Hedley ISD names new superintendent

The Hedley ISD school board named the lone finalist for the vacant superintendent position in a regularly scheduled meeting on Monday night, August 6. Bill Sanders was selected to be the next superintendent, and will take office after a 21-day mandatory waiting period.

Mr. Sanders is currently the principal of Poolville Junior High School, in Poolville, TX. He has been a coach, teacher, and principal in a career lasting 19 years, in districts ranging from A to 5-A. Mr. Sanders also has taught special education in high school.

He has earned a BS in Education from Mary Hardin Baylor University, an M.B.A. from the University of Texas Permian Basin, and a Masters in Education Administration from Tarleton State University.

In other business, the Hedley ISD will just about break even on the budget for the current school year ending at the end of this month.

Next year, the 2012-2013 budget projects a shortfall of \$51,423. Hedley ISD does have a reserve account, totaling about \$650,000, which can be used to cover the projected budget deficit.

Additionally, Hedley's student count is dropping with declining enrollments expected to continue into the future. The board discussed strategies to increase student enrollment in the future. The board will announce plans to combat declining enrollment within the next few weeks.

Ashtola reunion to be held Saturday

The Ashtola-Martin Reunion will be held this Saturday, August 11, at the Donley County Senior Citizens Center in Clarendon.

The reunion will go from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., and organizers encourage all interested folks to attend because this will likely be the last reunion for these communities.

City expands hours for recycling center

Clarendon City Hall has announced that it will now open the recycling center on Front Center on Sunday afternoons from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m. so that citizens will be able to take grass clippings, tree limbs, and other debris there at a more convenient time. The center will maintain its regular hours on Monday through Saturday as well.

CEDC launches phase one of Mulkey work

A gleaming new face on the Mulkey Theatre should be completed in a few months as the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation takes the first steps in a \$123,000 refurbishment of the building's façade.

The CEDC Board approved soliciting a general contractor for the project after architect Mason Rogers presented his proposal for Phase One of the Mulkey project Monday evening. Proposals from contractors will be reviewed by the board on August 20 with the hopes of completing this phase before the end of the year.

CEDC President Sherol Johnston said she glad to be moving for-

ward with the Mulkey and said the money is on hand to complete this part of the renovations.

The scope of work will include replacing stucco on the façade with a new EFIS material that is flexible and infused with the paint color, which should last at least 50 years. Contractors will also be correcting the pitch of the marquee so that water on the overhang's roof drains properly, and badly damage stucco work on the underside of the marquee will be replaced.

New aluminum doors will be fabricated to match existing doors that have either been damaged or are difficult to use, and a new elec-

trical service capable of supporting the entire building will be installed. Damaged tiles will be repaired or replaced, and the corrugated accent on the center of the façade will be refinished.

The project also calls for neon or LED lighting to be restored on the underside of the marquee and for new neon or LED tubing to be added in the porthole windows and along the top of the building.

"We've got the money for this, but we'll still need donations to get to the inside," said CEDC Vice President Bill Stavenhagen. "It will be a million-dollar building when we get through."

Stavenhagen said prices for construction projects of this type are astounding and that the project will cost more than he had hoped.

"I don't think anyone on our board thought it would be this much," he said. "But then we didn't think we'd spend \$50,000 on the new roof either. That cost us more than the building was worth at the time."

The architect's estimate for Phase Two of the Mulkey renovation is \$899,600 and doesn't include the price of new seating, but CEDC board members agreed that Phase Two may have to be broken into smaller phases to complete the theatre for its intended new use not only

as movie house but also as conference and visitors center. The board is also investigating private foundation grants.

"We'll just take it one step at a time," Stavenhagen said. "That's all we can do."

The board also took action Monday to approve replacing glass on the Mulkey marquee faces - much of which was damaged by hail - with new translucent acrylic material, and Johnston reported that Ferrol Shelton had volunteered to repair damaged plaster in the former Mulkey barbershop as part of the renovation of that area as a visitor's center and economic development office.

King to be new state legislator

Canadian School Board President Ken King will represent Donley County in the Texas House of Representatives after he defeated incumbent Rep. Jim Landtroop of Plainview in yesterday's Republican Primary Runoff Election.

King received 53.99 percent of the vote across District 88 compared to Landtroop's 46 percent. Locally, the margin was much wider with 77.35 percent of Donley County Republicans supporting King.

