Sales tax revenue up again

Hedley, Clarendon post higher returns

Clarendon's sales tax revenue ticked up for the second month in a row when Texas Comptroller Susan Combs delivered September allocations last week.

The city showed an increase for the month of 10.21 percent for a total of \$26,327.62 compared to \$23,886.43 for the same period one year ago.

The September allocation keeps the city just slightly ahead for its year-to-date figure with \$274,415.32 collected since January, which is up 0.97 percent from this same point in 2011.

Howardwick, which increased its sales tax rate last fall, posted an increase of 26.28 percent for the month with an allocation of \$1,555.09; and that city is running 25.22 percent for the year-to-date at \$14,134,31.

Hedley continued its trend of declining sales tax revenues, dropping 39.25 percent for the month to \$174.58 and now reporting a 32.94 decline for the year-to-date at \$4,035.62.

Statewide, Combs said sales tax revenue in September was \$1.96 billion, up 11.6 percent compared to September 2011.

"Continued strength in the manufacturing and oil and natural gas sectors led to the sales tax revenue increase," Combs said. "Collections were also boosted by improvement in consumer spending at restaurants and retail stores. State sales tax revenue has now increased for 30 straight months."

The sales tax figures represent monthly sales made in August.

Officials warn about cases of distemper

Local veterinarian Dr. Guy Ellis reports that there have been several cases of neurologic disease in raccoons recently in and around the Clarendon vicinity that has been diagnosed as canine distemper.

Dr. Ellis urges everyone to reduce exposure to wild animals and vaccinate pets to prevent this deadly disease.

Canine distemper is a highly contagious and sometimes fatal disease that is seen in dogs worldwide. Though its incidence has diminished greatly due to vaccination, distemper cases and outbreaks are still seen sporadically.

Canine distemper is caused by the canine distemper virus. This virus can also infect several other species including ferrets and wild animals such as coyotes, foxes, wolves, skunks, and raccoons. Animals usually become infected by direct contact with virus particles from the secretions of other infected animals (generally via inhalation). Indirect transmission (i.e., carried on dishes or other objects) is not common because the virus does not survive for long in the environment. The virus can be shed by dogs for several weeks after recovery.

Puppies under four months of age (before vaccinations are fully protective) and unvaccinated dogs are most at risk. Because canine distemper also occurs in wild animals, contact with wild animals may contribute to the spread of distemper to domestic dogs.

Canine distemper causes symptoms in multiple body systems, including the gastrointestinal tract, respiratory tract, and the brain and spinal cord. The appearance of symptoms and course of distemper can be variable, ranging from very

The scandal over Obama's 'intelligence'

The last few weeks have produced many intriguing political moments, but none as shocking as the revelation that President Obama has been absent from the vast majority of his daily intelligence briefings.

According to a study by the Government Accountability Institute, Obama failed to attend a single Presidential Daily Brief (PDB) in the week leading up to the recent anniversary of 9/11 and the chaos that erupted in the Arab world. The mere fact that we were approaching 9/11 was a crucial enough reason to attend not one but all the briefings. President Obama attended none.

Worse, this is apparently nothing new. Obama attended only 43.8 percent of his Daily Briefs in the first 1,225 days of his administration. For this year, he attended a little over a third.

This is stunning, and there's no excuse for it. Washington Post columnist, Marc Thiessen, who worked for President George W. Bush, pressed NSC spokesman Tommy Vietor for an explanation. Thiessen reported:

Vietor did not dispute the numbers, but said the fact that the president, during a time of war, does not attend his daily intelligence meeting on a daily basis is "not particularly interesting or useful." He says that the president reads his PDB every day, and he disagreed with the suggestion that there is any difference whatsoever between simply reading the briefing book and having an interactive discussion of its contents with top national security and intelligence officials where the president can probe assumptions and ask questions. "I actually don't agree at all," Vietor told me in an e-mail. "The president gets the information he needs from the intelligence community each day."

That's simply the White House covering for the president.

