Demo Runoff Election Saturday

The second Democratic primary election will be held Saturday, June 1 with polls opening at 7 a.m. and closing at 7 p.m.

Four places are provided within Bailey County by Commissioner's Precincts.

Those eligible voters who live in Commissioner's Precinct 1-1A are to vote at the county courthouse. Those living in Commissioner's Precinct 2 are to vote at West Camp Baptist Church; Commissioner's Precinct 3 vote at Three Way school and those who live within Commissioner's Precinct 4 are to cast their ballots at Enoch's Gin.

First on the local level of voting will be of major interest with a runoff between two men for two separate Commissioner's posts.

In Precinct 1-1A Matt Dudley and Sherman Inman are runoff candidates. Incumbent I. M.

(like) Stinson did not run for the office this term, then resigned later with his resignation being effective June 1.

In the first primary, the votes cast were for the five candidates who tossed their hats in the ring. The runoff was created when Dudley polled 461 of the total votes and Inman was second with 295 in the five-way voting. Dudley led by 166 votes in the precinct voting.

For Precinct 3, the initial ballot bore three names, that of incumbent W. H. (Bill) Eubanks who was edged out by another candidate, Wayland Altman. The third man in the race, L. E. (Bud) Warren, received 50 of the 222 votes cast in that precinct while Altman polled 12 more of the total figure over incumbent Eubanks, leaving Altman and Eubanks on the ballot for the second primary.

State election will focus on gubernatorial candidates, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Don Yarborough.

In the May 4 primary, voters in Bailey County favored Preston Smith over Don Yarborough to the tune of 566 to 198.

Also on the ballot are the candidates of the Court of Civil Appeal, District 7 Associate Justice. They are James A. Joy and Jack Hazelwood.

Hazelwood carried Bailey County on the Democratic primary ballot on May 4 with 868 votes compared to 548 cast for Judge James A. Joy.

As the final days come about for the Democratic primary, Lt. Governor Preston Smith is stressing that his experience in helping solve problems and opportunities can best aid progress in the state.

will not tolerate rioting and burning in Texas and one of my major objectives as governor will be to see that such occurrences never take place.

"And should a trouble situation arise, or if rioting breaks out, I will do whatever is necessary to stop it before it gets out of hand."

In the latest statement from Yarborough, he said "As governor, I will fight to strengthen the position of the independent family farmer to stop the intrusion of non-farm interest into agriculture."

The Houston attorney pledges to work with federal, state and local officials to revitalize rural areas to achieve full parity for farmers and ranchers.

Before the May 4 primary Precinct 1-1A candidate Matt Dudley said

the construction business, work on road construction in Denton County and the time I have served as a city councilman are among the things which qualifies me to ask the people for their consideration in the May 4 election. To conduct the business of a county or city, a person must use their best judgment and common sense on matters which face them. In working with the public, I feel I am capable and qualified to do this.

"I am for re-evaluation on a county-wide basis and an economical price. It is my opinion that we have qualified people in Bailey County to re-evaluate the tax structure without hiring out of county evaluators at a high price.

"Lots of people are paying more taxes than they should. I am also in favor of the county participating in providing parks to a certain extent, depending on the financial situation of the county.

"The jail has already been condemned and there is little question that some adjustment will have to be made in order to continue to use the jail. However, I am not in favor of building a new courthouse at the present time.

"It is my opinion that the only real solution to some of the problems of the county is re-districting the precincts in accordance with the Supreme Court ruling on the one-man, one-vote ruling.

Sherman Inman said "It is my desire to work honestly for the county and Precinct 1-1A. I have served on the board of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, Texas Veteran Land Board for Bailey County and on the Soil Conservation Board, to name a few. The experience I have gained through serving on these various boards adds to my qualifications of handling budgets and business affairs on the county and state levels."

Inman said "I will need to study the tax situation more thoroughly before I will know fully what should and can be done concerning re-evaluation in Bailey County, as far as the county participating in financing parks, although I recognize the need for county parks and recreation areas, I do not know at this time if the county can financially afford this now.

"I am definitely for the county having a new jail facility. I do not know what can be done, but something must be done about the Bailey County jail.

"If I understand the one-man, one-vote issue, I am for this being done in our county. This will take more detailed study by the commissioners," he concluded.

Wayland Altman, Precinct 3 candidate, said that he was not at present familiar enough with the issues to comment.

