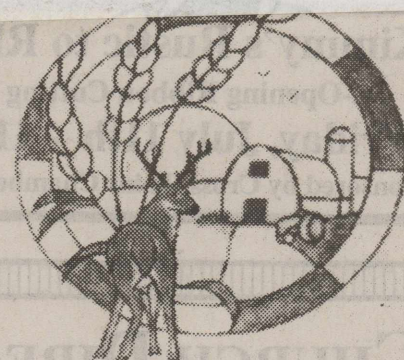

## DOWN HOME

**Editor's Note:** Below is a list of statements made by various individuals about America being a Christian nation. It seems timely to read the following on the eve of celebrating July 4th.

In 1992, when Governor Kirk Fordice stated unreservedly, "America is a Christian nation" the response bordered on hysteria.

But before that—Congress, declared 1983 to be the "Year of the Bible"—stating that the Bible, the Word of God, has made a unique contribution in shaping the US as a distinctive and blessed nation...Biblical teaching inspired concepts of civil government that are contained in our Declaration of Independence and the Constitution of the US (Public Law 97-280, Stat. 1211, approved 10/4/1982).

But before that—Former Chief Justice Earl Warren, 1954, said, the history of our country and the documents/charter exhibit the same objective: "A Christian land governed by Christian principles..."

But before that—Abraham Lincoln, April 30, 1863, appointed a National Fast Day and declared, "It is the duty of nations as well as men to own their dependence upon the overruling power of God, to confess their sins and transgressions in humble sorrow yet with assured hope that sublime truth, announced in the Holy Scriptures and proven by all history: that nations only are blessed whose God is Lord."

But before that—George Washington, October 3, 1789, "It is the duty of all nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, to obey His will, to be grateful for His benefits, and humbly implore His protection and favor."

But before that—Mayflower Compact 1620 was covenant "in the presence of God," "In the name of God, Amen...by the Grace of God...have undertaken for the glory of God and advancement of the Christian faith."

But before that—Calvin wrote to the King of France in 1536, "Now, that king who is ruling over his realm does not serve God's glory exercises not kingly rule but brigandage (oppression). Furthermore, he is deceived who looks for enduring prosperity in his kingdom when it is not ruled by God's scepter, that is, his Holy Word; for the heavenly oracle that proclaims that 'where prophecy fails the people are scattered' (Prov. 29:18) cannot lie."

But before, long before that—Psalm 33:12 says, Blessed is the nation whose God is the LORD. Just some things to think about.

## Trustee Finalizes Leadership Training

(San Antonio)—Cross Plains ISD trustee Scott Childress has earned the designation of Master Trustee upon completion of Leadership TASB, a program sponsored by the Texas Association of School Boards (TASB). During the fifth session, June 12-14, school board members in the 2007-08 Leadership TASB class made presentations of their team's finding following yearlong research. Class participants selected topics that reflected relevant issues facing Texas public schools, such as team building, relating academics to school construction, teacher satisfaction indicators, curricular revisions and accountability systems.

The Leadership TASB class met in conjunction with TASB's Summer Leadership Institute in San Antonio. More than 2,500 new and veteran school leaders received in-depth training on every facet of effective board governance, heard keynote addresses from renowned education experts, and picked up valuable ideas from district

showcases and networking opportunities.

The keynote speaker for Leadership TASB was Salome Thomas-El, noted author of *I Choose to Stay* and *The Immortality of Influences*. After the graduation ceremony on June 13, participants joined the ranks of more than 450 school board members statewide who are Leadership TASB alumni.

The 2008 Leadership TASB class, composed of 35 school board members, represents Texas school districts of all sizes and property wealth. Participants who completed all required elements of the study program earned master trustee status, the highest designation recognized by TASB. Program sponsors include H-E-B and Linebarger Goggan Blair & Sampson, LLP.

TASB is a nonprofit association established in 1949 to serve local Texas school districts. School board members are the largest group of publicly elected officials in the state. The districts they represent serve more than 4.5 million public school students.

