





## Kids' Health Briefs

How is your child wired? MADISON, WI- Telling your very anxious child to "calm down" probably won't work, says a psychiatrist at University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health. New research in adolescent monkeys shows that the brains of those suffering from anxiety and severe shyness in social settings consistently respond more strongly to stress and show signs of anxiety even in situations others find safe.

Dr. Ned Kalin, chair of the UW psychiatry department, says the brain machinery underlying the stress response seems to be always "on" in these individuals.

A 2008 study published in Public Library of Science (PLoS One) looked at brain activity, anxious behavior and stress hormones in the monkeys (often used as a research model for human children). Those with the most anxious temperaments showed higher activity in the amygdala, the brain structure that regulates emotion and triggers reaction to anxiety.

"Severely shy or anxious children are not likely to just 'grow out of it' without help," says Kalin. "Having an anxious temperament at a young age is a predictor of the later risk to develop anxiety, depression and drug abuse related to selfmedicating.'

Pick your food battles A picky eater can cause a lot

of anxiety around the family dinner table. But a registered dietitian with American Family Children's Hospital says forcing a child to eat is a great recipe for a power struggle between parent and child.

"In a meal situation," says Amy Podmolik, "children will always win. The more parents try to take control, the more combative it will become."

Podmolik, herself the mother of five, says most young children are pretty good at regulating their food intake.

"Until the age of three, children have a perfect sense of how many calories they need," she explains. "If a child eats 100 calories in a snack before a meal, he'll eat 100 calories less at the next meal."

As children grow, parents need to establish more structure around food. Ideally, that will help children develop healthy habits that will last a

Key strategies include having regular family meals; eliminating "free-range grazing" in favor of sit-down snacks; giving kids time to appreciate new foods; and respecting that children's eating habits are different from those of adults.

Counting on Colds

Parents can expect their preschoolers to come down with six to 10 colds between December and April, says Dr. Theresa Guilbert, associate professor of pediatrics at University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health. For most kids, that's good news - early colds may help strengthen the immune

But for youngsters with a family history of allergies and asthma, exposure to the common-cold viruses may lead to wheezing and severe coughing - which in turn indicate that the child is more likely to develop asthma in later life.

Guilbert is researching the links between colds and asthma to see if there is a causal relationship. Until the link is clarified, Guilbert says, parents of high-risk children may choose to keep susceptible kids away from potential contacts that may be infected. Otherwise, since the viruses are transmitted through the air or in droplets, the standard precautions hand-washing, covering mouths, and cleaning surfaces

## Cross Plains' 2008 retail sales are over 1 percent higher than 2007

The City of Cross Plains' one percent city sales tax payments in 2008 are running just over one percent higher than 2007 sales tax payments, according to the Texas State Comptroller's

Texas State Comptroller Susan Combs reported the city's sales tax payment on Friday, November 14th.

Cross Plains' 2008 sales tax payments for the year totalled \$167,852.66, which is 1.59 percent higher than the \$165,216.49 in sales tax rebate payments collected in 2007.

The payment to the city for November 2008 \$18,534.54, which is 10.12 percent higher than the \$16,830.50 payment made in November 2007

Texas Comptroller Susan Combs says the state collected \$1.73 billion in sales tax revenue in October, up 5.2 percent compared to October 2007.

"Sales tax collections grew in the first two months of fiscal 2009, however, at slower rates than generally seen over the past three years," Combs said. 'Collections have continued to increase overall, but remittances from the key retail trade sector have begun to decline slightly as consumers grow increasingly cautious and confidence erodes."

Today, Combs distributed \$548.3 million in November sales tax rebates to cities, counties, transit systems and special purpose taxing districts. Local sales tax allocations are up 4.4 percent compared to November

Combs sent Texas cities \$373.8 million in sales tax allocations, up 4 percent compared to November 2007. So far this calendar year, city sales tax allocations are up 5.2 percent compared to the same time period last year. Texas counties received November sales tax allocations of \$33 million, up 8.7 percent compared to one year ago. For the calendar yearto-date, county sales tax allocaahead of 2007

Merchants collect the state and local sales tax and send it to the Comptroller's office with their tax returns. The state keeps its 6 1/4% share and returns the local one percent sales tax each month to the local governments. Cities and counties may levy a combined tax of up to two percent above the state's sales tax.

Clyde businesses collect 2.00% including one percent for the City of Clyde, one-half of one percent for the Clyde Economic Development Corporation and one half of one percent to reduce property taxes (Proceeds to benefit the Clyde Volunteer Fire Department.)

Cross Plains collects 1.75% in local sales taxes, of which 1.00 percent is allocated to the city and 0.75% is allocated for economic development in the

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



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## **Tick Problems NEW**

Area cattlemen are at risk if a tiny tick in South Texas cannot be contained by quarantine efforts, said Sam Snyder, president of the Callahan-Shackleford County Farm

Snyder said the Texas Farm Bureau Resolutions Committee met recently in Waco and suggested a number of policy changes that relate to control of the fever tick, which carries a disease potentially fatal to cattle. That policy will be debated and voted on at the upcoming Texas Farm Bureau annual meeting in Corpus Christi Dec. 6th through 8th.

