# Steam engine rolls into town

#### **Union Pacific** celebrates its 150th birthday

The smoke, the steam, and a loud, long whistle that only a few folks had heard before. A piece of railroad history steamed into Clarendon Saturday morning and gave residents a glimpse at what life might have been like seven decades

Union Pacific's last steam engine, No. 844, was greeted by a large crowd as the gigantic locomotive stopped at the Kearney Street cross just a few feet from where the old Ft. Worth & Denver Depot stood for years. In addition to local kids of all ages, the train was greeted by railroad enthusiasts from as far away as Lubbock who eagerly took pictures and videos of the rare occasion.

It's not clear when the last steam engine rolled through Clarendon. One Enterprise reader said they recalled one in about 1966 or 67, and one railroad enthusiast website says the American Freedom Train steamed up "the Denver Road" in 1976.

No. 844, which was built for UP in 1944, was on the final leg of its nationwide tour, celebrating the company's 150th anniversary. The 454-ton train left its home in Wyoming in March to begin crisscrossing America. It left Houston on October 27 on the sixth and final leg of its anniversary tour and will arrive back in Cheyenne on November 8.

Crew members told the Enterprise they were enjoying their tour but were ready to get back home. The railroad periodically flies family members to meet up with them, they said.

A high-speed passenger engine, the 844 pulled such widely known trains as the Overland Limited, Los Angeles Limited, Portland Rose and Challenger. When diesels took over all of the passenger train duties, No. 844 was placed in freight service in Nebraska between 1957 and 1959. It was saved from being scrapped in 1960 and held for special service. Since then it has served as the company's goodwill ambassador. Several passenger cars also made the tour. When it gets home on Thursday, it will have traveled 13,000 miles on this tour.

It was 150 years ago that Abraham Lincoln signed the Pacific Railway Act of July 1, 1862, creating the original Union Pacific. To learn more, visit www.UP150.com.

# Ceremonies planned to honor vets

Veterans of the United States' armed forces will be honored during several public ceremonies in Donley County over a four day period.

The first service will be held at 10 a.m. Friday, November 9, by the Adamson-Lane Post 287 of the American Legion at the Rowe Cemetery near Hedley. Prior to the service, post members will place flags on the graves of 220 veterans buried in that cemetery, and the flags will remain there through November 11.

The Friday service will be conducted by members of the Legion, and William S. Thompson, who served in the US Army from 1984 to 1992, will deliver the address. ·Thompson received his officer's commission and served in many positions within the Fourth Infantry Division, 56th Field Artillery Command and the Seventh Corps Support Group throughout his career. In November 1991, as a captain, his unit was deployed from Crailsheim, Germany, to Operation Desert Shield /Desert Storm in Saudi Arabia.

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# Clarendon must focus on improving

At a meeting in Amarillo Monday, community leaders from across the Panhandle gathered to discuss the problems facing their towns and ideas for how to raise funds for those programs.

Your humble editor represented the Clarendon Economic Development Corporation at the meeting, which was hosted by the Amarillo Area Foundation. To kick off the morning, participants were asked to do a "dreaming" exercise. "What would you do," the speaker asked, "if I gave you \$1 million a year to do anything you wanted to in your

community?"

The wheels began turning for 30-plus people in the room, and we soon each had a list that filled an entire page. As participants took turns giving ideas from their lists, it became clear that we all face many of the same problems. From Tulia to Childress to

Pampa to Spearman to Chillicothe, towns of all sizes are grappling with the same issues that Clarendon faces. Each community wants more "quality of life" improvements - whether it be youth centers, park facilities, or entertainment venues. Each place has infrastructure needs and must consider how best to use the tax dollars at their disposal, and in almost every town there is a shortage of good, middle-income housing.

One participant blamed part of his town's problems on previous community leaders who failed to plan for growth and failed to give the present generation the tools necessary to address the problems of today.