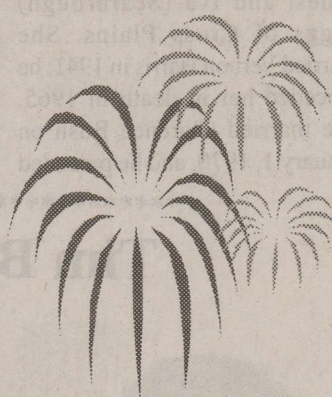

## New Methodist Church Is Now Officially Open

"To God be the glory" truly echoed throughout the new Methodist Church as members showed off their facility to the community on a cloudy Sunday afternoon—June 29, 2008—915 days after the church had been destroyed by fire.

The "oh's" and "ah's" began as soon as the visitors stepped into the spacious foyer and looked around at the tasteful arrangement of chairs, tables, plants and an antique display case containing a few artifacts from the fire, as well as a few items reflecting the history of the Methodist movement in this area.

Passing beneath the **METHODIST** stained glass to enter the Sanctuary, most people just stopped to take it all in—the deep red carpet, the dark wooden furnishings, the cross design in both the wood and fabric of the pews, the pristine white walls, the white and gold hanging lights and the massive rock cross above the choir area. The worship center did indeed look different, but somehow it felt the same. The presence of God is prone to do that.

From there, visitors strolled



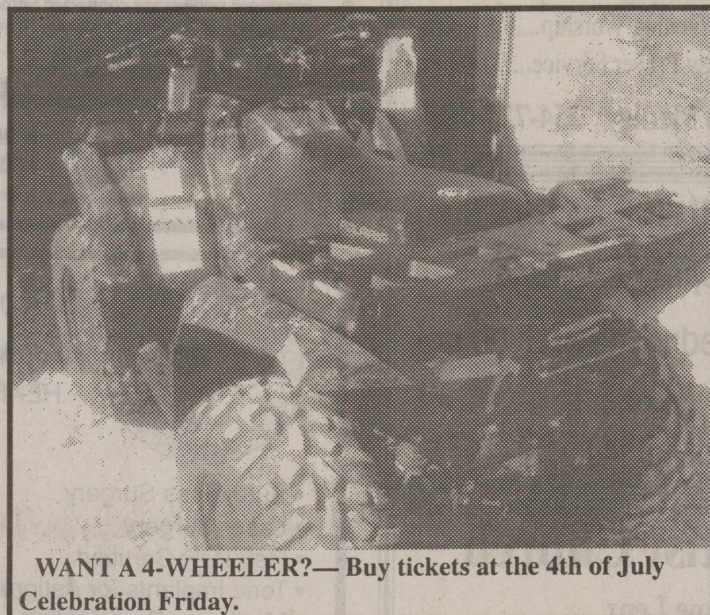

through the various work stations, storage areas, adult classrooms and the library with its beautiful conference table with the three crosses carved in the center. Then came the choir room complete with ample room for hanging robes, music files, a small office and room for weekly practice sessions. A special treat in that area was the opportunity to experiment with the bell chimes

before entering the children and youth areas with all the funky decorations depicting a Christian atmosphere of learning.

Feeling they had been through a maze of hallways and rooms, visitors seemed delighted to find they had ended up in the fellowship hall that was a true beehive of activity. Tables decorated with different themes beckoned folks to sample a variety of refreshments from a watermelon fruit basket, a pineapple covered with picks of cheese and olives to the crowd pleasing chocolate fountain. 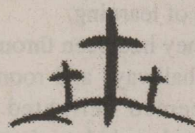