Landtroop had been the top vote getter in the four-man race in May's Republican Primary, but he fell short of the majority needed to secure his party's nomination. Donley County voters also preferred King in May with Landtroop coming in fourth locally.

Following the primary, the other two challengers - Mac Smith of Pampa and former State Rep. Gary Walker of Plains - both endorsed King, and retiring State Rep. Warren Chisum also endorsed King in the final days of before the election.

With no Democrat running for the House seat, King is the presumptive winner of the November election and will represent District 88, which was formerly represented by Chisum but was redistricted to include Landtroop's home base of Hale County.

In statewide GOP races, Republicans nominated Tea Party favorite Ted Cruz over Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst 56.79 percent to 43.20 percent to run for the US Senate seat currently held by Kay Bailey Hutchinson. Cruz will face Democrat Paul Sadler, who won his party's runoff yesterday with 60 percent of the vote over Grady Yarbrough.

Locally, Donley Republicans favored Dewhurst, 55.96 percent to 44.03 percent; and county Democrats sided with Sadler 63.08 percent to 36.91 percent.

Warren Chisum fell short of his goal becoming the Republican nominee for Railroad Commissioner, losing his bid to Christi Craddock 40.19 percent to 59.80 percent. Local voters preferred Chisum, 69.81 percent to 30.18 percent.

Barry Smitherman was the choice of both state and local Republicans to fill an unexpired term on the Railroad Commission over challenger Greg Parker.

State and local Republicans also picked John Devine over David Medina to run for Supreme Court Justice, Place 4.

CC president says new employees will boost college

Clarendon College Regents approved the hiring of six new employees during their July meeting as CC gets ready for its fall session.

The new personnel are expected to bring great individual qualities to CC, President Phil Shirley said.

"I feel like we made great gains in these new hires," he said. "We've

strengthened our coaching staff and personnel. These are quality people who fit into our Clarendon College family."

The new hires are cross country coach Zachary Leggett, baseball coach Devin McIntosh, enrollment services counselor/recruiter Becky Green, vocational nursing instructor Daniel Trejo, women's basketball

coach Brad Vanden-Boogaard, and assistant softball coach / Knorpp Hall director Aljandra Rodriguez. Additionally, the board approved reassigning Kory Dunn to be director of the vocational nursing program and making Kim Layton the cheerleading coach.

Regents Vice-Chair Jerry Woodard, who was presiding, raised

the issue of personnel living outside of the college district, and a discussion followed, particularly regarding Athletic Director John Green and new enrollment services counselor Becky Green. The couple is continuing to reside in Borger because they have a daughter in high school there, but the athletic director does reside in and oversee a college dorm.

The board discussed encouraging department heads and senior staff to reside in Clarendon or Donley County as a requirement of their employment, but no action was taken.

"The board prefers employees live in the district," Shirley said, "but they stopped short of requiring it."

Are all of us now criminals in America?

Under the blazing Arizona sun stands an encampment of military tents filled with some 2,000 people. They battle the heat by positioning themselves in front of a few large fans, but they are of little use when temperatures reach 145 degrees. Stun fences surround the perimeter, with four Sky Watch Towers bearing down on the occupants. Facial recognition software and K-9 units keep track of the people moving about, longing for their freedom.

For the residents of Tent City Jail, their time behind bars is an exercise in humiliation: they are forced to dress in pink underwear, they "work seven days a week, are fed only twice a day, get no coffee, no cigarettes, no salt, pepper or ketchup and no organized recreation." They work on chain gangs, and have to pay ten bucks every time they want to see a nurse. This draconian treatment is not reserved for hardened criminals. In fact, most inmates in Tent City are imprisoned for less than a year for minor crimes, or are simply awaiting trial.

It is in this Guantanamo-like facility, surrounded by hardened criminals and subjected to all manners of degradation and hardship that Michael Salman — who was fined more than \$12,000 and sentenced to 60 days in jail starting on July 9, 2012, for the so-called "crime" of holding a weekly Bible study in his Phoenix home, allegedly in violation of the city's building codes — is incarcerated.

What happened to Michael Salman — armed police raids of his property, repeated warnings against holding any form of Bible study at his home, and a court-ordered probation banning him from having any gatherings of more than 12 people at his home — should never have happened in America. Yet this is the reality that more and more Americans are grappling with in the face of a government bureaucracy consumed with churning out laws, statutes, codes and regulations that reinforce its powers and value systems and those of the police state and its corporate allies. All the while, the life is slowly being choked out of our individual freedoms. The aim, of course, is absolute control by way of thousands of regulations that dictate when, where, how and with whom we live our lives.

