### Man charged with child sex assault

A former Donley County resident this week is facing felony charges of sexually assaulting a child.

Gregory Dwayne Beall, age 45, was arrested in Marion, Ark., last Thursday, February 7, on a Donley County warrant, Sheriff Butch Blackburn said.

Beall is alleged to have had sexual contact and intercourse with a seven-year-old girl in January of 2011.

The suspect was booked into the county jail on February 9 and arraigned Monday on the first degree felony offense. Bail was set at \$100,000, and Beall remained in jail at press time.

## Candidates still applying for elections

A few more candidates have joined the races for local offices, but only one board has enough candidates to hold an election at this point.

The City, of Howardwick was still leading the candidate count at eight with David P. Cafferata and former alderman Mike Rowland running for mayor; William R. Jordan, Gail Leathers, and Jim Cockerham running for two vacant full terms on the Board of Aldermen; and Alderman Gene Rogers, Cory Longan, former mayor H.L. "Buster" Baird, and Sandy Sanders vying for two unexpired terms.

In Clarendon, Sandy Skelton has thrown his hat in the ring this week for one of the two full terms up on the Board of Aldermen. Mayor Larry Hicks filed to run for re-election previously.

Two incumbents on the Clarendon ISD Board of Trustees have filed the paperwork to run for their offices again. Robin Ellis and James Shelton are seeking re-election. There are three seats up on that board this year.

Hedley ISD has two terms up this year on its Board of Trustees, and incumbent Bonnie Walsh was the only candidate as of Tuesday.

As of Tuesday morning, the Donley County Hospital District still reported having just three candidates, one for each of the expiring seats. Incumbents Wayne Tubbs (Place 1) and Melinda McAnear (Place 3) are seeking re-election on the hospital board, which oversees emergency medical services and indigent care in the county. Carey Wann is also seeking the Place 2 seat currently held by Bob Watson.

The City of Hedley has three positions open on its Board of Aldermen this year but had no candidates as of Tuesday.

All local offices are elected at-large, but hospital board candidates must sign up for a specific place.

Sign up continues through March 1, 2013; and the elections will be held Saturday, May 11.

## Wellington residents make pleas

Two Wellington residents accepted plea agreements on drugrelated charges when the 100th District Court met in Clarendon on Wednesday, January 30.

District Attorney Luke Inman prosecuted the cases for the State of Texas with the Honorable Judge Stuart Messer presiding.

A total of \$10,000 in fines was assessed as a result of the pleas that took place on January 30. In addition to the fines, the defendants were required to pay a total of \$752 in court costs and \$280 restitution.

Ramon Herrera was placed on probation for a period of six years for the second degree felony offense of possession of a controlled substance. Herrera pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

"The Collingsworth County Sheriff's Office did an excellent job in this investigation acting on information they received and moving forward to locate illegal controlled substances in this county," said Inman.

Herrera, 53-year-old resident of Wellington, was arrested in Collingsworth County for the offense that took place on January 24, 2013, and pleaded guilty to a complaint filed by the State on January 29,



## **Erasing Reagan:** The illiberal war on truth

The prospect of four more years of Barack Obama in the White House has caused several conservative voices (among them, The Wall Street Journal's Daniel Henninger, Fox News commentator Charles Krauthammer, and noted Ronald Reagan scholar Paul Kengor) to opine that President Obama's second term portends the passing of the Reagan era, the reversal of his pro-growth policies and the attempted burial of Reagan's credo, "government is the problem."

None of this is news. It is a given that Obama and his fellow progressives reject Reagan's values and philosophy. They will continue to try to expand government.

There is, however, a more sinister dimension to the progressive agenda: Rush Limbaugh asserted that Team Obama wants to "erase every trace of Reagan from America"-not just to repeal and reverse Reagan's policies, but to engage in wholesale historical revisionism by obfuscating Reagan's record and reshaping public opinion about him. It serves the progressives' interests if they can obscure the fact that Reagan's policies of lower tax rates, a sound dollar, and reductions in governmental regulatory micromanagement enhanced prosperity and raised standards of living. Those of us who lived through the Reagan years remember the resulting economic growth, but nobody under the age of 30 has first-hand knowledge of those years.

Is it really possible that the left could rewrite the history of the Reagan presidency? Absolutely. They've already perverted the record of earlier Republican presidents. Take, as Exhibit A, Warren G. Hardingthe president who always appears at the bottom of presidential rankings.