### Patsy "Pat" Bush

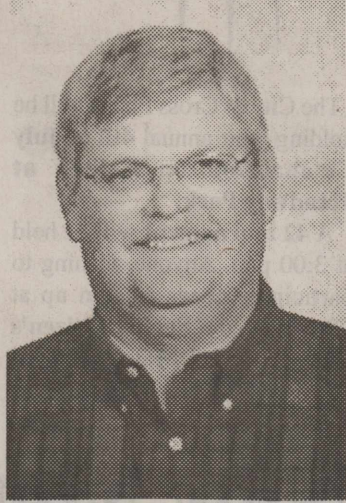

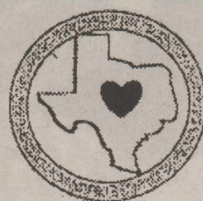

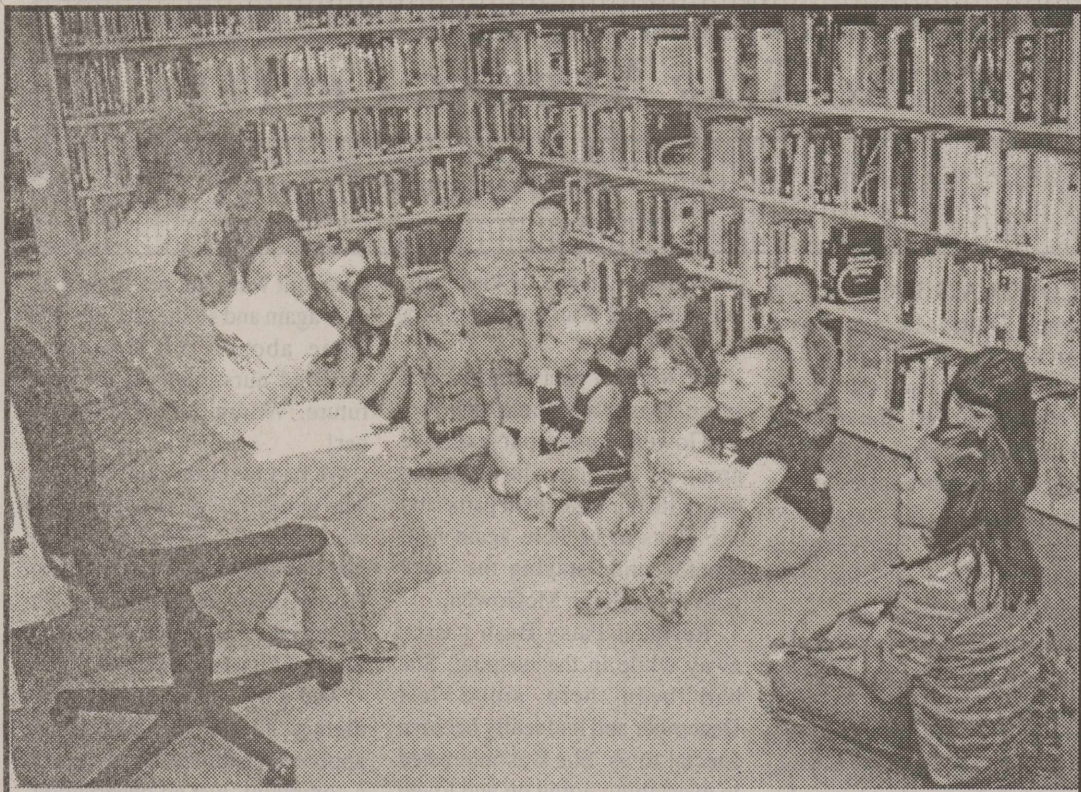

# This Week in Texas History

## Klan unstoppable in 1922 Senate Election

JULY 2 - 8, 2008

"Farmer Jim" Ferguson spent July 4, 1922 polticking at patriotic picnics in East Texas, but even the champion campaigner had his work cut out for him if he hoped to beat not one but two Klan-supported candidates in the race for the U.S. Senate.

Revived in Georgia in 1915, the Ku Klux Klan was exported to Texas five years later. In record time the hooded order became the most powerful force in Lone Star politics. Although membership never exceeded 140,000, a microscopic three percent of the state population, the KKK could count on thousands of Texans to follow their lead come Election Day.

