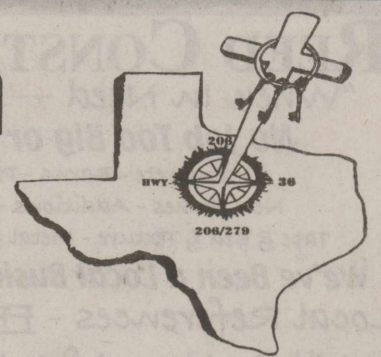

Ella Bullard came by my office Tuesday to tell me that her sweet husband, Curtis "Bill" Bullard, had passed away that morning. It really threw me, because I had a special friendship with him. She remarked, "He would want you to know."

Curtis wrote spirit inspired poetry and several years ago we published many of his poems in the newspaper. During that time, I became acquainted with him and was amazed by the strength of his faith.

When I heard his pastor, Phillip Schaefer, describe him, I knew exactly what he meant. Phillip kept saying, "I loved Brother Bill!" I think that was the way everyone who knew him must have felt.

Phillip told us that "Bill" loved to sing and pray for others. I know he will be sorely missed in his congregation.

Curtis had a way of making you feel at ease and you knew he treasured your friendship. He was soft-spoken but his words were full of wisdom and you needed to pay heed.

I recall my son calling me from Cottonwood several years ago and asking me to come pick him up because he had a flat on his truck. He said, "I'm at this really nice man's house." He told me how to get there and when I arrived it was Curtis and Ella's house.

I got out and went directly to hug Curtis because he always greeted you in that fashion. Then he took me around his place and showed me his workshop.

Some of his neighbors, Wendell and Jean Draper, were telling me about Curtis' "famous" turkey pepper soup. They said he grew the peppers himself and he had a "secret" recipe. Bro. Schaefer noted that if he threw in some extra peppers it would get pretty spicy.

The Drapers agreed the soup was wonderful and asked if I had ever tasted it. I was sorry that I missed out on that. Jean remarked that "Bill" would offer his soup when you were sick and it was tempting to be sick more often just to get the wonderful soup. Cooking was dear to Curtis' heart.

It just occurred to me why I was so drawn to him. He was the stature of my late granddad, Almer Anderson, and something about his gentle manner reminded me of beloved granddad.

Curtis came by to visit with me about two weeks ago and as always, he brightened my day. I got my hug and he patted my hand several times as we talked. He was telling me about visiting with his mother, who is in her late nineties. I was amazed that he still had his mother.

Looking back, I think it was a good-bye visit. God is so good to allow those sweet farewells.

Cross Plains I.S.D. Receives Superior Achievement Rating in Financial Integrity System of Texas

Copies of this year's F.I.R.S.T. (Financial Integrity Rating System of Texas) was reviewed by the school board at the called meeting on September 16th. The purpose of the rating system is to grade the district on the use and budgeting of the monies for the fiscal school year. Cross Plains I.S.D. received a passing status with a rating of Superior Achievement. A school district must score at least 55 points to pass and Cross Plains I.S.D. scored 79.

The ESL report was presented to the school board to report the progress of students with limited English proficiency. Mrs. Sowell was happy to report that the students are progressing very well, and are advancing in their use of the English language.

The board then voted to use Global Training Academy for this year's drug searches for the 08-09 school year. Mr. Loyless, the high school principal, reported that this agency is very accommo-

dating and cooperative in their searches. He also reported, that at one point, out of 130 students who participated in drug testing, all 130 students passed. Congratulations C.P.I.S.D. students for being drug free!

The board named Hoss Sasin as an Extension Agent as Adjunct Faculty Member of C.P.I.S.D. for those students wishing to participate in extracurricular activities dealing with such things as livestock.

The use of the school facilities for the Cancer Benefit and Memory Walk on October 4th was granted, and also the use of facilities for Helping Hearts and Hands on October 18th.

The board voted to advertise for bids on a Suburban, and wait to advertise for bids for a new bus, and repairing the rock wall.

All trustees were present, with the exception of Byran Bennett. The Superintendent, Elementary and High School Principals were also in attendance. Members of the public included Annette Nickerson, Nora Odom, Judy Luter and Kimberlee Lambert.

The Parade starts at 4:00 p.m. at the Dollar General and will move down Main Street to Buffalo Stadium.

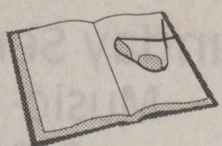
There will be food booths, a 42 tournament, face painting, air castle, live entertainment, and illuminaries and memory balloons.