Yes, I know there were a couple of crooks in Harding's cabinet. Those odious men betrayed the trust of both a president and a nation. But while they gained a few hundred thousand dollars, Harding's policies enriched the American people by billions. Harding entered office in the midst of the Depression of 1920-21—a downturn as rapid and severe as any in American history, with GNP contracting 24 percent and unemployment more than doubling to 11.7 percent.

Harding's policy response was to get government out of the way and let free markets make the necessary adjustments. He induced Congress to slash federal spending by 40 percent in two years and lower the top marginal tax rate from 73 percent to 56 percent (on its way down to 25 percent under his successor, Calvin Coolidge). Demonstrating the fallacy of the Keynesian dogma that government should increase spending and deficits to cure recessions, the Harding spending cuts yielded large surpluses (used to pay down World War I indebtedness), and yet, by 1922, GDP was rising and unemployment falling, plummeting to a minuscule 2.4 percent by 1923. Maybe Harding wasn't the best judge of character, but his economic program was arguably the most successful of any president in the 20th century. A "terrible" president? Absurd.

Another example of historical revisionism, progressive-style, involves Herbert Hoover. Today's students are routinely taught that Hoover was the last of the "laissez faire" presidents. Last year, progressives produced a "take back the American dream" special edition of "The Big Picture," during which the host denigrated the alleged laissez faire trio of Harding, Coolidge, and Hoover, contrasting them with the great economic savior, Franklin Roosevelt. Part of the error is simple partisan bias—i.e., Republicans are bad and Democrats are good-but party aside, Hoover should have been lumped with FDR, not with his two predecessors. Harding and Coolidge truly were sympathetic to free markets. Hoover was not. He disdained and distrusted the laissez faire philosophy, and was almost as much of an interventionist as Roosevelt. Indeed, FDR's own advisers recorded in their memoirs that the true originator of the New Deal was Hoover. It is political propaganda, not historical verisimilitude, which paints Hoover as a clone of his predecessors rather than of his successor.

The lesson is clear: If those who understood and approved of Reagan's policies fail to reiterate Reagan's beliefs and policies, Reagan's progressive opponents will distort his history, and he eventually will be as misunderstood as Harding and Hoover are today.

The progressive war against historical accuracy should concern all American citizens. When those in power mutilate truth, the welfare of the people is at risk. Think of what all the illiberal movements whether fascist, socialist, communist, environmentalist, or progressive—have in common. All exalt state power at the expense of the individual rights of liberty, property, and ultimately life itself. In the effort to attain that power, they also commit depredations on truth, as George Orwell warned in "1984." Watch to see how often Team Obama employs the Big Lie technique in attempting to revise Reagan's record.

Whether we agree or disagree with what Ronald Reagan did, we shouldn't let anyone lie about it. Falsehood is the enemy of human progress.

It is commonly accepted that Saint Valentine was persecuted as a Christian and personally interrogated by Roman Emperor Claudius II. Claudius was personally impressed by Valentine and carried on a series of discussions with him, hoping to convert him to follow the law of the land and convert to paganism, thus saving his life. Unfortunately, St. Valentine refused his offer and had the gall to try to convert Claudius to Christianity, which proved to be a less than prudent decision. Claudius became livid with St. Valentine and sentenced him to death, affording him the opportunity to send the first valentine to the daughter of his jailer.

## Searching for the City on a Hill

One of the most widely employed metaphors in today's American political discourse is that the United States is a "city on a hill." Especially popularized by Ronald Reagan, this phrase (taken from Matthew chapter 5) has been used by countless politicians, journalists, and historians in recent decades to describe America's mission in the world. Its origin is John Winthrop's 1630 sermon titled "A Model of Christian Charity," which explained what the Puritans who settled Massachusetts Bay Colony sought to create—a godly community that furnished a model of Christian love and liberty.

Richard Gamble shows in his recent book, "In Search of the City on a Hill: The Making and Unmaking of an American Myth" (Continuum, August 2012), that the common assumption of this phrase being employed continuously and frequently from Winthrop to Reagan is false. Only since the 1950s have pastors, politicians, and historians made Winthrop's sermon one of our nation's most hallowed documents. In the process, Gamble contends, they transformed Jesus' metaphor that applies to the church (along with being light and salt in the world) into a national myth about America's alleged goal.

Gamble explains that the primary purpose of Winthrop's sermon was to argue that Massachusetts Bay Colony should model Christian love and base aspects of its life on biblical teaching. Winthrop's statement was a proclamation, not a prediction. Their migration to the new world and effort to establish a righteous community inescapably made the Puritans a visible city that could either be a model of God's blessing or chastisement depending on their conduct.

