## Big Plans Announced for Improving Treadway Park in Cross Plains

### Joint Venture—Cross Plains City, EDC and Chamber

The Cross Plains City Council discussed the lack of restroom facilities at Treadway Park at their meeting on May 13. This park is located on West Highway 36 adjacent to the Roping Arena. Many local activities take place there, such as the Annual Fourth of July Fireworks Celebration.

The lack of a convenient centralized bathroom has been a hindrance to the many groups that gather there as well as the individuals who stop at the park as they are traveling through the area.

The Cross Plains Economic Development Corporation, Chamber of Commerce and the City of Cross Plains have teamed up to brainstorm ways of joining together for this community project. These groups met on Thursday, May 8th, at the park to discuss the need for this facility to be built as soon as the funds can be gathered. Two representatives from each group will comprise the committee.

The preliminary plans are to have an almost maintenance-free block-constructed building such as those seen along Interstate 20. Three stalls for women and two for men were mentioned with an open-air ventilation system.

It was agreed that City Administrator Debbie Gosnell would contact the new Hook and Anchor Marine Boat Company on Highway 279 in Brownwood Lake to discuss the purchase of either a 4-Wheeler or a Sea-doo to raffle off to raise some of the

needed funds for the project. The Council agreed by General Consent this was a great project and pledged their support.

**Paving the Way**  
The City of Cross Plains and Callahan County are working together to pave a shared street beginning the week of May 19th. Fisher Street is one block north of West Highway 36, behind McCreedy's Rods and Rides, and will benefit from the collaboration.

Mrs. Gosnell mentioned Callahan County has a Distributor they'd like to sell. This machine puts down the oil and gravel needed for street paving. She elaborated that the one the City now has is not in the best of shape. She stated that County Commissioner Cliff Kirkham told her the County would sell theirs for \$12,000.

The Council said they wanted to look at the machine before making a decision. They will have that opportunity when this paving project begins this week.

**Payment Due**  
Councilwoman Peg Terrell suggested that the Council change the wording regarding how and when the City's bills are paid. Last month Mrs. Gosnell approached the Council asking permission to pay the bills as she needed to on a weekly basis instead of waiting until the end of the month. The Council agreed. Mrs. Terrell asked that the wording be changed, so it would not be construed as City Policy to require checks to be written every week. Terrell stated that she

was just thinking about cash management.

Outgoing Councilman James Nichols suggested the wording: "Bills will be paid on their due date." Gosnell explained that it really was of no consequence to her how it was worded, but she would appreciate being able to write the checks as bills were due.

She clarified that she writes the checks on a Friday and Mayor Ray Purvis reviews them and signs them on Monday, then Secretary Teresa Kennedy mails them on Tuesday. The Council voted to have the wording on the minutes from last month changed to "Invoices will be paid at the appropriate time".

The Council thanked James Nichols for his service as Councilman and said they hoped he would still come and visit them. There was a Called Meeting on Monday, May 19th at 5:00 p.m. to Canvas the Votes of the May 10th Election. Seated as the new Councilman is Mr. Bob Kirkham.

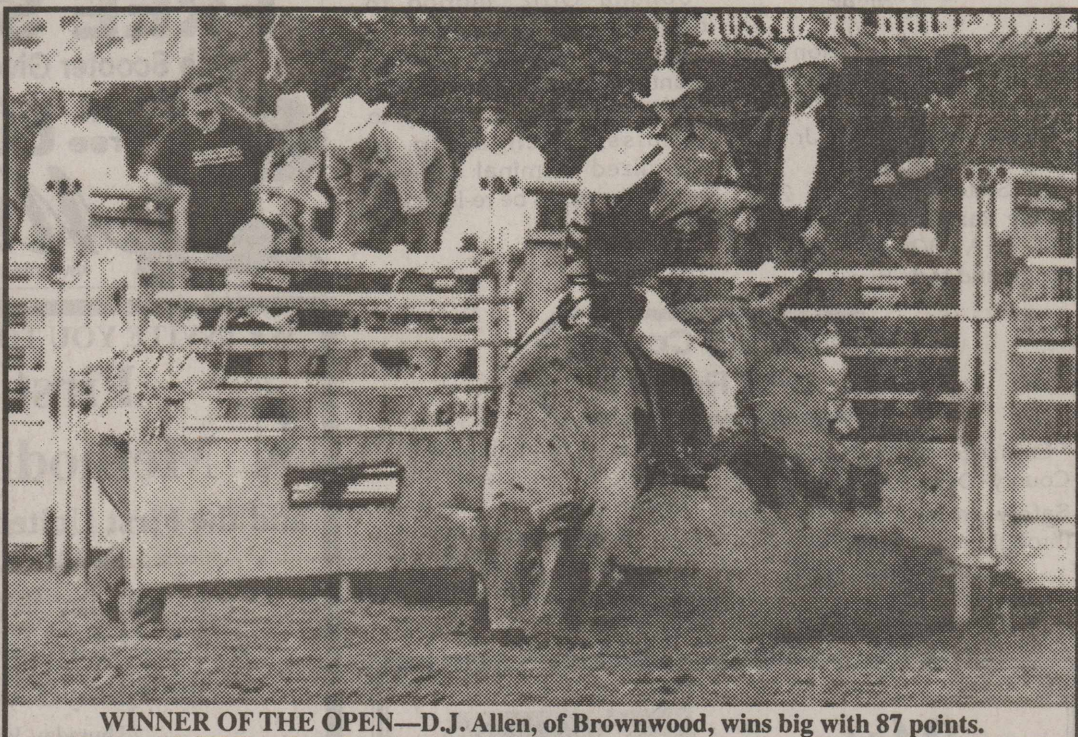
## Cross Plains Garden Club Flower Show May 24th