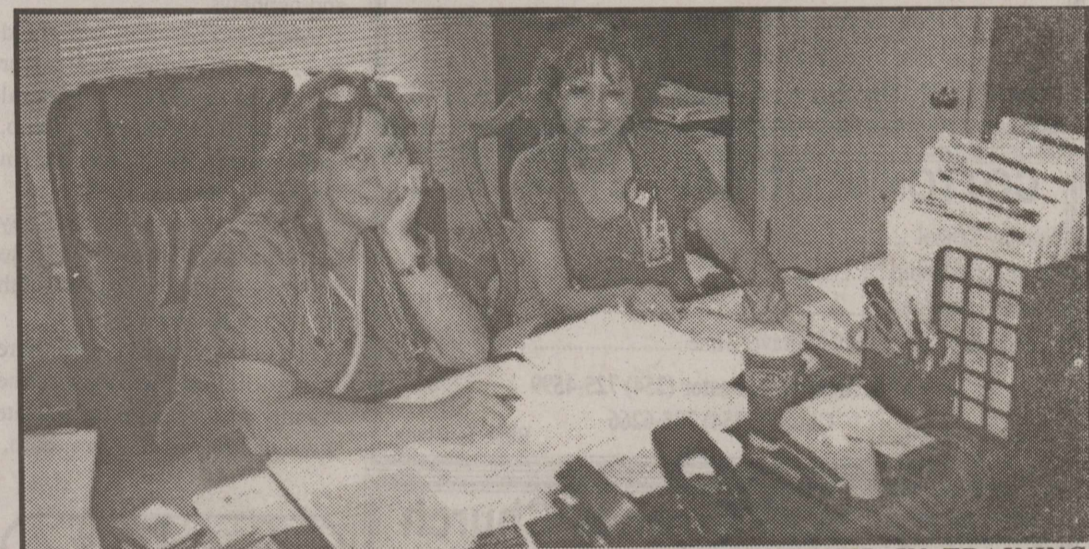

Family Nurse Practitioner Students Choose Cross Plains and Albany to Complete Rural Clinical Training

Cross Plains, Tx — Patricia Short and Glenda Cross, both family nurse practitioner students enrolled at the University of Texas at Arlington School of Nursing recently completed 40 hours of clinical training under the guidance of Dr. Albert Kincheloe, DO and Kristi Via, FNP-BC splitting time at the Shackelford County Community Resource Center in Albany and the Cross Plains Community Health Center. The Shackelford County Community Resource Center provided housing for the students.

Ms. Short is originally from Marion, Iowa. She has completed a BSN degree at the University of Texas at Arlington. Ms. Cross is originally from Durant, Oklahoma and was awarded a MSN by the University of

Phoenix. Meeting the health needs of rural communities continues to be a focus of Area Health Education Center (AHEC) programs in Texas. Providing the opportunity for students in health professions programs to complete clinical training in rural areas not only gives the student a glimpse of what rural medicine entails but also allows the community the opportunity to recruit health professionals for the long-term future.

While each student who completes clinical training in a rural community might choose to practice in another area, word of mouth from a positive experience goes a long way to hosting future students and compiling a list of prospective health providers for a community's long term plans for

meeting the health needs of its population. Ronnie Laurance, Director of Special Projects for the Big Country AHEC stated, "introducing your community to a future practitioner and the opportunity for the student to continue the learning process in a rural setting is a win-win situation for both the community and the student."

Community based education experiences like these are the result of a partnership between communities, community health professionals, health professions training schools and the Big

Cross Plains City Council accepting applications for positions at Senior Citizens Center

The main topic of discussion during the special called meeting of the City Council, Monday September 22nd, was that Margaret Clark informed the City Council the previous Friday that she did not wish to hold the position of cook at the Senior Citizens Center at the start of the new year. This prompted the Board members to vote that they will start accepting applications immediately for the position. The Council also voted to ask for Gene Dillard's resignation as site manager for the center and start accepting applications for this position, too.

The applications will be reviewed and interviews will be set up for those applicants. The Board voted to make their decision of site manager during the regular meeting held on November 11, 2008, and the decision of cook during the December 9, 2008 regular meeting.

The City Council reviewed the proposed contract with the Nutrition Board for the next three months and agreed to pay \$854.17 a month.

All members of the Council were present with the exception of Edwin Weiss. Employee present was Debbie Gosnell. Members of the public included Bob Pipes, Ann Beeler, and Kimberlee Lambert.