There's no extant evidence, Gamble claims, of anyone quoting from Winthrop's sermon before 1838. For two centuries, apparently no one saw his sermon as a prophecy of America's divine destiny to be a great nation. Throughout the 19th century, many prominent Americans also used Jesus' metaphor to applaud or admonish various cities, states, or the nation without referring to Winthrop. Between 1860 and 1930 "A Model of Christian Charity" gradually became widely analyzed in studying the early history of the Puritans. However, while orators,

historians, and biographers underscored the sermon's emphasis on Christian love, brotherhood, and establishing a righteous community, they did not connect the city on a hill metaphor with America's messianic mission or exceptional destiny.

In the 1950s, however, prominent historians Perry Miller and Daniel Boorstin sought to make the city on the hill image the "keynote of American history," and a 1961 address by John F. Kennedy propelled this powerful symbol into contemporary American politics.

Reagan, in dozens of speeches between 1969 and 1989, converted Jesus' metaphor into a succinct summary of what he hoped the United States would become-"a shining city on a hill" that promoted economic growth, democracy, and peace around the world. Reagan made this metaphor essential to American identity and the nation's civil religion. As a result, since the 1980s Republicans and Democrats have asserted that "America, from its earliest days, was destined to be a city on a hill." Both the political right and left have crafted "secularized, politicized versions" of Winthrop's statement without questioning whether it is proper to apply this label to our nation.

Moreover, numerous politicians, scholars, and pundits today use the phrase to applaud or critique America's domestic or foreign policies. They argue that the Puritans either set the United States on the path toward civic and religious freedom, democracy, and humanitarianism or toward "capitalistic exploitation," "messianic delusions,"

and interference in the affairs of other nations. As an independent nation, and especially as a global superpower after World War II, the United States has clearly been a city on a hill in terms of the attention and scrutiny it has received, but this does not prove, Gamble argues, that it is specially chosen by God to accomplish His purposes.

Gamble analyzes how Americans have manipulated this metaphor to serve their own purposes and explains how the metaphor's meaning has changed throughout American history.

Gamble could have noted that some evangelicals, most notably Gregory Boyd and Richard Hughes, have strongly criticized the typical evangelical understanding of American exceptionalism.

Gamble's book is a clarion call to reassess whether and how America is indeed exceptional. Does it have a special relationship to God and a divinely-appointed mission in the world? He faults Christians for both misapplying the city on a hill metaphor and failing to recognize America's shortcomings and "lust for domination." He correctly challenges Christians to untangle the metaphor from its association with the United States and employ it where it properly belongs—to the worldwide church.

Malinda Herrera was placed on probation for a period of four years for the second degree felony offense of possession of a controlled substance. Herrera pleaded guilty and was placed on deferred adjudication for the offense.

Herrera, 35-year-old resident of Wellington, was arrested in Collingsworth County for the offense that took place on January 24, 2013, and pleaded guilty to a complaint filed by the State on January 29, 2013.

Pursuant to the plea agreement, Herrera is required to pay a \$4,000 fine to Collingsworth County, \$376 in court costs, \$140 restitution, and successfully complete 300 hours of community service. If Herrera violates probation, she could face up to 20 years in the Institutional Division of the TDCJ.

Both arrests occurred after Collingsworth County Deputy Larry Ashurst executed a search warrant on Herrera's house located at 1001 El Paso Street, in Wellington, Texas, according to court documents.

Cocaine and methamphetamines were located in the house, according to Inman.



Drugs in the News

FDA Approves Drug for Multi-Drug Resistant Tuberculosis


Recently, the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) approved Sirturo (bedaquiline) to treat adults who have what is called multidrug resistant pulmonary tuberculosis (TB). In clinical trials, Sirturo showed significant reduction in the length of time it took for a person's sputum to be free of Mycobacterium tuberculosis. The most common side effects for Sirturo are nausea, joint pain, and headache. In addition, the FDA indicated that Sirturo should be used appropriately and only in individuals who don't have other treatment options.

TB is one of the world's deadliest infectious diseases caused by various strains of mycobacteria, usually M. tuberculosis. It is spread through the air from infected individuals to others. TB usually affects the lungs, but it can also affect other parts of the body such as the brain and kidneys. Isonazid and Rifampin are two powerful drugs most commonly used to treat TB, however, some multi-drug resistant TB strains become resistant to these drugs, and they pose a serious health threat throughout the world. Sirturo seems to overcome this acquired resistance.
