Cross Plains, Baird enrollment up, Clyde and Eula school totals down

Student enrollment for the start of the 2008 school year at Cross Plains and Baird ISD were higher than the previous year, while enrollment at Clyde CISD and Eula ISD were lower this year compared to the start of school last vear

School began for all Callahan County students on Monday, August 25th.

Cross Plains ISD reported 384 students enrolled for the start of the 2008-2009 school year, which is up 43 students compared to 341 which reported for the start of the 2007-2008 school year. Cross Plains Elementary School reported 234 students, while Cross Plains Junior High and Cross Plains High School reported 150 students for the start of the school this year.

Baird ISD said 306 students enrolled for the start of school this year, which is five students higher than the 301 students who reported at the start of school last year. Baird High School reported 95 students, while Baird Middle School had 69 students and Baird Elementary School listed 142 students enrolled for the start of school this year.

C.P.I.S.D. School Tax Rate **Remains the Same** School Employees Receive Raise

The Cross Plains I.S.D. Board of Trustees reviewed and discussed the 2008-09 proposed budget and tax rate in a public hearing Tuesday, August 26th. The board passed the ordinance to set the 2008-09 tax rate at .973 (91 cents) for Maintenance and Operation (M&O) and .063 for Interest and Sinking (I.&.S). I.&.S. is for paying bonded debt for the construction of the new

gym and classrooms. The topic of employee's pay was discussed. This school year all auxiliary personnel received a dollar an hour raise, all instructional personnel received a 2 percent raise above the 3 percent they were previously receiving for state base pay, and all administrative personnel will receive a 3 percent raise.



Consumer Alert: New identity theft scam targets Texas debit card users

Parents who use the Texas vey Web sites and do not solicit support payments should beware of a new identity theft scam that targets EPPICard users. The be vigilant and avoid this new Texas Attorney General's Office and government agencies in 14 other states use EPPICards, which are known locally as the Texas Debit Card, to disburse child support payments.

According to the Internet Complaint Center, EPPICard users nationwide have reported receiving e-mail, voice and text messages falsely indicating problems with their accounts. Card users are directed to update their accounts or correct a problem by clicking on a Web link included within the message. The link directs the individuals to a fraudulent Web site where their personal information, such as account number and PIN, is compromised. Recipients of these messages also may be directed to call a phone number.

EPPICard users have also reported receiving an e-mail message offering payments to those who complete an online survey. At the end of the survey, users are asked for their EPPICard to receiving child support payaccount information so that ments by cash or check. Parfunds can be credited to the account. By providing the requested information, users put mation or survey requests should their financial information at risk. notify the Internet Complaint

Debit Card to access their child personal information via e-mail or text messages.

Texas Debit Card users should twist on old e-mail scheme. Parents should never open unsolicited e-mails or click on Web links that appear in an unsolicited e-mail. Doing so could activate hidden viruses or other malicious software or direct users to a decoy Web site that allows identity thieves to collect the information they need to empty the users' bank accounts and ruin their credit.

Texas Debit Card users who have questions about their account should call the program's toll-free hotline at (866) 729-6159. Customer service representatives are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Parents also may call the toll-free number to check account balances and obtain transaction histories.

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



This Week in Texas History

Handful of Rebs stop Union invasion of Texas

SEPTEMBER 3 - 9, 2008 As the sun rose over the southeastern corner of Texas on the morning of Sep. 8, 1863, four Yankee warships began the bombardment of the pitiful excuse for a fort at Sabine Pass.

Union strategists resolved in the summer of 1863 to compensate for the embarrassing New Year's Day loss of Galveston with a surprise attack of their own. Rebel spies were spoon-fed false intelligence hinting at an enemy offensive to be launched from Shreveport, Louisiana. While the southerners concentrated their forces far to the north, the northerners secretly assembled a quartet of warships and 23 troop transports for a landing in southeast Texas at Sabine

With the Confederates effectively outflanked, the Union armada would deposit 20,000 soldiers at the narrow strait where the Sabine River empties into the Gulf of Mexico. Beaumont, Houston and the hub of the state's rail system would be under Yankee control by the end of the week.

