

The Donley County Sheriff's Office is seeking the public's help in identifying two thieves who struck local



Blackburn says surveillance pictures show two subjects - a white male and a black or Hispanic male - burglarized a shop owned by Morrow Drilling on April 4 at about 1:30 a.m. The pair took numerous tools from the building.

Authorities believe the pair are likely the same people who broke into the shop in March, stacked up several tools, and then were apparently scared off before they could carry off the loot. With Morrow's permission, the sheriff's department set up a game camera which captured the images of the suspects when they returned this month.

Blackburn says the images have been distributed to all area law enforcement agencies, but so far no one has been able to identify either man.

CC names three distinguished alumni

The Clarendon College Ex-Students Association bestowed its Distinguished Alumnus Award on three former students during the 71st CC Alumni Reunion last Saturday in the Bairfield Activity Center.

Carl Irlbeck, Dr. Keith "Buddy" Hudson, and Leon "Bud" Schaffer, were each recognized for professional and personal achievements, civic responsibility, and continuing support of Clarendon College.

Carl Irlbeck of Plainview graduated from Happy High School before playing guard on the Western Junior College Conference championship team at Clarendon College in 1959. He graduated from Clarendon in 1960 and then received his Master's degree in PE and math from West Texas State University.

He coached basketball at Nazareth, Clarendon, Abernathy, and Plainview. He also coached at Plainview Christian, Monterey, and Hart. He was known for his crew-cut hair and cowboy boots, which he

City may increase trash fees

Trash rates may need to be increased by 30 percent City Administrator Lambert Little told the Clarendon Board of Aldermen at their regular meeting last Tuesday. But he says citizens can keep that from happening if they step up and help the city save money in its sanitation department.

Little says the current municipal budget planned for the sanitation department to run a deficit of 6.3 percent but the actual loss is going to be between 10 and 15 percent. To get the department back in the black would take a rate increase of 15 percent. To earn enough money to purchase much needed equipment would mean increasing city trash rates by 30 percent, he said.

There are alternatives to higher rates - reporting and recycling.

"If we could stop theft of service, we would not have to do this," Little said, referring to rural residents who bring their trash to town and fill up city Dumpsters. "It's out of control. There are enough folks using our Dumpsters from out of town that we could keep our rates low if we could stop them."

Little says he doesn't want to pit city folks against county folks, but he also says the situation is out of hand.

City Hall encourages anyone who sees people improperly using a Dumpster to report those individuals to the city or the sheriff's office. Illegal dumping is a violation of city ordinance and carries of fine of up to \$2,000.

Little said it would help also if citizens would recycle more. The city pays for trash going to the Memphis landfill by weight, so recycling and keeping leaves and grass clippings out of Dumpsters cuts costs for the city.

In other city business, the board approved a new policy for leak adjustments on water bills. If a citizen has had a leak and proves they have fixed the leak, City Hall will charge that customer's water usage from the same period the year before and then charge the city's wholesale cost for the excess water.

In less than a single lifetime, space exploration has broken through unthinkable barriers.

Fifty years ago, Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin became the first human to journey into outer space. He was followed only weeks later by astronaut, Alan Shepard Jr., the first American to travel into space.

Shortly after these historic ventures into the new

frontier, President Kennedy laid out his imperative to the American people when he said, "I believe that this nation should commit itself to achieving a goal, before this decade is out, of landing a man on the moon and returning him safely to Earth."

by sen. kay bailey hutchison The Cold War space race was full steam ahead, and less than a year after JFK's famous charge, John Glenn became the first American to orbit Earth. In

1968, America surpassed the Soviets in space exploration by sending the first manned spacecraft beyond Earth's orbit when Apollo 8 orbited the moon ten times before returning home.

And so it was, before the end of the decade, in 1969, American astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin of the Apollo 11 crew became the first men to walk on the moon.

In 1981, 30 years ago this April, America launched the inaugural space shuttle, Columbia, the first winged spaceship to orbit Earth. In the three decades since, 356 men and women, including pilots, engineers, scientists, and teachers, have flown aboard shuttles, the world's only reusable human spacecraft and rocket system. In 1986 and then later in 2003, we were reminded that even technological marvels like the space shuttle are not immune from the inherent risks of human space flight when we lost the Challenger and Columbia orbiters and the 14 courageous crew aboard. Our nation will always be grateful for their sacrifice.

