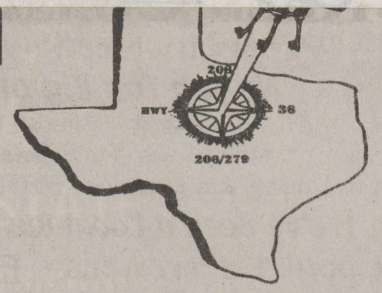

Editor's Note: While searching for something appropriate for the upcoming Veteran's Day, I ran across the requirements of soldiers guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. I was amazed at the requirements of this duty. The dedication/sincerity of the soldiers who serve as guards is outstanding. In these days of seemingly few expectations, this is rare. Remember to honor our Veterans for their past service and our present troops in their dedication for continued freedom.

Tomb of the Unknown Soldier

The guards for the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier are committed to all these rules for the rest of their life. Wonderful young men!!!!

Did you know...

This must take a special kind of person.

1. How many steps does the guard take during his walk across the tomb of the Unknowns and why?

21 steps. It alludes to the twenty-one gun salute, which is the highest honor given any military or foreign dignitary.

2. How long does he hesitate after his about face to begin his return walk and why?

21 seconds for the same reason as answer number 1.

3. Why are his gloves wet?
His gloves are moistened to prevent him losing his grip on the rifle.

4. Does he carry his rifle on the same shoulder all the time, and if not, why not?
He carries the rifle on the shoulder away from the tomb. After his march across the path, he executes an about face, and moves the rifle to the outside shoulder.

5. How often are the guards changed?
Guards are changed every 30 minutes, twenty-four hours a day, 365 days a year.

6. What are the physical traits of the guard limited to?
For person to apply for guard duty at the tomb, he must be between 5'10" and 6'2" tall and his waist size cannot exceed 30".

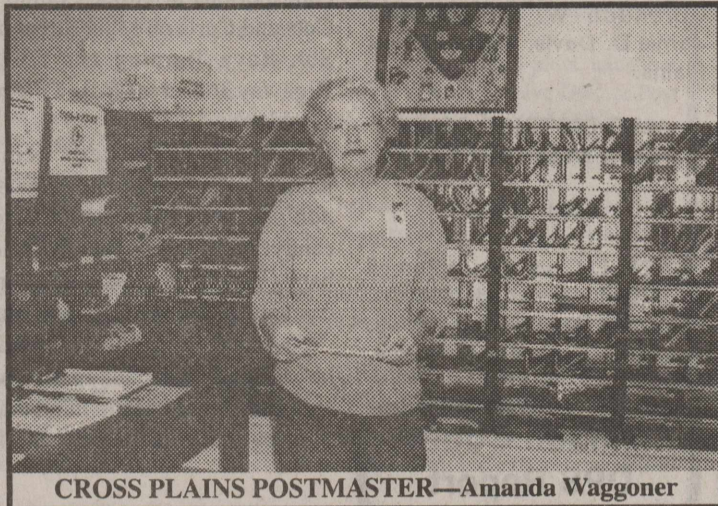
Other requirements of the Guard:

They must commit 2 years of life to guard the tomb, live in a barracks under the tomb, and cannot drink any alcohol on or off duty for the rest of their lives.

They cannot swear in public for the rest of their lives and cannot disgrace the uniform (fighting), or the tomb in any way.

After two years, the guard is given a wreath pin that is worn on their lapel signifying they served as guard of the tomb. There are only 400 presently worn.