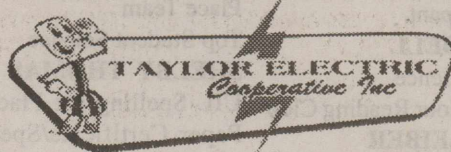

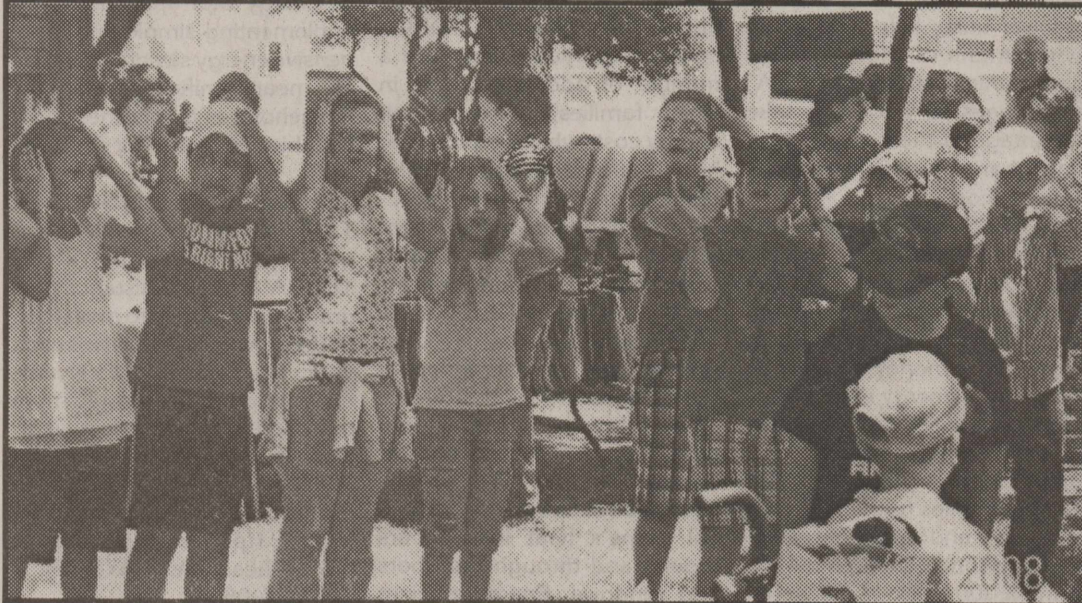
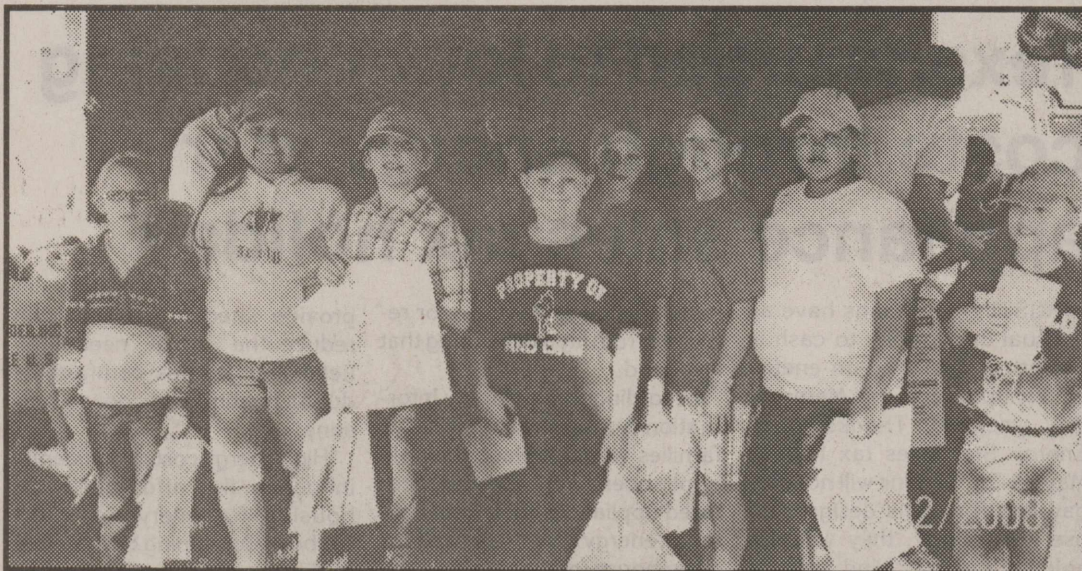