And that, dear readers, is where Clarendon now finds itself

We have been shortchanged, in many ways, by city leaders over the last 20 or 30 or more years who failed to stringently enforce zoning, and codes, and ordinances, who were perhaps too complacent when it came to taking care of infrastructure, and who have left us a city that needs new streets, new water and sewer lines, and a firm hand when it comes to enforcing the rules.


This situation has left Clarendon in a position where it largely tries to just patch things together and hobble along because it doesn't have the funds to address any one issue. The city is spending about \$25,000, for example, on a comprehensive study of its waterworks, but what will we do when it is completed? It's going to take money and a lot of it before the discolored water experienced by some citizens can be permanently fixed.


Our current city leaders allow themselves to get bogged down in the political nonsense of whether the city administrator should attend professional conferences or other trivial pursuits when they should be focused on what can we do long term to improve our city.

Instead, City Hall is embroiled in the fate of City Administrator Lambert Little and faces the real prospect of losing yet another administrator. Little's exit would no doubt please some people; but while he has made mistakes, it is unlikely that any man - or woman - can come in here and fix in one or two years the mess that has been created over a couple of generations. And probably no city administrator could ever please some people who essentially want to run this city by committee (the board) instead of letting a professional do what needs to be done.

We need to set all this aside and start looking to the future. We need to put aside the negative attitudes of the complainers and realize that we're going to have to raise taxes because it takes money to fix problems. We're going to have to be pro-active in cleaning up this city and every person here has to come to understand that we all have a stake in making things better. Whether it's a citizen simply cleaning up a vacant lot or a city employee putting up street signs, all the little things that we can do will make a big impact. And we have to dream big to make this the city it ought to be.

Clarendon has a lot of positive things, and this column has talked about all of them in the past. But we need to build on those and actively work to make things better. That should be the focus of the city and its citizens.





# Halleluiah! The elections are over!



This election may go down in history as the moment when truth and lies lost both their honor and stigma, respectively. The Mittster has demonstrated an unrepentant willingness to say anything and everything to win this election. Yet he is running dead even with the presi-

dent, who's lies and untruths are not quite so flagrant, but just as destructive to our trust in the demo-

The list of the candidates' out-andout lies is too long to list here. Neither candidate wouldn't acknowledge the truth if it bit him on the butt. They seem to have decided that the only things standing between them and the White House are those irksome little facts. They continue to roll right over them. Perhaps Jack Nicholson was correct when he uttered, "You can't handle the truth," in his role in the movie A Few Good Men.

The question becomes: will this outrageous tactic work?

There is a growing body of evidence that suggests that facts and the people who check them don't carry the same weight that they once did.

The extremist on the far right and far left have created marvelous disinformation machines, which both explicitly and implicitly make the argument that facts are exchangeable and have been co-opted by nefarious operatives on the other side. Both sides have declared war on facts in what they claim is an unscrupulous war on the truth. This is patiently false and untrue, but it works on some.

How is it that so many people are willing to support men who they don't believe are honest and trustworthy? Voters also don't really believe that Obama and Romney really care about their problems. Who votes for men who

they think don't care about them?

Knowing what we know about the president and Governor Romney we must ask ourselves this question: are we granting them the liberty to lie? If so, why?

Until We the People rise up as one as say, "enough is enough," this absurd folly will continue.

Now, I realize that in days gone by, politicians conducted venomous personal attacks on each other. James Madison, in one election, was accused of pimping out Dolly and her sisters for votes. Accusations of miscegenation (which later proved to be true) were directed against Jefferson. Jefferson's supporters flung accusations of bestiality and other assorted sordid activities at John Adams, at one time or another.

Adams' supporters responded by slamming Jefferson with, "Jefferson is an atheist, mean-spirited, low-lived fellow, the son of a half-breed squaw, sired by a Virginia mulatto father." Unfortunately, such a sacrifice is not unknown to our modern campaigns as we continue to witness the intense desire of political hopefuls (presidential, congressional, and state) who seem willing to sacrifice anything - their families, friends, and even their integrity to get elected. 

In response to the November 1 letter to the editor from Gary "Punk" Campbell:

Having been associated with the Texas Historical Commission's Heritage Trail Program, we take great pride in informing outsiders about the importance of individuals whose rural lifestyles greatly contributed to creating our great state.