Incredibly, Congress has been creating on average 55 new "crimes" per year, bringing the total number of federal crimes on the books to more than 5,000, with as many as 300,000 regulatory crimes. As journalist Radley Balko reports, "that doesn't include federal regulations, which are increasingly being enforced with criminal, not administrative, penalties. It also doesn't include the increasing leeway with which prosecutors can enforce broadly written federal conspiracy, racketeering, and money laundering laws. And this is before we even get to the states' criminal codes."

In such a society, we are all petty criminals, guilty of violating some minor law. In fact, Boston lawyer Harvey Silvergate, author of *Three Felonies a Day: How the Feds Target the Innocent*, estimates that the average American now unknowingly commits three felonies a day, thanks to an overabundance of vague laws that render otherwise innocent activity illegal and an inclination on the part of prosecutors to reject the idea that there can't be a crime without criminal intent. Consequently, we now find ourselves operating in a strange new world where small farmers who dare to make unpasteurized goat cheese and share it with members of their community are finding their farms raided, while home gardeners face jail time for daring to cultivate their own varieties of orchids without having completed sufficient paperwork.

This frightening state of affairs — where a person can actually be arrested and incarcerated for the most innocent and inane activities, including feeding a whale and collecting rainwater on their own property (these are actual cases in the courts right now) — is due to what law scholars refer to as overcriminalization, or the overt proliferation of criminal laws. "Such laws," notes journalist George Will, "which enable government zealots to accuse almost anyone of committing three felonies in a day, do not just enable government misconduct, they incite prosecutors to intimidate decent people who never had culpable intentions. And to inflict punishments without crimes."

There was a time in our nation's history when such an accounting of facts would have sparked immediate outrage. However, having bought into the idea that anything the government says and does is right, even when it is so clearly wrong, many Americans through their own compliance have become unwitting accomplices in the government's efforts to prosecute otherwise law-abiding citizens for unknowingly violating some statute in its vast trove of laws written by bureaucrats who operate above the law. Yet as Nathan Burney so aptly points out in his "Illustrated Guide to Criminal Law," "when crimes are too numerous to count... when you're punished, not because what you did was wrong, but simply because the law says so... when laws are too vague or overbroad... that's not justice."

Texas Tea Partiers have radical streak

Well, the tea party, which really isn't a party at all, has pushed the Texas Republican Party even farther to the right, if such a thing is possible. Little Teddy Cruz opened up a can (with Dubya's photo on the label) of whip-ass on lieutenant governor David Dewhurst in the recently held Republican senatorial primary runoff. He thumped not-so-super Dave by 13 points.

When Dewhurst entered the race to be Texas's next senator, his victory seemed all but assured, his being Governor Rick's Huckleberry and all. Republicans have controlled Texas since 1994, and until recently, without much internal discord and bickering. After all, Dewhurst has been the lieutenant governor since 2003 and his views have been solidly in line with Texas's Republican super-majority. He was endorsed by most of our top Republican powers-that-be, including Dubya and his cohorts. He also pumped in millions of his own money. A little-known fact is that he has about as much wealth as Mitt, give or take a few million.

He won the primary, but not quite enough. The nomination went to a run-off between not-so-super Dave (as compared to my friend Super Dave W) and Little Teddy Cruz, a favorite of the tea-party and Dubya's acolytes. Before the run-off Cruz was a virtual unknown Texas solicitor-general from the Houston area. In Teddy's view, Dewhurst was insufficiently conservative. Many Republicans, including the tea-party radicals, agreed and we now have a radical Republican running against a soon to be road-kill Democrat for the United States Senate.

The runoff was a huge upset, and one that points to a looming divide among Texas Republicans in particular

and a potential problem in Washington. Of course, Ted Cruz's monetary support primarily came from Washington power brokers. If establishment Republicans split with tea party radical Republicans the Democratic Party may reap unintended gains. However, if the Republicans can stay united, Ted's election to the Senate will be a blow to the Democrats, which is good.

Don't get me wrong. I love radicals. My all-time favorite radical is Sam Houston. I even considered myself to be a radical once, back in the free-love era of the 1960s. A large part of Texas's charm lies in its history of producing world class radicals, along the lines of General Sam Houston, to LBJ, to Dubya, to the boss, Roger — whom I'm fairly certain is a closet tea party sympathizer. Texas wouldn't be Texas without our rowdy and radical independent streak.