Texas Historic Commission begins statewide survey of World War II Military and home front sites

AUSTIN, Texas—The Texas Historical Commission (THC) and Ecological Communications Corporation are working together to develop the state's first comprehensive historic sites survey related to the role Texas played in World War II. These significant sites will be identified and commemorated with the assistance of county historical commissions, veterans groups, museums, archives and other local preservation organizations. The goal of the survey is to classify and record basic information on military and home front sites, develop a complete bibliography of historical resources on these sites, promote Texas in World War II scholarship, preservation, interpretation and heritage tourism, and provide internet access to the survey results.
 Fair climate, bountiful resources and a central location made Texas an ideal setting for wartime facilities during World War II. While thousands fought on foreign battlefields, others played vital roles in achieving allied victory from within Texas' borders. The THC's Texas in World War II initiative is a program to honor and preserve the memories of Texans who served in the armed forces during World War II and the contribution Texans made to the war effort. Historical markers, a special commemorative brochure and oral history training workshops join the statewide military/home front sites survey as integral components of this special program.

In reading the Old Testament Book of Job again recently, it becomes obvious that Elihu, in answering Job, had a better understanding of things than Job's three so-called friends- and in referring to God, Elihu speaks of Him as one "who gives songs in the night" (Job. 35:10b). And it reminded me of the time that God gave Paul and Silas "songs in the night" as they were in jail at Phillippi. Having been arrested, flogged, and imprisoned with their feet in stocks, Paul and Silas were "praying and singing hymns to God" (Acts 16:25). And God provided another gift - an earthquake that set them free!

Someone pointed out a lesson to learn from this: "I can't expect God to set me free until I learn to sing in my chains." Paul and Silas were rejoicing in the Lord, in spite of their circumstances - and that was God's message, through Paul, to the Christians at Phillippi (Phil. 4:4-7). And it's His message for us: "Rejoice in the Lord always!" We can't expect God to set us free until we learn to rejoice, regardless of the circumstances- until we "learn to sing in our chains."

I encourage you to share in times of Bible study and worship with us as we strive to "sign our lives with the excellence of God." 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TCEQ to collect agricultural waste pesticides in Abilene

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) is offering rural Texans the opportunity to dispose of banned or unwanted pesticides, properly rinsed plastic pesticide containers, used motor oil, oil filters, and lead-acid batteries free of charge, rain or shine. This Event will be held Wednesday, Sept. 24 at the Taylor County Extension office parking lot located at Taylor County Expo Center. Collection hours will be from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Agricultural wastes and chemicals we WILL ACCEPT include tractor brake and transmission fluids; and agricultural supplies, such as plant pesticides, insecticides, harvest chemicals, pesticides used on livestock, weed killers, rat poison, pentachloro-

rophenol, "2,4,5-T" or "2,4,5,TP" (Silvex) in quantities less than 5-gallons, and up to two 55-gallon drums of oil filters for recycling per participant. Filters and oil will not be accepted from businesses that change oil for a fee.

Agricultural chemicals we will NOT ACCEPT include fertilizers or nutrient materials that are neither hazardous nor contain pesticide admixtures. Also NOT ACCEPTED: tires, explosives, propane/butane compressed-gas cylinders larger than 20 pounds, or wastes from chemical dealers, school chemistry or biology labs, or applicators regulated by the Texas Structural Pest Control Service.

Empty, plastic pesticide con-

tainers must be clean and triple- or high-pressure rinsed to be accepted. For large quantities of plastic pesticide containers, please contact USAg Recycling at 1-800-654-3145 to arrange pickup at no cost.

Agricultural Waste Pesticide Collections are co-sponsored by the TCEQ's Small Business and Environmental Assistance Division, Texas AgriLife Extension Service, Texas Department of Agriculture, and USAg Recycling.

Texans asked to give wisely after Hurricane Ike

When disaster strikes, many Texans want to make generous donations to charitable organizations. Before reaching for their wallets, Texans should ask questions and check the facts to make sure they are not about to hand their money over to a scam artist posing as a charitable cause.

Door-to-door, telephone and e-mail solicitations should be treated cautiously and should be fully researched. When an individual knocks on the door or calls asking for a charitable donation to help in the relief effort, Texans should keep the following tips in mind:

- * Ask for credentials, including the exact name and telephone number of the organization, particularly if the charity is unfamiliar;

- * Call the charity directly and confirm that the solicitor is actually associated with it;

- * Look out for questionable charities using names that closely resemble those of well-

known charities;

- * Find out how the donation will be used;

- * Be wary of appeals that are long on emotion and short on descriptions about providing help to those in need;

- * Don't succumb to high-pressure tactics and demands for an immediate decision. A legitimate charity welcomes background checks on their operations;

- * Never give a credit card or bank account number to a telephone solicitor;

- * Never give cash and never agree to give money to a courier. Write a check in the name of the charity, not the individual doing the asking, and get a receipt.