May 27, took the life of a 71-year-old Sudan man. The lone occupant of the car, Lonnie Fredrick Meeks, was pronounced dead at the scene by Earth Justice of the Peace, L. A. Glasscock.

Investigating officer, Highway Patrolman Weldon Parsons, Lamb County, said the accident occurred at the crest of a hill, nine miles north of Sudan inside Lamb County, on FM 303.

Meeks was traveling north, driving a 1966 Dodge.

The second vehicle, a 1963 International truck - tractor semi, was being driven, southbound, by L. J. Vibbard, 65 years of age, who lives at 2002 Simmons, Abilene. Vibbard was not injured.

The truck, owned by the Abilene firm of Bryant Taylor, was loaded with cattle and traveled on down the incline several hundred feet before overturning on the right side. Cattle, most of which were injured, roamed the roadway until motorists and officers at the scene turned them into a pasture near the accident scene.

The car slammed into an embankment near the point of

impact with the victim pinned inside the wreckage.

Officers report the Dodge a total loss and estimated damage to the truck and trailer at about \$8,000.

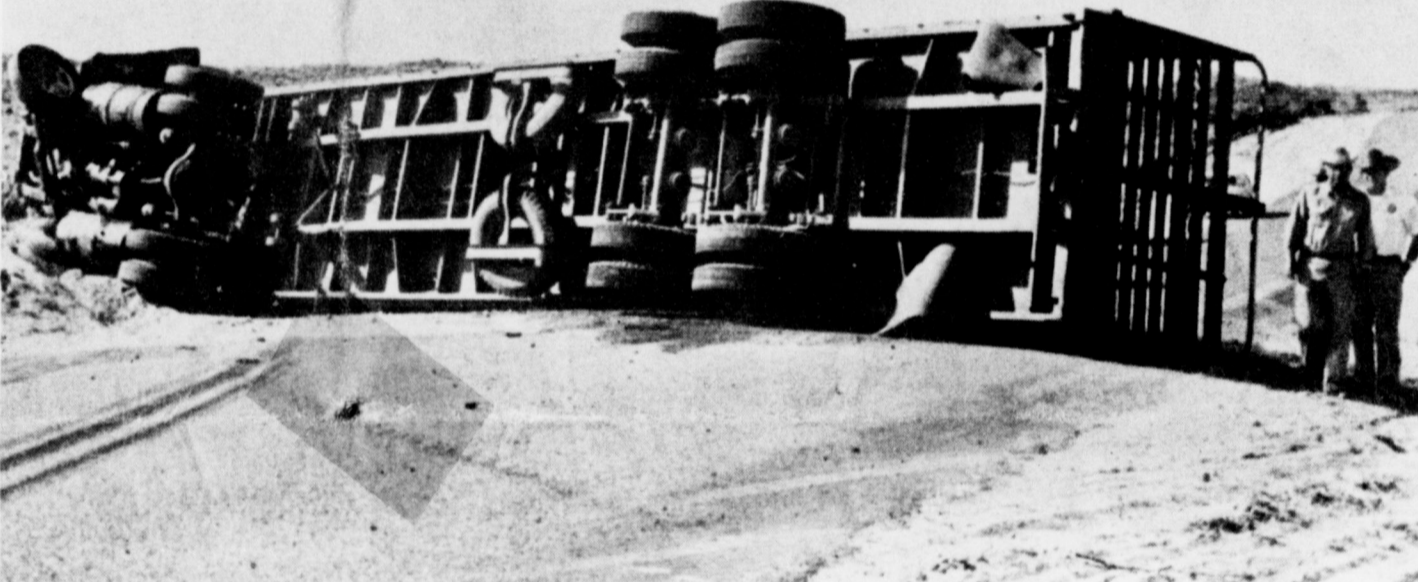

Memorial Day Parade, Program In Memory of Two Bailey County Vietnam Servicemen

Memorial Day, a day set aside in special memory of the war casualties of all wars, will be observed here in reverence and honor, in commemoration to the two men who gave their lives most recently in Vietnam.

Parents of the two men will be presented a plaque in their memory as the Memorial Day Parade reaches the terminal point at the Mule Memorial Site located at the north end

of Main Street on the north side of U. S. 84.

The plaques are to be presented by Mayor W. B. LeVeque to the families of servicemen Antonio Orozco and W. S. "Dub" Hatfield.