The space shuttle program is inextricably linked to Texas's own Johnson Space Center. Throughout its 30-year history, the shuttle program has been managed in Houston, each mission has been controlled by the talented professionals at Mission Control, and all astronauts who have flown on shuttles have been trained in the community. NASA's current human space flight mission, the International Space Station, was completed using the shuttle fleet and is also managed at Johnson Space Center. As we celebrate this incredible anniversary, Texans should be proud that Houston has been, and will remain, the heart and soul of America's human space flight program.

Space exploration has inspired the American people to redefine our view of the possible, sparking young men and women to pursue careers in math and science. It has lead to advances in numerous fields, improving our lives and moving us forward as a nation. Through the innovations achieved in space, we have made great scientific advances, enabling us to better tackle challenges on Earth. Key advancements in modern medicine, national defense, meteorology, surveillance, communication, navigation, imaging, and remote sensing for chemicals have all been made possible because of America's push toward the heavens.


But today, our leadership role in space exploration faces a critical turning point. For the first time in 50 years, and after the last shuttle launch this summer, America will lack the capability to launch a human

into space. To prevent that devastating setback to half a century of achievement and investment in NASA, Senator Bill Nelson of Florida and I negotiated a bipartisan NASA Reauthorization bill to safeguard America's human space flight capabilities while balancing new commercial space investment with a robust mission for NASA. The compromise also prioritizes scientific research and protects our sizeable investment in the International Space Station.

Despite this bill being overwhelmingly passed by Congress, the Obama Administration has dragged its feet in implementing the law. My message to President Obama and NASA Administrator Charles Bolden remains that the framework we passed last year was not merely a suggestion, it is the law. It is also the blueprint to preserving our preeminence in space as a nation. This is strategically important for national security and to achieve the research results that will spur medical and energy innovations. NASA, like many federal agencies, faces budget constraints in this current fiscal climate. Nonetheless, Congress has provided the agency with a strong mission and the priority designation to tackle the next chapter of American space exploration.

Our nation and our space program have always confronted challenges and obstacles to new discoveries and new frontiers of innovation. As President Kenney famously said in 1962, "We choose to go to the moon. We choose to go to the moon in this decade and do the other things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard, because that goal will serve to organize and measure the best of our energies and skills, because that challenge is one that we are willing to accept, one we are unwilling to postpone, and one which we intend to win, and the others, too."

With the 50th anniversary of manned space flight, I hope this will be a turning point for NASA to once again recapture America's imagination; to reach for the dream and make it possible.



How 'radical' is Rep. Ryan's plan

Question for those of you concerned about the size of federal debts and deficits: Would you endorse a plan which would add another five or six trillion dollars to the federal debt over the next decade while increasing Uncle Sam's annual expenditures by \$1.1 trillion? If so, you're in luck. House Budget Committee Chairman Paul Ryan (R-WI) recently unveiled just such a plan.

Naturally, Democrats immediately denounced Ryan's plan as "radical." They think the increases in spending and debt should be much larger. It shows how far the goalposts have been moved in American politics that adding multitrillion-dollars of debt is the most conservative proposal anyone in government has made. How would you like your government debt, Mr. or Ms. Citizengargantuan or astronomical?

The Ryan Plan, if implemented (more on that in a moment), would cut \$179 billion from President Obama's planned spending in 2012 and another \$241 billion in 2013. Why is it not "radical" to raise spending by \$787 billion in one year, like Obama did in 2009, but "radical" to propose a decrease of \$179 billion?

Ryan proposes to reform Medicare and Medicaid so that they don't bankrupt the country. Why is that demonized as "war on the elderly and poor" (the phraseology of Illinois Democrat Jan Schakovsky), but nobody talks about waging "war on the young" by saddling the rising generation with trillions of dollars of debt?

Ryan's plan is bold in comparison to the status quo in Washington, but it isn't radical. You want "radical?" How about getting government out of the medical field entirely? Since the creation of Medicare and Medicaid in the 1960s, medical costs have soared far beyond the rate of inflation. More than that, market competition has been diminished and fraud and inefficiency have ballooned apace with the growth of these two medical bureaucracies. (Why do liberals rant and rave about the Pentagon's inefficiencies, but remain silent about the similar inefficiencies of Medicare and Medicaid?) Ryan's plan is statist to the core, promising seniors large government subsidies with which to choose from a slate of government-regulated health care plans.

At this stage, Ryan's plan is academic. Its combination of spending cuts, tax cuts, and devolution of administration of government programs from the federal to the state level—while a significant improvement over the fiscal insanity of recent years—is dead in the water until at least 2013.