Callahan County Nutrition Project Factual Report

September 19, 2008— The following information is from records in the office of the Callahan County Nutrition Project, which can be reviewed by anyone who would have a vested interest in receiving this information.

The following information concerns the so called wasted amount of meals by the Callahan County Nutrition. The first count of meals was the count of meals that had been cooked by the kitchen. This first count consisted of the two programs, known as Title XX and Title XIX. The cooked meals totaled 16,457. The meals delivered on these two programs was 12,562.

This meal count does not include the congregate private pay meals cooked and served and delivered, which make the figure of 6,000 meals wasted totally erroneous.

For eight months, October 1, 2007 to May 30, 2008 the following meals were prepared, and served.

Meals on Wheels	
(prepared meals)	16,487
Meals Served	16,323
Congregate Meals	
(prepared/ordered)	7,570
Congregate Meals	(served)
	7,148
Total Ordered	24,057
Total Served	23,471.

If you will notice the difference in the amount prepared and served is 586 meals. This means the kitchen prepared more meals than were served by the three centers.

These meals are prepared in case there are folks who attend who are not expected, someone on the Meals on Wheels route that called late or just returned from seeing the doctor and needs a meal. This is sometimes hard for them to remember to call the center before 9 a.m.

The records are available for inspection, and that would be on the permission of the Board of Directors of the Callahan County Nutrition.

It is amazing to me when a request for \$354.17 increase in a subsidy amount from the City of Cross Plains can snowball into something like mold. This increased amount was for the fuel and repairs on the food van that goes to Cross Plains five days each week. This does not include other expenses which are food, kitchen utilities, supplies, etc.

Item #1 —It was reported in a letter read by Debbie Gosnell at the City Council meeting and published in the *Cross Plains Review* that Katie Dunn stated that 6,000 meals were wasted. This is false information.

Item #2—Clyde Center is not in anyway involved in this, and would not depend on any other place for their funds. The City of Clyde takes good care of their

seniors and the many ways they do this are too numerous to list.

Item #3 — The Baird and Clyde Centers did not expect any funds from the donations made to the Cross Plains Seniors for the repairs on the building.

It was my understanding that this money would be used for the repairs on the Cross Plains Center.

It has always been my goal to aid senior citizens, anyway I can, and that would be to make sure there are funds to pay for all the expenses in operating the three centers. However, you cannot continue to operate in the same manner you have for years.

I hope that all people involved or concerned about this problem would take a step back and look at what our goal is really about here. "Seniors". To not do anything to disrespect or hurt them.

I would like remind the public once again that all the information printed in this article is a record of the operation of this project. These records are also given to the members of my board each month. We run a tight ship, and as one little lady said, "You have to run it on a shoe string. And, by the way, you're doing a good job and I love you for what you are doing." This was said by a former director, the late Rosa Hass.

The course has been a bee hive of activity. We had Dave Evans, Kobey Morris and David

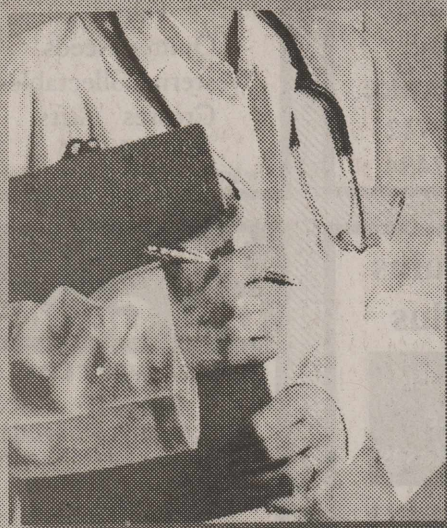

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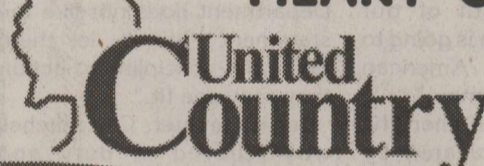

Children should be taught from an early age to be aware of the problems associated with sun exposure and the need to use sun protection. Parents can teach their children early sun protection techniques that will help prevent skin cancer throughout their lives.

Skin cancer rates in the United States are increasing at epidemic levels. One in 55 people will now be diagnosed with melanoma, the deadliest form of skin cancer, during their lifetime. This is particularly important for children because one blistering sunburn in childhood more than doubles a person's chances of developing melanoma later in life.

"We believe the rise in melanoma is due to sun exposure and sunburns in childhood, increased sun exposure over time and the use of tanning beds," said Perry Robins, MD, President of The Skin Cancer Foundation.

The vast majority of skin cancers are preventable with good sun protection habits.

