It is a tragic fact tha in recent bus accidents, more than half the fatalities occurred as a result of rollvers, and 70 percent of the individuals belts were teected from the bus. If we heard reports about airplane crashes as often as we hear about bus outrage. We should hold buses to the
same high safety standards. Minimum. same high safety standards. Minimut are taken for granted in other modes of ransportation, such as cars and plan re absent in most buses today.
have introduced legislation (The MotorCoach Enhanced Safety Act of 2011) to safery of buses to reduce deaths and serious injuries caused by these accidents.
Our bill, S. 453 , has already passed the Senate Commerce, Science and Transportation Committee and we hope to bring it to a vote in the full Senate soon.

The statewide poll of 800 reg. istered volers was conducted May
\(11-18\), as the legistaure began \(11-18\), as the legistature began

When asked about how they prefer to balance the budget, 49 percent of Texans leaned toward
budget cuts, with an additional 22 budget cuts, with an additional 22 should be made up entiriely through budget cuts. Another 22 percent said the state's efforts should be evenly
split between cutting spending and increasing revenue.

Yet the majority of survey respondents do not support some of the prominent cuus being considiered by the legistature. Only is percen funding for primary and secondary funding for primary anc seconaary
education and 27 percent favored cutting state funding of higher education.
Given a list of possible cuts to balance the budget, 40 percent of voters favored ending funding for pre-kindergarten classes, the highess response among the proposed cuts. Tinty-ive percent favored reduc-
ins state contributions to teacher and thate employee retirement proerams "Texans remain consistent in heir inconsisisency when it come to the budget," said James Henson director of the Texas Politics Projec and a lecturer in the Department of Government at The University of Texas at Austin.
The poll respondents also opposed most new taxes by large
margins. Ninety-four percent margins. Ninety-four percent ax on individuals and 88 percent pposed increasing the state sales tax rate beyond the current 6.25 per cent. "Sin taxes" had more support: 49 percent of respondents supported increasing taxes on alcoholic bever ages and 62 percent supported legalizing gambling and imposing taxe \(n\) gambling establishments.