Similarly, White House spokesman Jay Carney dismissed the PDB charge as "hilarious." No, no, said Carney, the president "gets it every day." By "it," Carney was apparently talking about the intelligence briefing papers, not the actual meetings.

Pro-Obama journalists happily accepted Carney's explanation. CNN posted Carney's comments under a photo of a pensive Obama sitting at an intelligence briefing.

Sorry, but, once again, there's no excuse for this, especially in the post-9/11 world. George W. Bush not only didn't miss the PDB but actually expanded it to six meetings per week.

Consider, too, the case of Ronald Reagan, who liberals, ironically, portrayed as an uninformed idiot who didn't pay attention in meetings or read anything.

Reagan, in fact, attended the daily intelligence briefing. I could lay this out at length, but here I'll offer just two Reagan sources, both still living, who can speak to this:

One source is Herb Meyer, special assistant to CIA director Bill Casey in the 1980s. Meyer told me: "Of course Reagan attended all those daily briefings. And after the briefers returned to CIA headquarters, Bill [Casey] would meet with them just to be sure the president (and Haig & Weinberger) got answers to whatever questions they may have had. In short, it was a very - very - serious business."

Another source is Bill Clark. Clark was Ronald Reagan's right-hand man in foreign policy. As his biographer, I know Clark well. He is 80 years old and lives in California. Clark told me this about Reagan and the PDB:

Bill Casey would, by courier, send the President's Daily Brief each morning at about 5:00 a.m. to our war room downstairs in our [National] Security Council.... It would be delivered to the president in his residence before he came over [by 7:00 a.m.].... He'd write questions all over the margins about things that weren't clear in the briefing. And, of course, the agency [CIA] would come down with further explanations.

Clark recalls how Reagan craved that regular morning update. He would read it and then they would meet. Reagan ate up these briefings. He asked questions of his advisers. He probed for ideas. Reagan attended the briefings and used them as presidents should.

When Reagan finished his presidency, after two terms, genuine freedom and democracy were surging all over the communist world.

As for President Obama, if he's in the process of finishing his presidency, after one term, he's facing a surge of radical Islamic fundamentalism in the Middle East. Can any of that be blamed on Obama's failure to attend these routine briefings? Maybe, maybe not, but it certainly can't help.

In fact, as Marc Theissen and the Government Accountability Institute have noted in follow-up stories, Obama is now suddenly attending his daily briefing. That's no doubt a response to political criticism. But could it be - on the heels of the eruptions in Libya and Egypt, which Obama initially blamed not on pre-meditated terrorism but a video - that maybe President Obama feels like he might have been missing something?

Let's become tolerant of intolerance

Is there a way to overcome religious intolerance? In America, the question holds critical importance because American society is highly religious and remarkably diverse and - on religious matters - considerably more politically polarized than 25 years ago.

The United States prides itself on welcoming people of different faiths. The Bill of Rights begins with a guarantee of freedom of religion.

Over the last generation Americans have grown more comfortable talking about race, ethnicity, gender, and sexual orientation, but not faith. It's too personal and divisive - too explosive. We haven't completely figured out how to conduct a productive conversation among people whose cherished religious beliefs - exclusive God-given truths cannot be reconciled.

Many Americans harbor unfavorable attitudes toward those who harbor different beliefs, notably Muslims and Mormons, but also evangelical Christians, Catholics, Jews, and the most disdained group of all, atheists.


The Bill of Rights also promotes freedom of speech – even hateful speech. When it comes to free speech, it is always edifying to see how people deal with opinions, particularly religious opihions they despise.

Take for example, the members of the Westboro Baptist Church. That name always gets folks' blood boiling. Anyway, this group is based in Topeka, Kansas, and their point of view may reasonably be described as loathsome to most people in America.

Marxism - Groucho Marxism. "What-

ever it is, I'm against it," Groucho sang in "Horse Feathers." That pretty much sums up this ugly, hateful group. It seems to be antieverything and

is conspicu-



ously anti-gay and anti-Semitic, and has gone the extra mile to earn the scorn and contempt of most Americans by picketing the funerals of soldiers and Marines killed in combat. It calls those deaths God's punishment for America's acceptance of homosexuality.