## TxDOT Drivers Cautioned to Keep Vehicle Titles Up to Date

### Protect Your Title Campaign Launched

Soaring gas prices are prompting many energy-conscious motorists to consider replacing what they are currently driving with more fuel-efficient models. With millions of cars and trucks expected to change hands in the upcoming months, the Texas Department of Transportation launched its *Protect Your Title*, Texas public awareness outreach campaign today to remind consumers not to overlook the paperwork side of buying or selling a vehicle.

State law requires buyers and sellers to provide specific information to TxDOT to keep vehicle ownership records correct and up to date. When a vehicle is sold, traded in or given away, the vehicle's title must be reassigned to its new owner.

According to state officials, this is where things often go wrong.

"A vehicle's title lists who officially owns it," said Rebecca Davio, director of TxDOT's Vehicle Titles and Registration Division. "If the seller doesn't let us know when a vehicle is sold or traded, he or she will continue to show up in our

records as the owner, which means the individual can be held responsible if the new owner racks up parking tickets, toll violations or even more serious infractions."

Speaking at TxDOT's press event to announce the agency's new outreach effort, Tim Frost III, senior executive vice president of Frost Bank, warned motorists not to make the same mistake he did when he traded in his car two years ago.

"I assumed the dealership was taking care of the paperwork"

Frost said. "I didn't know it was my responsibility to file a simple one page piece of paper that could have saved me two years of stress and aggravation because of things the new owner did in a vehicle that was still titled in my name."

That one page piece of paper, the Vehicle Transfer Notification, is now as simple as a few computer clicks. You can file the transfer notification for free on-line at [www.txdot.gov](http://www.txdot.gov). When you submit the notification within 30 days of selling your vehicle, you are protecting yourself

from actions the new owner may commit with the vehicle.

As an additional precaution, sellers also should take advantage of a new state law that allows them to transfer the license plates to another vehicle they own. When the plates and windshield registration sticker are removed, it forces the buyer of your car or truck to apply for a new title and register the vehicle in his or her name.

By law, buyers must retitle a vehicle within 20 days of purchase. Recurring penalties apply to procrastinators, beginning with an initial \$25 fine and \$25 for every month that the buyer fails to turn in an application for a new title.

"The best advice I can give to buyers and sellers who aren't sure what to do and what forms to fill out is to go together to their local county tax office to complete the sale," said Davio. "If that isn't possible, everything they need to know and all the necessary forms are on our website."

## Law enforcement agencies remind Texans to 'click it or ticket'

Drivers and passengers who aren't buckled up should expect to meet Texas law enforcement officers on the side of the road from May 19th through June 1st, when hundreds of police agencies across the state participate in the "Click It or Ticket" enforcement mobilization.

"We're reminding all drivers, but especially pickup truck drivers, to buckle up and make sure their passengers are buckled up," said Col. Thomas A. Davis, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety. "Drivers think they are safer in pickups and other high-profile vehicles; but in reality, pickups roll over twice as often as passenger cars in fatal crashes."

Wearing a safety belt will reduce the risk of dying in a

rollover pickup truck crash by up to 80 percent.

Texas law requires every person sitting in the front seat of a vehicle to wear a safety belt. The law also states that all children under 17 must be secured with a safety belt, or in a child safety seat, whether they are sitting in the front or in the back seat. A child less than five years old and less than 36 inches tall must be secured in a child safety seat. Drivers can be stopped and ticketed for a safety belt violation if they, or any of their passengers under the age of 17, are not buckled up or properly restrained. Traffic fines for failing to use a seat belt or secure a child in a safety seat can run from \$25 to \$200, plus court costs.