Hatfield, a Navy Corpsman, was killed as a hand grenade discharged aboard ship while off the coast near Kyan Naai, Vietnam, in defensive position on October 14, 1966. He was

the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. (Pete) Hatfield, former Muleshoe residents, now of Knox City.

Marine Private Orozco was the second casualty of the Vietnam jungle battle as he died somewhere between Da Nang and Quang Tri while engaged in guerrilla warfare with the Viet Cong, fighting with the Weapons Division of the Third Platoon. The 20-year-old Marine had

been in service less than one year and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Orozco of Muleshoe.

The Memorial Day Parade, planned to be conducted in silent reverence, will form in the 500 block on Main Street at 10 a.m. that day, parade marshal R. A. Bradley said.

The formation will proceed north.

Those scheduled to be in the parade are groups of Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Brownies, members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, mem-

Muleshoe Man Killed In Nightclub Shooting

A 27-year-old Muleshoe man, Ignacio Alvarez Reyna, was killed and three other men, including two of the dead man's brothers, were injured in a shooting which took place early Sunday, May 26, at the Bamboo Club located on U. S. 84, south-east of Lubbock.

Reyna, who listed his home address as Route 2, was pronounced dead at the scene by Justice of the Peace Wayne LeCroy. The Lubbock Sheriff's office said Reyna was shot in the nose.

Treated and released at Methodist Hospital was Reyna's brother, Benito Reyna, 21, of 1623 7th Street, Lubbock. Another brother, Henry Reyna, 35, of the same Lubbock address, was reported to be in satisfactory condition at Methodist Hospital.

Also reported in satisfactory condition was Robert Lopez, 26, of Route 6, Lubbock, who suffered two wounds about two inches below his left breast.

DANCE FLOOR Officers in Lubbock are holding

a Latin American man in connection with the shooting. Reyna's body was found on the dance floor of the nightclub, some 25 feet from the bandstand. Officers said a small caliber weapon was used in the killing, but no weapon had been found.

Crepe is Back With Care Problems

COLLEGE STATION--Crepe is back with its care problems. A term used to describe fabrics made of a plain weave, crepe is very serviceable with reasonable care, says Graham Hard, Extension clothing specialist. Some crepes have a tendency to shrink and others to stretch.

Take care not to glaze the fabric in pressing, reminds the Texas A&M University specialist. Bias cut garments are more difficult to press than garments cut with the grain or straight of the fabric. A well trained dry cleaner is likely to finish crepes better than the inexperienced homemaker.

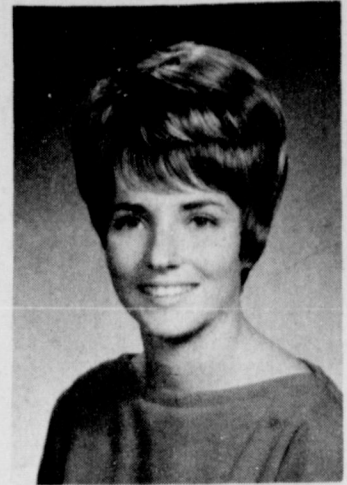

"And should a trouble situation arise, or if rioting should break out, I will do whatever is necessary to stop it before it gets out of hand and becomes another Watts, Newark or Detroit."

Commenting on his opposition to a state income tax: "So long as I am governor of Texas, there will be no in-

come tax in our state. "A man's wages after the federal government is through taking its tax bite are small enough already. I will not see a working man's pay further diminished by state income tax."

To increase job opportunities, he said: "As lieutenant governor, I am working with the Senate Study Committee on Vocational Technical Education to conduct an Industrial Conference this summer.

"It will bring together industrial and educational leaders in one of the most comprehensive and complete attempts to improve the job training situation for our people."

Don Yarborough Plans Independent Farm Strength

Democrat Don Yarborough said as Governor he will fight to strengthen the position of the independent family farmer to stop the intrusion of non-farm interests into agriculture.

The Houston attorney pledged to work with federal, state and local officials to revitalize rural areas and to achieve full parity for farmers and ranchers.

"My programs for water, soil and timber conservation, for brush control and for expanding markets for Texas farm products will help strengthen the farms and small towns of Texas," Yarborough said.

"I will work closely with Sen. Ralph Yarborough and the federal government for full parity for Texas farm products," the gubernatorial candidate said.

Yarborough also promised to work with the state Commissioner of Agriculture, John White, and with local agricultural officials to see that the state provides the best help possible to the farmer.