Since being obnoxious and intolerant does not violate the Constitution, and since these people are clearly beyond reasoned argument, and since there are so few of them, you might have thought that a wise response would be to ignore them. That's what prudent people have sensibly urged. However, good, decent citizens- and more than a few indecent ones - have started gathering around to taunt the Topekans.

They do so in a manner that makes America an inspiration to the world: They shout sexually charged vulgarities and other choice insults and threats. These are not exactly teachable moments. Free expression has been reduced to distasteful simultaneous monologues between the bigoted and the crude.

speech' is exactly the cry of those who have long opposed positive social and cultural change."

Even so, isn't hate speech deplorable? Some people define hate speech as an opinion they dislike, Mr. Myers said. Besides, he said, "hate speech is not unconstitutional or illegal."

A censorious streak runs stubbornly through this country that regards itself as a bastion of tolerance. It has led to the removal of a billboard that challenged immigration policies and of another that quoted a biblical passage condemning homosexuality. It kept an antiwar message from being put up in Times Square during the 2004 Republican National Convention. It stripped shelters of notices about a free health care information line for gay men and lesbians. Many other examples abound.

Besides being "lazy and disreputable," censorship can boomerang, Mr. Myers cautioned. Let it prevail and there will be nothing to top other towns and cities from suppressing the speech that we revere - that in favor of pro-life, prochoice, pro-gay marriage, pro-defense of marriage act, plus many other examples.

Even though we may hate each other's hate speech, we must not become intolerant of intolerance. When we do that we get on that slippery slope that is a very real threat to our republic, and put democracy and the free exchange of ideas, regardless of how loathsome they may be, at great risk.



A challenge of global proportions

Gunmen stormed a school bus last Tuesday and shot a 14-year-old girl in the head. Her crime? Getting an educa-

tion. This seems almost inconceivable to those of us blessed to live in America, but in some areas of the globe, girls must risk their lives to get a basic education.

Malala Yousafzai became a prominent voice for girls' education in Pakistan after the Taliban seized control of her native Swat - once a tourist destination renowned for its scenery, culture and open-mindedness - and forced an end to education for women and girls. She brought insight to a tragic situation as the anonymous author of a blog for the BBC about her struggle for education and the fear of living under Taliban rule. In one entry, she wrote about girls sneaking off to class, wearing regular clothes instead of their school uniforms and hiding their books under their robes.

The blog received international attention and Malala became an outspoken advocate for children's rights. She was 11.

The Pakistani Army has since reclaimed Swat, clearing out the Taliban, and now maintains control over the region. But last Tuesday's attack was one of several in recent months, and there are fears the Taliban could be regaining momentum in the area.

The Taliban loudly claimed "credit" for the attack, saying they targeted Malala because, "She has become a symbol of Western culture in the area; she was openly

propagating it." It is evidence of comment the cowardice, by sen. kay bailey hutchison impotence and

ignorance of the Taliban that a 14-yearold child could pose such an immense threat. But that is the nature of truth, equality, and democratic ideals - they shed light in the corners of the world that people like the Taliban wish to keep in darkness.

Malala Yousafzai puts a human face on the grim education statistics in developing countries. (The expected length of schooling for girls in Pakistan is six years. In Niger it is five, and in Somalia it is two.) Her bravery and struggle alone should compel us to work for greater inclusion of women and girls in education.

But there is also the practical consideration that the health of these countries, both socially and economically, depends on an educated female populace. There is no developed country on Earth that does not have full gender equality - access to education, enfranchisement, civil liberties; it is an essential component of being a firstworld nation.

Women make up half the world's population. Excluding them from participation in everyday life prevents them from contributing to the strength of the economy, by rendering them unable to act as full consumers and depriving the workforce of 50 percent of its talent pool. Uneducated women are also less healthy, have more children at a younger age - who are also less healthy than their educated counterparts - and are less likely to keep their children in school, creating a cycle of poverty that is virtually unbreakable.

According to a recent working paper by the World Bank, "Closing the inactivity rate between girls and boys would increase gross domestic product by up to 5.4 percent."