Safety belt use in Texas continues to rise. In 2006, safety belt use was at 90.4 percent; and in 2007, use was at 91.8 percent. The goal for 2008 is to increase the safety belt usage rate to 92.5 percent.

"Our true goal for safety belt use is 100 percent of all drivers and passengers, 100 percent of the time," Col. Davis said. "Wearing a safety belt is the cheapest form of insurance, so there's no excuse to not buckle up."

The Texas Department of Public Safety has had a zero-tolerance policy regarding seat belts and child safety seats since 1999. Drivers who are pulled over for seat belt and child safety seat violations by troopers always receive tickets for those violations.

## Texans urged to lower housing costs through energy star appliance sales tax holiday

(AUSTIN) — Texans have an unusual opportunity to cash in not once, but twice on energy efficient products this Memorial Day weekend. Thanks to an Energy Star sales tax holiday May 24-26, Texans will not only pay less for items designed to use less energy, they will also enjoy the cost-saving benefits of lower utility bills. The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) encourages all Texans to take advantage of the compounded savings and the benefits of lower housing costs.

"Energy Star appliances translate into lower housing costs," said Michael Gerber, TDHCA Executive Director. "The Energy Star sales tax holiday will help Texans save money by lowering the costs of energy efficient appliances as well as lowering their monthly energy costs."

The Energy Star Sales Tax Holiday applies to the following appliances and household equipment: air conditioners priced less than \$6,000, ceiling fans, dehumidifiers, dishwashers, incandescent and fluorescent light bulbs, programmable thermostats, refrigerators priced less than \$2,000 and clothes washers, but not clothes dryers. Shoppers are expected to save about \$2.6 million in state and local sales taxes.

To qualify for the sales tax exemption, the Energy Star logo must appear on the appliance, the packaging or the Energy Guide label. The tax break also applies to catalog or Internet sales of eligible products during Memorial Day weekend and to

items placed on layaway or removed from layaway during that weekend.

According to the Energy Information Administration, if Texas families would replace their old appliances with Energy Star rated appliances they could cut their energy bills, as well as greenhouse gas emissions, by about 30%. However, TDHCA reminds everyone there are a number of additional ways in which families can curb their energy costs while keeping their homes affordable and reducing demand on energy resources. A few hundred dollars spent properly insulating and weatherizing a home can reduce heating and cooling needs by up to 30 percent. By also caulking, sealing, and weather-stripping seams and cracks that create air leaks in a home, a family can save 10 percent or more on their energy bills.

Also about one-third of a typical home's heat loss occurs around and through the doors and windows. Energy-efficient doors and windows are always a good energy saving investment. An inexpensive alternative is to make sure existing doors seal tightly and have door sweeps at the bottom to prevent air leaks. Caulk any cracks around the windows, make sure they seal tightly and add sheets of clear plastic to the outside to create additional air barriers.

Certain landscape practices can modify the weather's impact on home environments. By strategically placing trees, shrubs, and other landscape structures to block the wind and

provide shade, residents can reduce the energy needed to keep their homes comfortable during heating and cooling seasons.

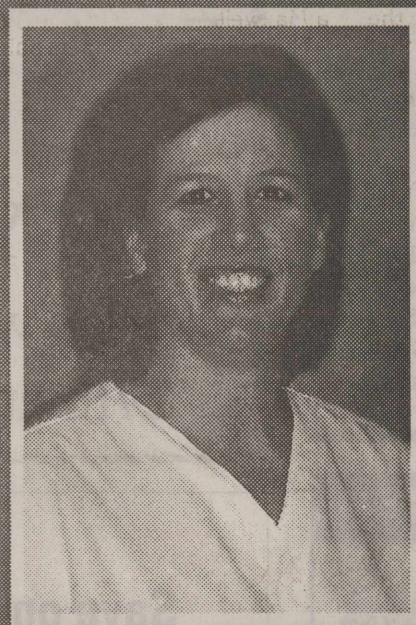
"High energy costs significantly influence the affordability of housing for everyone," said Gerber. "Combining both the use of Energy Star appliances and implementing simple and inexpensive energy saving measures can mean significant savings for households of all incomes and a healthier environment for all of us."

## This Week in Texas History

### Brothers 7 and 11 ride horseback across the Country

President William Howard Taft, all 335 pounds of him, personally welcomed the Abernathy brothers to Washington D.C. on May 27, 1910 and gave the famous travelers a guided tour of the White House.

Though only ten and six years old, Louie and Temple Abernathy were big-time celebrities with thousands of unchaperoned miles under their tiny belts. In less than two years, the youngsters had made the lonely round trip to New Mexico from their home in Oklahoma and traveled to New York City all on horseback.

