Freddy is an ll-year-old Vietnamese boy who has adopted the Marines of "C" Company, 9th Engineer Bn., and Freddy has been adopted by the engineers.

Originally, Freddy became friends with an artillery unit at the Tam Ky compound, but when that unit moved out, Freddy became friendly with the Seabees. Then "C" Company moved

into the compound and Freddy began to hang around with his new-found Marine buddies. Soon he became accepted by the Marines.

Freddy's plight is not unusual in Vietnam but he was lucky to have found friends in the Leatherneck compound, Freddy comes from a large family that is extremely poor. Consequently, he couldn't attend school. When the 1st Platoon of "C" Company heard this they immediately made room for him "in their hearts", and set about remedying the situation.

Now Freddy eats with his Marine friends and through them is provided transportation to and from school.



poration sales policies that interfere with the marketing of current crop cotton is a problem that's been with us for a long time and one of the first problems that will face incoming Secretary of Agriculture Clifford M. Hardin."

This is a statement from Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., who says PCG will be in touch with the new Secretary on the matter soon after he takes office January

His reference was to numerous times in the past when CCC sales prices and policies have made it more advantageous to merchants and mills to buy cotton from CCC stocks rather than from producers.

"When this situation exists." he noted, "current crop cotton is forced into the government loan, government costs are increased and producers are deprived of a market for current production."

Johnson desn't blame CCC for the frustration producers have experienced to date in their attempts to market 1968-crop

and exporters are going to need situation and is thought to have a great deal more of this year's added at least \$1 million to p than has been sold so far, and the CCC sales policies that should be announced early this year will have much to do with determining whether the cotton is bought from producers or from CCC."

He pointed out that there were only 6.3 million bales of cotton in the carryover at the beginning of this year and that domestic and export consumption for the year is estimated at 12 million bales. This means mills and the trade will need to acquire a minimum of 5.7 million bales from this year's crop just to carry them to August 1, when CCC will take title to any cotton unredeemed

from the loan. This cotton, Johnson assumes, will have to be bought from producers, either directly or in the form of producer equities in loan cotton, because CCC will not have the cotton to sell until after August 1 this year.

"But," he continues, "how much cotton can be sold between now and August 1 above this 5.7 million bales will be determined largely by the CCC sales policies that should be announced early this year by Secretary Hardin.

"And we will be urging the Secretary to announce CCC resale policies that will give a clear - cut advantage to purchases made from producers

Any other course of action by the Secretary, Johnson said. will force a considerable amount of each year's crop to remain in the government loan. "And this would be inexcusable, particularly this year when consumption is expected to exceed production by more than a million bales."

As an example of how CCC sales policies can affect sale of current crop cotton. Johnson pointed to 1966 when production of the shorter staples fell about 1 million bales below consumption, yet CCC sold 1.8 million bales of such cotton, depriving producers of a possible market for some 800,000 bales.

In September of 1967, at the insistence of PCG, CCC revised its policy to provide for the sale of CCC cotton at "the current market price, but not less than 120 points (1.2 cents) per pound above the loan rate for such cotton at the time of delivery.'

This 120 point spread between loan prices and CCC's resale "However," he says, "mills prices went far to correct the

crop on the Plains. Johnson said PCG will ask the new Secretary to either continue a policy similar to that adopted in 1967 or to devise some other mechanism which will assure that needed cotton will come first from current production and from CCC stocks only as the current crop falls short of filling market requirements.

"We recognize the need for a reasonable reserve of cotton to assure a continuous supply of all qualities to the market." Johnson concluded, "but it should be made clear to all concerned that there will be no economical advantage to buying from the CCC catalog over buying current crop cotton from producers.

"And this is a point that should also be kept firmly in mind when future legislation is



### 85 Per Cent **Cotton Classed Lower Grades**

The Cotton Classing Offices of the USDA in this area classed 67,000 samples of new crop cotton last week ending Friday, January 3, 1969. This brought the total for the entire season to 1,441,000. One million forty five thousand (1,045,000) Samples had been classed on the South Plains this time last

Predominant grades were Middling Light Spotted, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted, Middling Spotted, and Strict Low Middling Spotted. These five (5) grades represented 85 per cent of the total classed.

The average staple length from the South Plains area last week was 31/32 of an inch. Micronaire readings by percentages were: 3.5 - 4.9, 22 per cent; 3.3 - 3.4, 15 per cent; 3.0 - 3.2, 28 per cent; 2.7 - 2.9, 22 per cent; and 2.6 and below, 13 per cent.

The average Pressley tests,

which is the breaking strength of the fibers, for the Lubbock area was 81,000 pounds per square inch, for the Lamesa area was 81,000 pounds, and for the Brownfield area was 82,000

Prices reported to the Consumer and Marketing Service of the USDA at Lubbock ranged from \$2.00 to \$10.50 per bale over the Government loan value for White grades and \$6,00 to \$12.75 per bale over the loan for Light Spotted grades, and \$12.20 to \$12.30 per bale over the loan for Spotted grades in the 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire range. Average cottonseed prices paid to producers was \$49.00 per ten.