The Foundation recommends the following methods of protection for different age groups.

Babies: An infant's skin possesses little melanin, the pigment that gives color to skin, hair and eyes and provides some

sun protection. Therefore, babies are especially susceptible to the sun's damaging effects. In fact, babies under 6 months of age should be kept out of the sun. Follow these tips for babies older than 6 months:

Take walks early in the morning or late afternoon and use a stroller with a sun-protective cover.

Make sure babies are covered up with clothes. (Long-sleeved un-bleached cotton clothing is cool and comfortable, while also highly protective). Clothing with an Ultraviolet Protection Factor (UPF) listing on the label offers extra security. UPF is similar to the SPF for sunscreen, and The Skin Cancer Foundation recommends UPFs of 30 or higher for superior protection.

Choose a wide-brimmed hat or bonnet that protects the baby's face, neck, and ears. A baby who wears a hat during the first few months will get used to having it on.

Sunglasses are not very practical for a young baby. To protect your baby's eyes, seek the shade between 10 AM and 4 PM.

Apply a broad-spectrum, SPF 15+ sunscreen to areas left uncovered such as baby's hands.

Shield the baby from direct sunlight coming in through the

windows of your car.

Toddlers and School-Age Children: Protecting toddlers from the sun requires a little more thought and effort. It is important to educate not only your child, but caregivers as well.

Make sure your child seeks the shade between 10AM and 4PM. Check the outdoor area where your child plays to make sure there is adequate shade.

A broad-spectrum, SPF 15+ sunscreen should be applied every morning, 30 minutes before leaving the house. Keep sunscreen in the bathroom where children brush their teeth, and eventually it will become routine.

Two tablespoons (one ounce) of sunscreen must be applied every two hours and more often if your child is swimming or sweating.

Children should wear sun-protective clothing whenever possible - including shirts, hats and sunglasses - for protection against ultraviolet radiation. Make sure your child wears a wide-brimmed hat, long-sleeved shirt and pants during prolonged periods in the sun.

Children should enjoy the outdoors safely. Teach them how to protect themselves and tell others about the importance of sun protection.

Air power champion butts heads with the Brass

SEP. 24 - 30, 2008

Col. Billy Mitchell, outspoken advocate of air power, left San Antonio on Sep. 24, 1925 never to return in uniform to the flight training center.

As commander of American aviators in the First World War, Mitchell became the chief champion of airborne tactics. To prove his controversial point that the weapon with wings had rendered the battleship obsolete, he sank three captured German ships in a dramatic 1921 demonstration.

Nevertheless, stubborn superiors dismissed the airplane as a novelty with little combat potential and Mitchell as a troublemaking crackpot. He was punished for his persistence in early 1925 with the loss of his number-two post in the Army Air Service, demotion from brigadier general to colonel and exile to the Lone Star State.

Abe Yeager, military reporter for the "San Antonio Light," was already well-acquainted with both sides of the heated debate. Unhappy pilots at Kelly Field and Brooks Field regularly cried on the newspaperman's shoulder, and ground officers at Fort Sam Houston aggressively argued their case.

The young fliers complained that the seniority-based promotion system kept them at the bottom of the Army's pecking order. With increases in rank going to older foot soldiers, the result was reinforcement of the deeply ingrained prejudice against the fledgling air force.

The depth of this bias was revealed by an artillery colonel in a frank interview with Yeager. He called the cloud-hoppers "nothing more than air chauffeurs" and added with obvious contempt, "They know nothing of military tactics and are incapable of exercising command. Their

chief ambition is to fly around the country and have a good time."

Mitchell's critics figured his demotion and transfer would turn the fiery maverick into a docile team player, but the move had the opposite effect. During his short stay in San Antonio, he wrote a series of articles for major magazines and finished a book-length presentation of his views.

On Sep. 1, 1925, the day Winged Defense was published, Col. Mitchell summoned reporter Yeager to his office. Speaking for the record and with typical intensity, he said, "The truth about the United States Air Service is to be suppressed no longer. The truth of our deplorable situation is going to be put before the American people come what may."

Yeager asked whether the manuscript was cleared by military censors. Mitchell readily admitted he had not bothered to obtain their blessing.

"If the War Department wants to start something, so much the better," stressed the combative colonel. "Then we can get the case before Congress, and we will have a chance to remedy this unfortunate situation."

A Navy flying boat disappeared the very next day over the Pacific, and less than 24 hours later the dirigible "Shenandoah" went down in a thunderstorm. Mitchell lost several close friends in the twin tragedies, which seemed to set him on a collision course with the bigwigs at the War Department.