I like members of the tea party on an individual basis. Back in the 1970s, I was privileged to know Dick Arme, then a professor of economics at North Texas State University. He was one of the real founders of the tea party movement, and was an advocate of several radical ideas, like cutting the federal budget, including defense, creating a flat-tax, and favored open immigration, etc.

I certainly don't agree with everything the tea party advocates, like making "no tax increase pledges" to Grover Norquist and his "Taxpayer

Protection Pledge." I prefer that our representatives in congress make their pledges to their constituents, rather than being Grover Norquist's Huckleberries.

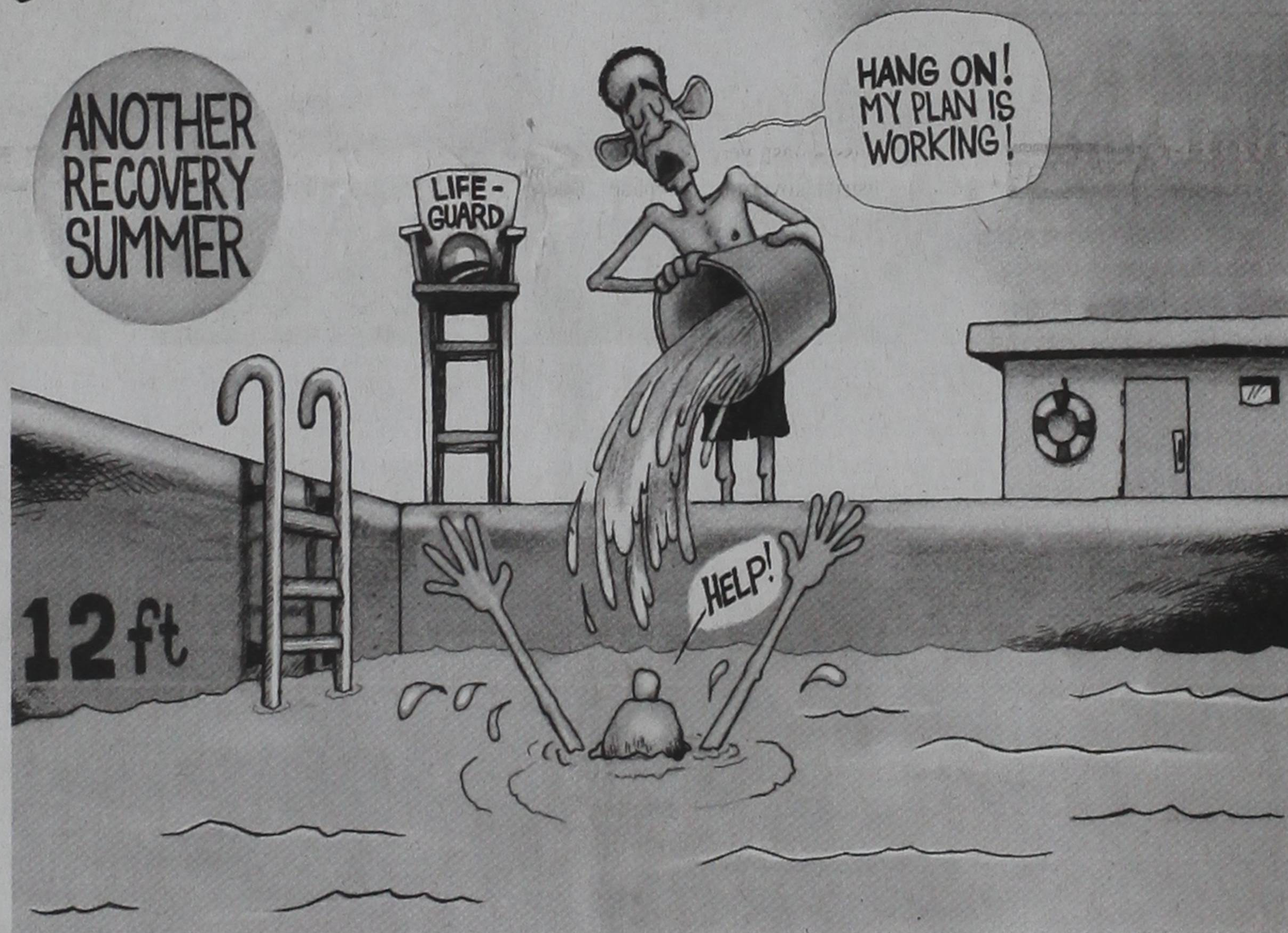
The tea party is a conservative movement made up of loosely affiliated groups of people unified around the central principles of "limited government and fiscal responsibility." While most of the various groups that compose the movement agree on the tea party principles — limited government, fiscal responsibility, personal responsibility, the rule of law, and national sovereignty — they often disagree on individual tenants and the extent to which they espouse libertarianism.