Postmaster Amanda Waggoner Promoted

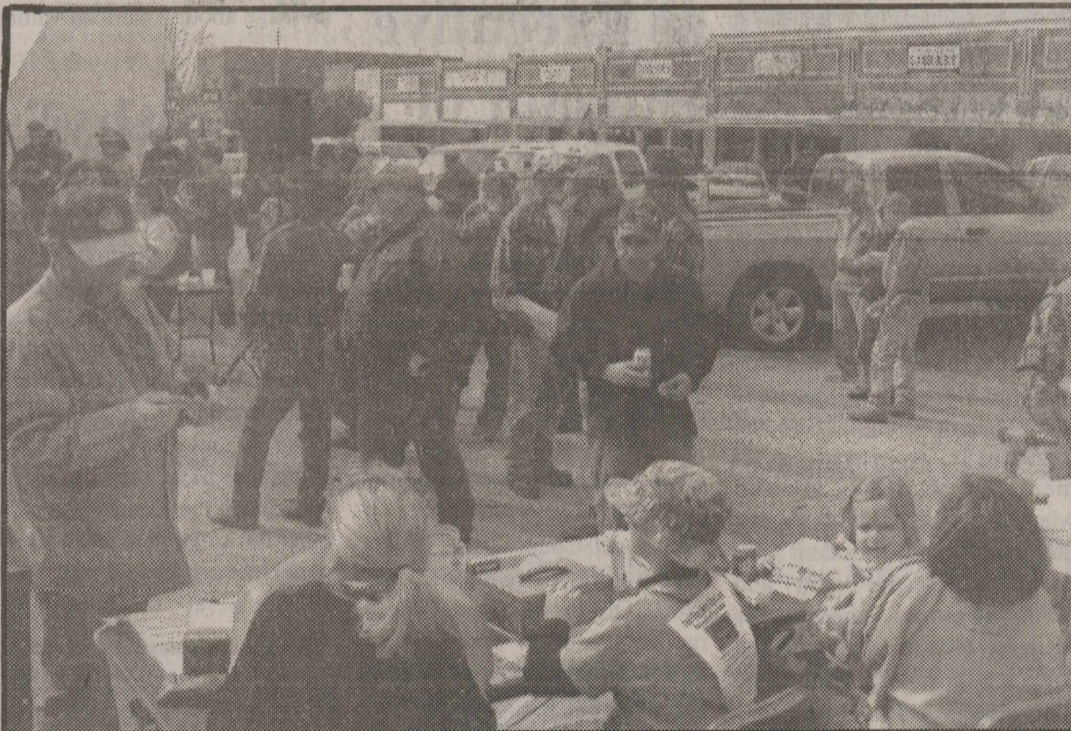

The guard must obey these rules for the rest of their lives or give up the wreath.
 The shoes they wear are specially made with very thick soles to keep the heat and cold from their feet. There are metal heel plates that extend to the top of the shoe in order to make the loud click as they come to a halt.
 There are no wrinkles, folds or lint on the uniform.
 Guards dress for duty in front of a full-length mirror.
 The first six months of duty a guard cannot talk to anyone, nor watch TV.
 All off duty time is spent studying the 175 notable people laid to rest in Arlington National Cemetery. A guard must memorize who they are and where they are interred. Among the notables are: President Taft, Joe E. Lewis (the boxer) and Medal of Honor winner Audie Murphy (the most decorated soldier of WWII) of Hollywood fame.
 Every guard spends five hours a day getting his uniform ready for guard duty.

ETERNAL REST GRANT THEM O LORD, AND LET PERPETUAL LIGHT SHINE UPON THEM.
 The U.S. Senate/House took 2 days off as they couldn't work because of the expected Hurricane Isabelle.

The ABC evening news reported that because of the dangers from Hurricane Isabelle approaching Washington D.C., the military members assigned the duty of guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier were given permission to suspend the assignment.
 They respectfully declined the offer, "No way, Sir!"
 Soaked to the skin, marching in the pelting rain of a tropical storm, they said that guarding the Tomb was not just an assignment, it was the highest honor that can be afforded to a serviceperson.
 The tomb has been patrolled continuously, 24/7 since 1930.

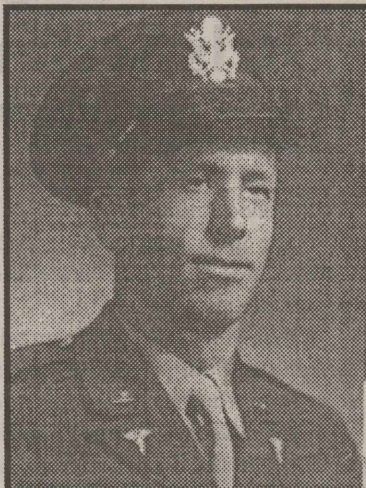

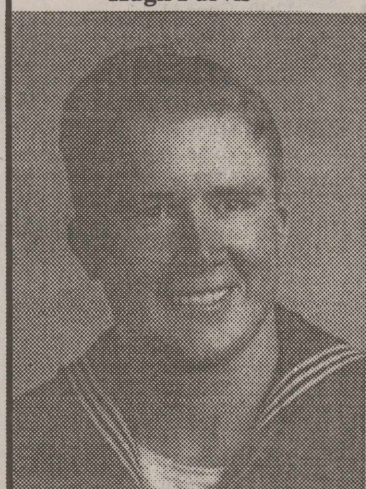

Children's Resource Center Completion getting Closer

The Cross Plains Public Library is getting closer to achieving its goal of completing the new Children's Resource Center. We recently received a grant of \$11,000 from the Rockwell Fund of Houston, and only need to raise another \$10,000 to be able to finish construction. At this time, we have applied to another foundation for that \$10,000. We hope to hear good news soon, but in case we don't receive that grant, we are working with another funding source which should provide the funds for completion.

This is very good news, but it does nothing to support our operating fund. We've been thrilled to receive the grants and donations for the construction work, but they can only be spent for the actual construction; not one penny can go toward salary, utilities, purchasing books, etc. For our day-to-day operating expenses, we must depend on fund-raisers and your donations. Sadly, donations for operating costs have been unusually low the last few months, and we are faced with the possibility of running short of money before the end of

the year.

As the end of the year approaches, and you're finishing your tax planning, we hope you'll remember the Cross Plains Public Library. We are a nonprofit corporation, exempt from tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. We very much appreciate the contributions we receive from the City and County, and the many benefits the City provides us, but less than 20% of our operating budget comes from the City and County. Every year, it's a mad scramble, fueled by hope and trust in our patrons and friends, to come up with the other 80% plus of the operating funds. Please keep us in mind!

