Donations sought to keep JRCA here

Local citizens and businesses are being asked to make donations toward keeping the Junior Rodeo Cowboy Association coming to Clarendon for its annual May rodeo.

The organization is usually sponsored by the city but did not file its request properly this year and missed its window for funding. Now local JRCA supporter Robert Benson says he needs to raise \$2,500 by Friday, July 27, in order to bring the event back to. Clarendon next spring.

Benson says the JRCA rodeo attracts more than 200 youth who compete in the event and a total of about 800 visitors to the city for the two-day event each May, which has been held here for several years.

An account has been set up at the Donley County State Bank to receive donations for the JRCA: and Benson says if the full \$2,500 isn't raised by July 27, he will refund whatever money is raised back to the donors.

Applicator license training set Aug. 9

AMARILLO - The Texas AgriLife Extension Service in Potter County is offering private pesticide applicator license training on Aug. 9 at the Texas AgriLife Research and Extension Center, 6500 W. Amarillo Blvd., Amarillo.

The training session begins at 8 a.m., according to Brandon Boughen, AgriLife Extension agent for Potter County. The three and a half hour training will give participants the needed information to take the private applicator license test, which will be administered by the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Cost of the training is \$60 and all materials will be provided.

Anyone in the Texas Panhandle may and are encouraged to participate if they need a private pesticide applicator license, Boughen said.

The private pesticide applicator license is for agricultural producers and land owners who apply restricted-use pesticides to their own property.

RSVPs are requested by August 3, and can be made by contacting Boughen at 806-373-0713.

Rainwater harvesting seminar set for July 28

An educational rainwater harvesting seminar, complete with a hands-on installation demonstration, has been scheduled for July 28 in Clarendon, according to Leonard Haynes, Texas AgriLife Extension Service agent for Donley County.

The seminar will begin with registration from 8-8:30 a.m. at the home of Sarah SoRelle, 507 W. 5th Street. SoRelle, who is helping sponsor the event, has offered her home as a demonstration location due to her interest in conserving water.

"The hands-on installation demonstration will be led by the world-renowned rainwater harvesting expert, Billy Kniffen, who has presented this topic at several locations across the United States," Haynes said. Kniffen is the AgriLife Extension state rainwater harvesting specialist.

Following the hands-on portion, a meal will be provided along with an educational program at the Donley County Activity Center, 4437 N. State Highway 70. The program will end around 3 p.m., he said.

There will be a \$10 registration fee per person. Checks should be made payable to Donley County Texas AgriLife Extension and mailed to Box 682, Clarendon, Texas 79226.

Those planning to attend are asked to RSVP by July 25 to the AgriLife Extension office in Donley County at 806-874-2141 or 806-282-7680, Haynes said. Call the same numbers for more information or directions.

Haynes said this meeting is a joint effort between Greenbelt Water Authority, City of Clarendon, SoRelle and AgriLife Extension, and targets communities within the Greenbelt Water Authority - Clarendon, Hedley, Childress, Quanah and Crowell – but is open to anyone.

"Not only has the Greenbelt Water Authority identified depletion of water resources as a major concern, but the Texas water-supply planning process has identified that surface and groundwater supplies will not be able to meet future water demand," Haynes said.

Water conservation and development of alternative water supplies is necessary to meet the growing demand for fresh water, according to Kniffen. Rainwater harvesting is an See 'Rainwater' on page 8.

Couple in jail for 3

A Donley County couple is in jail this week following a 16-day crime spree of theft and burglary.

Sheriff Butch Blackburn said 32-year-old Eduardo Carrillo "Eddie" Vaquera and 18-year-old Harley Echols were already in custody for misdemeanor charges when they were arrested last Monday, July 2, and each charged with three counts of Burglary of a Building, which is a state jail felony.

The couple is alleged to have stolen numerous items from June 9 to June 25, and many of the items were recovered from Amarillo and Childress pawn shops.

Blackburn said a call from the Amarillo Police Department with a pawn shop report pointed to Vaquera and Echols.

"There were items on the report that we recognized from local burglaries, and we put the pieces together," the sheriff said.

Stolen property in these cases ranged from welders to saddles to guns, Blackburn said.

States are resisting Obamacare

One of the few bright spots in the Supreme Court's ruling on Obamacare was its 7-2 decision striking down the Obama administration's attempt to blackmail states into going along with a massive and costly expansion of Medicaid.

Barely a day later, Florida governor Rick Scott announced that his state would not expand Medicaid eligibility to 133 percent of the poverty level, which comes out to roughly \$30,000 per year for a family of four, or allow single, childless men to participate in the program. Earlier, Scott had rejected another key component of Obamacare, refusing to establish a state insurance exchange. He had even returned grants and other funding that the previous governor had received to help implement the legislation.

