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## '68 Cotton Harvest Nears End

### Improvement Noted In Staple and Mike

With more than 65,000 bales of cotton already ginned in the Bailey County area, harvest is all but completed for 1968.

Micronaire quality and staple length is noticeably improved in the county this year, especially in Southern Bailey County where the 'mike' quality has been consistent in the 3.5 range, or better.

By noon Wednesday, December 11, the fifteen rural gins had turned out 52,135 bales of cotton with some gins reporting more than 1000 bales on the gin yard waiting to be processed. The five local gins at the same time reported more than 11,000 bales ginned and Lazbuddie had more than 10,000 bales of cotton ginned at their five area gins.

The significant improvement in staple length and fiber strength of this year's High Plains cotton crop is highly encouraging to Donald Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. "Despite the fact that prices for our better cottons this season have been disappointing," Johnson said, "the proven ability to grow the longer and stronger varieties as well as the shorter staples is still a definite plus factor in the long range outlook for cotton in this area."

His comments were prompted by a look at PCG's first comprehensive report on the quality of cotton harvested this year in the organization's 23 counties. PCG compiles and publishes twice each month during the harvest season a detailed fiber property analysis of cotton classed at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa. The report is sent to buyers, mills, researchers and other interested parties over the world.

The first report this year, printed later than normal because of the necessity for a new computer program, covered 887,900 bales classed through December 6, just over half the area's total expected production for 1968. It shows notable quality improvements over the reports of previous years at a comparable stage of the harvest.

Staple length for instance has averaged 32.7 thirty-seconds of an inch, a full thirty-second better this year than last. And over 76 per cent of this year's crop to date has stapled an inch or longer as compared to only 4 per cent recorded at Con't., on Page 2, Col. 7

## Muleshoe Doctors Busy as Flu Hits

### School Attendance Shows Little Drop

Muleshoe, like many towns and cities in the United States, is presently plagued by the 'flu bug'.

Muleshoe doctors are seeing more than 50 people a day in their offices. Many of them have influenza and many more want to get flu shots. Especially for the 'Hong Kong Flu' which has become widespread over the United States.

Doctor B.O. McDaniel said he has been seeing quite a lot of people and although he has not hospitalized very many for treatment, many are being treated at their homes.

He said that the hardest hit are the very young and the very old. According to Dr. McDaniel, influenza is increasing in Muleshoe. He is seeing more cases than he has in past years. Dr. McDaniel stated, "It reminds me of the 1918 flu.

We don't know exactly what type of flu is here, but there definitely is a lot of it."

When asked what precautionary measures to take, he said that the same thing mainly holds true for the present flu: stay in bed, drink a lot of water and take aspirin. There is no flu serum in Muleshoe and at the present time, there is none available. The last serum available at any Muleshoe doctor's office or at the hospital in Muleshoe was given Tuesday afternoon. Doctors fear that by the time the serum would be made available, it will be too late. For some time, what little serum could be obtained was saved for heart and respiratory patients and the elderly.

Marshall Cook, assistant administrator at West Plains Memorial Hospital, said that following the Nursing Home Christmas party Tuesday afternoon, the visiting was closed at the home. He said, "We are forced to restrict visitors at the nursing home to families who bring in and pick up clothing. The nurses will meet the families at the door and do this for them for the present time. This has become necessary due to the high incidence of flu at the present time."

"Also," he said, there are no plans at the present time to curtail hospital visiting. However, it is felt that perhaps persons not knowing whether or not he has been exposed to the flu will be potentially dangerous to hospital patients. It is and would be more desirable not to make hospital visits until the present epidemic has subsided."

Cook further said that not many influenza patients are being hospitalized, although he is aware of the fact that many are being treated for the flu.

Although doctors are treating many more influenza patients than normal for this time of the year, and term it a 'mild epidemic' Muleshoe School Superintendent Neal Dillman reports that the schools are not hard hit by the flu. Con't., on Page 12, Col. 8

## Turnover Injures One

Walter Sain, Muleshoe, is hospitalized following an accident last Saturday just before noon.

The accident, which was reported to the city police department at 11:17 a.m. Saturday, happened about 17 miles west of Muleshoe on FM 1760.

Sain was traveling east on the highway when he apparently lost control of his 1963 Chevrolet pickup on a curve. After swerving out-of-control down the highway for several hundred feet, the pickup left the high-

way and turned over one and one-half times in a field. Sain and a passenger, Wendell Vernon, were thrown from the pickup and Sain came to rest on the pickup.

Vernon was not injured but a Singleton ambulance brought Sain to West Plains Memorial Hospital where he is undergoing treatment for a fractured shoulder, face and head lacerations, contusions, and a burned hand where his hand came to rest on the exhaust of the pickup.

## Boys Ranch Receives Area Corn and Milo

More than 22,000 pounds of cracked corn and 22,230 pounds of milo were taken to Boys Ranch near Amarillo last Saturday, December 14, by members of the Young Farmers Organization.

The corn and milo will be used by the more than 350 boys in a beef and pork feeding operation. By 1972, they will attempt to be self-sufficient as far as

beef and pork is concerned. They are raising their own beef and pork and feeding it out to be used in the mess halls at the ranch.

With the assistance of a large feeder organization, which is donating several beaves a month to the ranch, the boys hope to become self-sufficient as they are feeding out their own products, and under supervision, are killing and processing their own meat. In addition to beef and pork, the boys are also feeding their own broilers.

groups, will have the opportunity of seeing all the money contributed by them be used for the education of our own Muleshoe students.

The first contribution received was from the H. D. King family in the amount of \$1000. David Bergin of Houston heard about the Stegall-Muleshoe Memorial Fund and wrote a letter enclosing a check to be used for the fund.