When Mitchell asked to see him early Saturday morning, Sep. 5th, Yeager knew something was up. Handing the puzzled journalist the final draft of a lengthy article, he solemnly said, "I expect to be under arrest by Monday, but I believe it would be the best

thing. It would bring the issue of national defense to a head."

The bombshell broadside did exactly that. Afternoon editions across the country carried the explosive story, which blew the lid off the air-power debate.

"These accidents are the direct result of the incompetency, criminal negligence and almost treasonable administration of the national defense by the Navy and War Departments," Mitchell charged in black and white.

The surprising silence of his superiors only made him madder. On the following Wednesday, he issued a defiant challenge. "If the War Department does not like the statement I made, let them take any disciplinary action they may see fit."

Ten days later, Col. Mitchell was relieved of duty and ordered to Washington to appear before a special commission created by President Coolidge. His tough, uncompromising testimony sealed his fate.

The court-martial of Billy Mitchell concluded on Dec. 17, 1925. He was convicted of numerous breaches of military discipline and suspended from "rank, command and duty" for five years. Rather than the sentence, he resigned to continue his one-man crusade in civilian clothes until his death in 1936.

In 1957 Abe Yeager reflected on the biggest story he ever covered. I have often wondered whether the court finding that brought an end to his career did not in some measure condemn the world to the costly fighting of the war that followed.

"Would Hitler have dared to attack defenseless nations had this country developed a powerful air force headed by such a brilliant commander as Billy Mitchell?"

