Dr. Allen Speaker For C of C Banquet

Dr. Charles Allen, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Houston, will be special guest speaker at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet, Friday night, February 21, at 8 p.m.

Dr. Allen is pastor of the First Methodist Church of Houston. This church has a membership of 9,100. The sanctuary seats 2,000 and it is necessary to have duplicate Sunday morning services to have room for the people who attend. His service is televised each Sunday morning over Station KTRK-TV.

Dr. Allen moved to Houston from the Grace Methodist Church in Atlanta, Ga. Under his ministry, Grace Church became the largest Methodist church in the southeast.

He was born and reared in Georgia, the son of a minister. He is a graduate of Young Harris College, Wofford College, and the School of Theology of Emory University. He holds

the degree of Doctor of Divinity from both Piedmont College and Emory University and the degree of Doctor of Laws from John Brown University. He is a member of Phi Beta Kappa, and he is listed in Who's Who in America.

Dr. Allen is the author of twenty books, all of which have been best sellers in the religious field. He writes a column for the Houston Chronicle, the Dallas Times-Herald and other newspapers.

Time Magazine said of him: "The success story of Charles L. Allen is not the result of rafter ringing oratory. He speaks simply, seldom raises his voice and uses few gestures. He emphasizes Christian daily living and prayer. He is inclined to say simply, 'You'll be happier if you live this way.'"

Dolph Briscoe, Jr. was speaker at the banquet at which the State winner, Donald J. Wright of Dimmitt, was named.

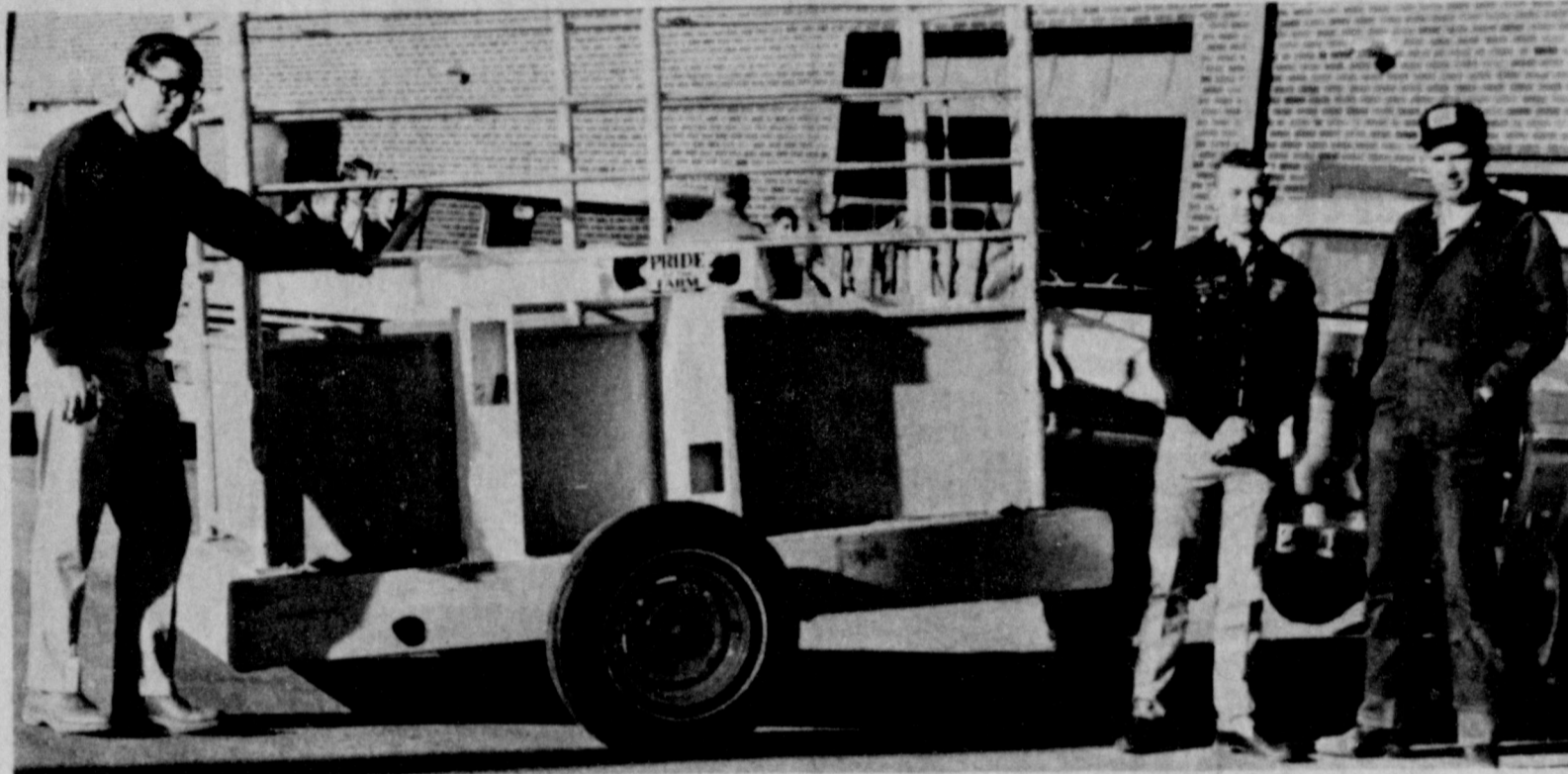

Recently, the Bailey County Young Farmers Organization has been doing custom farm work and accepting donations in order to buy a portable livestock scale for the 4-H Clubs and FFA Clubs in Bailey County.

