# Water project progressing

The process of bringing groundwater to the Greenbelt Water Authority system is getting closer to reality this week as contractors began the process of laying pipe from Clarendon to the authority's filter plant.

Greenbelt General Manager Bobbie Kidd said Monday that the five wells in north Clarendon have all been tied together, and workers were busy laying the main line on North Sully Street that will carry the city's groundwater to the plant.

Most of the work on the wells has been completed, and the groundwater district is on board with the plan, Kidd said.

It has taken several months to bring the old wells back online since the city stopped using them in 1968, after relying on them for decades. At least one well is documented to have been dug in 1887, the same year Clarendon moved to its present location.


As part of the modern project, the wells were re-drilled and cased and tied together. Kidd said he expects to be pumping in three weeks or a month, and the groundwater will be blended with surface water from Lake Greenbelt in an effort to ease pressure on the reservoir, which has been hard hit by the ongoing drought and two summers of intense heat.

"It's still only supplemental water," Kidd said, noting that Greenbelt has plans to develop four additional wells on its property on Kelly Creek.

"We'll have a public hearing about that in May at the groundwater district," he said.

Greenbelt remains on the state's "six-month watch list" where it has been since last summer, Kidd said, and the water authority is moving forward with plans to secure additional water rights for the future.

A \$10 million application has been made to the Texas Water Development Board's Revolving Fund to develop a project to bring water from the north, but Kidd said the authority won't know the success of that application until late July of this year. In the meantime, Greenbelt is pursuing other funding sources for that project.

## **CISD** moves closer to tax rate election

Clarendon ISD Trustees reviewed a timeline that will lead to an election seeking an increase in the district's property tax rate from \$1.04 per \$100 valuation to \$1.17 when they met in regular session March 21.

Although the board still has not taken any formal action on the subject, trustees are expected to propose the \$1.17 tax rate at a called meeting on Monday, April 15, which will trigger the timeline, leading to a formal adoption of the tax rate on April 26 and causing a rollback election that will be held on Saturday, June 1.

CISD officials say raising the tax rate above the \$1.04 limit set by the state will help the district cope with reductions in state funding by bringing in about \$350,000 in new revenue. If the \$1.17 rate is proposed on April 15, the district will hold a public hearing on the rate on April 26 prior to adopting it.

In other school business, the board accepted a bid on tax delinquent property in Howardwick, for \$4,161, and listened to several administrative reports.

After meeting in closed session for an hour and a half, the board accepted letters of resignation from two retiring teachers - Lyndal Gillen and Katherine Williams - and approved the superintendent's recommendations to offer the following contracts:

by sen. john cornyn For their part, Senate Democrats have returned from a four-year budgeting hiatus to unveil a plan that would raise taxes by up to \$1.5 trillion, increase spending by 62 percent, and add \$7.3 trillion to a national debt that already eclipses our economy. Not surprisingly, their budget does not balance.

Since President Obama took office, his tax-andspend policies have given us \$6 trillion dollars in new debt, chronically high unemployment, rising insurance premiums, and a credit-rating downgrade. These are the policies that gave us a failed "stimulus" program and a government takeover of our health care system that continues to discourage job creation. With the federal government's unfunded liabilities surpassing \$100 trillion and annual interest payments on our debt exceeding \$200 billion, we simply cannot afford more of the same.

Make no mistake, this debate is not just about numbers in a ledger. It's about people. It's about the longevity of a great nation and its ability to care for its citizens. As a B-17 pilot in World War II, my father fought to ensure that his children and grandchildren could grow up in a country of prosperity; a country where hard work is dignified and opportunities abound for all. He and countless other members of that greatest generation left their country better than they found it. As I look to his grandchildren - my two daughters - I cannot help but wonder if they and their children will be able to say the same of my generation.

Every dollar this administration taxes and borrows is a dollar ransomed from the prosperity and well-being of future generations. This has created a growing economic burden that threatens the programs that Americans rely on: the Social Security checks that keep the heat on in the winter; the Medicare payments that bring comfort to the elderly, and the Medicaid services that assist our citizens who need their country's help the most. If we continue down the President's path, these programs will not exist when the children and young adults of today enter retirement.

As a parent, I want nothing but the best for my children. As an American, I want to see my country prosper and protect her citizens. As a senator, I cannot stand by and watch this administration wage war on America's youth.

This is why I have sponsored a Constitutional amendment to require the federal government to balance its budget. We must ensure that our country lives within its means, lest we rob future generations of the quality of life that is an American's birthright. This is a moral obligation, and if we fail to meet it we will have spoiled the gifts of American prosperity that have been nurtured and handed down to us, generation after generation.

The Balanced Budget Amendment, which is backed by every Republican senator, is a sincere approach to putting our fiscal house in order. The alternative couldn't be clearer: more debt, more fiscal cliffs, and a one-way ticket to a Europeanstyle meltdown. Rather than wage more political battles while we jeopardize our children's future, policymakers must face these issues with the honesty, the moral clarity, and the determination they demand.





