The first Association was however disbanded on the cessation of the epidemic. organized under a written constitution with officers, by-laws, &c., which continued to extend relief to the destitute, to the termination of that epidemic, at which time they had on hand a small amount of funds en trusted to them. A resolution was then passed making the President the depository of the residuary fund with directions that it should be loaned on good security, bringing an annual interest. The money was so loaned and the amount was nearly doubled by the breaking out of the present epidemic A resolution passed at the last meeting in 1847, also provided that the books, papers, &c., should be placed in trust with the clerk of the county, and that the Association should again be called into action whenever ceived liberal assistance from abroad for which we have heard a general expression of gratitude among our citizens towards the reperous donors. The Association continnes, through its visiting committees an pointed for the several Wards, to provide for the destitute as far as they are able. We had hoped there would have been some diminution in the demands for relief, before this time, and we believe the number of the sick is considerably less; but the epidemic has made many helpless orphans, and has left many families in a state of destitution requiring relief. We believe the expenditures of the Association continue nearly about the same, being some six or seven hundred dollars per week, as nearly

ntains \$10,000,000 in gold and a few ndreds in ailver coin. The safe containing the coin is kept in the custom house. and is composed of double sheets of iron, strengthened by cross-bars of lattice work of cast-steel rods, between which no instrument can cut or file. The safe is fifteen feet long, eight wide, and about as many feet high. It is divided into two apart-ments, in the inner one of which the moner is deposited; and it has three thick iron ors, each having two locks, the keys to hich are distributed at night among the fferent clerks, the Assistant Treasurer keeping himself the register of the princi-pal key, so that the safe cannot be unlock-ed unless all are present. On the sides of safes are tiers of boxes, capable of holding in all, nine millions six bundred thousand follars. They are now filled with con dollars.
