Improvements for both Muleshoe and Bailey County are planned. The forward movement hinges on the outcome of the bond issues which will be up for a vote before the public on the day of September 10.

Some people question the fact that city improvements can be had at this time without raising city taxes and fees for municipal services.

However, a financial analysis has been made, based on information, reports and data available as of January 1.

The financial analysis shows that the City of Muleshoe now has three primary sources of current income: ad valorem taxes, the revenues of the water and sewer system, and the proceeds of a one percent local sales and use tax. Secondary sources of income included the garbage charge, utility franchise taxes, fines, licenses, etc.

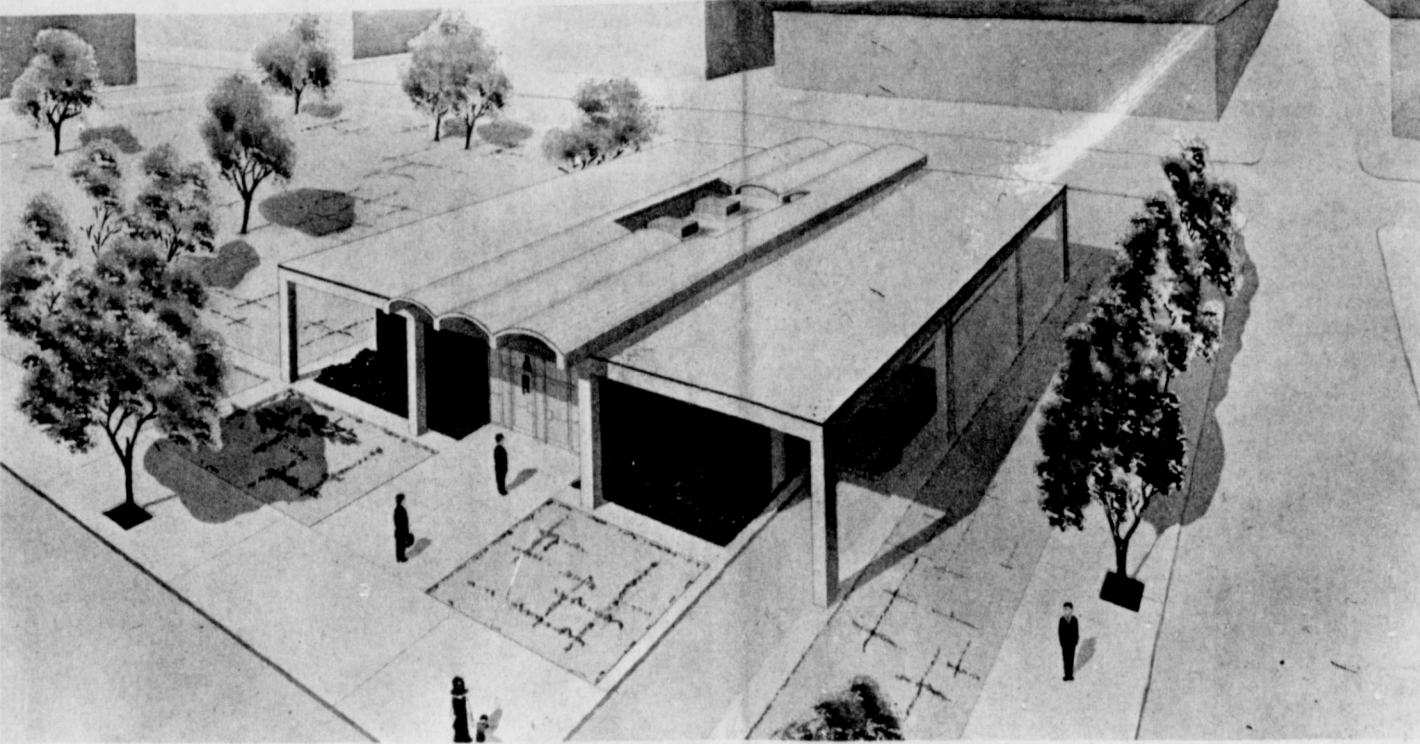
The local sales and use tax was authorized by the city to levy and collect a one-percent sales and use tax at an election held on December 16, 1967. Collection of this tax was commenced April 1.

Actual collections are to be made by the Comptroller of Public Accounts, and the proceeds, less two percent for expenses, remitted to the City quarterly. Estimates of the amount of income the City may expect to derive from this sales tax vary from \$25,000 to \$40,000 annually. Proceeds of the tax must be credited to the General Fund.

Charges for sanitation purposes (garbage) are approximately equal to the cost of operation, the financial report shows. Private utilities (telephone, gas, and electric power) pay the City a franchise or gross receipts tax limited by law to two percent of gross receipts. Other sources of income such as fines, license, permits and other items of this nature are considered a minor contribution to the financial status of the city and are part of the General Fund to operate the city.

The analysis of the financial capabilities of the City of Muleshoe relies basically on ad valorem taxes, the water and

Ticket Deadline Is Saturday

Time is fast running out for those who had reserve seat tickets for the home football games last year to take advantage of their option on these seats for the game's this year. Deadline is Saturday, August 31.

On September 2, all tickets go on sale at Western Drug, the school business offices and the high school athletic offices. Placards with the games throughout the season, including a place on the side to keep track of the season's scores are available at no charge.

Cost of the reserve seats for the five home games is \$10, and \$2 per game after the season starts.

The first game of the season will be played at Dimmitt on Bobcat Field there with game time set at 8 p.m.

Proving to be strong in defense and holding the advance of the scrimmage team, the Mules are rather weak on offense as yet.

Although fumbles, which had plagued the team through last season were almost completely eliminated, the team still has some problems in penetrating the defense of opposing teams.

With the regular quarterback not suited out for the game, the quarterback position was a little weak on passing.

The overall effect of the team has improved and there seemed

to be improved morale among the team members themselves.

With eleven returning lettermen to spearhead the team, it perhaps will be that the 'bugs' will be worked out prior to the first game of the regular season which will be played on September 13.

When the Mules meet the Dimmitt Bobcats in the first game of the season on that night, most of the problems of being held on pass plays and being unable to penetrate the line can be worked out.

Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Dick Stafford told the Journal at the beginning of the practice session that he is 'cautiously optimistic' about the 1968 team. Their attitude toward the game has

undergone a marked change, in comparison with previous years.

In talking with some of the fans at the game following the scrimmage session, each person talked to seemed to feel a difference in the 1968 team. "They looked better" was the general consensus of opinion.

Committees Submit Material For Blue Ribbon Award

During an early August meeting of the Board of Director of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, members voted to enter Muleshoe in the West Texas Chamber of Commerce's Blue Ribbon City Awards Program.

This award is presented to those cities in West Texas, whose population is less than 12,000, which achieves a certain standard of excellence in Community Development.

Chamber of Commerce manager Derrell Oliver said "Three of the six divisions which will be entered in the program have been submitted to West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the other three are being prepared to be submitted."

Those which have been submitted for approval are 'Industrial Development', 'Education' and 'Local Government'. Others to be submitted are 'Tourist Development', 'Beautification' and 'Parks and Recreation.'

Oliver said "Once these standards are met, the city of Muleshoe will further indicate to industries and persons interested in locating in Muleshoe, that the city and its citi-

zens are genuinely interested in community progress and development.

Blue Ribbon City Committee chairman is Robert Alford.

Committees determined that the basic purpose of this program was to achieve these basic goals: community development, community growth, community involvement and making Muleshoe a better place to live and transact business.

What about a new City Hall for Muleshoe? It is part of the proposed capital improvement plan for the city of Muleshoe which the public will vote for or against on Tuesday, September 10.

Several questions seem to be in order. First...why do we need a new facility such as this?

A Comprehensive Plan, compiled for the City of Muleshoe and the City Planning Commission shows: "the present City Hall is entirely inadequate for the present municipal operation."

"Any expansion of the present staff would be impossible due to lack of area and functional arrangements, no parking is provided, drive-up systems are impractical and meeting areas are such that frequent movement to other locations are necessary."

The plans show that a new well-designed, functional City Hall located centrally would unquestionably improve the City's ability to serve its citizens and would be a definite asset to the appearance of the City.

Since Bailey County is planning the construction of a badly needed county jail, the City will not have to construct jail facilities and will be able to locate its police and law enforcement operations in this county building. Duplication of equipment will be avoided and efficiency of operations will be increased through joint use of communications systems.

The \$105,000 ask for to be used in this manner will provide money for land acquisition and construction, with adequate parking provided.

A survey has been underway for some time, conducted by the Muleshoe Publishing Company. Little comment has been received as to improvement of the personnel of the city, such as law enforcement and in many cases, the public have voiced opinions that the officers should draw higher pay.

A check of the survey indicates that the city hall location and parking areas is one of the "sore spots" with the public.

It is difficult to find the Police Station, located in the rear of City Hall, and almost impossible to find at night. One man stated that "if this situation is not changed then flares or neon signs should be erected so that people who do not frequently need to find the Police Station may do so."

Then again, he said "It is rather difficult to explain to those from out of town that to get to Muleshoe's City Police Station that you turn off U.S. highway 84 at the first alley east of the Main Street traffic light, then turn into the first dark alley and there is this small door in the rear of a building with the Police ensignia on it...it sorta sounds like a trap of some sort," he concluded.

Yet this is presently City Police Headquarters and the present City Hall.

The City Hall houses the Police Department, including the dispatcher's room and the office for the Chief of Police.

City Manager Albert Field has a small office in the center of the west side of the building adjoining the small council room.

Also in the building is the office of the City secretary, which is combined with the business transactions of the City tax office and City Judge.

Muleshoe Jaycees met on Monday with Robert Hooten, president of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce, as a guest.

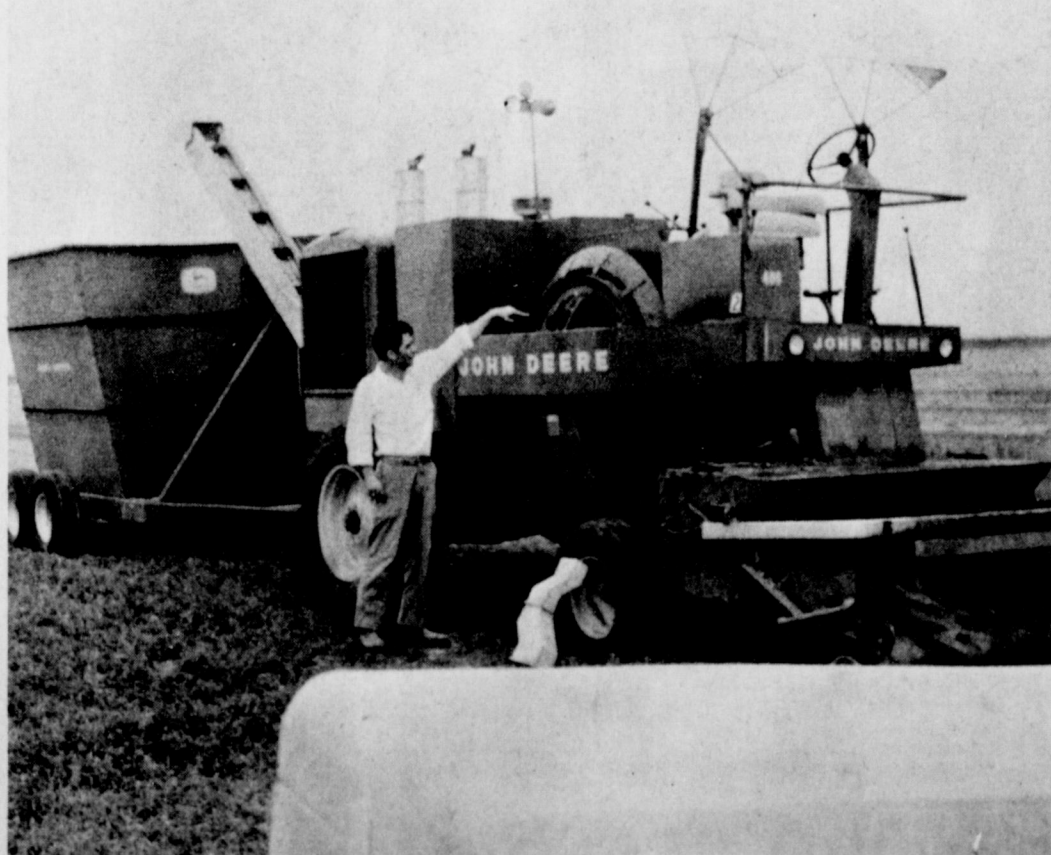
Hooten received the official Muleshoe bumper stickers from the Jaycees to be distributed at the Chamber of Commerce office.

 At the front entrance is the Water Department, where all users of city water pay their monthly bills.
 A check around the building reveals that there is truly no room for expansion and the storage space is dwindling away due to records increasing daily.
 Aside from the storage space and the combined office for three city functions: city secretary, tax and city judge, another of the major complaints is that of the meeting room in which the City Council meets to transact all city business. It is now impossible to have a public hearing as space within the room will only accommodate approximately 15 people.
 A public meeting is scheduled to be held September 5, however due to the space difficulty, it will be held in the Muleshoe high school cafeteria. This is being held to answer questions concerning the City County Bond Issues.
 City manager Albert Field said "It would be nice to have a room large enough that the councilmen can face the people who come to talk with them concerning city business and make requests of the council and not have to be packed into the small space with no one being able to see the person who is speaking. Heating and cooling is also very inadequate.
 City Hall is not only outmoded for the employees, but poses a major problem for those who pay water bills and during tax paying time due to the parking space problem. The voting time for city elections is always something else which shows the inadequacy of the present system.
 With the central law enforcement center upcoming on the County Bond election set the same date, the City of Muleshoe can build this unit, which will meet the needs and enable better service to the public, in addition to boosting the assets of the city.

 sewer system, and the sales tax as sources of income for financing of capital improvements either from current funds or to support bond issues.
 The city may issue two classes of bonds: General Obligation Bonds and Special Obligation (Revenue) Bonds.
 The General Obligation (Tax) Bond are subject to an approving majority at an election. Voters must be resident, qualified, tax-paying electors who have rendered property for taxation. General obligation bonds may be used to finance water, sewer, street storm sewer, parks, municipal buildings and other improvements.
 Although general law and the City Charter specify no limitation of the \$2.50 maximum tax rate as a pledge to the payment of general obligation bonds, the Attorney General of the State of Texas as a matter of practice requires the limitation of annual general obligation bond requirements to levels that can be paid from a \$1.50 tax calculated at 10 percent collections using the City's current tax roll and assessed valuation.
 The purpose of the Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds must be for improvement of the waterworks or sewer systems and must be authorized by the residents, qualified tax-paying electors of the City at an election. New revenue of the water and sewer system after operations and maintenance expense may be pledged to pay these bonds.
 The City of Muleshoe operates its financial affairs through four major funds: the General Fund, the General Obligation Bond Interest and Sinking Fund, the Water and Sewer Revenue Fund, and the Water and Sewer Revenue Bond Interest and Sinking Fund.
 The assessed valuation of the City has shown a steady growth for the past 15 years. In 1962 total real property valuation stood at \$1,114,942 and the assessed valuation at \$874,866.
 In 1967 the increase shows real property at \$8,458,136; personal property at \$1,914,025 and assessed valuation at \$10,372,161.
 The tax rate has remained level during the period under study and current collections of taxes average well over 90 percent. The relationship of ad valorem taxes to the General Fund and the Interest Fund can be assessed by analyzing each other.
 When the analysis was made, the 1967 taxes were in the process of being collected, however the previous year, 1966 collections totaled \$108,387 which represents 96.28 percent of due taxes.
 In summarizing the financial status of the city, the report shows the city's credit is sound, Debt ratios are low and well under control, both on a direct and overlapping basis. Revenue Bonds are well covered by net income of the Water and Sewer system with tax collection averages high.
 The report shows the City of Muleshoe can finance capital improvements with General Obligation Bonds and Waterworks and Sewer System Revenue Bonds with the financing of reasonable amounts of capital improvement.