We'll be holding our annual Bake Sale on November 21, the day before Thanksgiving, and we hope this will be a big help with our operating expenses. So Bakers, get your pans ready — we'll be calling on you soon! And all of you can count on a visit to the Library to help supply the goodies for your Thanksgiving feast.

Junior High Basketball Girls Scrimmaged Baird

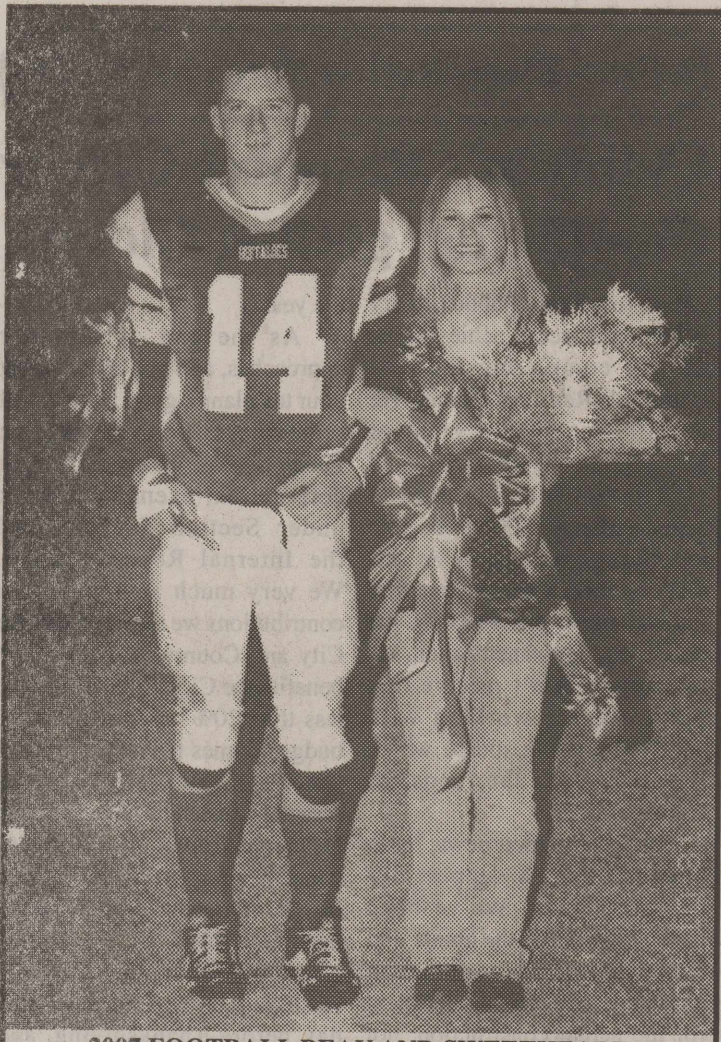
The Cross Plains Jr. High Girls started Basketball season Monday as they hosted Baird in a controlled scrimmage.

Barb's Cues

By Barbara Holmes Worcester

A Brief Account of Travel
By T.J. Burkes
1909

I was born in Tolbert County, Georgia, October 13, 1833.

I received what education I have from an excellent man by the name of John W. Wofford. After I finished my school days I taught school in Leak County, Mississippi. While there, I received news from my father that C. T. Traylor had been killed on the frontier of Texas. Traylor's wife, my sister Bettie, had been left in a deplorable condition. Father wanted me to abandon my school and go after her and the children immediately. I turned my school over to J.P. Harris and left Mississippi for Texas in October 1885.

I had not traveled before that time. I met with many impediments but nothing serious. I saw many sights and curiosities that kept my mind employed so much that I did not get lonesome. I got to Burnet County, Texas, November 1885.

My sister had been moved to Burnet after her husband was killed. He was a Mason and the Masons loaned her one hundred dollars and took care of her until I arrived. I got there about 3:00 o'clock in the evening tired and very hungry. I asked sister Bettie if she could fix some dinner for me. She said that she did not have a mouthful in the house. You can imagine how I felt. It was just before her youngest child was born. All this struck

me with such force I had to give vent to inward emotions by outward demonstrations. When I got so I could talk, I asked where I could get food for us to eat. She pointed to a house where I bought a quarter of beef and a bushel of meal. She said that was the first time since Mr. Traylor's death that she had been without anything to eat. This was one of the most trying events of my life. Sister Bettie said her neighbors had been very kind and good to her. Soon after I ate my dinner her little house was filled with neighbor women. After talking with them for a while, I asked them if they were an example of size of the women of Texas. One jolly lady said "We are babies beside most of the women of Texas." Everyone of those ladies would have weighed over two hundred pounds. I said to them that Texas was a large state, had big grass, big horses and big women, but small timber.

In settling sister Bettie's affairs, I had to travel along roads and trails that were mostly paths through a country infested with savage Indians and desperados and alone. I traveled from Burnet to San Saba and to San Antonio and on to Austin. I heard Governor Beasie's Inaugural address and got a view of all the legislators. I left Austin December 22nd or 23rd to return to Burnet.

I will stop here. Next time we will begin the trip back home to Mississippi.