The paper concurs with the conclusion of another study: "societies that have a preference for not investing in girls pay a price for it in terms of slower growth and reduced income."

Malala Yousafzai is just one of 600 million girls living in developing countries. Her bravery and eloquence at such a young age has brought international attention to a global problem. We can only hope that attention will stay focused. Malala had the courage to stand up to the Taliban; the rest of the world should have the courage to stand up for what is right.

Top 4H members recognized at Gold **Star Banquet**

AMARILLO - Twenty-seven outstanding 4-H members from the Panhandle area were honored at the 55th annual Gold Star Banquet for District I on Oct. 15 at the Alumni Banquet Facility of West Texas A&M University in Canyon.







Drugs in the News

New Drug Approved for Multiple Sclerosis Recently, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved

Aubagio (teriflunomide) to treat relapsing forms of MS (multiple sclerosis) in adults. Multiple sclerosis is an autoimmune, inflammatory condition that affects the brain and spinal cord. It is characterized by disturbance in the communication between the brain and other parts of the body. MS is one of the most common causes of neurological disability in young adults. People with this condition have episodes of relapses (worsening), followed by remissions (recovery). Fever, hot baths, sun exposure, and stress can trigger or worsen relapsing attacks. The exact mechanism by which Aubagio treats multiple sclerosis is unknown but may involve a reduction in the number of activated lymphocytes in the central nervous system.

In clinical trials, Aubagio significantly reduced both the relapsing rate and the active lesions per brain MRI scan. Aubagio is supplied as a once daily tablet for oral administration. Aubagio is intended only to be used for the initial relapsing phases of multiple sclerosis.

Vaccination is effective at preventing distemper. Puppies are typically vaccinated starting at 6 weeks of age and at regular intervals (every 2-4 weeks) until they are 14-16 weeks old (as with other vaccines, presence of antibodies received from the mother can interfere with vaccines so a puppy is not considered fully protected until the final vaccine in the series has been given). Vaccination should be repeated a year later, then at regular intervals.

About The Course:

As an American, the Second Amendment gives you the right to bear arms. As a citizen, you have the right to protect yourself, your loved ones, and your property.

CHL Classes offer you the opportunity to get the required education and gun qualification to obtain a Concealed Handgun License from the State of Texas, which can help better protect yourself and your family. It gives you that sense of additional security---at home or away.

The state requires a minimum of 10 hours instruction, including gun qualification. The classroom part of the program is normally 8 hours and includes information about laws, use of force, conflict resolution, CHL responsibilities, gun safety, and other information that you will find useful.

Classes are held on Saturdays from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. with gun qualification from 5-6:30 p.m. Lunch is provided during the one-day classes.

We have access to two very good gun ranges: In Borger, we utilize the Canadian River Archery & Gun Club, located north of Borger off of State Highway 207. In Pampa, we use the Pampa Rifle & Pistol Club ranges (indoor at Recreation Park and outdoor range on County Road D). (http://pamparifleandpistolclubinc.com/nra.html)

To qualify you will need a 32 caliber or larger gun. If you qualify with a revolver, you can

only carry a revolver (and/or a derringer). If you qualify with a semi-automatic, you may carry a revolver or a semi-automatic as a Concealed Handgun Licensee.

What To Bring: All you need is a gun, 50 rounds

of ammo, eye protection (safety glasses, sun glasses, or regular glasses), and ear protection. If you don't have a gun, arrangements can be made. Cost of CHL class is \$75 for new applicants, \$50 for renewals. 1. I am at least 21 years of age or I am 18 to 20 years of age 11. I am not currently restricted and am eligible under Section 411.172(g) (military excep-

8. I am fully qualified under applicable federal and state laws to purchase a handgun.

9. I have not been finally determined to be delinquent in making child support payments administered or collected by the attorney general. 10. I have not been finally de-

termined to be delinquent in the payment of taxes or other money collected by the comptroller, state treasurer, or tax collector of any agency or political subdivision of this state (or state of residence for nonresident applicants).