Young Farmers and supporters of the organization donated the use of equipment and labor to perform custom farm operations so funds could be raised for the purchase of the scales. Ben Roming, Pat Vinson, Jimmy Black, Marshall Head, Kenny Wells, Phil Garrett, Edward Wueflein and Lloyd Throckmorton performed the custom farm operations after arrangements were coordinated through the Chamber of Commerce office.

Rotary Club Hears Address On Alcoholism

Members of the Rotary Club heard special guest speaker, Marshall Mullins from Odessa who spoke on the "Disease of Alcoholism" at their noon meeting on Tuesday.

Gil Lamb introduced Mullins, who told the group that three percent of all alcoholics are on skid row and the remainder is in everyday life.

He said that alcoholism is the fourth greatest health problem in the United States and less is being done to remove the stigma of the disease through research.

Bringing out the point that an alcoholic cannot take one drink and quit, he further said that like the "pot smoker" who eventually will get on something stronger, the alcoholic will become firmly hooked.

Mullins said, "An alcoholic must first admit he is an alcoholic, and ask himself what he really thinks of himself, then he is ready for help."

Alcoholics live for today, said Mullins. Forget yesterday and tomorrow isn't here yet, he said.

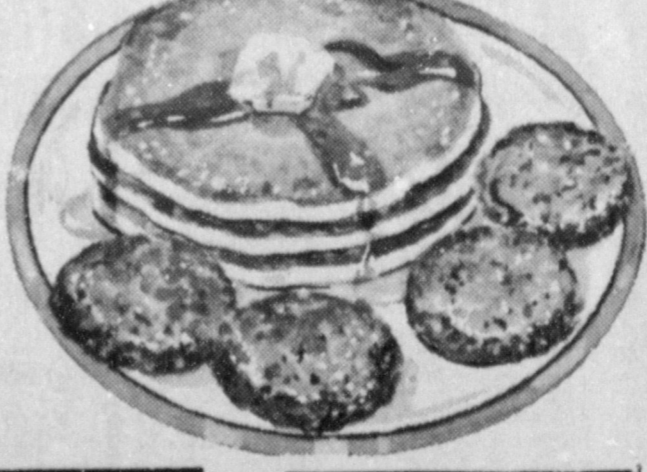

★ Q's and A's ★

Q - I have been waiting to file my 1968 income tax return until I receive a statement from the Veterans Administration as to the amount of service-connected disability compensation when may I expect this statement?
A - Since your service-connected disability compensation is not taxable, you will not receive any statement from VA and need not delay filing your return.

Among these exempt veterans' benefits are pension payments, educational assistance allowances, grants for specially equipped homes and cars for the severely disabled, and payments to surviving dependents of deceased veterans.
The only reportable item is the interest earned on G. I. insurance dividends left as deposit or credit with VA. This interest is not considered a veteran's benefit and must be reported as income.

Q-I neglected to have some needed dental work done while in the Army because I was anxious to get out of service. Can I get treatment from the Veterans Administration? I have been out of service three months.

A-Under a new VA policy, a veteran may receive such treatment, without regard to supporting military records, if he applies within six months after release from service, and if it is determined professionally within eight months after separation that the condition is service-connected.

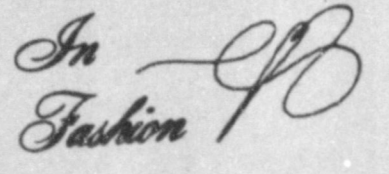

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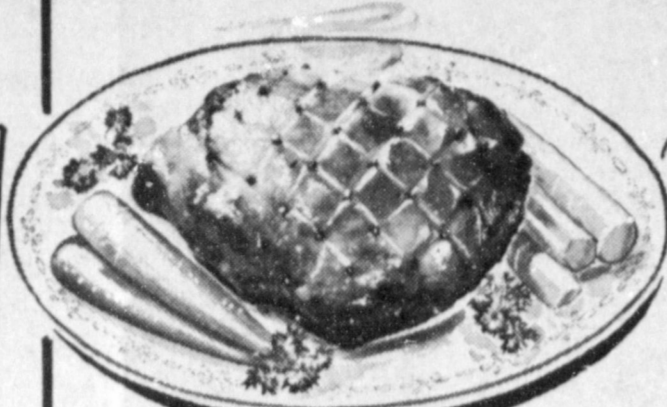


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