If you doubt that, look at the recently concluded "government shutdown" soap opera. The government is going broke, the Republicans were asking for a giveback of less than 10 percent of the Obama/Pelosi/Reid spending increases, but the Democrats—famous for extolling bipartisanship—threatened to shut down the government rather than make such a modest compromise.

It will be interesting to see how long Ryan's fellow Republicans in

the House stand by his proposals. The coming vote is largely symbolic. The real test will be when Republicans have to face the voters in close re-election races next year. A majority of Americans may say that they favor reduced federal spending and smaller deficits, but when push comes to shove, how many will vote for a legislator who actually shrinks programs from which voters benefit? Even if Ryan's plan, by some

miracle, were to be enacted, nothing fundamental would change. Uncle Sam will remain a gigantic, meddling nanny, interfering with our lives and progressively eroding our liberty, entangling us in a corrupt network of special privileges that murder justice and bury the rule of law.

Ryan's plan is a futile attempt to square the circle. He is trying to find a way to preserve an inherently flawed system—a democratic transfer society-whereby government somehow takes care of all of us without eventually spending itself into bankruptcy.

The Ryan Plan is not radical; that is, it doesn't get to the root of the problem. It never questions the legitimacy of government redistribution of wealth. The mechanisms, rationale, and justification for Big Government remain unchallenged. Although a significant step in the right direction (i.e., less federal spending), Paul Ryan's plan ultimately is not a cure for what ails us.

Elementary taking Pre-K, HS sign-ups

Clarendon HeadStart and Pre-Kindergarten will take applications for the 2011-2012 school year on Monday, May 1, and Tuesday, May 2, from 12:30 p.m. to 3:30 p.m. You may make an appointment by calling the Elementary office at 874-3855.

Children who will turn four years old on or before September 1, 2011, and five-year-olds who are not going to be enrolled in Kindergarten and meet the qualifications will be considered for enrollment.

All children must complete a HeadStart application and this will determine which room your child will be eligible for. If an opening occurs in HeadStart, they will be pulling the next qualified applicant from the Pre-K class.

You must bring your child's birth certificate, income verification, immunization record, Social Security card, documentation of disability (if applicable), and proof of public assistance.

Keys to successful weight-loss plans By Andrea Stelling,

Donley County Extension Service

Maintaining weight-loss can be very challenging. However, it is not hopeless. About one in twenty individuals who lose weight will keep the weight off. Ever wonder why some who 'diet' are successful while others are not? What is their secret?

The National Weight Control Registry is a database of over 6,000 successful weight-loss maintainers. Researchers use the Registry to see if there are commonalities among the participants that can help us better understand weight loss.

According to the National Weight Control Registry successful weight-loss maintainers: get plenty of physical activity, limit sedentary activities such as television watching, have a consistent eating plan, consume breakfast and monitor their weight.

Weight-loss maintainers get at least 200 minutes a week of moderate intensity exercise such as walking or swimming. They also limit television viewing to about 10 hours a week. "Another trait of weightloss maintainers is consistency; they do not 'splurge' because it's the weekend, a holiday or because they are eating out," said Dr. Sharon Robinson, Nutrition Specialist and Registered Dietitian with the Texas AgriLife Extension Service. Sometimes when people want to lose weight they will stop eating breakfast. However, we know from the Registry that weight-loss maintainers eat breakfast daily. Also they monitor their weight by weighing themselves weekly and tracking their food intake daily.


Weight loss is not easy, said Robinson, but incorporating these positive lifestyle behaviors will increase the odds of being a success.

Drugs in the News

Hepatitis Treatment Improved with Drug

According to two new clinical studies, adding the drug boceprevir to the current standard drug treatment (interferon and ribavirin) for hepatitis C infection significantly improves what health experts refer to as the rate of cure for this infection. According to the results of these two studies, which are published in the New England Journal of Medicine, boceprevir provided a sustained virologic response in persons who had either relapsed or did not respond to standard therapy. One study researcher indicated that the response in those studied was a dramatic and rapid improvement in antiviral therapy.

Hepatitis C is an infection caused by a virus that reportedly affects over 3 million Americans. Many infected with this virus are symptomfree and are not aware that they have it. The most commonly occurring strain of the hepatitis C virus is called Genotype 1. This type is usually referred to by health experts as the most difficult to treat. Currently, there is no vaccine available to prevent this type of hepatitis. Treatment, therefore, has become the most important way to manage this infection.