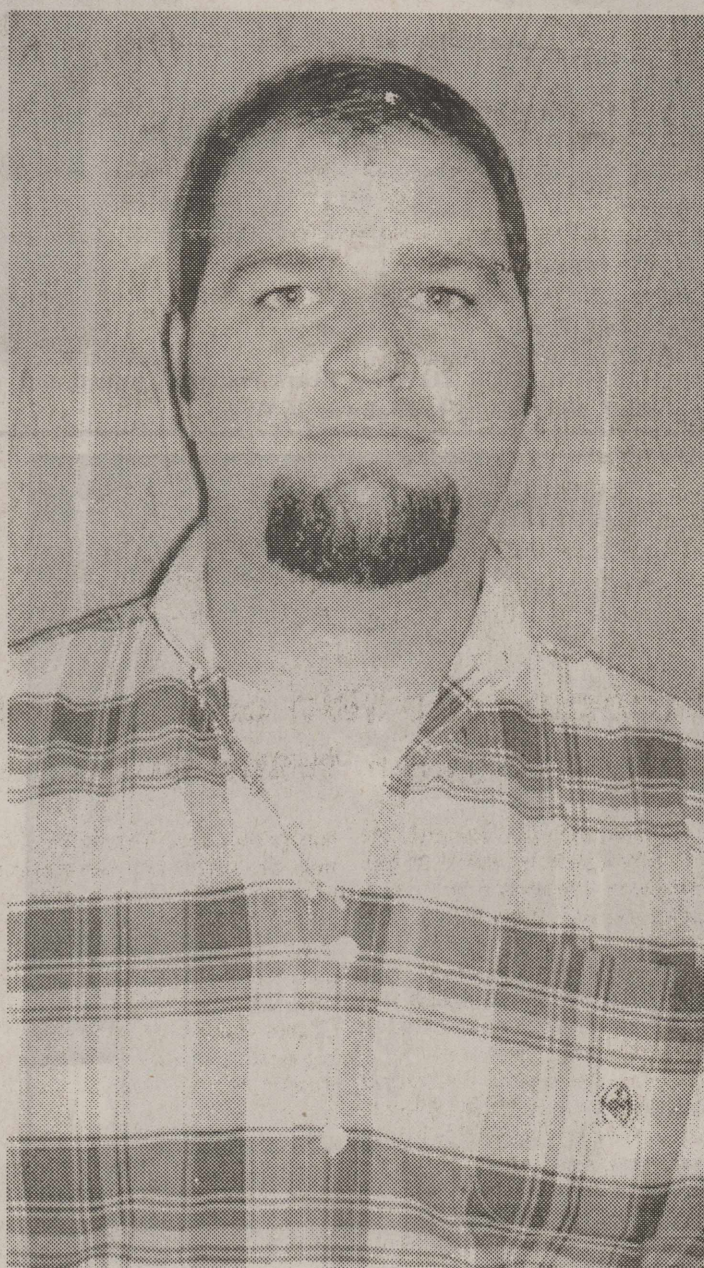

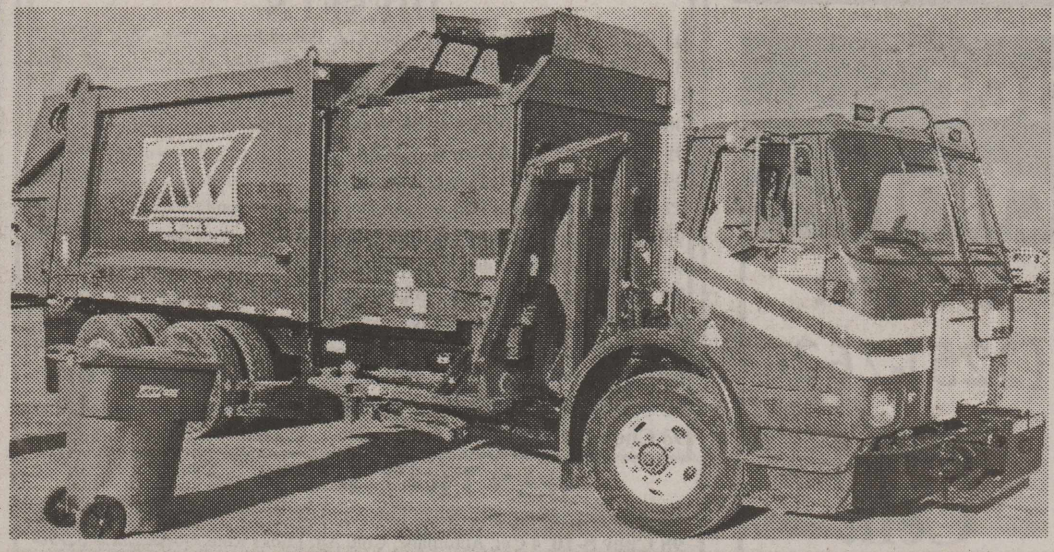

Placement Tips

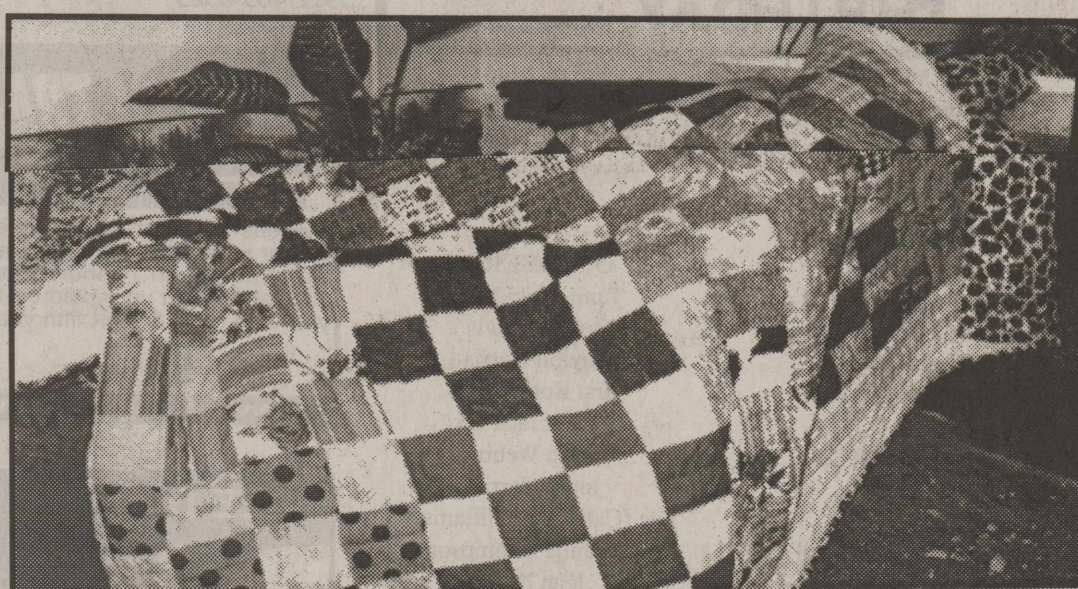

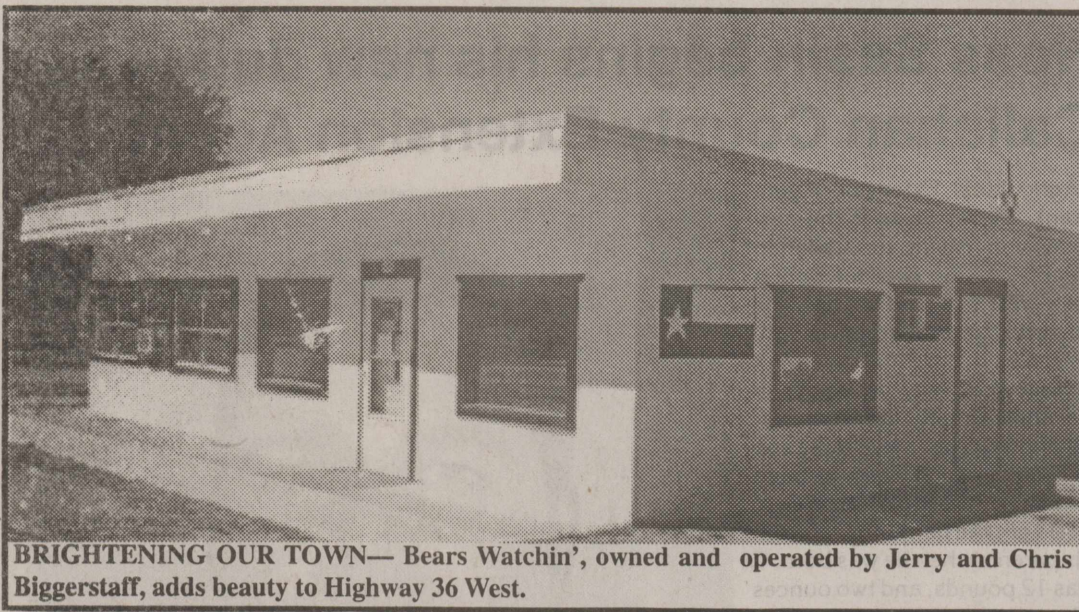