I believe strongly in fiscal responsibility and I don't think it wise to never consider raising taxes, especially in emergencies. I don't believe it prudent to arbitrarily limit our arsenal of economic tools, tools that may be needed sometime in the future. Most Americans, including moderates, also believe in fiscal responsibility, personal responsibility, the rule of law, and national sovereignty. The tea party movement certainly has no right to question one's patriotism on the basis of differing positions on these issues.

So, while I don't agree with everything the tea party types advocate, I do celebrate their independent thinking and their willingness to stand up and be heard. Texans have a unique tradition of formulating radical positions which have proven beneficial to America. Even though they can be pesky and irritating, tea party folks need to be heard and the principles they advocate deserve serious consideration.

On occasion, they can, however, be misguided, wrong, and a bit dangerous.

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Texas Olympians going for gold

It didn't take long for Texans to share in a breathtaking Olympic moment as the 2012 summer games got underway in London. On the first weekend of competition, Dana Vollmer of Granbury set a new world-record in the 100-meter butterfly, becoming the first woman to break the 56-second barrier.

We marvel at the athletic ability of Olympic competitors, but we also take inspiration from their personal stories. Dana was diagnosed with a heart condition when she was training for the 2004 Olympics in Athens. She persevered and won a gold medal at 16. But she almost gave up on competitive swimming when she failed to make the team in 2008. She could have let that setback end her career; instead, she redoubled her efforts and went on to make Olympic history.

That perseverance is part of the indefatigable American spirit that says: never give up. And it is a reflection of the simple equation that hard work plus skill and determination equals success. Our men and women representing

America at the Olympic Games offer inspiration and example, showing all of us that we can realize our dreams.

Many of our athletes have been helped along the way by the support of families, coaches, teammates and communities. Marquise Goodwin, of the University of Texas, is a track phenom. At his first track meet, when he was only nine years old, he jumped nearly 14 feet — and won three events that day for his team, appropriately named the Lubbock Olympians. Thirteen years later, in the Olympic trials, he jumped 27 feet, 4 and one-quarter inches.

Marquise's mother Tamina was unable to afford the flight from Lubbock to London, so the community

came together to make sure she would get there. Not only did they get Tamina to London, they got her mother there as well. I have no doubt that all of Lubbock will be watching Marquise compete — and be keeping an eye out for his mother and grandmother in the stands as well. The people of Lubbock are perfect examples of why my pride in Texas's athletes is matched by my pride in Texas's community spirit.

The Olympics are a time when the world comes together in the spirit of friendly competition, and give everyone a chance to indulge in some good, old-fashioned national pride. The spirit of international cooperation is wonderful, and I, like everyone, am cheering for our men and women to take home the gold. But I take special pride in the more than forty Texas athletes representing our country in over a dozen sports. I'll be rooting for them over the coming days. I know I won't be alone.

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AgriLife name to include A&M

COLLEGE STATION — Four state agricultural agencies — three of which have served Texans for about 100 years — are adding A&M to their names to reflect their connection to the system that includes Texas A&M University.

The new names — Texas A&M AgriLife Research, Texas A&M AgriLife Extension Service, Texas A&M Forest Service, and Texas A&M Veterinary Medical Diagnostic Laboratory — are among seven agencies that will change as of Sept. 1, following a vote Friday by the Texas A&M University System Board of Regents.

The changes were recommended by Texas A&M University System Chancellor John Sharp, who believed that the previous names of the agencies did not adequately benefit the statewide organization.

"There is no better set of agriculture and life sciences agencies in America, and I am confident the shared equity presented through a direct association with Texas

A&M will only enhance the already strong AgriLife brand. My goal is to enhance total brand equity and value," Sharp said.

According to the resolution adopted by the regents, "This lack of identification with the A&M System has the potential to cause confusion and to hinder A&M System and agency efforts to effectively communicate to constituents and stakeholders the mission, accomplishments and public benefit of individual agencies and how these correspond with the other A&M System agencies."

The other agency changes include Texas A&M Engineering Experiment Station, Texas A&M Engineering Extension Service and Texas A&M Transportation Institute.