## A careful look at homicide and guns

Since the horrible school shooting in Connecticut, much has been said and written about guns, and their constitutional protection. Their availability to Americans has been debated, argued about, discussed, and cussed, with little effect on current gun laws. This is good. The last thing we need is a bunch of knee-jerk reactions that result in poorly thought out and poorly constructed new laws needlessly going on the books.

David Brooks, the conservative op-ed columnist of the New York times recently wrote a column that sheds an insightful and cogent light on the role that guns play in killings, whether single homicides or mass murders. His insight merits sharing.

Brooks suggests that the recent shootings are not the result of our gun ownership; in fact guns are not the ultimate culprit in those vile murders. He adds that there are other considerations, referred to as a "killing chain" that is involved in these horrific acts of depravity. In short, there is a complex series of links leading up to the homicides.

The killers come from different neighborhoods, family backgrounds, cultures, gangs, and mental states. Mr. Brooks suggests that we need to consider how the killers got into crime, prior arrests, prison time, drug use, etc. We need to consider how the murder weapon was acquired, what sort of police presence there was, and what incited the murders.

In other words, we need to consider most of the killings? a long, complex killing chain, an integrated series of links leading up to the killing. Brooks adds, "Over the past 25 years, American authorities have tried to interrupt that killing chain at almost every link except one. In a hodgepodge but organic manner, there have been vast changes in proactive policing, mentoring programs, gang eradication programs, incarceration rates, cultural attitudes, and so on. The only step in the killing chain that we haven't really touched is gun acquisition."

He adds that federal gun laws have become more permissive over the last

have decreased significantly over the same period of time. So, it can't be the increased availability of guns. So, what is it?

According to Brooks, the de facto

approach - influencing the entire killing chain except gun acquisition - has nonetheless contributed to a phenomenal decline in gun violence. He adds that murder rates across the land have fallen by 50 percent, back to levels not seen since the administration of John Kennedy. He adds, "Thousands of people are alive today because homicide rates dropped so precipitously."

The recent massacres have resulted in yet another debate about gun violence. If our society was purely rational, which it isn't, this debate would have started with a series of questions: What is the reason for the dramatic drop in gun violence? What can we do to continue lowering the murder rate even more? Brooks suggested that these general questions would have led to a series of more specific questions about police procedures, probably the most direct way to prevent shootings. How can we focus police resources on those areas that host

In a recent study, Robert Maranto of the University of Arkansas pointed out that New York police chiefs and precinct leaders are held accountable for changes in the murder rate in their areas. New York has seen an 80 percent drop in the homicide rate. Why aren't police officials in other areas of the country held to similar requirements?

These questions are rarely asked by politicians and gun opponents. Instead, they focus on just one area of the killing chain, the acquisition of guns.

According to David Brooks, "The reality is that gun acquisition is probably the link on the killing chains least amein a country that already has about 250 million guns floating around. And, it's almost impossible to retroactively get a grip on them. There is no way we could, or should, take them out of circulation.

not even slightly reduced gun violence. Brooks reminds us that the Gun Control Act of 1968, the Brady Act of 1993, and the Assault Weapons Ban of 1994 all failed to reduce homicides significantly. Actually, a 2002 study by the American Medical Association found that the Brady Law did not lead to a reduction in the overall murder rate.

According to Brooks, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention did an analysis of 51 studies of a series of gun control regulations. It could not find evidence to prove the effectiveness of gun control laws. A 2012 study conducted at Arizona State University and the University of Cincinnati found that waiting periods and background checks had little statistical effect on gun crimes.

Brooks concluded, "We have a successful history of reducing gun violence by spreading efforts across the killing chain. We have a disappointing history of trying to reduce violence with a gunobsessed approach. Let's focus on what works."

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
## Hedley's athlete signs to play for **Wayland Baptist**

A four week Basic Computer class will be starting on April 8 for those who need to help using a



There are 10 computers available to the general public-plus a copier, printer and fax machine for public use.





# Drugs in the News

### New Acne Treatment for Young Children

Recently, the FDA approved Epiduo (adapalene 0.1%/ benzoyl peroxide 2.5%) gel to treat acne in children as young as 9 years old. Clinical trials showed that the gel was safe, effective and improved acne conditions in children with early acne. 

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

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#### NOTICE OF COMPLIANCE TARIFF FILING

Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) on March 19, 2013, its Petition requesting approval of its proposed Military Base Surcharge Tariff.

Section 36.354(a) of the Public Utility Regulatory Act (PURA), at Texas Utilities Code § 36.354, provides that each electric utility in an area where implementation of full customer choice has been delayed by the Commission in accordance with PURA Section 39.103 shall discount charges for electric service provided to a military base. Section 36.354(b) of PURA establishes the discount to be provided to military installations as a 20 percent reduction of the base commercial rate that the electric utility would otherwise charge to the installation.

Section 36.354(c) of PURA provides that the electric utility may assess a surcharge to all its Texas retail customers to recover the difference in revenue between the revenues from the discounted rate for military bases and the base commercial rate. Tariff Sheet No. IV-16 provides the Military Base Adjustment Factor per billing kWh as reflected below:
