A blood drive will take place at First Baptist Church in Cross Plains on Tuesday, July 11. The Meek Blood Center bloodmobile will be at the church from 1:00 p.m. until 6:00 p.m. Each donor will receive a patriotic T-shirt and a total cholesterol test for giving the gift of life.

Meek Blood Center supplies blood to seventeen area hospitals. "Blood shortages occur most often in the summer months," said Frances Baker, donor recruiter. "However, the need for blood is constant. Hospital patients

require medical care every day, regardless of holidays and summer vacations. One out of every ten hospital patients receive a blood transfusion, and most of these patients require at least three pints of blood."

Blood donors must be at least seventeen years of age, weight a minimum of 110 pounds and in good health. Those who have questions regarding donor requirements may call Meek Blood Center at 325-670-2798 or the website www.meekbloodcenter.org.