Scott was quickly joined by at least six other GOP governors in rejecting the Medicaid expansion, including governors Branstad (Iowa), Brownback (Kansas), Haley (South Carolina), Heineman (Nebraska), Jindal (Louisiana), and, not surprisingly, Scott Walker (Wisconsin). At least seven other governors, including Bentley (Alabama), Bryant (Mississippi), Daniels (Indiana), Deal (Georgia), Fallin (Oklahoma), McDonnell (Virginia), Perry (Texas), and Jay Nixon (Missouri), a Democrat, had previously made statements suggesting that they were unlikely to expand their programs. Nevada had earlier passed regulations paving the way to participate in the expansion, but Governor Sandoval has since indicated he may reconsider.

In rejecting Obamacare's Medicaid expansion, these governors will be saving their state taxpayers billions of dollars. Initially, the federal government would have provided additional funding to cover the expansion, but those additional funds would have been phased down, starting in 2017. Eventually state taxpayers would have had to pick up much of the extra cost. For example, over ten years, the Medicaid expansion would have cost taxpayers in states such as Florida, Kansas, and Texas more than \$20 billion each, while in New Jersey, for example, the expansion could cost as much as \$35 billion. (In fairness, a few states such as California do emerge as net winners under the expansion formula, but they are clearly the exception, and there are plenty of other reasons why they should resist participating.)

On the other hand, if a state does not expand its Medicaid program, most of those who would have been eligible for Medicaid will now become eligible for subsidies through Obamacare's health-insurance exchanges. Those subsidies are paid in full by the federal government. That much should be an easy call for any fiscally responsible governor, although the reasons to forgo the exchanges and the subsidies they entail are strong as well.

Beyond the Medicaid expansion, at least four governors have joined Governor Scott in explicitly refusing to set up a state-based insurance exchange: Jindal, Perry, and Walker, as well as Democratic New Hampshire governor John Lynch. Perhaps as many as 35 other states have simply not taken the actions. necessary to establish exchanges. That may be less explicit a revolt, but it has the same result.

Of course, if states refuse to set up an exchange, Obamacare gives the federal government the authority to step in and operate an exchange itself in those states. But there is reason to doubt that the federal government has either the ability or the money to do so. Congress has not appropriated any funding for this purpose and seems unlikely to do so.

More important, as my colleague Michael Cannon has discovered, a little-discussed provision of Obamacare makes federal subsidies for insurance available only through those exchanges that the states set up themselves. So, while the federal government does have the power to create exchanges in states that refuse to do so, it cannot offer subsidies through those federally run exchanges.

Moreover, it is those subsidies that actually trigger the penalty under Obamacare for employers who fail to provide workers with insurance. Obamacare requires employers with 50 or more workers to provide health insurance or pay a tax, but only if at least one employee qualifies for subsidies under the exchange. Therefore, if subsidies can be provided only through a state-authorized exchange, a state could potentially block the employer mandate altogether, simply by refusing to establish an exchange.

The Obama administration and the IRS, unsurprisingly, have claimed that they have the right to unilaterally rewrite the law, yet again, to close this loophole. But, at the very least, this would be open to legal challenge. And perhaps next time the Supreme Court will get it right.

So, by refusing to go along with Obamacare's Medicaid expansion and by blocking state-run exchanges, governors are not just saving state taxpayers money. They are potentially reducing future federal spending by as much as \$1.5 trillion over the next ten years.

While congressional Republicans have been reduced to taking symbolic repeal votes, and Mitt Romney struggles to determine whether or not the individual mandate is a tax, governors — and state legislators — have become the real heroes of the fight against Obamacare.



Honoring our wounded warriors

Each July 4th, we celebrate the birth of our great nation, the independence for which our founding patriots fought and died. We honor their sacrifice and know that without them, we would not enjoy the freedom and liberty we have today.


But those gifts bestowed by our founders do not exist in absolute security. In the years since July 4th, 1776, generations of brave men and women have fought to preserve our democracy Each Independence Day, we remember those early patriots and the 56 delegates from the 13 original colonies who signed that historical document. I also think of the members of our nation's military who have kept that dream alive for all Americans.

We often toss around words like "hero". Perhaps it's because we have far too few of them. Or maybe we've forgotten what it means. We lionize sports stars or celebrities, many of whom are talented and worthy of praise. But they're not heroic.

General Norman Schwarzkopf, who led our forces in Operation Desert Storm, once said, "It doesn't take a hero to order men into battle. It takes a hero to be one of those men who goes into battle." To me, the brave men and women who fight to protect our freedom are, indeed, the heroes.

It's also important to recognize

the sacrifice made by the families they leave behind. These families wait and hope for husbands and wives, brothers and sisters, fathers

daughters and sons. It takes courage to watch a loved one go off to war. There is pride that they go in defense of our nation; but that does not diminish the worry or fear.

