Callahan Commissioners Met for Budget Workshop County Tax Rates Discussed

Callahan County Commission- rate. Other revenue for the Geners met for over two hours in a budget workshop Monday, July 24th on the preliminary 2006-2007 fiscal year budget.

The meeting was called to order by Callahan County Judge Roger Corn. Present for the budget workshop were Precinct #1 Commissioner Harold Hicks, Precinct #2 Commissioner Bryan Farmer, Precinct #3 Commissioner Tommy Holland, and Precinct #4 Commissioner Doris Grider. Also present at the workshop were County Treasurer Dianne Alexander and County Clerk Jeanie Bohannon.

Judge Corn said the Monday budget workshop was called to order at 10:08 a.m. and adjourned at 12:35 p.m.

The commissioners' court is contemplating two tax rates—a tax rate for Maintenance and Operation and a second tax rate for the county's Road & Bridge

Last year's M&O tax rate was .30642¢ per \$100 of property value. The commissioners' court is looking at a M&O tax rate this year at .31456¢ per \$100 of property value.

Last year's Road & Bridge Fund tax rate was .10¢ per \$100 of property value. This year's preliminary Road & Bridge tax rate is .10241¢ per \$100 of property value.

The total preliminary tax rate for this year is .41697¢ per \$100 of property value. This compares with last year's total tax rate of .40642¢ per \$100 of property value

This year's effective tax rate is .38609¢ per \$100 of property value. The effective tax rate is the tax rate which will generate the same amount of tax levy as last year. This year's rollback tax rate is .41698¢ per \$100 of property value. The rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate an entity can set without risking a rollback election.

Callahan County's total certified tax value for 2006-2007 is \$380,823,308.00. Based upon the preliminary tax rate of .31456¢, this year's tax rate would generate \$1,190,001.04 in total property taxes, based upon a 96 percent collection eral Fund includes \$125,200 from Restricted Accounts, \$260,300 from General Fund Fees of Offices; \$54,582 in General Fund Other Revenue, \$1,216,320 in General Fund Fines of Office, and \$35,000 in General Fund Interest. The preliminary total General Fund income is \$2,881,403.04.

Commissioners are projecting expenses total \$2,881,629.46, which would create a budget deficit of \$226.41.

Judge Corn said this year's expenses include a three percent pay raise for county employees

Judge Corn said the commissioners' court is also looking into additional office space for a number of Callahan County Sheriff's Department deputies. Judge Corn said the current jail staff is in need of additional office space. The judge said only one empty office is available at the county courthouse building, but the Sheriff's Department needs several offices to relocate some of the jail staff.

Last year's total income from property taxes and other fees amounted to \$2,787,057.58. Total expenses from the 2005-2006 fiscal \$2,786,480.11.

Judge Corn said the commissioners' court held a second budget workshop Monday morning, July 31st at the County Courthouse in Baird. The second budget workshop was called to order at 9:07 a.m. and adjourned at 11:40 a.m.

Judge Corn said the commissioners' court is planning another budget workshop for Tuesday, August 1st.

The commissioners' court is scheduled to meet Monday, August 14th to discuss the tax rate and take a record vote and schedule the two public hearing

The public hearing dates have been tentatively set for Monday, August 21st and Friday, August 25th. The commissioners' court has tentatively scheduled a meeting on Tuesday, September 5th to adopt this year's tax

Big Country Wheat Conference set for August 17th in Abilene

Cooperative Extension's Big Country Wheat Conference has been set for August 17th.