The Muleshoe student body of 1967-68 contributed \$150 to be used in the fund and this year already, more than \$600 has been received from various classes, clubs and organizations in Muleshoe High School. More organizations will announce their contribution at a later date.

Funds from the Stegall-Muleshoe Division shall be awarded according to the needs of the student without regard to race, color or creed, or whether the student plans to attend a four-year college, a junior college, a two-year college, trade school, or technical school.

Through the Stegall-Muleshoe Division of the Opportunity Plan, the students from Muleshoe can further their education beyond high school by providing financial assistance to those who would otherwise be unable to do so. Through the development of this fund with annual contributions, the citizens of Muleshoe will be in a position to loan students money for the furthering of their education without being dependent upon any federal grant or subsidy, and without having citizens in another community do for the young people of Muleshoe what each of us, as citizens of this community,

should do ourselves.

Too many times, in too many small communities, when the younger people grow up they go off to school, and finishing their education, move on to a city and the small town dies.

By financing their education through an Opportunity Plan, the young people feel that they have a stake in the town's future, there is more of a tie and the feeling that they should return to their own community, perhaps to provide opportunities for other, younger children growing up.

The Stegall-Muleshoe Division of the Opportunity Plan was originated as a tribute to L.R. Stegall, who was a teacher in the Muleshoe schools before his death this year. He was one of the most respected teachers in the school system, serving not only as a teacher of math, but as a counselor and a living example for his students. He was a well-known figure at all school functions, both civic and athletic. Lee Roy Stegall was a true booster of youth and was frequently called on to serve as guest speaker for banquets and meetings. His favorite pastime was speaking to youth, . . . about youth. He provided incentive and guidance for all youngsters he came in contact with and was rewarded by their outspoken respect for "Mr. Stegall."

Milton Morris of the Opportunity Plan, Inc., Canyon, will counsel with Muleshoe High School students Thursday, February 6, and Friday, February 7, 1969. Parents of students needing financial assistance are encouraged to meet with Morris at this time. this time in 1967. Fiber strength, another important factor in determining the spinning performance of cotton, this year jumped from 79,600 pounds per square inch to 84,900 pounds.

Micronaire, or fiber fineness, moved to a more desirable 3.6 average this year as compared to 3.3. The trade refers to 3.5 as the "tenderable limit" for cotton, and 53.6 per cent of the Plains crop through December 6 had "miked" 3.5 or better. At this time last year, 37.7 per cent of Plains cotton had fallen in this category.

The term "tenderable limit" stems from the cotton futures market, in which only cotton miking between 3.5 and 4.9 can be tendered on futures contracts. Less than one per cent of this year's crop has had micronaire readings above 4.9.

A big improvement in staple and pressley, or fiber strength, has been seen on the Plains in each of the past three years and the full impact of the rise in quality of Plains cotton can best be seen by looking back to 1965.

The first 950,000 bales of the 1965 crop, which was slightly less than half of that year's 2.2 million bale production, had an average staple of 30.3 thirty-seconds of an inch and a meager 11 per cent measured an inch or longer.

Clemmons, 2. The team was off on their shooting early in the season, hitting 26 percent of their field goals and 38 percent of their free throws.

Dennis Beene was high scorer in the Idalou game Friday with 11 points; Jim Putman, 9; Ricky Botkin, 8; Jesse Clemmons, 5; Lionel Patterson, 4; John Elliott, 2 and Alfred Bleeker, 1 point.  
Idalou put the Mules down by a score of 48-40.

The same cotton in 1965 had a pressley average of only 78,200 pounds per square inch.

"With these advances," Johnson stated, "we have proven to the world that we can grow a much broader range of cotton qualities than was commonly thought possible a few years ago. And by doing so we have made our production suitable for a much wider spread of end uses and markets."

As recently as 1966 it was the general opinion across the cotton belt that the High Plains could not produce 1-1/16 inch cotton with a pressley of 90,000 psi or above, as required by some spinning mills.

"But this year's crop should dispel that notion once and for all," Johnson said. He pointed out that the first half of this year's crop contained over 23 per cent that stapled 1-1/16 inches or longer and 26 per cent with a pressley of 90,000 psi or better.

"So it is obvious that we can grow just about whatever upland variety of cotton that is needed," Johnson concludes, "and this just has to be a strong factor in our favor, regardless of short term market considerations."

### HIGHLIGHTS

Ohio State is the Harmon National Champion for 1968 with Penn State finishing in the runner-up position. In last year's final ratings, Penn State was 10th, the Buckeyes were 35th. With an average power quotient of 104.7, there was more football POWER jammed into the Top Twenty Teams this year than in any other year. And no less than fourteen of these teams are involved in Bowl Games which should make for some of the finest post-season entertainment football fans have ever enjoyed.

The biggest mover among the top powers was Florida State. The Seminoles clobbered North Carolina State. Wake Forest, and Houston in their final three games to move from almost no where into the No. 10 spot in the final ratings.

Just a note about the ratings of the Top Forty Teams: Please keep in mind that a team's rating is based on the AVERAGE of its performance against ALL opposition through the entire season. A team's won and lost record has no bearing on its national position. Calibre of competition is a major factor in determining a team's rating.

For the third consecutive year, the powerful Southeast Conference ranks Number One among the more than 65 football conferences in the country. However, they just nosed out the strong Big Eight Conference which moved from 5th place last year to the runner-up spot in 1968.

The Pacific Coast Conference, Southwest Conference, and Big Ten each dropped a notch to 3rd, 4th, and 5th respectively. To repeat once again: These ratings are based on each league's power quotient average, determined from the ratings of all teams in every conference. Chester Clay Beavers offered Christmas selections at the piano and accompanied the group in carol singing. Zed Robinson was song leader.