The Rebel commander realized too late that the invasion expected at Marshall, where he had massed 10,000 troops, was coming instead at Sabine Pass. Certain that resistance by the tiny detachment would be futile, he telegraphed the Davis Guards to blow up Fort Sabine and to run for their lives.

In spite of their valor in the hand-to-hand fighting at Galveston in January, the Irish Texans had earned little respect from their Confederate comrades. A fierce desire to prove themselves dictated a seemingly suicidal decision.

His orders were crystal clear, but Houston saloonkeeper Dick Dowling insisted upon putting the question to the 40

Guards. To a man the Emerald showering the terrified crew Isle Rebs chose to defend rather than to destroy the fort. Nothing more than a huge

mud hut minus a roof, the structure was a fortification in name only. Although the Guards spent the anxious hours leading up to the battle reinforcing the earthen walls with railroad tracks, they had

The 27-vessel task force left Confederacy mouth of the Sabine. The throughout the South. crowded troop carriers contained the initial wave of six artillery batteries, 50 wagons and hundreds of horses and mules.

One squad overshot the Galveston before noticing the navigational error. Consequently the fleet lost two days and the element of the Sabine on the morning of

Presuming the Johnny Rebs had wisely withdrawn after the hour and a half barrage, the Union admiral confidently gave the go-ahead. The "Clifton" and a third warship as the flagship "Granite City" waited offshore.

Dowling calmly held his fire until the lead vessel came into range. Finally the Confederate cannons roared in deadly defiance sending a shell straight through the very heart of the "Sachem." The crippled craft veered crazily off-course and ran aground in the shallow strait giving the Irish gunners an easy target.

As the "Sachem" took salvo after salvo from the smokeshrouded fort, the "Clifton" steamed to the rescue. A fantastic shot through its boiler instantly disabled the "Clifton"

with scalding water. The third warship put itself out of commission in the soft Sabine When the captains of the





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Callahan County's unemployment rate goes over 4.0% in July

The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose one-tenth of one percentage point to 4.0 percent in July 2008, according to jobless figures released Monday, August 18th by the Texas Workforce Commission. The unemployment rate in Callahan County rose from 3.9% in June 2008 to 4.0% in July 2008.

Of the 7,127 civilian labor force in Callahan County, 6,840 were employed during July 2008, and 287 were unemployed, giving the county an unemployment rate of 4.0%. The county's unemployment rate one year ago in July 2007 was 4.0%.

Callahan County's unemployment rate was 3.9% in June 2008. Of the 7,132 civilian labor force in the county during May, 6,854 had jobs while 278 or 3.9% were unemployed.

Previous monthly jobless rates in Callahan County included: 3.3% in May 2008, 2.9% in April, 3.2% in March, 3.4% in February, 3.6% in January 2008, 3.2% in December 2007, 3.3% in November, 3.0% in October, 3.5% in September, and 3.4% in August, according to the unemployment figures.

Big Country area counties, bordering Callahan County, and the counties' unemployment rates for July 2008 include: Brown, 4.8%; Coleman, 4.3%; Eastland, 5.0%; Jones, 5.1%; Runnels, 5.3%; Shackelford, 2.9%; Stephens, 4.0%; and Taylor County, 4.0%.

The Abilene MSA (Metropolitan Statistical Area) unemployment rate, which includes Taylor, Callahan and Jones Counties, stood at 4.1% in July 2008, according to the Texas Commission. Workforce Abilene's Combined Labor Force is 81,700. There were 78,300 employed during July 2008, while 3,400 were unemployed, giving the Abilene MSA an unemployment rate of 4.1%.

The state's unemployment rate for the month of July 2008 was 5.0 percent. Last month's statewide unemployment rate was 4.8 percent. The state's unemployment rate in July of 2007

"CFLs use 75 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs, bum cooler and last up to 10 times longer. One CFL can save up to \$30, on average, in energy costs, making it well worth the price."