"Unless the trend toward corporation farming is halted we will have more people forced off the land and more empty store fronts along the main streets of once prosperous Texas towns," Yarborough said.

"I am the only candidate in this race with creative programs for the problems facing Texas," he said.

Included in his plans, Yarborough said, are programs of expanding markets for Texas farm and ranch products and for encouraging research in these fields.

"I believe Texas needs to do more, considerably more, in promoting its farm products," Yarborough said.

"California and Florida spend great sums of money promoting their farm products in national and international markets."

Yarborough said his programs for strengthening the economy of small towns in Texas include a special agency to work solely in quest of new industry for small towns.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN--Your Capitol is bursting with life on the eve of the most significant political and governmental events -- the June 1 runoff election, the June 4 beginning of a special session of the Legislature, and the June 11 conventions of State Democratic and Republican parties.

Although there are 15 runoffs in Legislative races to be decided Saturday, the main bout, of course, is that between Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Houston Attorney Don Yarborough.

Probably no more than a million voters will decide whether to moderate -- conservative Smith or liberal Yarborough will be the Democratic nominee for governor.

Each is reaching for the other's voter potential. Smith boasts of his 18 years' governmental experience; Yarborough, without governmental experience, urges his own "fresh approach" and "constructive programs," including lower auto insurance rates and consumer protection.

Even name identification -- usually considered the well-spring of political success -- won't be the deciding factor between these two. Both men have been in statewide races nearly a decade and are well-known names on the ballot.

Incidentally, the winner may find surprisingly tough opposition in November from Republican nominee Paul Eggers of Wichita Falls.

Regardless of whether Smith, Yarborough -- or Eggers -- is the next governor, the battle-wise Democratic legislative presiding officers, Lt. Gov. nominee Ben Barnes in the Senate and Speaker-to-be Gus Mutscher of Brenham in the House, will be powerful figures to be reckoned with. Barnes admittedly aspires to higher office and Mutscher reportedly is interested in a long tenure in the House.

LEGISLATIVE RACES--There are few district races on the June 1 ballot and no other statewide contests. However, as far as professional politics go, the legislative races are very significant -- especially where incumbents are concerned. This because "lame ducks" often vote differently from those re-elected.

Many eyes will be on the races between Sen. Bruce Reagan and Rep. Ronald Bridges of Corpus Christi, for the State Senate seat for that area; Rep. John E. Blaine versus Ramon Ramos of El Paso; Rep. J. E. Miller of Burkeville versus Don Adams; Rep. Bob Hendricks versus former Rep. Bill Dungan of McKinney.

Other runoffs involve top vote getters in local races where incumbents lost altogether or were not running for reelection.

LIQUOR LEGISLATIONDUE --Gov. John Connally's June 4 special session of the Legislature almost certainly will come to grips with important liquor legislation, probably including a mixed-drinks bill.

A House study committee's report on how to improve present statutes has been promised before the special session begins. Rep. R. H. Cory of Victoria, chairman of the panel,

and House Speaker Ben Barnes have indicated the report will contain major, controversial recommendations.

Results of the investigation made by Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin -- and his recommendations -- also are due by June 4.

Connally has strongly indicated he will urge the lawmakers to come up with a mixed-drinks bill as a part of his tax program. Observers believe that, instead of a straight booze-over-the-bar measure, he will ask for legislation permitting the sale of liquor in small, one-drink-sized bottles on a local option basis. This would mean that, if the bill passes, Texans still will have to mix their own but at least they won't have to bring their own bottles.

STATE CONVENTIONS----Every even-numbered year state political parties hold two conventions. In presidential election years the June convention, customarily, is called "the presidential convention," and the September convention is known as "the governor's convention."

This year since the big issue in the State Democratic convention in Dallas on June 11 will be whether Governor Connally is picked as the "favorite son" both Democratic party conventions will be "governor's conventions." If Connally is chosen as "favorite son," the first vote of the Texas delegation at the national convention in Chicago will go to Connally, the second to whomever he likes of the major candidates -- probably Hubert Humphrey.

Republicans, who will hold their convention in Corpus Christi on June 11, doubtless will pick US Sen. John Tower as their "favorite son." State GOP chairman Peter O'Donnell of Dallas, and other southern GOP chairmen, met in New Orleans with hopefuls Gov. Ronald Reagan and Gov. Nelson Rockefeller. But O'Donnell is not expected to talk about a second - ballot alternative to Senator Tower until he has conferred with Richard Nixon, and considered results of talks with all three.