I recently visited the Warrior and Family Support Center (WFSC) in San Antonio, where I was honored to meet some of our courageous veterans. The WFSC serves wounded veterans and their families and is located by Brooke Army Medical Center, one of the world's best trauma centers. The patients treated there have sustained devastating injuries, and most will remain in the hospital for months; some will be there over a year.

This, of course, is difficult for both the soldiers and their families. Recuperation requires healing from more than just physical wounds. The WFSC is a place where patients can keep company with their military family and people on the same long road to recovery. It is a place where they can rehabilitate as

individuals, couples or families - whatever they need. It is a place that knows that the casualties of war are not always counted in bones and limbs. It is a place that heals the whole soldier.

The WFSC creates a home away from home. There is a big, open kitchen, where volunteers prepare home-cooked meals. There is a classroom where soldiers can take lessons, such as computer training or courses to earn degree credits as they acquire the skills they need to re-enter the workforce.

The WFSC is a showcase of the genuine community spirit we have in Texas. It depends completely on private donations, yet the Center has continued to expand, even in a time of economic uncertainty. There are a few paid staff, but 143 volunteers keep it open 13 hours every day.

I was just amazed by the Warrior and Family Support Center and their volunteers. Among the contributions made by Texans: steaks for cookouts, trays of homemade cookies, wedding dresses and a wedding cake for every wounded soldier who gets married there, and groceries to stock the snack bar.

I hope all Americans have honored America's founders, the brilliance and bravery that created this great country, the men and women who fight to preserve its freedoms and the military families that support them.



Blood Sugar Drug Delays Progression to Diabetes


The results of a recent clinical trial reported the effects of Lantus (insulin glargine), an insulin injection used to treat diabetes. Those results were recently published in the New England Journal of Medicine. This clinical trial demonstrated that Lantus delayed progression from pre-diabetes to type 2 diabetes. Pre-diabetes is defined as having blood glucose (sugar) levels that are higher than normal but not yet high enough to be defined as diabetes. A person with diabetes has high blood sugar because either the body does not make enough insulin or because the body does not respond to the insulin produced. Pre-diabetes and diabetes can occur in anyone regardless of age or

race, but are more common in African Americans, Latinos, Native Americans and Asian Americans/Pacific Islanders. The aged population is also at risk for developing pre-diabetes and diabetes. Long term damage that may result from diabetes includes complications to the heart and circulation, the kidneys, and vision. Blood tests can help a physician determine if a person has pre-diabetes or diabetes.

I pray that you would lose something for God so that you might gain Christ. My prayer is that everyone would be honest and see that man's will can't compare with the Lord's. May God give you the courage to stand up for Him and be proud to be a "loser."







As an American, the Second Amendment gives you the right to bear arms. As a citizen, you have the right to protect yourself, your loved ones, and your

property. CHL Classes offer you the opportunity to get the required education and gun qualification to obtain a Concealed Handgun License from the State of Texas, which can help better protect yourself and your family. It gives you that sense of additional se-

curity---at home or away. The state requires a minimum of 10 hours instruction, including gun qualification. The classroom part of the program is normally 8 hours and includes information about laws, use of force, conflict resolution, CHL responsibilities, gun safety, and other information that you will find useful.

Classes are held on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. with gun qualification from 5-6:30 p.m., Lunch is provided during the one-day classes.

We have access to two very good gun ranges: In Borger, we utilize the Canadian River Archery & Gun Club, located north of Borger off of State Highway 207. In Pampa, we use the Pampa Rifle & Pistol Club ranges (indoor at Recreation Park and outdoor range on County Road D). (http://pamparifleandpistol- 5. I am not chemically depenclubinc.com/nra.html)

To qualify you will need a 32 caliber or larger gun. If you qualify with a revolver, you can

only carry a revolver (and/or a derringer). If you qualify with a semi-automatic, you may carry a revolver or a semi-automatic as a Concealed Handgun Licensee.

What To Bring:

All you need is a gun, 50 rounds of ammo, eye protection (safety glasses, sun glasses, or regular glasses), and ear protection. If you don't have a gun, ar-

storage of a handgun.

7. I have not been convicted of a Class A or Class B misdemeanor or an offense under Section 42.01 (Disorderly Conduct) of the Texas Penal Code in the

past five years. plicable federal and state laws

to purchase a handgun. 9. I have not been finally determined to be delinquent in making child support payments administered or collected by the attorney general

10. I have not been finally determined to be delinquent in the payment of taxes or other money collected by the comptroller, state treasurer, or tax collector of any agency or political subdivision of this state (or state of residence for nonresident applicants).

11. I am not currently restricted under a court protective order or subject to a restraining order affecting the spousal relationship, not including a restraining order affecting property.

12. I have not in the past tenyears been adjudicated as having engaged in delinquent conduct violating a penal law of the grade of felony.

13. I have not made any material misrepresentation, or failed to disclose any material fact, in an application or request for application submitted pursuant to 37 TAC Chapter 6 and Chapter 411 of the Texas Government Code.