Dr. Mark Hussey, vice chancellor and dean of agriculture and life sciences at Texas A&M, oversees the agricultural agencies and said the change is a boost for the science and educational programs conducted by AgriLife Research and AgriLife

Extension.

"Our clientele already know of the excellent research and educational efforts of our agencies," Hussey said. "This more obvious alignment with the A&M System will project the collaborations and cooperative efforts throughout the state."

AgriLife Research annually conducts more than \$150 million in agriculture and life sciences research in such areas as improving food and fiber production, enhancing human and animal health, and conserving water, soils, wildlife and other natural resources.

AgriLife Extension serves people in all 254 counties with objective, research-based education programs and services in agriculture and natural resources, 4-H and youth development, family and consumer sciences, and community economic development.

Better Business Bureau being attacked by spammers

The BBB is being attacked by spammers again. Be extremely careful of any email even if appears to be from a reliable company wanting your information. I use Suddenlink and get 5 to 50 a day. Although I carefully take my time to send them to spam they just keep returning. Hotmail users beware of a Spam or Phishing Spam that is hitting Clarendon. Received an email from Roger at the Enterprise asking if I would contact a lady who though that she was being Spammed. It sure looked like a spam. We worked on it to gather. It wanted her to change her password and she finally did. I hope she checks with Hotmail to see if they actually requested the change.

A new scam using the BBB name has been received by consumers and businesses across the U.S. and Canada...including many BBB offices!

How the Scam Works: Two versions of the email have been received. One claims to be following up on a complaint filed with BBB, the other is asking for updated

contact information "as a service to BBB Accredited Businesses."

Both are good fakes - they use correct grammar and follow formats often used by BBB, so they look quite realistic. Both refer the recipient to an online form, and the address appears to be that of a local BBB. However, if you hover your mouse over the web address (the part that begins with http), you can see that the real address is not BBB at all. Do not click on the link! The link actually takes you to a rogue website that downloads a Trojan virus on your computer.

New Gift Card Spam Emails

BBB joined Wal-Mart, Target and Best Buy as another established brand used to promote fake gift cards. Don't bother trying to redeem this offer. It's just a trick to get your email address, cell number and other personal information.

How the Scam Works: People nationwide are receiving emails informing them that Better Business Bureau is giving away \$1,000 Visa gift cards. Emails come from a variety of email addresses and contain different links, but all use a variation of the message below:

Go to the web address given in the email, and you will be asked to input information about your age, address, email and cell phone number. Given that the survey does not request your Social Security Number, banking information or ask you to download a malware file, it is not likely an attempt at ID theft. Rather, it's probably an unscrupulous way to collect consumer data, such as email addresses and phone numbers.