Clarendon Church of Christ STANDARDS AND TOLERANCE

I have been educated the past 2 weeks about the world's definitions of standards and tolerance. Much of the world believes that we each have our own standard and that we should all be tolerant of it. But, if your standard is the word of God, then the world's definition of that standard is hate. I've been told lately that everyone should be free to live the way he or she wants and be able to say what we want, unless you are a Christian. I've heard from people, coast to coast, who say Christians have no right to speak out against others, while, ironically, they spoke out against me and my brethren. It would be funny if it wasn't so tragic.

This isn't new, but is a timeless position of those who do not respect God and His word. Not only do many not believe in God's word and standards but actually propose sinful things as being good and right. (Isaiah 5:20) "Woe to those who call evil good, and good evil; Who put darkness for light, and light for darkness; Who put bitter for sweet, and sweet for bitter!"

Ask yourself, "What standard should we live by if there is no God?" Hitler and Nazi Germany decided that it was a good thing to murder millions of people. It became their law. Who had the right to go in and tell them different? If murder is wrong, and it is, who made it wrong? And by what authority did anyone pronounce it to be wrong? Was it a man? If so, where did he get that idea? I know that I've asked a lot of questions, but the point is that if everyone has his or her own standard, then mine is as good as yours. No one should fall out with me if my standard is different. Deep down, people know better. Deep down, they know we all answer to a higher power. Many do not want to acknowledge Him. He is Jehovah God, the Creator of the universe. He is the Lawgiver. He is the great I am.

He may be ignored for a while. People can delude themselves into believing that they don't have to answer to Him, but they will. (Romans 14:11) For it is written: "As I live, says the LORD, Every knee shall bow to Me, And every tongue shall confess to God." (1 Corinthians 6:9-10) "Do you not know that the unrighteous will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived. Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor homosexuals, nor sodomites, nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners will inherit the kingdom of God." Of course there are other sins not listed there. We've all been guilty of one or more. But here's the difference in the world and a Christian, a Christian is a sinner who has acknowledged it before God and repents of it. Listen to the next verse Paul wrote to the Corinthians. (1 Corinthians 6:11) "And such were some of you. But you were washed, but you were sanctified, but you were justified in the name of the Lord Jesus and by the Spirit of our God." The key word in that sentence is WERE. It is past tense. Those terrible sins were now in their past. Somebody had to teach, preach, or speak against those things for them to make a change. 

of two years for the state jail felony offense of evading arrest. Brown pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Brown, 26-year-old resident of Childress, was arrested in Childress County by Childress Police Sergeant Justin Hunter for the offense that took place March 10, 2012. Brown was indicted by a Childress County Grand Jury on June 25, 2012.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Brown is required to pay a \$1,000 fine to Childress County, and is also required to pay \$385.50 in court costs. If Brown violates probation, he could face up to 2 years in the State Jail Division of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice.

Clinton John Stevens was convicted for the state jail felony offense of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. Stevens pleaded guilty and was convicted and sentenced to six months in the Donley County Jail.

Stevens, 35-year-old resident of Wichita Falls, was arrested in Donley County for the offense that took place June 22, 2010 and pleaded guilty to a complaint filed by the State on August 12, 2010.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Stevens is required to pay \$473 in court costs.

Shayne Aric Spindler was placed on probation for a period of four years for the third degree felony offense of money laundering. Spindler pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

The 26-year-old Spindler was arrested in Hall County by Estelline Chief of Police Mike Warren for the offense that took place May 23. 2012. Spindler pleaded guilty to a complaint filed by the State on September 24, 2012.

Laura Hommel King was convicted for the third degree felony offense of aggregated theft. King pleaded guilty and was convicted and sentenced to five years in the Institutional Division of TDCJ after a contested punishment hearing.

King, 33-year-old resident of Clarendon, was arrested in Donley County by Donley County Sheriff Charles "Butch" Blackburn for the offense that took place June 7, 2011.

King was indicted by a Donley County Grand Jury on August 29, 2012.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, King is required to pay \$473 in court costs and \$51,902.81 restitution.