There will be a Parade at 10 a.m. and the Chamber of Commerce will have BBQ sandwiches for sale at lunch time.

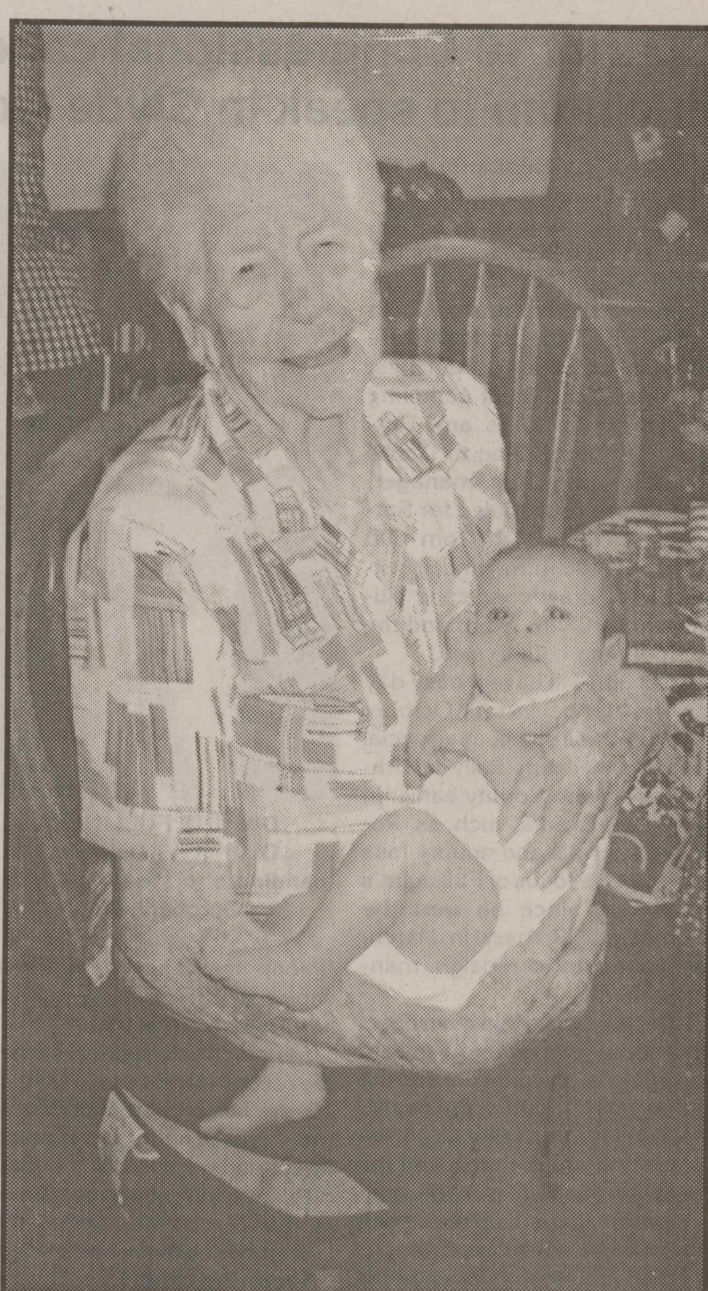