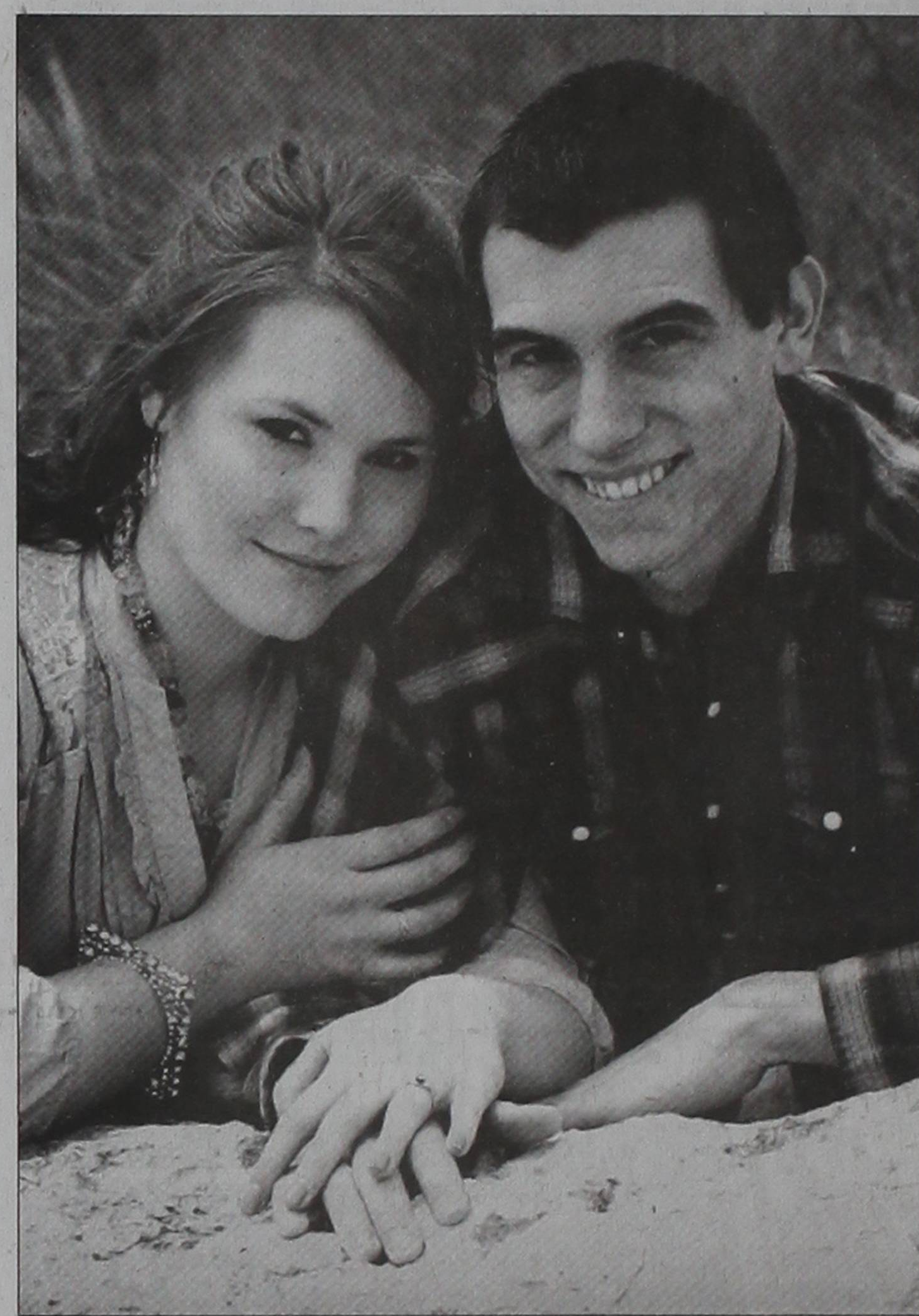

Maggie all in Goodnight, Texas. The family moved to Clarendon in or about 1945. I.B. and Jewel lived in Clarendon the rest of their lives.