"State animal health officials and cattleman are worried about how far the fever tick will spread," Snyder said. "We need to control the fever tick in its present area."

Snyder said the fever tick quarantine along the U.S. / Mexico border was recently expanded. He suggested the U.S. attempt to move that buffer zone across the river into Mexico. He also hoped Mexico would help control the pest.

"The fever tick poses a real threat not only to Texas, but the U.S. cattle industry as well," Snyder said. "We need to step up control efforts."

## Farm Legislation a Concern to **Local Farmers**

Serious concerns over the risk management aspects of the new farm legislation have arisen among local producers, said Sam Snyder, president of the Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau.

"Flood, drought, you name it, Texas farmers experienced it this year," Snyder said. "These extreme weather conditions have exposed flaws in the risk management aspects of new farm legislation."

Snyder said the amount of production costs have also skyrocketed this year, increasing farmers' risk.

"Farmers have very deep concerns about being able to protect ourselves from disaster," he said.

Snyder said it is too early to tell if changes are needed in the commodity portions of the new farm bill passed earlier this year by Congress. Regulations to implement that legislation are currently being written and will accelerate as the Obama administration takes office in

"As regulations are written for those commodities, there will be issues that probably need to be addressed in the future," Snyder said. "This is a very complicated problem."

Regardless, all Americans should be interested in farm policy, Snyder said.

"The farm bill presents a safety net for farmers in bad times," Snyder said. "The legislation provides food security for our nation and ensures a safe, reliable and abundant food source for all Americans."

## **Trans-Texas** Corridor **Update**

As gears start grinding in preparation for the upcoming legislative session in Austin, good news has surfaced for rural Texans as it relates to the Trans-Texas Corridor (TTC).

Callahan-Shackelford County Farm Bureau President said Trans-Texas Corridor citizens' advisory committee appointed to advise the Texas Transportation Commission on future transportation needs agrees with Texas Farm Bureau that the TTC needs to go back to the drawing board.

A report issued November 12th called a citizens' report on the current and future needs of the I-35 Corridor stated the committee does not support the TTC concept. It recommended a more inclusive solution that respects local communities and private property rights while addressing statewide and local transportation needs.

"Rural Texans don't question the need to address the transportation needs of a growing state," Snyder said. "Any solution, however, must minimize the impact of the proposed project on rural Texas and must respect the rights of private property owners."

The report specifically recommended that the Texas Department of Transportation coordinated with "Texas Farm Bureau and other agricultural groups on how to minimize the impacts on the farming and ranching community, as well as improve safety.'

The report recommended that farmers and ranchers, whose land will be divided by a transportation project, be consulted early when determining placement and cost of agriculture crossings to ensure adequate spacing and minimum inconvenience.

"Most important, the committee acknowledged that every effort should be made to minimize the impact of future transportation projects to private property owners," Snyder said. something Farm Bureau has advocated from the

Texas Employers Add 23,000 Jobs in October

## **Texas Unemployment Rate Rises to 5.6 Percent**

AUSTIN, Texas—Seasonally adjusted nonagricultural employment grew by 23,000 jobs in October. Texas employers now have added 230,400 jobs in the past 12 months, for an annual job growth rate of 2.2 percent. The United States recorded 1.1 million job losses during the same period.

Texas' seasonally adjusted unemployment rate rose to 5.6 percent in October, up from 5.1 percent in September and 4.3 percent in October 2007. The U.S. seasonally adjusted unemployment rate climbed to 6.5 percent in October, up from 6.1 percent in September and 4.8 percent a year ago.

"The combination of Hurricane Ike and adverse national economic trends has resulted in a one-half percent increase in the unemployment rate in Texas for October," said Texas Workforce Commission (TWC) Chairman Tom Pauken. "While Texas still has nearly a one percent lower unemployment rate than the rate of the nation, I would expect unemployment rates in Texas to continue to track the national trend upward in the months ahead."

The increase in the number of unemployed (not seasonally adjusted) in the Houston and Beaumont Metropolitan Statistical Areas (MSA), which were impacted by Hurricane lke, represents nearly half of the increase in the unemployed reported statewide. The Midland MSA experienced the

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lowest unemployment rate in the state at 3.1 percent (not seasonally adjusted). The Odessa MSA was second at 3.7 percent, followed by the Amarillo and Lubbock MSAs at 3.9 percent.

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Professional and Business Services gained 12,200 positions in October, for an industry gain of 62,000 jobs in the past year. Education and months.

"Texas is in a better position than most other states with continued positive job said TWC growth," Commissioner Representing the Public Andres Alcantar. "However, we must remain diligent throughout our state, strategically connecting workers to job opportunities."

Trade, Transportation and Utilities employment increased by 2,700 jobs in October, with 34,300 positions added over the year. Natural Resources and Mining gained 1,600 jobs this month, with 16,500 jobs