The rural tourism project for our area of the Texas Plains Trail Region is called the Quanah Parker Trail. Each county will install a metal sculpture representative of a Comanche arrow (22ft. long) at a historic or general location in the county. The objective is threefold: 1) To establish a direct relationship with surrounding counties and communities to build a partnership to enhance economic growth through rural tourism; 2) To educate citizens of the county, students, visitors and officials at large to the historic significance of each region; and 3) To honor and illuminate the history of Quanah Parker (warrior, cattleman and Native American statesman) and the Southern Plains Comanche by museum displays of cultural artifacts, tours to historical landmarks, lectures, presentations and festivals.

Quanah Parker convinced his tribe that they must give up the Indian way of life and adapt to the ways of the white man or they would eventually all be killed. They moved to the Reservation in Ft. Sill, Oklahoma, for they were tired of running. As a guest of Col. Charles Goodnight, Quanah Parker returned to Donley County for one last buffalo hunt.

The location for placement of the Quanah Parker arrow is undecided at this time.


Clarendon's newspaper was established as The Clarendon News on June 1, 1878, at Old Clarendon by Rev. L.H. Carhart. It was the first newspaper in the Texas Panhandle. In 1887, the paper moved to New Clarendon under the direction of publisher William Grant when the town moved to the railroad. Over the years, the paper operated in several locations under different names and owners. The Estlack Family published The Donley County Leader from 1929 to 1974 before selling it to Dean Singleton's Clarendon Press. 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





score of 135 and there was a tie for second place between Bo Morrison and Tom Stauder and Bruce Ferguson and Kevin Wood with a 137.


Bob Permenter and Dan Luther won the third flight with a 146. Bret and Randy White finished second at 147, and John Myers and Tony Hoover took third with a 154.







# Drugs in the News

Heart Attack Stroke Prevention with Multi-Drug Pill

According to the results of a study discussed in a recent issue of the online journal PloS One, a multi-drug pill given to study subjects over the age of 50, produced a significant drop in LDL cholesterol and blood pressure at the end of a three month period. The pill, which is referred to as the Polypill, consists of four drugs, three for lowering a person's blood pressure and one drug for reducing LDL cholesterol. They include losartan, hydrochlorothiazde, amlodipine, and simvastatin.

Researchers connected with the study at the Wolfson Institute of Preventative Medicine and The London School of Medicine & Dentistry feel their findings will lead to a sixty or greater percentage cut in the rate of heart attacks and strokes worldwide. They also indicate that the Polypill would be beneficial, even if it was not taken until people were 50 years of age. Other health experts are being more cautious, saying that medicines are no substitute for the promotion of healthy life styles (diet, exercise and not smoking) among all age groups.

# Be aware of wildfire threat during hunting season

COLLEGE STATION – With hunting season under way and some areas of the state still recovering from last year's drought, Texas Forest Service officials are urging caution for those heading outdoors.

Hunters should refrain from building campfires and burning debris during windy or dry conditions. More than 90 Texas counties currently are under a burn ban.

Keep in mind the following wildfire safety tips:

• If there is no burn ban in place and conditions are right, you may safely build a campfire. But keep the fire small, never leave it unattended and remove flammable leaves and other materials from the area surrounding the fire.

• Make sure the fire is extinguished and cold to the touch before you leave it.

 Clear combustible materials and vegetation away from your camp house to reduce the likelihood of a wildfire to spread.


• Keep water nearby when welding on stands.

• Drive only on designated trails. Don't park or idle vehicles in tall, dry grass, which can be ignited by contact with a hot muffler.

Use caution with cigarettes and matches.

• Use spark arresters on all power equipment.






Troy Wilson, a Vietnam War Veteran. Ernie Houdashell, Randall County Judge and Vietnam War Veteran will be the guest speaker.

Refreshments will be provided after the celebration by the VFW Ladies Auxiliary. This program will honor veterans of all wars and everyone in the community is invited to attend.



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


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