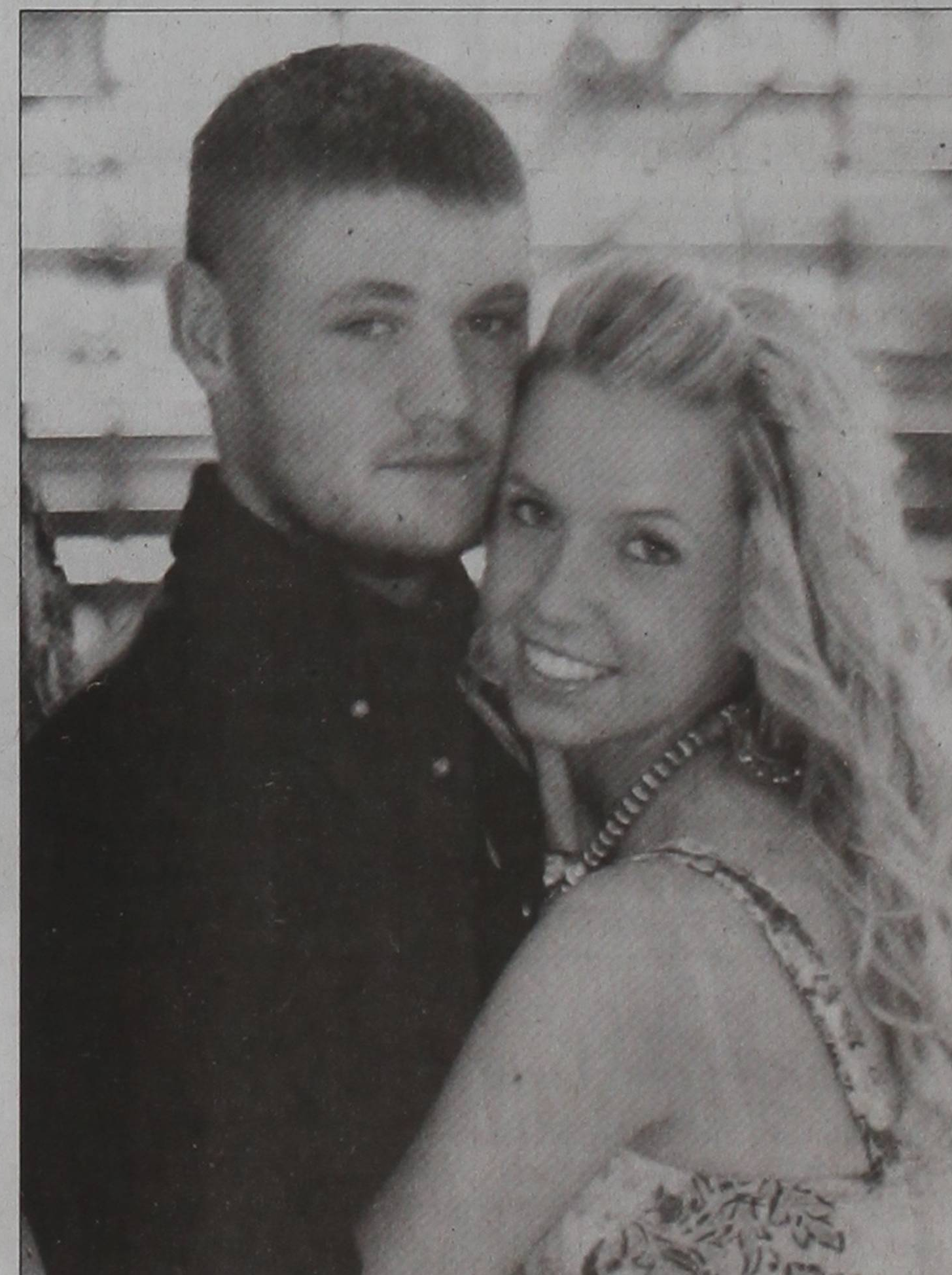

Drugs in the News

New Drug for Overactive Bladder Approved

Recently, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved Myrbetriq (mirabegron) to treat adults with overactive bladder, a condition in which the bladder muscle cannot be controlled, squeezes too often or squeezes without warning. Myrbetriq works by activating a protein receptor (beta-3 adrenergic receptor) in bladder muscles that relaxes them and helps the bladder fill and store urine. This medication minimizes the potential symptoms of needing to urinate too often and/or urgently, or the involuntary leakage of urine.

In clinical trials, a significant number of individuals treated with Myrbetriq showed an effective reduction in the frequency of urination. They also showed improvement in the storage capacity of the bladder. Myrbetriq comes as an extended-release tablet taken once daily. However, this medication is not recommended for use in those with severe uncontrolled high blood pressure, end stage kidney disease or severe liver impairment. Hopefully, the approval of Myrbetriq in the United States will help in improving the life style of individuals affected by overactive bladder condition.

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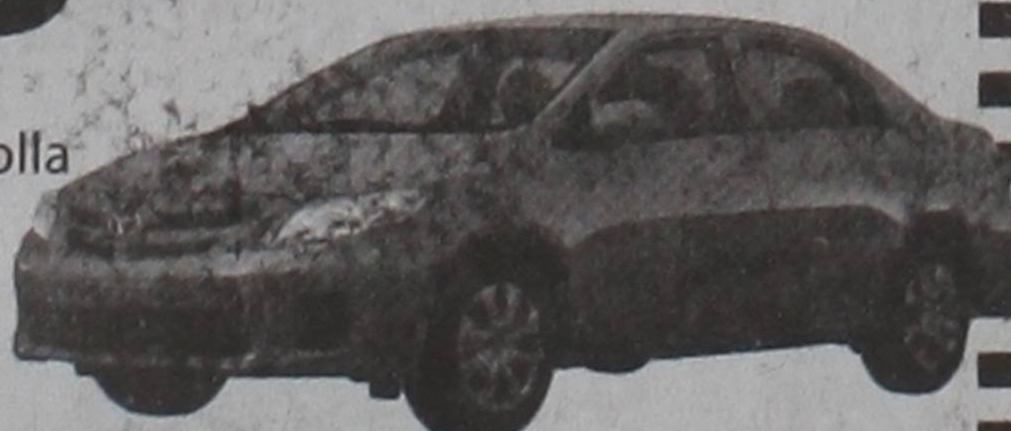
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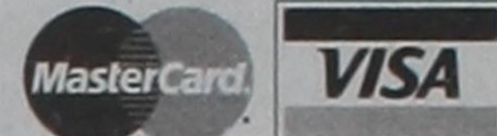