Encouraged by the failing health of five-term incumbent Charles Culberson, five different challengers filed for the 1922 Democratic Senate primary. Leading the list were James E. Ferguson, the impeached former governor who still packed a political punch in the countryside, and two reputed Klansmen: ex-congressman R.L. Henry and railroad commissioner Earle B. Mayfield. While Henry proudly boasted of his KKK affiliation, Mayfield played it close to the vest and stayed shrewdly silent on the subject.

The opening primary featured a strong first-place showing by Mayfield, who drew 30 percent of the vote, with Ferguson making the runoff by edging the incumbent Culberson for second. Gov. Pat Neff condemned both as unfit for the high office, but most prominent Democrats such as Sen. Morris Sheppard chose Mayfield, a prohibitionist, as the lesser of two evils over Farmer Jim, an unabashed "wet."

Unusually nasty name-calling produced a heavy turnout for the next round of balloting on the last Saturday in August 1922. In contrast to brother Klansmen that went

down to defeat in three other contests, Mayfield rode an anti-Ferguson backlash to a surprising 50,000-vote victory.

The nomination of the closet Klansman stunned Democratic Party regulars, especially liberals who had failed to take the Mayfield movement seriously. With seven short weeks until the general election in November, disaffected Democrats gathered in Dallas to select their own candidate.

The day before the meeting, Republicans endorsed sight unseen the impending choice of the so-called "Independent Democrats." Still an ineffective minority a half century after Reconstruction, the GOP was ready to rally around a rebel Democrat so long as he was "a clean honorable man who is opposed to the Ku Klux Klan."

Naturally no Democratic office-holder in his right mind was willing to risk his career by going against the party's official nominee. The dubious honor fell to George E.B. Peddy, a pugnacious prosecutor from Houston who had celebrated his thirtieth birthday just in time to qualify for the uphill crusade.

In spite of his youth, Peddy was a well-known public figure. As an undergraduate at the University of Texas, he was elected to the state legislature in 1916. The next year he guided the successful fight against then-governor Jim Ferguson's veto of the appropriations bill for his alma mater.

Due to his late start, lack of organization and shortage of campaign funds, Peddy's chances were slim at best. When he was barred from the ballot, any hope of a miracle upset went up in smoke.

Backed by the bloc vote of the Klan and loyal Democrats, who could not bring themselves to break with the party of their forefathers,

Mayfield had a lock on the election. He won, of course, but not by the expected landslide as Peddy received an amazing 130,000 write-in votes.

The battle was not yet over, however. In an unorthodox move that some applauded and others scorned as sour grapes, the loser went over the winner's head directly to the United States Senate. Peddy requested a full investigation of the election on the grounds that Mayfield conspired to have his name stricken from the ballot, missed miscellaneous filing deadlines, violated campaign spending limits and was in cahoots with the Ku Klux Klan.

The complicated complaint delayed the seating of Mayfield for two years, and during that time Texas had to get by with a single Senator.

Earle Mayfield had one term in Washington and not a full term at that. When he sought reelection to the Senate in 1928, the Klan was in shambles. Public opinion had turned against the masked menace reducing its once formidable ranks to a hard core of no more than 2,500. Congressman Tom Connally soundly defeated Mayfield for the nomination and remained in the U.S. Senate until his retirement in 1953.

In his political swan song two years later, Mayfield finished an embarrassing seventh in a gubernatorial pack of 11. Having learned his lesson, he quietly withdrew to private life in Tyler, where he died in 1964.

George Peddy fared no better. Waiting 26 years to enter this second and last statewide race, he was the odd man out who forced the 1948 Senate primary into overtime.

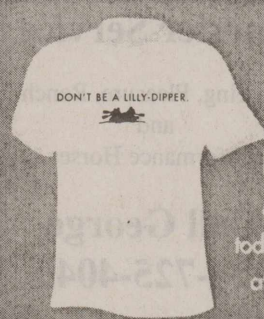

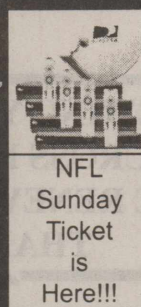
