> Within those calls were 21 wildland fires, with a total of 619 acres affected. There were 10 vehicle-related calls, 3 Haz-Mat (hazard material) calls, 4 structural fires and 18 miscellaneous calls that they responded to within that 10 month time period.

Another proposed idea was for contractors to haul their trash to a stationary secured dumpsite overseen by the City. City Administrator, Debbie Gosnell is concerned that the latter will constitute a 'transfer station", which would be illegal for the City to operate. She will check with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCQ) about the regulations and get back to the Council.

*Gosnell also requested that a resolution be submitted for a grant to obtain a New Chipper through the West Central Texas Council of Governments and the TCQ. The Council will advertise for bids on the sale of the Tire Cutter and Dodge truck, that was formally used for welding.
