redeemed 7. Oklahoma armers have placed 43,905 bales under loan and redeemed 1.

Cottonseed prices paid to farmers strengthened slightly last week in Texas and Oklahoma. Prices averaged \$43.80 per ton in Texas and \$41.70 in Oklahoma.
