## Cast Iron Skillet

 vs. WokA while back, I talked about how
cowboys come in all shapes, sizes cowboys come in all shapes, sizes and colors, but one thing I neve saw was a Chinese cowboy. But
did run into a Chinese ranch cook once, and I learnt a few things from him . One of the best-remembered lessons I got had to do with servin' Chinese food (the kind with lots of vegetables and not much meat) to DON'TDO IT!!! That little feller, whose name I
never could get straight, told me he never could get straight, told me he thought he was goin' to get strung up for servin' up a mess of chop
suey to a gang who'd been workin' calves all day and was ready for beef and beans, not chicken and bean sprouts over rice. He said if it hadn't a'been for that big ol'
Chinese knife and a big batch of hot biscuits and ribbon cane syrup het biscuits and riboon cane syr But he did show me how he
cooked in a wok cooked in a wok, which ain't
nothin' but a funny-shaped skillet nothin' but a funny-shaped skillet
in the first place, and how, with in the first place, and how, with
just a little grease, he could cook just a little grease, he could cook
up a whole mess of beef in a rea hurry. Now bein' kind of an adventuresome eater myself, I kinda ook a likin' to some of the
priental delicasies, but I took his orient on tryin' 'em out on a bunch of hungry hands. He told me about all kinds of things they cook in China, like octopus and snakes,
puppies and a few things that puppies and a few things thal
sounded unmentionable as well as unedible. But that feller sure could make that big ol' cleaver-lookin' knife get up and talk. He could whack up a pile of green onions, get set to watch, and he done the same with beef steak, too. But I got to confess that what he done to a whole chicken carcass was almost
sinful, just a 'whackin without no regard for joints and regular servin' pieces. His chickens was nothin but a hacked-up mess, full of bone splinters and done where you couldn't tell white from dark meat. Well, I reckon it takes all kinds. kind of changed around a bit ha
always been a favorite with the
boys wherever I'veserved boys wherever I've served it, since I revised it so it has a Southwest
kind of flavor. 'Course I use my Dutch oven instead of a wok, but it
still comes out just fine still comes out just fine. The other day, in a cookin' gear store, I seen
this big ol' cast iron wok, and sure was tempted to buy it 'til I seen the price tag. Here's some advice: if you've got cast iron cookin' gear, hang on to it, unless you've got one of them, sell it to me real cheap! Anyway, here's my receet for:
TEXAS-STYLE CHINESE PEPPER STEAK
Take a good, thick 3 lb . slab of Take a good, thick 3 lb . slab of
round steak Trim off the fat and tissue, Usin' a big, sharp knife Usin' a big, sharp knife (why the meat in real thin slices across In a the grain In a glass or stainless steel bowl,
mix the meat with. mix the meat with: 2 or 3 cloves of mashed garlic
2 Tablespoons soy sauce Tablespoon Louisiana hot sauce 2 teaspoons finely chopped fresh ginger (if you're lucky enough to
be able to get it) be able to get it) Stir the meat into this stuff real good and let it set 10 minutes Get a skillet (or a wok) real hot
Add 3 Tablester Add 3 Tablespoons cookin' oil (peanut oil works best) and
2 coursely chopped bell peppers
Keep 'em movin' in the hot oil for a couple of minutes peppers, chopped fine Then dump in the meat with its Keep everythices ksillet real good It cooks fast, so don't overdo it with this over hot rice or noodles, with some soy sauce on the side.