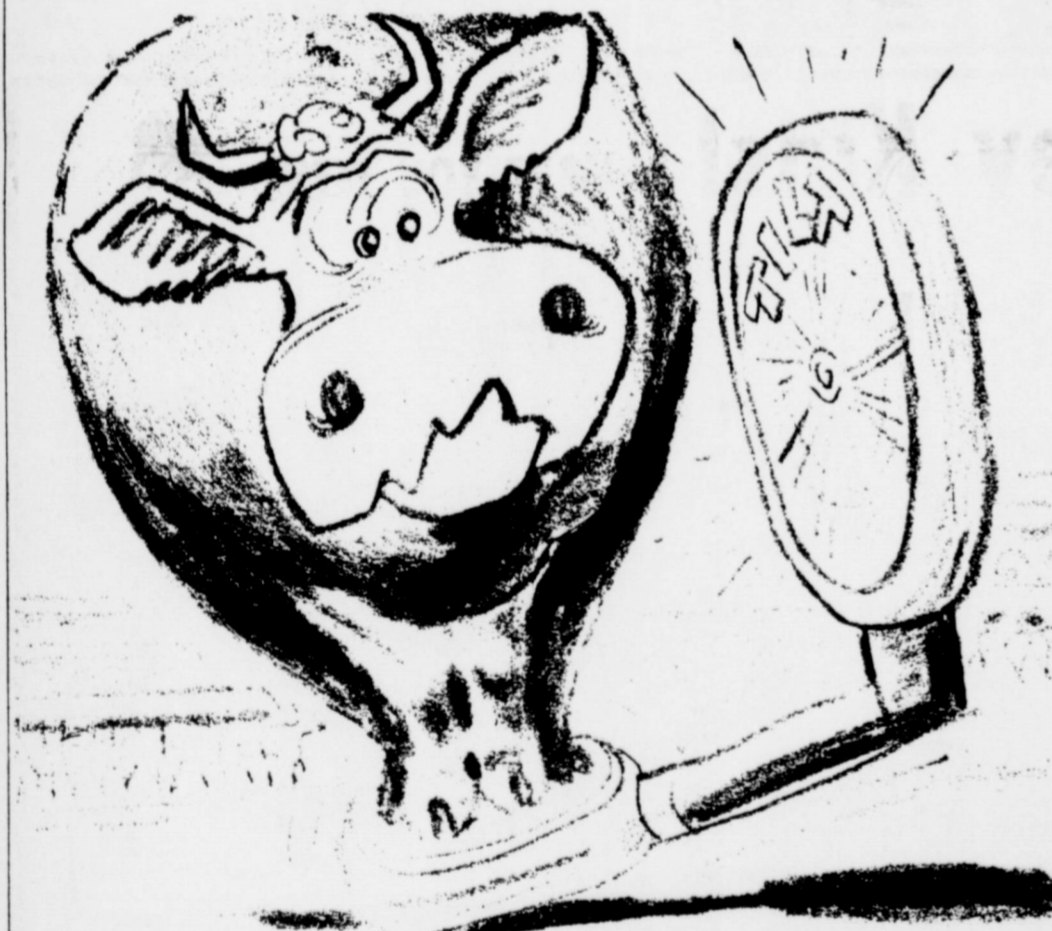

But processors will be able to give free film as part of an introductory offer, reports the Texas A&M University specialist. But if "continuous or frequent offers" are made, then the free-film pitch is misleading because the price becomes "regular."

Though processors still will be able to offer a combination price for film and processing, they'll have to tell you frankly that's what it is.

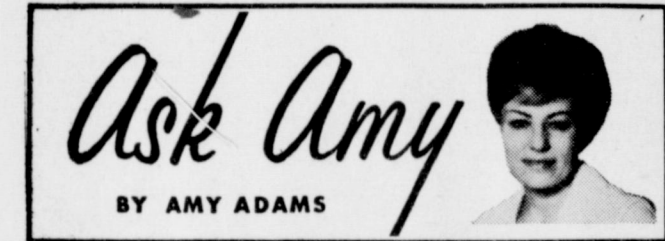

West Texas Dove Population Good

SAN ANGELO -- Game management officers continue to be pleased with the outlook for this year's dove season. The population of doves is good, and there seems to be adequate food to hold the birds in the West Texas area through the September 1 opening day.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department offices and most license deputies have free maps available for the convenience of the hunters in both North and South Zones, and there is a reminder included that the State is currently on Daylight Saving Time. The starting hour each day will be 1 p.m. until reversion to Central Standard Time on October 27 when it will start at 12 noon.

From various sections of West Texas, management officers report that sunflower, already plowed stubble, have cut maize, some have already plowed stubble, but most grain fields will be ready to cut about the time bird season opens and grain should be on the ground to draw in the birds.

The dove has proven to be one of the most difficult birds to hit as indicated by the national average of one bird in the bag for each five shotgun shells expended in its direction. So, if you bring in five birds per box of shells be happy, and consider any over that amount as a bonus.