PORNOGRAPHY WARMAPPED---Attorney General Martin has mapped a drive against "lewd" movies and pornographic literature.

His office has received frequent complaints about circulation of obscenity, so he will ask the Legislature to tighten its control laws.

Specifically, Martin said he will ask for repeal of a portion of the penal code which exempts from control foreign films and movies that are in interstate commerce. Many of the complaints he receives concern pornography originating in Mexico and other foreign countries.

Martin also will seek legislation to include the attorney general among those granted authority to enforce the law by civil injunction. He criticized US Supreme Court decisions as having "torn down virtually all standards in judging pornographic materials."

SALES TAX -- Board members of the Texas Municipal League will meet at El Paso on June 6. They are expected

to discuss Governor Connally's plan to abolish the city sales tax.

Connally's plan would raise the state sales tax from two to three percent and funnel part of this money back to incorporated cities.

There is a difference of opinion among legal experts on the constitutionality of such a plan. Texas' Constitution may forbid the state from giving money to municipalities when there is no return to the state. Governor's advisors apparently feel the courts would be hesitant to deny funds to the state and cities with both in dire need.

Still, the sales tax change is quite likely to be sent to the Legislature when it convenes in special session next Thursday.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES---School districts are not authorized to issue time warrants for the purpose of purchasing unimproved land only. So held Attorney General Martin in a recent opinion. However, he stated that warrants can be issued to purchase school buildings and equipment.

State officials may be reimbursed by the government for expenses incurred in delivery of veterans land bonds to out-of-state banks, said Martin in another opinion.

NEW BANKS PROPOSED---State Banking Board is considering requests for charters from Harlingen, High Island and Missouri City.

Organizers of a proposed Bank of Commerce for a new Harlingen shopping center insisted through their spokesman that downtown banks are not readily accessible due to traffic congestion. But presidents of the Harlingen National Bank and First National Bank of Harlingen disagreed.

Request to charter a Peninsula Bank at High Island was opposed by the Gulf Coast Bank of Winnie.

And the case for a Missouri City State Bank was protested by officers of the First National Bank of Stafford and Sugarland State Bank.

GRANTS APPROVED---Planning grants for two more State Regional Sewage Treatment Facilities were made by the Texas Water Quality Board. Approved was a \$300,000 grant for the Alamo Area Council of Governments (San Antonio River Basin), and one for \$95,650 to the Coastal Bend Regional Planning Commission (Corpus Christi region).

Another \$1,061,850 remains in the Board's plans pending applications for grants by the Houston-Galveston Area Council, Brazos River Authority, Rio Grande Valley Pollution Authority, Northeast Texas Municipal Water District, and Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority and the Upper Guadalupe River Authority.

SHORT SNORTS
A total of 18 candidates have filed for the House of Representatives, District 33, Place 5, in the June 18 special election at Dallas to pick a successor to the late Rep. Joseph Lockridge.

Governor Connally expects to attend the first part of the Southern Governor's Conference in Charleston, S. C., starting June 16. He probably can't stay for the full conference because of the special session.

State Building Commission has set June 11 for bid opening on construction of the first new buildings at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park across Ranch Road 1 from the LBJ Ranch in Gillespie County.

On June 19th, State Supreme Court will hear the South Plains Underground Water Conservation District's appeal of a District Four election contest.

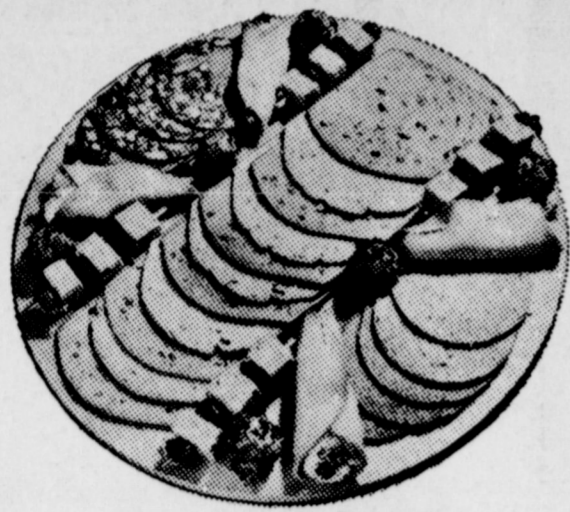