The brothers came by their precocious spunk naturally. Having made his own way in the adult world at the tender age of seven, Jack Abernathy saw nothing unusual in his son's daring deeds. A veteran cowhand before he could shave, the Bosque County native migrated to the Texas Panhandle where he became an expert broncobuster while barely in his teens.

The elder Abernathy discovered by accident the trick that earned him frontier fame. Attacked by a huge wolf, he thrust his hand into the animal's mouth, grabbed its lower jaw and held on for dear life. To his amazement, the hold instantly subdued the powerful creature.

Practice made perfect, and Abernathy was soon known far and wide as a world-class wolf wrestler. He performed the spectacular stunt on countless occasions and sold the captured wolves to zoos and carnivals.

To placate his worried new wife, Abernathy tried a tamer line of work. He was peddling pianos in Fort Worth when their first child Louie came along in 1899, but by the time Temple was born five years later he was toting a badge in the rowdy region north of the

Red River.

Cattleman Burke Burnett hosted a wolf hunt for President Teddy Roosevelt in 1904. The star attraction was, of course, lawman Abernathy, who manhandled several wolves for the amusement of the guest of honor. The exhibition so impressed the outdoorsman Roosevelt that upon his return to Washington he appointed Abernathy U.S. Marshal for the Oklahoma Territory.

With their mother dead and their father always away on law-and-order business, Louie and Temple learned how to take care of themselves. They were only nine and five, when their dad gave them permission for their first solo ride from their hometown of Guthrie, Oklahoma to Santa Fe, New Mexico and back again.

Afraid to carry money, the boys took along a checkbook in case of emergencies. But few people accepted payment for goods and services rendered, and those that did kept the uncashed checks as souvenirs.

In the spring of 1910, Abernathy made plans to welcome his old pal Teddy Roosevelt back from an African safari when his ship docked at New York. The boys wanted to be on hand too to greet the former president and with their father's blessing set out on a nine-state journey.

Soaking up memories that would last them a lifetime, the popular brothers attracted large crowds and local dignitaries at every stop along the way. They met Wilbur Wright only months before the pioneer aviator's tragic death from typhoid fever, and a hotel proprietor in West Virginia dragged them out of bed in the middle of the night to see Halley's Comet.

When Roosevelt returned in June 1910 from his big-game

hunt, the three Abernathies accompanied him on a ticker-tape parade through mid-town Manhattan. For the trip back to Oklahoma, Jack Abernathy bought two automobiles and the family went home in style. Louie drove a brand-new Brush followed by his father in a Maxwell.

The next year promoters paid the boys to stage a mock race to the nation's capital astride the living symbols of the two political parties—a donkey and an elephant. The same hucksters then offered Louie and Temple the stupendous sum of \$10,000 if they could complete a transcontinental crossing on horseback in 60 days.

With a rousing send-off from thousands of cheering New Yorkers, the lads left Coney Island on Aug. 1, 1911. Required by the conditions of the challenge to sleep under the stars, the hardy little heroes braved the elements around the clock.

For two boys with a combined age of 18, the cross-country trek was a feat of epic proportions. Their 3,500-mile trip ended on Oct. 2, 1911, when they arrived no worse for wear in San Francisco. Sadly their odyssey had taken 62 days, and the pint-sized adventurers missed out on the five-figure prize.

Louie and Temple Abernathy returned to Oklahoma and the carefree life of boys their own age. As adults they settled in Texas, where both led surprisingly normal and uneventful lives. The brothers stayed close to home having seen all the sights before they were even in their teens.

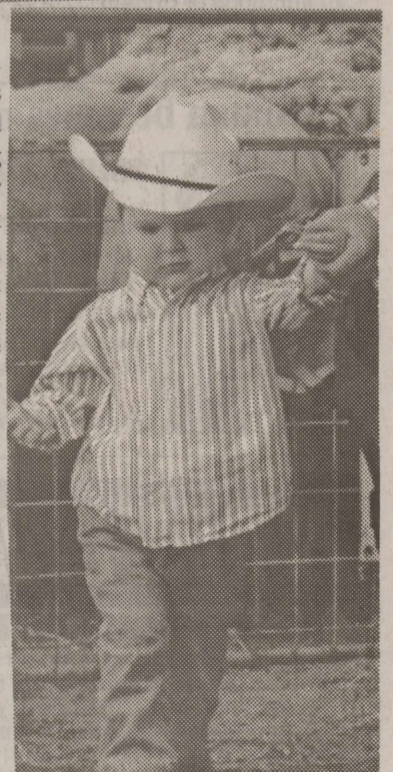
To add to the excitement, an
